

Another month has come and gone, and we are entering the last part of 2020. Time really does pass so quickly, and may we be busy serving where the Lord has us. This update will share current prayer requests as well as current updates.

This past month has been very busy. So many things to do. We made a big "to do" list, and you never really realize what a job it is until you start shutting down for furlough. Various insurances to be paid, trying to find someone to stay in our house while we are away, arranging for paying bills here while we are in America, and the list goes on and on. It can be overwhelming and you have to take one thing at a time. We are thankful to have neighbors now so if there are any urgent matters, they can inform and assist us.

We also were working on our work permits that expire next April. We did get the documentation done, and there are just a few minor items to send in soon. We are thankful for the progress that we made on the permits, and ask that you would pray with us that they will be renewed without any issues.

RENEWING WORK PERMITS & PLANNING FOR FURLOUGH

In health news, I (Nathan) had to see a dermatologist recently and she recommended the removal of seven different moles. There is a history of melanoma in the family, so I need to be seen regularly and need to be careful with sun exposure. I did have all seven moles removed and have been able to recover well, for which I am thankful. The sun is strong here in Kenya and you need to take precautions. Thanks for your prayers in regards to not only my health, but the health of the entire family.

Speaking of health, the coronavirus cases as of the date of this letter are nearly 35,000. We are thankful that Kitale has been spared the brunt of the cases, and please be in prayer for various areas of Kenya which have seen a spike in cases, mainly Nairobi, the capital city. It is still advisable to

wear a mask, sanitize, social distance, and avoid large gatherings as much as possible. All of these are the standard health precautions. We know it is similar in America as well, and you are in our thoughts and prayers regarding the coronavirus.

There is still more to do, even working on my missions presentation, trying to get the missions video done in the near future, etc. In all these duties, I am reminded of Ecclesiastes 9:10a, which says "Whatsoever thy hand findeth to do, do it with thy might." Also I like the verses of Colossians 3:23-24, which say, "And whatsoever ye do, do it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men; Knowing that of the Lord ye shall receive the reward of the inheritance: for ye serve the Lord Christ." May these verses remind us of Who we serve, and the proper attitude for service.

This is especially close to me as I served with the Lexington Fire Department for 23 years before I surrendered to the call to be a missionary to Brasil. It has been another month for planning and preparation, but before I get into that I need to tell you about an interruption that has happened to me this month. While doing some clean up on the property here in Lexington I had an accident. I was removing some tree limbs from a trailer and lost my balance and began to fall. This planning involves choosing the locations, the professors, the translators, and the tech support people. We have completed our first virtual class. There were some minor glitches but we are getting them corrected. So, we have the first of many under our belt and looking forward to many more.

It is with much appreciation and gratitude that I express our love and prayers to all of you who sponsor, support, and loyally give to BFM. During this pandemic we appreciate even more your financial support as we know you have families and it gets harder to continue your outside giving. So, one more time THANK YOU for your financial support and prayerful intercession for our ministry.

Praise the Lord, the six of us remain in overall good health during this pandemic lockdown. Not that we have not encountered a few occurrences during the last few weeks. About two weeks ago, Benjamin suffered a muscle trauma in his right foot while playing basketball. Based on the pain, we suspected he could have a hairline fracture in his foot, but the x-ray confirmed otherwise. The doctor prescribed painkillers, and no running or jumping until it heals. Melissa underwent an infected tooth treatment at the dentist. I have faced a couple of acute allergy attacks during this last month. The intense sneezing left me feeling mulched and beaten by day's end - as if I had been through the meat grinder a couple of times. Thankfully, this was about it during this month.

As a prevention remedy to COVID-19, we are taking a what was once an "over the counter" medica-

tion. A childhood friend (who holds a doctorate in biochemistry and is a university professor) suggested we take this specific medication after his research team reached empirical research results indicating its efficacy against the virus. We truly are grateful to the Lord for caring for us. We have multiple encounters with infected people, but none of us have caught it (or, if we have, it has been asymptomatic).

