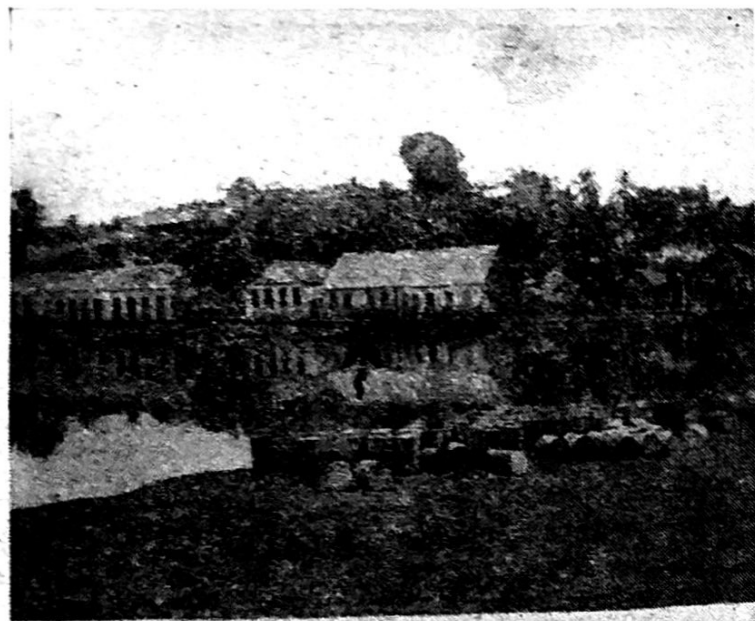

This is a picture of the Mission Hall in Cruzeiro do Sul, Acre Territory of Brazil. The arrow is pointing to the hall which is in the very center of picture. This picture was taken at high water time. There is a board walk in front of the house on posts and the water in under the walk. This is a creek that flows through Cruzeiro do Sul separating the town into two parts. This creek flows into the Jurua River about a hundred yards or more to the left. Cruzeiro do Sul is very hilly. This is one of the very best locations in the town. It is near the main market and the people who come into town from this side of the creek, all pass in front of the hall. Brother Paul Calley has had a new palm leaf roof put on the house and has torn out the partition, and is having some new posts put under the house, and a new floor put in and toilets installed in the rear for both men and women, new benches with backs are being built. This is where the gospel is preached every night in the week, except when the missionary is on a journey in his houseboat. Many souls have been saved in this building. When the water is low, you see only a gully-like creek with the water a few inches deep in it. One year ago when we were here we hung our hammocks and slept in this building.

## Bro. Royal Calley Tells Experiences Of His Trip Coming Home By Plane

Dear Friends:

I have now been home (in the U. S.) for sometime. We had a pleasant trip home, but it was sad to leave those whom we love so much there. About two weeks before we left Brazil, my brother, Paul and family came down from Cruzeiro do Sul (an all day flight by flying boat) to see us. It was certainly good to see him again, but he was pale from recent sickness, malaria and yellow jaundice, and had lost quite a bit of weight. He seemed to be picking up though the time he was there.

We let our house, that we had rented, go and stored our things in the house of Brother John Dias. He has a new house now that was built just before we left. The last night we were in Manaus we had a joint service of the Tabernacle and Calvary churches. It was sweet sorrow, so Shakespeare might say. I cannot put into words what those people mean to me. They are among the finest on earth. I particularly hated to leave the preacher brethren. They all have a special place in my heart.

The next morning we went to the airport to take our plane to Belem. We all could not help but to cry as we said good-bye. I watched my brother Paul and family, and the others from the window of the plane as we were preparing to take off, and it

seemed that I was leaving part of myself there with them.

We flew in a four engine Constellation plane from Manaus to Belem, and made the thousand mile trip in two hours and forty-five minutes. The trip in the two-engine flying boats takes about nine hours.

