Dear Brethren:

As this letter is begun the rapidity with the months pass is brought to my attention. Jacob also realized the briefness of life and so declared when appearing before Pharaoh for the first and perhaps only time, declaring that his life of 130 years was of few days and those being evil.

Today was a big one for us at the Chapada Baptist Church. Tonight was the first service in a weeks meeting with Brother Manoel Sarmento doing the preaching. There were many visitors and at total of 46 persons present. This afternoon the members of the church met for prayer and afterwards distributed invitations throughout all the community of The Chapada. Another thing that made it a big day was that the church voted to buy the property next door to the church which has a new house on it about the size of our present building. We can use one for the Sunday School and the other for the auditorium and we are also hoping to have a grade school. The needs are so great and we are barely "touching the hem of the garment".

New School Building Real Blessing

Two rooms of the Preacher's school are finished and in use; one serving as the Library and the other as a class room. One class still meets in the auditorium of the Tabernacle Church. We have the biggest enrollment this terms with 13 full time day students and two part-time day students and a night class with five enrolled. The Lord willing this week another class room will be finished and then all our classes will meet in the school building. We wish that each of you could visit us and see the preacher's school. Hope to have pictures of the new term next time.

Mira Aua

Brother Ranulfo Tobar, one of the preacher students, supplied at the new church in Mira Aua last week. There were over forty in the Sunday School and two professions of faith. One of these that were saved was a man who some time ago threatened to kill his own sons for having made professions of faith. Marvelous Grace.

The Chapada church also this month bought a lot and house next door to the church which will be used for Sunday School etc.

Preacher's School Building Nice

We are enjoying the use of the new building, that is the part that is finished. The office is being used temporarily as the Library and then we have two class rooms finished. By the last of the month we hope to have the large assembly room finished. The steel windows are already in (lacking the glass which will be put in as soon as the final wall finish is done.) and they are finishing the plaster job. The doors are ordered and almost ready. The second floor walls are already going up and we hope to get under roof by the last of January. For next month I will try to send pictures showing the new building and the students of the preacher's school.

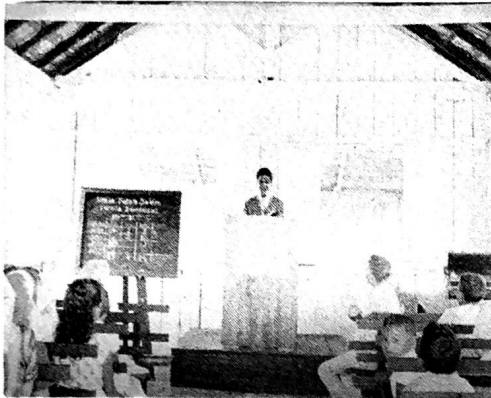

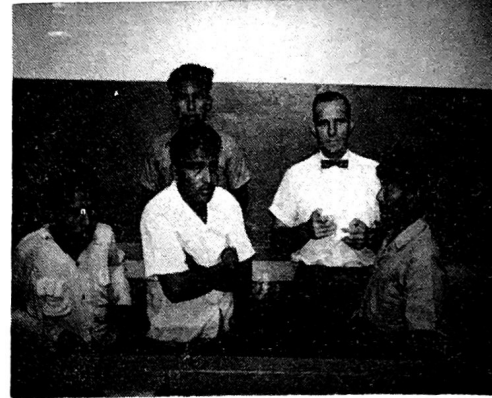

Dear Bro. Overbey:

During this month we have followed a regular schedule. Each morning (Tuesday through Friday) I arrive at the school at 7:00 A.M. and am usually there the most of the morning. The afternoons are given to study. I find it necessary to spend hours in preparing my class lectures. I'm having the most difficulty in "Church History". I have to read from several books, both in Portuguese and English to get all the different events, countries and persons clear in my mind. The nights are given to services at the church or further study.

I have had the privilege of preaching several times this month, both at Zion and in other churches. I want to share with you my text I used for the message I preached at two different churches this last Sunday. My text was Ephesians 3:8-9. These verses tell us that Paul had a two-fold commission from the Lord. First to "preach among the Gentiles the unsearchable riches of Christ" (the Gospel). Second, "To make all men see what is the fellowship of the mystery." By reading all the third chapter of Ephesians, we learn that this "mystery" is the Church of the Lord Jesus Christ. Therefore the second part of Paul's Commission was to show to all that for the believer, the saved person, the church ought to occupy a most important place in his life. It is our desire and the aim of all our labors here in Brazil to do as Paul was doing. We want to preach the gospel to all and also show them the place of the church of the Lord Jesus. We want to see all of the lost saved and then see all the saved as members of Baptist churches which are churches of the New Testament.

