Lunsford Reports 6 Souls Saved -Makes Journey To Guajara

Dear Brother Overbey,

Three Professions of Faith

The Church is progressing fine here in Cruzeiro do Sul since its organization last month. Yesterday there were three professions of faith. One of the new converts, near Colonia, brought a canoe full of people to Church with him yesterday, and his wife, a young man, and an elderly man, of the ones brought with him, were the ones who made profes-sions. Also the Church has not missed a Sunday, since being organized, having a service in the jail. Also the newly or-dained pastor, Bro. Rodrigues, has ad-ministered the ordinance of baptism. Last Monday he was planning to go down the Jurua river to Alegria, so I asked Bro. Cido to go to operate the motor. I also sent my camera with them, and when I finish the roll and have them developed I'll send the negatives, if they are good. There were two for baptism, but only one of them was legally mar-ried. I wanted to be present at Bro. Rodrigues' first baptismal service, but it it just wasn't intended.

The Church in Mourapirango has just about completed their addition to their building, and are working on the benches. Bro. Cido tells me that they are hav-

ing good attendance.

Bro. Mario was here one day last month, and I took him and his canoe most of the way back to Japiim, so he could make the trip all the way in one day. Before we got to port Quatorze on the Moa river we noticed a deer in the water, swimming across the river. Bro. Mario pushed his canoe off the frent of the Embaixador and caught it. I towed him while he dressed it. The work there in Japiim is going good. Of the other work, I haven't heard, but hope to visit before long.

This letter leaves us all well, or practically well. Jewel, (my wife), made a trip down to Guajara with me, and felt better every day while there. Bro. Rodrigues went also and preached both nights while there. There were no pro-fessions of faith in the services, but there was one in a home, an 18 year old boy, and gave as his excuse for not making a public profession, that his father was the man who prayed for the repose of the souls of dead people in that neighborhood, and he didn't know what he would do to him. The whole family of Lunsfords went there, and slept in the

Embaixador (house boat). I have made bunk beds for the Embaixador, and all six of us sleep comfortably therein. This is much easier than having to put up hammocks each night in different homes, up and down the river, and we can have it clean, but in many of the places you would have to sleep you can't say as

Three More Professions of Faith

There have been three more professions of faith here at the Church in Cruzeiro do Sul. The son of the widow woman who lived next door to the Cal-leys was one of them, and his family are Catholic, which may be the reason he has not come to the services since. Another young man, about 25 years of age, professed faith, and has not missed but one time since. The other was a man about 50 years of age. He professed faith in a cottage srevice about three blocks distance from the regular place of worship. He sat there bare-footed, many come to church that way, and kept the hen he had under his arm as quiet as possible, and listened attentively. When the invitation was given he spoke out that he would accept Jesus as Saviour. After the dismissal I noticed that he had the smell of alcohol on him. The very next service he attended he was drinking, and tried to help Bro. Rodrigues preach until I had to get him by the arm and lead him out. I told him that he was my friend, but his whiskey was not, and he didn't seem to take of-fense. I intend to go to his home and talk to him later. Many people here, with the Catholic background, and no knowledge of the Bible, have to be taught everything. In the United States we refer to new converts as "Babes in Christ' yet many of them have been in Church and know many things about the Bible, but here, they really are "Pabes in Christ".

Hopes to Preach in Portuguese Soon

We are planning to go to a community farther up the Moa river than Moura-pirango. I'm not sure of the spelling of it, but it is something like Barron with the accent on the ron. There is no organized work there, but many people with interest. Bro. Cido and my family

as far as Campo de Santanto, the Lord willing, and I hope to preach at every place we stop. I'm taking Bro. Cido on every trip for a while, and for sure the people will have a sermon to listen to, whether mine are intelligible or not. Pray for me that I will have more liberty in the language.

Rodrigues Baptizes

Bro. Rodrigues has administered the ordinance of Baptism on two different occasions. Last week the Church went to the little creek near here and watched him baptize a young man. He did a good job of it, and if the pictures turn out good, I'll send you the negatives of them later. They are to be finished today, but not in time for me to mail them in this letter.

Large Crowds at Guajara To Buy Building

About the place in Guarjara. Bro. Rodrigues saw it this last trip and is much impressed with it. There were 68 people in the front room, and with seats, more could have been inside, and there were that many outside. The owner is in Manaus, but his wife is there in Guajara. They have come down to \$230.00 for the place. She is to write to her husband this week so she will have a signed statement by him so she can give us the proper papers without him having to come here. They have a table, six chairs, two benches, and some lumber that will go with the place. The land is about 35 yards by 100 yards. I step-ped it off. The Church here has almost \$113.00 on hand, and they voted to buy it if Baptist Faith Missions would give half and put it in the name of B.F.M. for protection. I think it is a good opportunity, and worth more than that. Much better located than the Catholic building there and could be made into a nuch better meeting place than theirs.

I told the woman that it would probably take two months for me to know definitely but if I could know sooner than that it would be better. I am afraid someone else might buy it. If it were not for us having to save for the children's courses, I would have already closed the sale and stood good for it myself, but I couldn't.

I didn't intend to write half as much as I have this letter, but when I get started, it is hard to stop. I'll not write a mission letter until I go on some of the other trips. Maybe there are parts of this you could use if you need it.

We are having Bible study in the home of a police sergeant and it thrills me the way that the man accepts the truths of God's Word. The sergeant is building a house closer to the church and I am sure that he and his family will attend regularly from now on.

We are looking forward to finishing our house so that we can do more visitation and make a few river trips with Don Simon. May the Lord bless you all.