When we arrived in Belem we registered at the Grande Hotel. It is a very nice place, run by Pan American. The next morning I went down to the American Consulate to have my passport renewed and while there they told me to go and get a clearance for our children that were born in Brazil. That was when the trouble began. They said that we could not take them out of the country as they were Brazilian citizens. The hospital in Manaus had never given us birth certificates and we needed them, so I had to phone my brother Paul in Manaus by radio, and he went to John Bentes' father who is the treasurer of the hospital and got the birth certificates in a few hours.

Paul took them to the airport and gave them to a crew member of the plane that was leaving for Belem, and I met the plane at the airport and got the certificates and took them to the proper authorities. Then we ran into every kind of delay and had to cancel our flight from Belem to New York.

It took many trips to straighten out the clearance on my income tax papers. I needed a witness and by the providence of God, I met another Baptist missionary, who was the only person I knew in Belem. He helped me by signing for me to guarantee that I was not leaving Brazil owing any debts. I had given blood for a transfusion for his wife when she was about to die when they lived in Manaus, and now he was doing me a favor.

Since we had cancelled our reservation on the plane for New York it was very difficult to get reservations for a man, wife and five children on the next plane, and we did not know when we would leave until a few hours before flight time. The trip home was very pleasant. We had tourist tickets, but since there were some sleeping berths empty on the plane, the steward asked if we would like to put our children to bed. We did and all had a good nights sleep.

We landed in New York at six o'clock in the evening and it seemed so strange to see all the movements of Americans again. We had to wait until 11 o'clock that night and took an airplane for Detroit and home. The city looked very pretty, all lit up as we flew in.

## Veteran Missionary, R. P. Hallum, Writes Of Experiences In Peru

If I was coming back to Peru again, the only things that I would bring in the way of household articles, etc., would be a refrigerator and washing machine, these are the only two necessary articles that I can think of that can not be replaced by merchants and others here in Peru, perhaps these can be bought in Brazil as Para and Manaus are much larger cities than Iquitos, in fact these articles can be purchased in Iquitos but they are small sized, I should have added bed springs and inner spring mattresses. I would bring these four articles to Peru.

As to other household articles it is nonsense to bring them, as

everything that a Missionary has to have can be acquired right here and delivered to your house. At the time we arrived the first time at Iquitos, Peru, none of these articles could be acquired. For four years we slept on hay mattresses and cooked on a crude homemade cook stove made by a native. My wife cooked some real delicious food on that old homemade stove. You can still get them here more modernized. We lived, sleeping on hay mattresses and cooking on a homemade stove and were no more the worse off. Of course we all prefer a modern range cook stove with kerosene as fuel, but there was no kerosene in those days. We had to use carbon.

Now we can get a modern cook stove for kerosene. We can order any kind of wood furniture made of some of the finest wood in the world, and fit for a king, at reasonable prices. We can order any kind of clothing suitable for the tropics, made in a few days, made to order. Everybody wears it. We can buy dishes, pots, pans, tubs, practically any thing that the heart ought to desire, and this with Soles that we bought at 19 Soles to the dollar. Clothing brought here from the States, unless it is something like seersucker is unsuitable for this climate.

If the missionary intends to be a carpenter, he can buy any kind of tools he needs to make anything he needs. If he intends to be a mechanic he can buy many modern tools used by the mechanic, but not all. Of course the tools of a mason are few and simple. The first trip that we made to Peru we brought two trunks

and a small box of books that were carried by a peon. Of course our getting through the custom house was a very simple thing. I suppose the officers were sorry for us being so poor. It did not cost us a cent. It reminds me of Jonah when the whale put him out on the shore of the Mediterranean Sea, with nothing but his clothes. All he had to do was to wash his clothes, and he was ready to go. We had \$200 that had been advanced on our salaries and naturally it had to go a long way, but the Lord provided every step of the way.

Marion, Ky., who was going to meet us at the water's edge. The Lord had a man there in the person of the British Consul who saw after us and notified an American family who were missionaries of another Mission. They came to the boat and got acquainted with us and took us into their home.

I was going along on the street one day and saw through the window a typewriter which (secondhand Underwood) was advertised for sale at \$50. I told the folk about it and they said I was mistaken. That an Underwood that was any good could not be bought for that price. We went and tried it out and it was a good machine. I bought it and it served us for about ten years, and we sold it for a good price.