EXERCISE

All of us have gained a few pounds during this COVID "stay at home" season. About 8 weeks ago, I was challenged by my son (Benjamin - 12 years old). He asked for us to wake-up an hour earlier each day to go running. I agreed to the challenge. We often take Maggie (our Golden Retriever) with us, as she is also needing the exercise. There is a large pond not far from our home that is a popular destination for runners and exercise enthusiasts. The first few days of running were the toughest, but we have gained momentum with the "new" routine. Benjamin and I get a chance to talk about all kinds of topics. He is not running now, at least until his foot fully heals.

SCHOOL

The new school year is up and running for all four of our children,

albeit it continues as distancelearning via online classes. Sarah is a freshman in highschool, Laura is in 8th, Benjamin in 6th and Melissa in 3rd grades. Government authorities keep postponing the return dates for school to resume on-campus class-

es. Our kids are ready to get back to "normal" at school and regular activities. Unfortunately, getting back to "normal" may take its own good time.

MINISTRY

This last Sunday was a full one. I preached at the morning service at Maria Virginia Baptist Church and went to a luncheon/afternoon gathering at our home. Pastor Helder is doing a great job as the new lead pastor of the "Maria Virginia" Church. Just last month a couple surrendered to Christ. Everyone was excited with the great news! We definitely celebrate new life in Christ.

We continue to follow-up with people through social media plat-



tions with folks. There are a lot of high-risk people we minister to within our ministry. Although, a lot of people we connect with have already caught COVID and have returned from selfisolation.

HALLENGES IN RESUMING SERVICES

September 22, 2020 Dear Brethren,

Greetings from the lockdown in the rainforest: Cruzeiro do Sul. My davs alternate between "frustrated" and "angry". Our timid (spineless) governor has tightened the shutdown even against the data that show we should be moving toward normal.

We had already authorized our congregations out of town and our chapels in town to resume services, as I reported last month. Three weeks ago, we had our first (limited) Sunday school. After our weekly pastor's meeting, we had decided to have a Sunday morning service of just an hour (9:00AM), but without publicizing the first one. If the news leaked and folks showed up, then fine. It did leak and we had 191 present. We followed the state rules as close as possible. The next week we had a 20% increase. The third week another 44% increase over the previous week. There were 329 for that service.

Then the state brought down a new law requiring ALL citizens in the Acre to wear a mask in all public and PRI-VATE places. It is now illegal to eat or shower without a mask if you follow the law as written. The next Sunday morning we had only 225, a 30% drop in attendance.

For the past 2 plus months I have been getting data on the state of the pandemic in Cruzeiro do Sul. The daily cases have dropped way down. Hospitalizations, which had been in the hundreds is now down to 7. There have been 4 deaths in over 2 months. There had been as many as 6 deaths weekly 3 months ago.

The "tyranny of the mask" as I call it, has kept me oscillating between frustrated and angry. I called off the livestream of our services until this is past. The livestream could bring the authorities down on us, if they saw anyone without a mask in the auditorium. I refuse to comply and certainly refuse to preach in a mask. Now I am back in the studio recording messages and lessons for all those who are afraid to come to church. We continue to have live services, but I must also prepare duplicate lessons and sermons for those too timid to get out or for the few who are hindered by some other high-risk factor.

One of the pastors wants us to follow the letter of the law, which is impossible. He comes to staff meetings in a huge cannister mask, face shield and gloves. The other 6 pastors take it in stride, even though we can't understand a word of what he says during the meetings! All of us get along fine though and do the best with all of this mess around us.

To end on a better note: We have added some new members by letter. Then on Sunday we presented a new baby that was born during the pandemic. Of course, that too is illegal as no children are allowed (according to the law) to be present. Someone more important than the governor once said, "Let the little ones come unto me." I think letting them come to His house counts, too.

Pray that we will be able to be faithful and continue to do our best for Christ and His kingdom.

