## NEW MISSIONARY FAMILY FOR PERU

Bro. Del Mayfield, wife Ada and son Eddie make up our new missionary family to Peru. Brother Mayfield has been pastor of the Pleasant Plains Baptist Church, Pleasant Plains, Ill., for about eight years. He has been the only pastor of this church and has proven himself in pastoral work. Brother Mayfield will go out to Peru under the authority of the Pleasant Plains Baptist Church. When he arrives in Peru and gets settled he will unite with the church in Iquitos and do his missionary work under the authority of that church. The Mayfields have been studying the Spanish language for the past few months and have a Spanish teacher coming to their home four nights a week tutoring them and they are well along in the study of the language. They hope to leave for Peru in about three months the Lord willing.

### FINANCIAL NEEDS

We now have more missionaries

than ever before. The needs are greater than ever before. We will soon be out more per month than ever before in the history of the mission work. We not only need the funds to pay the salaries to run on each month but we need the funds to send out the Mayfields and then to return the Lauermans to the field after furlough. We trust that many churches will increase their regular monthly offerings and that the Lord will raise up many new churches to support the work. We also need the designated offerings to build the Preacher's School Building and the Launch and to pay for the Bethel building. Join us in prayer about these things and may the Lord lay it on the heart of some church to give a real large offering. Remember when you send your offerings to Baptist Faith Missions it is used 100% for missions. It is not used to build up an estate for some one and his family.

## THANKSGIVING IN DETROIT

One of the greatest missionary and Bible conferences ever held was that which took place Nov. 21-24 in Detroit, Michigan. The largest crowds ever to attend this annual conference were on hand to enjoy and profit from the strong, Biblical preaching, the warm fellowship, and the great examples of missionary spirit and of sacrifice.

The total of special, Thanksgiving, missionary offerings reported at the conference came to over \$9500.00. Of this total the host church, Canfield

Ave. Baptist, though a small church in numbers, gave the largest individual offering of \$1820.91 in their annual Thanksgiving morning service.

This year saw a great host of pastors with 43 counted in one evening service and more from the Detroit area at other services. There were at least 11 states represented: Illinois, Kentucky, Tennessee, Texas, Maine, W. Va., Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Louisiana, New Jersey, Canada, and Peru — covering the country from

Dear Brethren:

Here in Brazil our hearts have been made exceedingly sad during these past days to hear that the American people have been lulled to the point of electing a Catholic president. The Roman Catholic church here has dominated and enslaved the South American people for centuries while the open Bible and religious liberty had made the United States the greatest country in the world and given to its people the highest standard of living ever known. Baptists in a large way are responsible for this catastrophe with their luke warm attitudes confiding in their large organizational horse and chariot and

forgetting to remember the name of their God. The day is closer to us now, as a result of the lukewarmness and indifference of God's people, than ever before to hear the American people repeat the words of the poet, "The saddest words of tongue or pen, Are these, IT MIGHT HAVE BEEN."

### QUICK TRIP TO CODAJAZ

On the 15th of November I made a quick trip to Codajaz and was with the church about two hours and caught the flying boat on the return trip. The Lord was good to me giving a safe trip and a blessed meeting with the church. It seems, from outward appearance that more was accomplished in these two hours than in a week on other trips that I have made.

Maine and N. Jersey on the east to Louisiana and Texas on the south, Canada in the north, and Illinois in the west and Peru in addition to all else.

The size of the conference, though large, was by no means what made the conference great. It was the strong preaching of faithful men with a wide range of subjects and messages delivered with power, warmth, urgency, and Spirit filled. Such great themes as faith, repentance, missions, grace, giving, baptism, prayer, and the church of God were prominent.

A high point in the mission emphasis of the conference was the acceptance of Pastor and Mrs. Del Mayfield as new missionaries to Peru. There was a tremendous impact for missions in the conference, what with the additional presence and singing of Miss Marguerite Hallum (20 years in Peru with missionary parents), the presence and speaking challenge of Missionary Lauerman (3 years in Peru), the sacrificial mission offerings of many small churches, and a ringing challenge by Harry Hille, Pres. of Baptist Faith Missions.