After we had been in Peru about four months, I took sick with an inflammation of the bowels. We had a French doctor, who tried out several remedies, all of which gave me no relief. I was getting worse and the doctor said there was only one remedy that he could think of which was a preparation made in France. So he prescribed it. We sent to the drug store and got it. I took a dose of it according to instructions and it gave me complete relief in one or two minutes. I continued taking it and soon got well. I inquired about the same remedy some time afterward, and it could not be found, maybe the Lord had those few cans of medicine there especially for me. It was put up in a metal can which looked like an oil can.

As I contemplate on those days of smaller things materially, I can

see that we were happier and did better work than we do with so many modern advantages. We had not gone in debt for several years before, nor did we go in debt for anything then or since. I am convinced that going in debt indicates too little faith. It violates God's Word, Rom. 13:8, besides it places the debtor in the position of a servant, Prov. 22:7.

One of the things that Brother H. B. Taylor emphasized strongly was to stay out of debt. Under his leadership the First Church at Murray built a new \$70,000 building on the pay as you go plan.

It is embarrassing to see some of the experiences some Missionaries go through in getting their stuff through the custom house. The worst thing about it all is the almost necessity of paying a bribe in order to get the stuff, most everything new, that comes without a Consulars invoice is fined one-third of its value. The first refrigerator that we brought out we did not get a Consulars invoice for it which was necessary. The fellow came around to my house and said if I would pay him \$100 Soles he would bring it to my home. I was to pay it or leave the refrigerator set in the custom house. We knew nothing else to do but pay it.

Let us hear from you brother pastors. This preachers' school will have three good teachers in Royal Calley, John Hatcher and John Bentes. And we trust that many Brazilian young men will be taught the Word of God.

Don Simon was unable to make a trip one week, as a severe wind storm damaged his house considerably and he stayed to repair it.