Thanks for all of your prayers and support. God bless you as much as He has us.

May we explain the importance of the Thanksgiving Offering for the continued support of your missionaries? And may we invite you to join us this year in giving to supply the benefits and services we have committed to our missionaries?! Thank you!

1. "WHY DO WE HAVE A THANKSGIVING OFFER-ING?"

We have a Thanksgiving Offering because WE NEED IT for the coming year to supply the financial commitments we have made to our missionaries for the services and benefits we provide from a common contribution receptacle account called the "Mis-sionary Support Fund." The monthly contributions we receive for the Missionary Support Fund are not sufficient to supply ALL of the benefits and services we commit to provide for our missionaries. So, we NEED the Thanksgiving Offering to supplement the monthly Missionary Support Fund offerings.

2. "WHY IS THE THANKSGIVING OFFERING SO **IMPORTANT?**"

The Thanksgiving Offering is ESSENTIAL because it is the only source of funds for supplying many of our missionaries' needs during the coming year. Those services and benefits NOT sufficiently funded by monthly offerings to the Missionary Support Fund are supplied by contributions received in the Thanksgiving Offering.

3. "WHAT SERVICES AND BENEFITS DOES THE THANKSGIVING OFFERING HELP PROVIDE?"

The Thanksgiving Offering enables us to provide the services and benefits we have committed to our missionaries "as the Lord provides" - in addition to

monthly salary, housing and ministry allowances, and hospitalization. These benefits include: • reimbursements for missionaries' Furlough (Home Assignment) airfare/transportation expenses to and from the field

• reimbursements for their hospitalization personal deductibles for the year (their personal deductible is \$1000 and we reimburse them \$600 of that amount)

• children's school/education expenses (if funds are available)

• expenses for mailing *BFM News & Reports* (mis-sionaries' monthly letters, reports, updates -- and a brief summary report of all offerings given through BFM that month)

• expenses for maintaining Stateside office for communication and daily services – there are a lot of activities that go on Stateside to keep our missionaries functioning on their fields of service

4. "HOW ELSE IS THE MISSIONARY SUPPORT FUND SUPPLIED?"

The primary supply for the Missionary Support Fund is from monthly offerings that are given to the Missionary Support Fund. These monthly Mission-Missionary Support Fund. These monthly Mission-ary Support Fund offerings are used to supply the "Essential Missionary Support" [EMS] that we have committed to the missionaries for their standard essential monthly expenses. These include: • their monthly salary • their monthly standard housing allowance • their monthly standard ministry allowance • their monthly hospitalization premium • expenses for printing BFM News & Reports – their monthly newsletters, reports, and updates We just wish to reiterate – and we cannot over-empha-size – that we have no sources of funding for these

size - that we have no sources of funding for these

committed benefits other than the monthly Missionary Support Fund and the Thanksgiving Offering. If we do not receive the necessary funding through these two contribution streams, we cannot disburse the benefits.

5. "WHY IS THE THANKSGIVING OFFERING GIVEN AT THE THANKSGIVING SEASON?"

• The BFM Thanksgiving Offering began many years ago in conjunction with the annual Thanksgiv-ing Missionary Conference in the Detroit-area and has continued that way to this day.

Also, the Thanksgiving season is good reminder of the thanks we owe God for His Indescribable Gift in Jesus Christ – and our Thanksgiving Offering is a good way to express that thanks.
 And, the Thanksgiving season and Offering is a good accession for us to give missionary offerings

a good occasion for us to give missionary offerings so others, also, may hear the blessed Good News of salvation through Christ...and, in this way, share our Thanksgivings to God with others and MUL-TIPLY STILL MORE THANKSGIVINGS TO GOD. • See 2 Corinthians 9.11-15

You can also give online at www.bfmnow.org and click on 'Donate/Support' and *designate for 'Thanks-giving Offering' in the memo field*.