An outstanding feature of this conference every year is the hospitality of the host church, together with some assistance of some sister churches in the Detroit area. The finest hospitality to be found on this earth today is to be found at this conference. The best of food and lodging was provided everyone from out of town at no expense to them.

The special music provided was excellent and edifying. Those ministering to us in this way by means of solo's, quartets, trios, duets were: Nancy Vater and Norma Works from First Baptist of Alexandria, Ky.; Carlos Hendricks and Shelby Hollingsworth from Bryan Station Baptist, Lexington, Ky.; Lois Campbell (pianist) from Waverly Rd. Baptist of Huntington, W. Va.; Marguerite Hallum, now of Hammond, La.; James Orrick, Newby Baptist, Richmond, Ky.; Z. E. Clark, Evansville, Ind.; Pamela and Betty Allen, Doris, Dale, Fanny Sue, and James Overbey of Canfield Ave. Baptist of Detroit with Norma Clark and Mrs. Gilbert Clark at the piano.

The conference got off to a high start with a penetrating message on the curse of covetness and the blessedness of giving by Sidney Fisher, Huntington, W. Va.; Louis Maple emphasized prayer as first and central for Baptist as a logical consequence of their doctrine and the example of their Lord; Eugene Clark, Warren, Mich., brought a stirring message on the absolute need of both initial repentance and day by day repentance; Wilbur Johnson, Wickliffe, Ky., brought one inspiring message on our abounding Lord, and another message on "The Place Called Calvary", the grace of God was magnified thru a powerful message by

Dempsey Henderson, Gracey, Ky.; Harry Hille, President of Baptist Faith Missions brought a ringing challenge to Baptists to get the vision for missions; Edward Overbey, Principal of Mt. State Schools, brought a great message on the trial of our faith; Clarence Walker electrified the audience with the perils of Romanism; Elder C. W. Sawyer from McCamey, Texas brought a strong and convincing message around Eph. 3:21, "Unto Him be glory in the church"; the steps of obedience leading on to final rewards was the theme of a partial and very Biblical message by W. D. Hundley of Lexington, Ky.; in the absence of J M Holliday, James Hamilton

of Lexington, Ky., enumerated the manifold goodness of God to His people; missionary from Peru, Walter Lauerman, brought a challenge to every heart concerning missions in Peru; J. V. Tate, Mt. ### A MEMBER DIES

On November 4th one of the members of our church died. He was an old man who had been a lay-preacher. Bro. Melo, the pastor, asked me to bring the message at the funeral. A funeral and burial, etc. is much different here than in the States. The body was carried by the pall-bearers from the house to the church and then from the church to the cemetery. I would judge the distance in all to be close to a half of a mile. In spite of different customs, the sorrow and sadness felt was the same.

Bro. York and I were planning to make a trip to the Acre for three weeks the last of this month but we received word from the pastor of the church at Cruzeiro do Sul that there is no gasoline there and if we went we couldn't travel. This has changed our plans. We'll not be able to make this trip.

### MAN SAVED

I have one more thing to report that caused the joy-bells of Heaven to ring. On Friday night after close to an hour's walk a group of us from the church arrived at a home to conduct a service. About the middle of my message it started raining. This downpour caused the ones who were listening on the outside to leave and the only ones I had left to preach to were the six of us from the church and the couple in whose house we were conducting the service. However, at the close of the service the man accepted Christ as his Saviour. With the rain falling outside we sang "Ring the Bells of Heaven, There is Joy Today . . ."

May the Lord bless each one of you as you labor for Him.

## Sickness In Peru . . . Trip Up The Nanay River . . . Priest Interferes . . . Crowds Come To Hear Accordion . . . Woman Wants Child Sprinkled.

Dear Bro. Overbey, and Brethren:

Your telegram of greetings came yesterday for which we say thanks to all who had a part in it. We are especially thankful that the Mayfields have been accepted to come out to Peru as missionaries. We see the need every hour for others to be here to do what is possible for the catholic interested hearts of this people. I am hoping that they get to come as soon after the first of the year as possible.