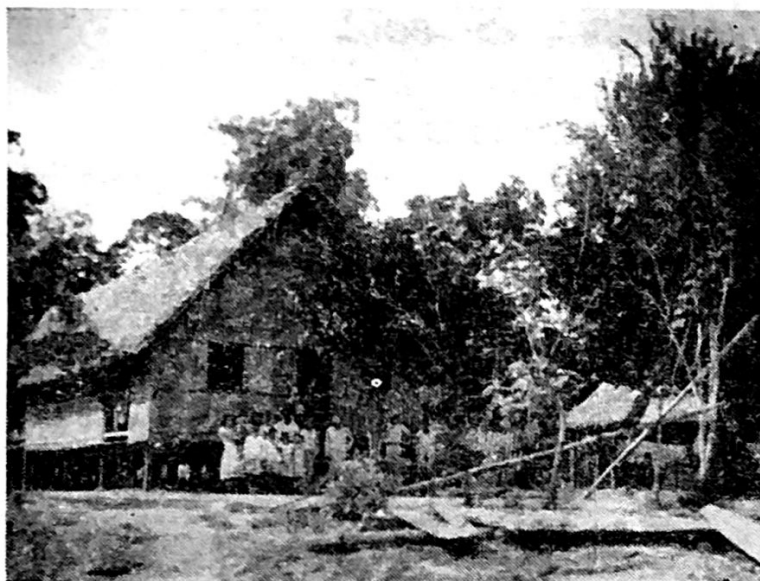

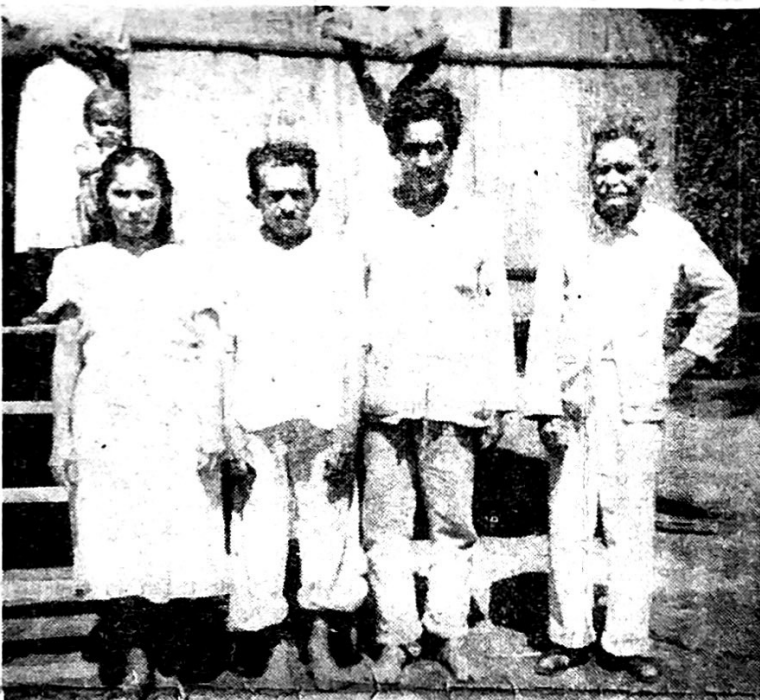

## PREACHING POINT ON JURUA RIVER



After a long journey of several days up the Jurua River in his houseboat, Brother Paul Calley stops at this house on the bank of the river for a service. The people who live near-by come at night and Leslie Paul, the missionary's son, plays the accordion and they sing the songs of Zion and then Brother Paul reads the Scripture and preaches the "Word of Life." ## Paul Calley Starts Church At Parana dos Mouros

On Tuesday, July 5, I received letters 28 and 29 dated June 20th. We thank you from the bottom of our hearts for your kind and encouraging letters. We thank the Lord that we have a brother as you have been to us and who loves his Lord and brethren in Christ, helping and encouraging them in every way he can. May the Lord reward you richly.

After a good journey we arrived in Manaus back in Cruzeiro do Sul, on June 20th and were thankful that the work here was as we left it. Everything had gone on about as we had planned it ahead of time. We were only back in Cruzeiro do Sul three days, when we left, on Friday, June 24th, with Brethren Cido and Mario to organize the church at Parana dos Mouros. We had planned on arriving there on Saturday afternoon and organize the church on Sunday, but we lost a propeller off the Penta outboard and did not arrive until Sunday afternoon. The nuts on the propeller shaft came loose and we lost the propeller in the middle of the Jurua River and could not retrieve it. I had an extra one, but it needed a bushing and I didn't have the tools to repair it. The bushing must be pressed in. I now have it repaired and also a hole bored in the shaft for a cotter pin so that the same thing won't happen again.

I had the small Archimedes outboard as a spare, so we used it to continue our journey, after working about two hours trying to repair the propeller that I had for the Penta outboard. The lit-

tle Archimedes is a wonderful little outboard, and we were surprised that it could push our big houseboat up the river like it did.

But there is nothing like the big Penta for pushing a big load and making good time. We had services at Parana Sunday night, but waited until the following Sunday, July 3, to organize the church. It was a great day for all of us, and the Lord was in our midst. We also visited Tatajuba for two days and made plans for organizing a church there the first of next month, the Lord willing.

Also we have a new preaching point at the mouth of the Parana dos Mouros River. I preached again and stayed over night at Colonia on the Jurua. We arrived back in Cruzeiro do Sul Tuesday, July 5 and have been preaching every night in the mission hall, although we have half the floor torn out. We are making progress with the mission hall and when it is finished it will really be nice, but I am having a hard time finding lumber to finish it. I will close for now and write a letter in more detail in a few days, the Lord willing.

We have been preaching every day here lately, and I don't have to tell you that that calls for a lot of study. We are very tired tonight, but happy that the Lord saved a soul tonight at the service in the mission hall.

