

# CHURCH AND SCHOOL BUILDING IN MANAOS



## Hatcher Building New Building. . . Needs Funds to Finish. Canfield Ave. Baptist Church to Have Special Offering

The above is a sketch of the new church and school building now being built by John Hatcher in Manaos, Brazil. The plans for this building were drawn by Mr. Lee Butler, a Baptist architect in Detroit, Michigan as a gift to Baptist Faith Missions. From the front of the church building to the rear of the school building is about 177 feet, 54 meters). The church building is about 59 feet (18 meters), long and the school building is 59 feet long and the breezeway connecting the two buildings is 59 feet long. The buildings are about 39 feet, (12 meters), wide. The breezeway separates the buildings in case of fire and also makes a fine place for open air services. This building will act as a church building for Tabernacle Baptist Church, Manaos, Brazil and a Preacher's School building for training Brazilian preachers.

### Fence Built Around the Lot

The first step was the building of a fence about six feet high around the lot, which is very necessary for the protection

of the building. This fence is now built on three sides. The front will be left open until the building is finished. The fence is made out of brick and is being plastered (or stuccoed) on both sides. The church building and school building are also being built out of brick and the walls will also be plastered (or stuccoed) on the inside and out.

### Work Started On Building

Brother Hatcher went to the city hall every day for many weeks trying to get through all the red tape so he could start the building. The building is now started and the walls are going up. We hope to have some pictures of the progress of the work for the paper next month. The brick and cement have been purchased and are on the lot. A shed has been built for the protection of cement and tools and one of the men of Tabernacle church guards the property at night.

### Need Money to Finish the Building

Brother Hatcher has made a mimeograph form and keeps an itemized list of everything that is bought and once each month he sends a report showing what has been bought and how much

spent for each month. To date \$6,121.00 has been spent on materials and labor leaving a balance in the building fund of \$2,129.40. As soon as the work is far enough advanced so that he can figure the approximate cost, Brother Hatcher will give an estimate of the amount needed to finish the building. We do know that it will take several thousand dollars more to finish, and we hope to have an estimated amount for the paper next month.

### Request for Prayer

We request each pastor and church and each reader to join with us in prayer that the Lord will supply the funds so that Brother Hatcher can finish this building without having to stop and wait until the money comes in. I have asked the church I pastor to have a special offering the last Sunday in March designated for this new building. We hope and pray that many other churches will join us and do likewise. We can think of a lot of ways whereby it would be easy to raise this money. For example 80 churches could give \$100.00 each and that would be \$8,000.00 or some could give more and some less. So we will leave it in the hands of the Lord and let Him do it His own way. All we ask (and we challenge you to do it) is to ask the Lord how much he would have you give and then give it. Only

nine churches and two individuals have given towards this new building so far.

Things move slowly in Brazil. It takes a long time to get things done and you cannot hurry them as much as we would like to do so. Most all of the offerings for this new church building were given in November, 1955, or 14 months ago and we are just now in the process of building—but now that it is started we hope that it can be finished without stopping. Here is a list of the nine churches and two individuals that have given to date to make this building a reality:







### Makes 13-Day Journey

We left here the first day of February for a trip up-river. My family all went with me, and also Bro. Cido. We now have the Embaixador arranged with bunk beds so my whole family (six of us) can sleep in the boat. There is no bother with hammocks, and wondering whether the house would accommodate the whole family or not. Many of the houses where we stop would not accommodate us all. We cooked, ate, and slept, during the whole 13-day trip, in the Embaixador. The family enjoyed everything about the trip, and are looking forward to the

## Royal Calley and Family Arrive in Acre Territory After Long Journey on Boat Up the Amazon and Jurua Rivers

Dear Friends:  
We are thankful to say that all goes well with us. We have just moved to Cruzeiro do Sul in the Acre territory. We had been considering moving here for some time. Ever since I returned to Brazil, this time it seems that everything impeded me from staying in Manaus. I don't think that God meant for me to stay there. There is a lot of things about Manaus that I like, especially when I consider the Brethren there.

### Hatchers a Great Help

While in Manaus we had the opportunity to know the Hatchers. We are their debtors in so many things. They have had a helping hand for us whenever it was needed. Just before we left Manaus, we ate daily at their home since our stove, etc., were all packed. Bro. Hatcher and his family are about the most hospitable people in the world. I don't doubt that they have equals, but none surpass them in this respect. I don't know how much they enjoyed our fellowship, and unhappily they can't know how much we enjoyed theirs for it is impossible to express in words what they have come to mean to us.