I am glad that the conference was a successful one, with the largest attendance you have ever had. During each day, I thought about it and wished I could be attending. Every one of them I have attended has seemed to be better than the one before.

Everything seems to be going along in the usual way here. The worst thing physically among the workers is concerning Bro. Antonio's oldest boy. He has had three boils, one after the other, behind his right eye. He came to town this month and brought him to the doctor. They said for six days they thought he was dying, but he pulled through. As a result his eyes are crossed, but there is a possibility that they will straighten out. We had to take Jamie to the hospital to cut a piece of glass out of his foot which had been there since April. It was overlooked at Paintsville, Ky. when we had his foot sewed up there. The Juan Castros have a baby girl born this week. This is the second girl and sixth child living. The middle boy of Juan Ruis drank some kerosene, but not enough to be very serious. This is about all of such things I know of, so let me tell you about a trip.

### UP THE NANAY RIVER

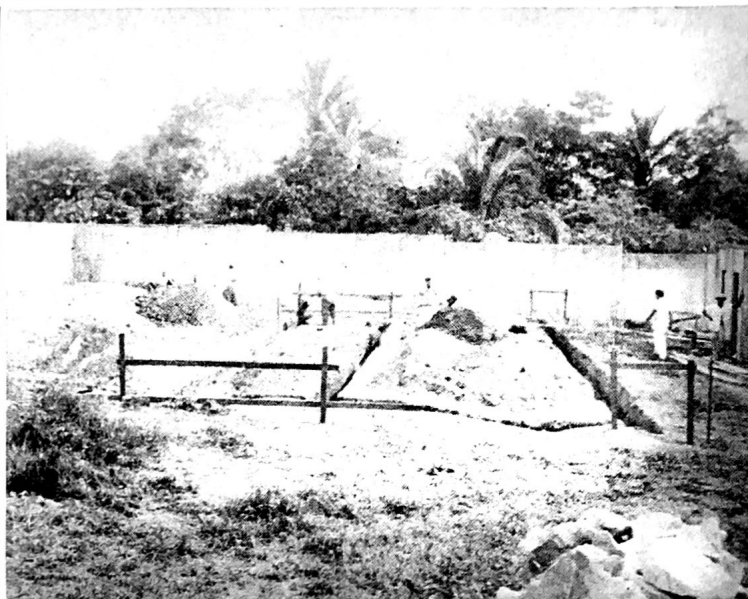
Since I last wrote to you, I have been with Bro. Gaima on a trip up the Nanay river. It was an enjoyable trip, and he is a good companion. Since traveling with him I have a greater respect for his work. At first I thought maybe he wasn't such a good worker, but I asked him to preach twice at the Church in Iquitos, and I was surprised at his messages. On this trip I found him to be a great visitor and personnel worker. He, like Paul, tells them what he was, and how he was rearing his family, then he

heard the gospel and from there he tells them the difference in a believer and a Catholic. This was his trip, and I let him take charge of everything. His messages were clear, not too long, and listened to attentively.

### PRIEST INTERFERES

Before we left town, he told me of a place called Llanchara. He had been there once on his last trip, and the house where he was planning to have the service was small, so the people asked him to come into the school house for the service. The teacher also was at the service. He was very much elated about the place, and talked a lot about it, but when we arrived there, the Catholic priest was leaving, and left orders that we were not to use the building any more. The leading citizens of the community was not in agreement with the priest's attitude, and his house was large, so we were invited there for the service and told we could use it every time we were there. This time the teacher didn't attend the service, but nearly all of the community came to it. This place is about two hours above Mapa Cocha. At Mapa Cocha the room filled with the people who came to Gaima's surprise most of them stayed for the whole service. He had complained to me that mostly children had been attending the services, and just after the singing that they would go out in front of the building to make noises. He thought the priests had been advising them to disturb, but I doubt it.