## Carroll Hunter Amazed At Catholic Worship Of Saints

Dear Bro. Overbey:

Greetings to all in the name of our Lord. This finds us all well and happy in the Lord. There isn't too much for me to write since I don't know the language yet, but I know you are anxious to know how and what we are doing. We are studying Spanish everyday and are learning, as they say here, "poco a poco" or little by little. It seems like a long slow process, but with the Lord's help we will one day master it. We are beginning to understand a few of the things that are said as we have lessons containing the words that we hear everyday. We are studying a lot of verbs now, which seem to be the main thing in the Spanish language. I covet everyone's prayers for us that we may learn this language as quickly as possible, so we may carry the gospel to those that are dying in sin here.

We are well and happy. The children have had a round of sickness probably from the change of climate and food, but all are fine now. They seem to enjoy themselves here.

We have found us a nice house. It is practically new, but has been lived in, so for cleanliness we had it gone over with a fresh coat of paint and it really looks nice and fresh. We are anxiously awaiting the arrival of our furniture by boat.

We had a letter from the Lewises saying that they plan to leave for Lima around the last of August. We will be happy to see them and have them here with us.

We are having fine services here. A nice congregation for church and Sunday School both. This has been a big week here

for the people. One of the great Catholic "saints" has arrived. It has traveled all over the world and has now arrived here. The afternoon it arrived the people all closed up their business places to go meet her and they say some of the people passed out on the bus they were bringing her into town on. The church bells rang for a long time. All this week they have been decorating different churches and carrying her from church to church for the people to worship. They think now that their city will be greatly blessed because of this saint. There was a piece in the paper telling all the people to be sure and be at the airport to meet the Saint and worship her thereby bringing blessing upon the city. Also that the Saint herself said that by worshipping her it would bring about peace with Russia. You can see by all this how blinded the people are here. They need the Gospel. They need to know Christ as their Saviour. Everyone needs to pray for these people that they will see the truth and be saved.

Again I ask that everyone be praying for us that we will learn this language quickly. Pray for the workers here and for the salvation of souls. We always remember you all in our prayers. May the Lord richly bless all of His children all over the world and lead them in the paths He would have them to go.

I hope before long we can write about the work we are doing here. Until then we will write as much as we can. Give the Calley's our regards. May the Lord bless you and keep you in His love.

I don't know too much to write this month but will try to write a few lines. I will certainly be glad when I am able to speak Spanish well enough to get out and work among these people. I must say I really enjoy reading the Calley's letters about the work they are doing there. We rejoice that Bro. Royall Calley and his family had a safe journey home.

The services here remain about the same. The attendance fell down some the last few Sundays.

We are having one day of special services here this week. The 22nd, 23rd and 30th of this month is the Fourth of July holidays here, so Bro. Hallum has planned an all day service at the church on Friday the 29th beginning at 9:00 A. M. until 11:00 A. M., and then from 3:00 P. M. until 5:00 P. M.

If you remember Bro. Hallum wrote not too long ago about a boy making a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, but was living with a woman and not married to her, so he could not be baptized. He is planning on being married over these holidays and says he wants to be baptized then. We are praying that this is so. We know that if he is saved and wants to follow the Lord that he will want to do this. Be praying for them that the Lord will lead.

## Bro. John Bentes Writes News From Manaus, Brazil

(Brother John Bentes is one of our Brazilian Missionaries. He was saved under the ministry of Missionary Royal Calley. Brother Bentes has learned to speak English and he writes this letter in English. Note how the work is being carried on in the absence of Brother Royal Calley, who is in the U. S. on furlough. We thank God for Brother John Bentes and for his soundness in the faith and for his faithfulness. — H. H. Overbey.)

My prayers to our God is that we all, Christ's co-heirs, may enjoy His control through the Spirit.

This is to tell you that the Mission is registered before the Brazilian government already, as Brother Paul might have written you. I have the documents in hand. Would something else be done you should write me, brother.

The work here is going fine. We have public services five times a week. Notwithstanding, we have witnessed only a few professions. Brothers John Dias and Hermogenes take care of "Matinha," where our church is built. Brother Miguel, a young preacher, stopped preaching in "Flores." We don't know whether he is going to open another preaching point or not. In the new-open area named "Petropolis" we are evangelizing in co-operation with the Tabernacle Baptist Church. This is the place where our church is building a new temple. Brother Manuel Lima and I have two places under our responsibility: "Estrada dos Franceses" and "Sao Francisco," where I live. I am preaching also downtown, in the market place.