When I left Manaus the church services were going on about the same as usual. We had no professions of faith for the past two months. The attendance was down during the week but the Sunday attendance was good. Bro. John Dias went to Borba to see about baptizing some of the believers there. Bro. Sarmento continues with the work there. My prayer is that it may grow.

We had a good trip. We left Manaus on the 26th of January and arrived the 15th of February. I am glad that we made the trip by boat. At first I tried to leave by plane but I could not get reservations, but all turned out for the best for we arrived with our furniture and could set up housekeeping immediately. The boat that we traveled on is called the "Porcival Farfuhar". It is new. It was made in Holland. It had refrigeration so the food was good all the way and not any of us got sick on our diet.

### Trip Up the Jurua

While traveling along the Jurua I saw many places where I would like to preach some day. The Jurua is prettier and wider near its mouth. You come to

next one. On this trip there were 13 preaching services, and there were some who heard the gospel for their first time. There was one profession of faith during the whole trip, and that was at Porto. So far he is the only believer there. There were 61 people who attended the service there, and there were several people who could sing the hymns as we did, so when the service was over, I asked them where they had learned to sing. They told me that Bro. Eufrazio had given them a small song book and taught them the tunes. Other families there were asking for song books and testaments, and from the interest shown there, I believe that a Church will be there some day.

### Preaches First Sermon in Portuguese

On this journey I preached in the Portuguese language at each of the three churches. All seemed to understand

the mouth of the Jurua abruptly. The scene hits you all at once for the Amazon curves right at where the two rivers join. It looks so peaceful and quiet. Just as soon as you enter the Jurua river it makes a big curve and does not stop twisting to its very end. After making the first curve you can not see the mouth any longer nor can you see far ahead for there is another curve just in front of you. It seems like you have been swallowed still, for no matter how far, the scene is the same, a curve in front, and in back with jungle on both sides. Yet you never get tired of gazing about you.

On the old river boats we used to stop often and stay long at various places to pick up wood to burn. The motor on the new boat is a diesel and we very seldom stopped except for a few minutes once in a while to leave mail or a box of freight. For that reason I did not get one chance to preach on the way up. I did get to talk with different people on board however. I spent a couple of evenings conversing with the Captain. He said that his mother and three sisters are Baptists. All the people whom we talked with were very nice. I have hopes that perhaps some day they might be saved. Two of the crew members have been attending our services here in Cruzeiro do Sul. The boat that we came on is still here loading and unloading.

### One Saved in Jail

When we arrived the Lunsfords were down to meet us. We had dinner at their home for the past three days. They had just returned from a trip up-river and had not fully got around to bringing their baggage in, etc., but they found time to help us greatly.

We had a hard time finding a house. We found a small home on top of a hill here and rented it. You can see the whole city from our house. It is very pretty.

I have been preaching since I arrived. I preached at the jail on Sunday afternoon and one was saved.

I met many old friends who happened to be in town when I arrived. It is sure good to see them again and to fellowship with them.

## Mitchell Lewis is Finishing Up House In Iquitos, Peru

Dear Brother Overbey,  
These last 11 weeks have been spent on the construction of our house. I am quite proud of it. We expect to move in within four weeks. It usually takes from 4 to 6 months to build a house the size of ours. Not only do we have the house, but also a brick wall around the entire lot 72 feet by 120 feet.

While visiting one day Juan began talking with the receptionist at a dentist's office. The girl informed Juan that she was well prepared to refute any doctrine that he might present and she informed him that she could prove from the Bible that Peter went to Rome and there he established the first church. Juan produced a Bible and asked her to prove her statement. After turning a few pages she handed the Bible back to him and told him that she would let him know later. Juan asked her, why do you want to put Peter in a place where he did not want to go? The dentist got a big kick out of the conversation.

There is an elderly American missionary who travels through South America distributing phonographs and records among the different Indian tribes. This man endures the most rigorous hardships to reach the most distant Indian tribes. He seems to be a most pious man. He goes into an Indian tribe and teaches them how to operate the phonograph and then he leaves them to go on to another tribe. Last year I believe he said that he gave out seven phonographs. The man is not a member of any church yet he tries to get folks to be baptized by himself. The sad thing is that the man does not learn the Indian dialect so that he can preach Christ to them. He leaves them the phonograph with records in the Spanish language. I asked him what he expected to accomplish leaving the poor ignorant Indians records in a language that he did not understand. The man thinks that the gospel hymns will combat the evil music that the Indians use and thereby produce in them a desire to know more about the true God and the way of salvation. This poor man thinks that he is doing a great service for God.


# Argemero Leite . . . The Worker and His Work


seven miles from Manaus. These pictures are of the same work one year later. One of Brother Hatcher's goals for 1957 is a church organized at this place, the Lord willing.