At one place above Mapa Cocha called Ninarume, where Bro. Gaima is stopping regularly there are several people who are interested in the gospel. The woman of the house asked me if I could baptize people, and I told her that I could under the authority of the Church in Iquitos. I thought maybe she had heard the gospel and was thinking about being baptized. That wasn't the case. For children to start to school here in Peru they are enrolled by the age on their baptismal (Catholic sprinkling) certificate, or by the date of birth on their government registration. This family hadn't registered the birth of their oldest little girl, just under 6 years old, and they wanted me to sprinkle her so she could start to school the next term.

Another month has faded into the sea of time and we are made to yearn more for that glorious and eternal day when time shall be no more and we shall be at Home with Christ to sing praises to His matchless name and marvelous grace throughout eternity. Sometime here we get a little homesick to be back home and then when we realize that we shall all be with Christ in the land beyond the grave, in the New Jerusalem, we get homesick for Heaven. The Word of the Lord describes us perfectly as pilgrims and sojourners for truly we are looking for a city which has foundations, whose builder and ruler is God. And yet, while we travel through this old world of sin, our heart is burdened for the salvation of many lost souls that we see here in Brazil, diseased by sin and deceived by a false religion which depends upon lies, dreams, and superstition to hold its power over the deranged minds of its membership. May God help us to preach with the power of the Holy Spirit and live lives which are to the praise of the Lord Jesus, and may He, in His infinite wisdom and tender mercy send more laborers into this vineyard to spread the glorious gospel.

God has been faithful to us in the last month, as He always is, and has blessed us above that which we deserve; blessing us with good health and the happiness that we have in our hearts because the Lord has seen fit to honor us with this divine call to serve Him in such a wide field where Satan bids high for the souls of men. If it were not true concerning the sinful condition here it would be needless for us or any other mission to spend

This afforded one of the best opportunities I have ever had to explain the gospel and to advise against the sprinkling of the priest.

I will have to write my next mission letter soon, because I am planning a trip to Pucallpa, 5 days up the river from here, and may not be here after the 15 of next month. The Lord willing it will be about the Church in Iquitos.

I have also led the singing several times but enjoy preaching much more. I always did and suppose I always will. We are also having services in our home on Sunday afternoon in English for our missionary families, mainly for the Creiglow's and ourselves, but a good preaching service never hurt anyone.

We also count it a joy and privilege to work on the construction of the "Preacher's School" as we are praying the Lord shall bless the school in a mighty way with young men that He shall equip to do a great work in their own country. We expect the school to be a great influence on the future of Brazil and the Kingdom of God. Pray for the school, its teachers and students and its future, that all shall be to the praise of Him who called us here to share in this great work.

slow progress with the Portuguese. We are able to speak some now, (about one small sentence at a time). Two of the first sentences we learned are short and we hope that it will not be too long until we can stop using them. They are (Eu nao falo Portuguese) and (Eu nao compreendo Portuguese) the meaning of these are (I do not speak Portuguese) and (I do not understand Portuguese). By the time some of you read this we hope to be able to speak more and understand some also.

Our son Michael had piano lessons for nine months before we left Florida and we are in hopes that he will be able to play enough so that by the time we go to the Acre that he can be a great help to the work there. We have borrowed an accordion and at this time he is able to play ten hymns fairly well. By the time we learn the language he should be able to play most any of them.

They had all saints day here around the last of October and the next day was decoration day, so we walked out to the cemetery to see what they were doing. It was night and almost every grave had candles on it and some had many. It was almost as light as day. We ask what the candles were for and we were told that they were to drive away the evil spirits from the one that had died. It was very sad to look at, and of course we have no way of knowing, but from all appearance I would say that about ninety five per cent of them died in the darkest of sin, for such there is no hope. There was a little more pleasant sight as we looked at the small graves of small children, because Jesus said, such is the Kingdom of Heaven. Of course we can be of no help to those who have died in their sins, but there are multitudes living here that are in just as much darkness and such a few to preach the word of God. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that He will send forth labourers into His Harvest. Matt. 9-38"

We are in the best of health and have been since the day we arrived except for minor things. We thank the Lord very much for this and all other blessings that no man can number.

When you go to the Lord in prayer, remember all of us here that He will prepare us for the work that He has called us to do.

May He richly bless all of you and us for His Glory.