Brother Lima made a trip, two weeks ago to Parintins, a city near Manaus. There he met some so-called Baptists. Brother Lima has not much knowledge in the Bible, but he could see the difference between our doctrine and theirs. Brother Lima told us that he preached and there was one profession of faith. Thank God!

Dear brother, I'm thinking seriously of marrying sister Elh. She is a good Christian; she is willing to obey everything Jesus taught us to observe. She is a member in our church. You must remember how I almost married an unsaved girl. But I thought better about II Cor. 6:14-18, and decided since a long time ago, not to marry her. I know I obeyed my Jesus and, although I am still unmarried, my conscience is much lighter than if I had married that girl.

I hope my marriage be to glory and honor of our Father.

## BROTHER MIGUEL IBERNON AND FAMILY



This is Brother Miguel Ibernnon, wife, and seven children, standing in front of the mud house they live in. The girl on the extreme right and the tall girl in the rear, third from the right, are neighbor children. The other seven are the Ibernnon children. Brother Miguel and wife have had twelve children, but five of them have died. His wife is expecting her thirteenth child the month of August, the Lord willing. Note the mud house. Poles or boards are put up and mud is put between them like plaster and it hardens. Brother Miguel is pastor of the church at Codajaz, three hundred miles up the Amazon River above Manaus. This house is owned by a Catholic and he notified Brother Miguel to move. A new parsonage is being built on the lot with the new church building for this faithful man of God and his family to live in. Before coming home, Brother Royal Calley, wife and five children went to Codajaz and they stayed in this house with the Miguel Ibernnon. They hung their hammocks and made themselves at home. There is no floor except the ground. This is a very dangerous house to live in because of snakes, etc. Brother Miguel killed a very poisonous one in the house with a shotgun. Mrs. Calley says she was really scared in this house. When the Calleys left to return to Manaus, Mrs. Ibernnon was in tears. She is a good woman and a faithful wife. Brother Miguel can really preach. We rejoice that they will soon have a new house that is better to move into. Remember them when you pray.

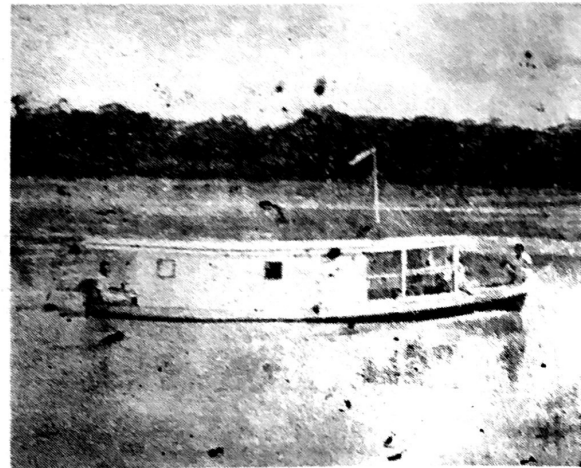

## PAUL CALLEY'S HOUSEBOAT

Missionary Paul Calley, wife, and son, are on their way up the Jurua River in the Acre Territory of Brazil. The only way to get to the places they go to is by boat. You can go in a canoe and paddle the boat by hand, or you can go in a houseboat with a powerful outboard motor like this picture shows. Brother Francisco "Cido" Lima is the "Motorista" at the controls in the rear of the boat. Mrs. Calley is standing in the front screened-in part and a Brazilian brother is standing in the very front of the boat. Gasoline, oil, food, and other supplies to last a month are put on board, and a small outboard motor is taken along for a spare and they are off to "The Regions Beyond." When night comes the boat is tied up at the bank of the river and the Missionary, wife, and son swing their hammocks and sleep in the boat. The Nationals who travel with them swing their hammocks in the house on the bank. Brother Calley is thankful for this boat and it is being used to God's honor and glory.