## Our Needs: Launches, Houseboats, Outboard Motors, Buildings, 11 Churches

Here in the United States every pastor needs an automobile and most every pastor has one. Just so a missionary in Brazil and Peru needs a boat. He has no roads and must travel on the rivers and he needs a boat just as much (and more so) as we pastors need a car. Also the native churches need native preachers for pastors and they must be taught the Bible. The preachers are saved from a life of idolatry and Catholicism and do not have any Bible background at all as preachers here do. Thus the need for a preacher's school.

**What We Now Have**

We now have by the Grace of God ten churches in Brazil and one in Peru and many, many mission points. We have hopes of several new churches being organized within the next three years, the Lord willing. We now have the Embaixador (houseboat), that Paul Calley traveled in many thousands of miles, and that Bruce Lunford is now using making journeys as Paul Calley did. This houseboat has given ample proof of the great need for boats and launches. The Embaixador with extra outboard motor is all paid for and in use. We also have the Aluminum boat and will soon have the outboard and the top built on this boat for Brother Lewis to use in Peru. We have the money on hand to pay in full for this boat. We have the diesel engine and many other things for the new launch to be built in Manaos, Brazil. We hope to hear soon that the work has been started on the hull of this launch. We need about \$4,149.31 (estimated) to finish the launch. We have the fence built around three sides of the lot, the building started and much of the materials on hand for the church and school building in Manaos, Brazil. We need several thousand dollars more to complete this building. We have a new brick church building in Codajaz, Brazil all finished and paid for.

**Houseboat For Paul Calley**

Before he left Brazil for a year of furthering in the United States, Paul Calley made arrangements with the oldest son of the "Old Patriarch" to build him a larger houseboat. This boat will be about ten feet wide and forty feet long

and will be built to travel in shallow water. We hope this boat will be finished when Paul Calley gets back to Brazil in January, 1958. Paul Calley, wife and son plan to move their furniture on this new larger houseboat (The Embaixador II) and live on it all the time. They will not rent a house, but live on the boat the year around. With this larger houseboat they can not only make trips but take enough supplies to go to a place and live for months to get a work established.

**Bruce Lunford Using Embaixador**

Bruce Lunford and family will use the present houseboat (Embaixador) the same as Paul Calley has done in the past. These are steps of faith and we believe that the Lord will supply the money to finish the building and build the launch and the larger houseboat. Only money designated for such can be used for the building, launch and houseboat. All regular offerings are used to pay the missionaries their salaries and traveling expenses and for doing mission work.

**Offerings 100% For Missions**

All offerings are used 100 percent for missions. You are not supporting any "board" when you support Baptist Faith Missions. Z. E. Clark and H. H. Overbey serve without pay, and do not, and cannot get any pay from the regular mission offerings. We both have served without pay for fifteen years. The only way for either of us to get any pay is for it to be designated for us. This is a Baptist work and it is a faith work. No one has to give, and no one has to give to build a building, launch or boat. But all can do so if led of the Lord to do so. Baptist Faith Missions does not interfere with any church or pastor whether they give or not give. A church may support Baptist Faith Missions without joining or unjoining anything. A church does not have to withdraw from anything to support Baptist Faith Missions. All a church has to do is to vote to do, so and then send the offerings to the mission treasurer, and when the money leaves your hands you have as much say as to how it is used as if you were to send it to any other mission in the world. We challenge anyone to prove differently.

## All Are Informed

You will note in the report in this issue that Canfield Avenue Baptist Church has already given \$5,240.00 towards the new building and we plan another special offering the last Sunday in March, the Lord willing. This church has already given \$3,959.74 towards the building of the launch and we plan to continue to give towards this until it is finished. This church has also given \$120.50 towards the Lewis boat. Then we plan to give towards the new larger houseboat for Paul Galey.

If you had a prize winning milk cow

you would want to keep her giving milk in championship style, and the way to keep a cow from going dry is to keep milking her well and regularly. Just so the way to keep a church missionary is to keep her giving. We are not telling anyone else what to do, or how to do it, we are only answering the question that is continually being asked us. For example: we plan our special offerings ahead of time. We plan our Thanksgiving offering many months ahead. The second largest offering last Thanksgiving was \$250.00 and this was from a young person in our church who is a student in Wayne University and works his way through school with a part time job. He started a Christmas Club savings ac-

First let me say that Canfield Avenue Baptist Church not only supports Baptist Faith Missions but other mission

work also. Until his death, we supported brother Guzman Nunez's Mexican mis-

This mission work is as much the work of the smallest church as it is of the largest church. Many perhaps think that Canfield Avenue Baptist Church is a large church.