8. "CAN I GIVE MY THANKSGIVING OFFERING ONLY AROUND THANKSGIVING ... OR DURING **NOVEMBER?**

No. Many churches and individual Friends of BFM give on or around "Thanksgiving Sunday." How-ever, offerings begin coming in before November and continue to come in to the Treasurer during the months following November, and sometimes on into the next year. You can give your Thanksgiv-ing Offering any time. But, all offerings designated "Thanksgiving Offering" go toward the same collective Offering for that year.

9. "HOW IS THE "EVERY FRIEND A GIVING FRIEND" PERSONAL GIVING MINISTRY PERTINENT TO THE THANKSGIVING OFFERING?" We introduced the "EVERY FRIEND A GIVING FRIEND" ministry and plan during the 2003 Thanks-giving Conference. "Every Friend a Giving Friend" encourages each of our missionaries' friends to personally participate in regular giving to the Mispersonally participate in regular giving to the Mis-sionary Support Fund. This plan is nothing new or unique; it is just another way to express and articu-late what the Friends of BFM have been doing since the inception of the Mission.



It is also patterned after the instructions Paul gives us in 2 Corinthians 8 and 9: that is,

1. to purpose in your heart to give an offering (9:7)

2. to give as generous an offering as God enables
you (8:1-3 & 9:6)
3. to ask God – and trust Him – to supply you
with the funds you will need to give the offering (9:8)
4. to plan and begin preparing even a ward bead

4. to plan and begin preparing even a year ahead of time (as Paul instructed the Corinthians and the other churches to do) (8:10-11 & 9:2) 5. to give your offerings to the Lord and to the Lord's missionaries willingly and cheerfully (9:7) 6. to express your love and obedience to the Lord

through your generous giving (8:8 & 9:13) 7. to give as your response to Jesus Christ's grace and gift of Himself to you (8:9 & 9:15)

We encourage every Friend of BFM to be a **Giving Friend** and give a personal Thanksgiving Offering to help supply our missionaries' needs that are met through the monthly Missionary Support Fund.

"EVERY FRIEND A GIVING FRIEND" also challenges each Friend of BFM to personally participate in mis-sions by giving monthly offerings over and above the regular tithes and offerings you give to your church to meet the needs of your local church's ministries. We encourage each **Giving Friend** to make a personal commitment to either begin giving or increase your giving each month to the Missionary Support Fund.

10. "WHY DO YOU SET GOALS FOR THE THANKS-GIVING OFFERING?"

We set goals because the goal amount is keyed to the projected needs we expect to provide for the coming year of missionary ministry. And, when we increase the commitments, services, and benefits we give our missionaries so they can better fulfill their ministries, our needs for the necessary funds increase also.

And, please remember with us that we cannot approve and commit to increasing the services and benefits we provide for our missionaries unless we believe the Lord will supply those funds through your giving.

OUR 2020-21 THANKSGIVING OFFERING GOAL IS \$50,000.00.

Would you please pray and ask the Lord of the Harvest what he would have you give to this year's Thanks-giving Offering? And then ask Him also to supply you with that gift from his inexhaustible resources of Grace?

However, only \$28,459.90 of this total amount was given for the *Missionary Support Fund*. The remaining \$29,663.72 of the total amount contributed was designated for various other funds [\$8,098.50] or to the missionaries by name [\$21,565.50] for various specified designations.

WHY IS THIS SO IMPORTANT? It is so critically important because the way Baptist Faith Missions functions is that: when we assume full-time support for a missionary, that missionary's monthly support commitments are supplied from the *Missionary Support Fund*. In other words, the missionary does not 'raise' his own essential support funds. BFM commits to disburse these essential maintenance services "as the Lord provides." Then, we pray fervently to God, appeal to you, and trust the Lord to work in your hearts to help us provide these commitments to your missionaries by contributing to the *Missionary Support Fund*.

Therefore, contributions that are given to the missionary by name for specific work projects, the generic "as needed," or for "personal" use are NOT allocated toward providing for that missionary's essential, base support disbursements.

