The John Hatchers Arrive in U.S.

Dear Brethren,

At this writing we are back in the United States and we are visiting in the home of Brother Overbey and family. It is a joy to be back to visit with our brethren and to have the opportunity to tell many churches what the Lord has done. I would like to tell you a few things about the last few weeks that we spent in Brazil and about our trip home.

New Tabernacle Baptist Church Building Dedicated

On the night of July 4 the new building of the Tabernacle church was dedicated to the service of the Lord and the occasion was truly a high hour. We had borrowed the benches from two other churches and the house was packed with nearly 500 persons present. We will have more about this along with pictures in the next Mission Sheet.

Our Trip Home

Leaving Manaus, Brazil on July 11, we arrived in the city of Iquitos, Peru on the same day. The Lauermans and the Brother Lewis were at the airport in Iquitos to meet us and it was a real thrill to see them again and to fellowship with them. Brother Lauerman was a member of the church in Alton, Illinois where I was pastor before going to Brazil. We stayed with them a little over two weeks and visited their mission work and worshipped with them in the First Baptist Church in Iquitos. It was our privilege to preach in that church two times while there. We left Iquitos

Lauerman Preaches First Sermon In Spanish—Enjoying Fellowship With The Hatchers

We are in the middle of a visit with the Hatchers, which we have enjoyed very much. Brother Hatcher accomplished in two weeks what it took me 9 months to do, that is to preach in Spanish here in Peru. Portuguese is somewhat like Spanish and some words are identical, therefore we all understood enough to understand the message. Brother Hatcher also showed slides of the work in Brazil and some of churches and people in U.S. These two weeks have been a big help and encouragement to me and my family. Bro. Hatcher is one of God's great because he is sound, faithful, and hard working, and also has a vision which is what most preachers lack.

Juan Castro, Javier Freitas and Simon Guima made a trip to Sorgento Lores a place on the Mamon River this month for a week. This is a neglected village of about 500 people, Juan said interest was good and crowds were large. Some believers there want a church but the Missionary Alliance (?) are poisoning the people against what Juan preached about Baptist baptism. Pray for this work. The missions in Astoria and Mapa Cocha are still being preached to every Sunday and we plan Saturday night and Sunday morning and night services at both places in a couple weeks. The native brethren are anxious to be preaching

18 DAYS JOURNEY UP THE JURUA. SIX SOULS SAVED. HAPPY REUNIONS. SEES NEW HOUSEBOAT.

Dear friends in Christ,

God continues to bless in the work here with souls saved and we are happy to again have the good news that there has been six more professions of faith and one baptized in the work here in the past month.

Since writing to you last we made an 18 day trip up the Jurua river visiting the churches at Parana dos Mouras, Tatajuba and Campo de Santana, about 125 miles from Cruzeiro do Sul. We also preached at many preaching points along the way and we preached at several new places for the first time. Brother Rodrigues, the pastor of Faith Baptist church at Cruzeiro do Sul was with us on this trip and we took it time about preaching and at some of the services at the churches we both preached. It was Brother Rodrigues first visit to the churches on the upper Jurua and he preached some good sermons to the churches that were needed.

Joyous Reunion

It was joyous reunions that we had with the churches and we had good attendance. It was good to fellowship with the old patriarch again and the church at Parana dos Mouras where we stayed four days, having services every night. Also while there we preached at

a place a few miles downstream from the church called Sao Bento where there are five houses. It was the first time that the gospel has been preached at this place and about 25 attended the service and most all were Catholics. They listened with good attention and the owner of the house invited us back.

New Houseboat

We were well pleased when we saw the houseboat that Brother Sebastian, the old Patriarch's oldest son and pastor of the church at Parana dos Mouras is building for us. It is going to be a large boat, 38 feet long and 10 feet wide and a more secure boat I haven't seen of this type since I have been in Brazil. It is being built out of the best wood and with proper care will be a good boat twenty years from now. The hull of the boat is about finished, but we estimate it will take six to eight months for Brother Sebastian to finish her completely. In the meantime we have the Embaixador to travel the rivers, while Brother Lunsford is in Manaus. The Embaixador is still a pretty good boat but will need some repairing by the time the large houseboat is finished and I am making minor repairs on her now.

Tatajuba

From Parana dos Mouras we went to Tatajuba and was with the church there for two days and also for one day on our return from Campo de Santana. We had wonderful fellowship with Brother Londos and family at Tatajuba and at

Our First Sermon Back Home



At the regular business of the Tabernacle Baptist Church it was voted to ordain Brother Manoel Aguiar to the Ministry in view of the fact that the mission of which he directs had asked to be organized as a church.