The accrued total that we have disbursed this month [August] just for the missionaries' essential maintenance services is \$33,761.36. This is supplied from the *Missionary Support Fund*.

For example, we have eight [8] current full-time missionary families. Each of those missionaries receives a base essential support disbursement of \$4,150.00 per month. Here's how that breaks down:

\$ 1900 = base support

- \$ 750 = housing/ministry expenses allowance
- \$ 1500 = paid medical insurance

Plus, there are other necessary expenditures

\$58,123.62 that are essential to implementing the logistics and administration of their support services. This month, we have disbursed over \$5000.00 to provide our missionaries with additional benefits and services to assist in their support.

All this to take you back to the top and note again that \$28,459.90 was given this month to the Missionary Support Fund.

While we recognize and acknowledge that our missionaries need and can use ALL contributions given to them for whatever purpose, we still want to emphasize that the only way we can fulfill the essential, bottom-line commitments we have made to them is for sufficient contributions to be made to the *Missionary Support Fund*.

So, PLEASE! May we appeal to you to make a commitment to help provide for your missionaries' on-going support by giving generously and faithfully to the *Missionary Support Fund*! Is your missionaries' ministries important enough to you to give, say, \$1 a day, or \$30 per month to the Missionary Support Fund?

And, we express our heartfelt gratitude to all our faithful friends who do give sacrificially and consistently to the *Missionary Support Fund*!

August 31, 2020 Dear Friends,

It is so wonderful to be back to having worship services together with our brothers and sisters in Christ in person. We are glad that we got the opportunity to learn how to use technology to increase our outreach while in quarantine, but

nothing replaces the warmth of physical fellowship.

The great majority of our members are attending regularly and we have quite a few new people attending. Or at least I think they are new people. With everyone wearing masks, it is sometimes hard to identify everyone. We are hoping that this safety measure and municipal requirement will soon be removed.

Charlene and I had an opportunity to

minister to a young man named Elizeu a couple of weeks ago. Elizeu's story is such a testimony to God's grace and power. For several years he suffered from debilitating headaches and seizures. The doctors discovered that he had a tumor on his brain that was causing this and they were able to remove it. Because of Elizeu's gratitude to God for relief from his suffering, he offered to work as an unpaid volunteer for a social services organization that helps the underprivileged and shares the gospel.

Neither Charlene nor I knew Elizeu or anything about him before, but one of our church members heard that his family was in great need and asked if we would make a visit. It was suggested to us to donate some special medical supplies and nutri-

tional supplements that he needed. I don't like to just throw money at people's circumstances without using the opportunity to speak of Christ's love and grace. That was our intention when we went to visit Elizeu and his family. Instead, God spoke to us through Elizeu. This man had lived years with great suffering. A successful surgery had relieved that, but then he discovered that he had cancer in his stomach and it had to be removed. It would be easy to understand how someone in his circumstances could become bitter or cynical, but not Elizeu. We went to his home to minister to him, to share a word of hope, but it was he who ministered to us. We did deliver the medi-

cal and nutritional supplies to him, but God delivered to us a message of courage, faith and joy in suffering that we've rarely seen. Most of this man's life has been one of hardship and pain, but he was so grateful to God for his salvation and for his purpose in life to tell of God's goodness that we were amazed. Humanly speaking, Elizeu's life expectancy isn't very promising, but, WOW!, what a life lived for God's glory!

Because of COVID-19 and the cancellation

of the in-person school year, our traveling outreach team won't be able to get into public schools until next February. We have been praying for and working on ways to get the gospel message out and we have found some that, we believe, will be used of the Lord. The whole country is tired of being cooped up indoors and we are planning some outdoor presentations of skits and gospel films in public parks where people are gathering. Our volunteers are trained to interact with the spectators at these events and seek opportunities to share the gospel one-on-one. Please pray that the Lord will help us to be successful in these endeavors.