On the 8th of June at the hour of the regular Sunday night service the Tabernacle Baptist Church met for this solemn purpose. Brother Santiago open the service with congregational singing and prayer. Brother Aguiar was called to the front and presented to the congregation and the pastors and missionaries and deacons of the Tabernacle church assisted in the service. Brother John A. 18 Days Journey Up The Jurua. Six Souls Saved. Happy Reunions. Sees New Houseboat.



our meals with them while there at their insistence. We had an average of about 30 each night at the services and most of the members came, but we learned while there that there was dissension between some of the members and some were in a backslidden condition. Since Brother Eufrazio's death and back to the time that he first took sick about six months ago, the church at Tatabuba has had no pastor and they were in much need of the word of God being preached to them. But we are thankful that the church there still has a faithful few like Brother Londres and wife. We pray that God will send a revival and intend to visit the church there often and return soon, the Lord willing.

Man Saved

When we left Tatabuba on a Thursday morning we intended to arrive at Lucania, a preaching point for services that night, but God had different plans and wanted us to preach Jesus to a man along the way. In ordinary traveling we had plenty of time to reach Lucania, but we broke pins and our stops along the way were longer than expected. When night came on we found ourselves several miles from Lucania and there was no moon and we had no choice but to stop at the first house we came to. As we groped our way slowly in the dark we saw in the distance a bonfire in front of a house and that bonfire told us it was a catholic home because it was a catholic saint day. The catholics here build a fire in front of their houses on their saint days in honor of the saints, such as St. Paul's day, St. John's day and etc. When I asked the man of the house if we could have service, although I knew they were catholic, I was surprised when he said, "Yes, you can have service here and I want you to." This man knew Brother Sebastian and the old patriarch at Parana dos Mouras and they had witnessed to him and he said they had told him about me and that he would like to hear more of the gospel. He had neighbors near by and sent for them and that night I preached the sermon that I love to preach and call my four-fold text sermon — No other Mediator, I Tim. 2:5 — No other Name, Acts 4:12 — No other Foundation, I Cor. 3:11 — No other Way, John 14:6. When the invitation was given this man who is about 30 years of age professed Christ as his Saviour. He had no more use for his bonfire

One thing Brother Cicero taught his little flock well, and that was to come to the house of the Lord to worship Him. Brother Nelsin, Brother Cicero's son-in-law is the leader in the church there now and conducts the services. Although he doesn't preach as a pastor

This takes extra money in the regular fund and we need it. All we ask is for the pastors to pray with us and ask the Lord what He would have them do.

does, he reads to them in the Bible and teaches them as much as he knows like a Sunday School teacher does and they sing hymns and have prayer. While there I helped him all I could in his studies and picked out two of Brother Cicero's commentaries that I thought would do him the most good and explained to him how to prepare his Bible lessons.

We were at Campo de Santana for three days and had fine services. On Sunday afternoon we had services at one of the member's home and had good attendance at all the services. While there we visited in most all the members homes and had wonderful fellowship.

We thank the Lord for this church and for Brother Nelsin who is taking the lead in conducting the services and feel assured that this little flock of about 35 members at Campo de Santana is going to hold together until the Lord raises up or sends them a pastor. We promised them that we would return soon, the Lord willing for a longer stay.

Four Saved at Porto Preto

On our return downstream we stopped again at Porto Preto and had service, but this time at a different house more centered for all to come. Brother Rod-

rigues preached that night and there were three professions of faith. A man and wife about 35 years old and the owner of the house, about 40 years of age professed Christ as their Saviour. Then the next morning while visiting at another home in the vicinity another man about 50 years old who had attended the services said he had trusted Christ and was saved. All said they wanted to be baptized and the Lord willing we will return in a few weeks to baptize them and have more services, but first we want to talk to each one about their marriage and make sure they are legally married.

We estimate that at least half of the families here in the Acre are not legally married. Most of them have been married by the catholic priest which is not legal and we do not baptize them until they are married by law. It is one of our greatest hindrances in organizing work here. We are happy to say that the man that was saved in Japiim while we were there and wrote about in our last letter was already legally married and Bro. Mario baptized him last Sunday.

One Saved in Cruzeiro do Sul

Getting back to our trip; on our way down stream from Porto Preto to Cruzeiro do Sul we had three more services at night preaching at Lucania, again at Tatajuba and at Brother Santos house on the Jurua below the mouth of Parana dos Mouras river. Space will not permit for us to go into detail about all our stops and the work here, but in Cruzeiro do Sul we have a new preaching point and last Sunday night, July 13th. I preached at the church on the Second coming of Christ and it pleased the Lord to save a young mother about 25 years old.

We Thank God

We thank God for the souls that have been saved. We thank God for each of you, for your prayers, for the way you have given to the Lord's work here. We thank God that my wife's health has been much better this past month. We thank God for the good news that He has called our oldest son Carl, to the ministry. We thank God most of all for our salvation in Christ Jesus, for His high calling and that He has saved all our children. But beloved, time would

fail me to tell all of His blessings, and as I write these lines I am on top of the mountain and my heart is saying with David — "Bless the Lord, O my soul; and all that is within me, bless His holy name, Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forgets not all His benefits; Who forgiveth all thine iniquities; who healeth all thy diseases; Who redeemeth thy life from destruction; who crowneth thee with loving kindness and tender mercies" Psa. 103:1-4.