I have received an invitation from Bro. Dantes, one of our student pastors to help him in a Vacation Bible School and Revival at Maues in December. Bro. Dantes last trip there was the first of October and he reports that he organized 10 baptized believers there into a Mission of the Bethel church here in Manaus on this last trip. I am looking forward to being with him at this interior town. I am also planning to take the family along with me.

Arrives In Cruzeiro Do Sul Safely After 50 Day Trip On Old Steamboat.

Cruzeiro do Sul
October 15, 1961

Dear Brethren:

At last we have arrived in Cruzeiro do Sul after a 50 day trip. This is the longest time it has ever taken this kind of boat to make this trip. There was low water and times in which we were aground.

We were all glad to see Cruzeiro do Sul come into sight. Most of us had been sick at one time or another. Since there was no refrigeration on the boat, the meat which was not eaten on the first two days after a beef was killed, had to be salted and kept until it was eaten. Also their water supply was the river with no purification. These two things, and the fact that the food was poorly prepared were the main reasons we were sick. There were three main dishes during the fifty days: meat, beans, and rice. For those who wanted it, there was an abundance of their farinha. This is a meal like substance made from the dehydrating process of the manioc root.

Among the crew there was one believer, and for several days there were other believers on board. There were times of fellowship which we will never forget. Also the time of fellowship with the Creiglows, the time of study, and the opportunity to know the different places along the river are of untold value to us. We were impressed with the many places along the river which would be large enough to have a preaching point. A person could start out to Manaus from here and have a service in a different place each night, and take over 300 days. There is a church in Codajas, Urucuri Coari, and Porto Rico between Manaus and Cruzeiro do Sul, a distance of about 2600 miles. The navigator had a list of their regular stops between Manaus and Cruzeiro do Sul and there were 299 of them. Many of these were of two or three houses, but many of them would be large enough to have a church in, if we had the opportunity to preach in them. Many of them are closed to the Gospel. Because of this we didn't have many services during the trip. At one place I asked the man if we

Dear Brethren:

It is again time to write for the Mission Sheet. The Lord again has been good as always and we are happy. I was sick for almost 2 weeks this past month with a sore throat

could have a service in his home, and he took a spasm of coughing and said it was up to the man who had the place rented from him. He left the room coughing and the other man said it was up to the owner to say. The two of them never did say we could have service and left us in the house and didn't come back until we had left. That place was Monte Cristo, using part of the name of the Lord for its name, yet not allowing his gospel to be preached. We were made sad by the occurrence of things like this, but on any trip here in these parts you will find places where the gospel is not allowed.

We did have the privilege of having some services, but we got the idea that the 1st and 2nd captain didn't want to stop for the night where we could have a service. Many times, just at dark, they would go just a curve or so beyond a house or houses to stop where there were no houses at all. They may have had other reasons for doing so, but we were made to wonder.

At a place called Belem we were allowed to have a service by a tenant. The one in charge of the place said we couldn't have a service in the houses he was in charge of, because the owner wouldn't want him to. One old man there said that he had attended a service in Porto Rico in March of 1958. This was a trip I made just before going to Manaus in '58. He said he enjoyed the service then, and if I wanted to that we could use his house for a service. I asked him what would happen if his land-lord should be angry with him, and he said in essence; "I have a way to handle him." At the close of the service he made a profession of faith. There were others who made professions of faith in other services, but this old man seemed to be more serious than the others.

Much of our work on this trip was confined to personal work. There were many people who were passengers who were going for days into other creeks and rivers. We had tracts and some of the gospels to give away, and we will never know in this life, if our witnessing and these gospels will have much influence or not. Frankly, I'm be-

and fever, so the Preuvian preachers brethren got a turn preaching here in the church in Iquitos. I have therefore not concluded the Book of Galatians or the Trail of the Blood. The attendance here was down some but we still had good crowds. I baptized Abram Gaima, son of Simon Gaima one of our missionaries and 3 others from Mapa Cocha on October 1st. These 3 from Mapa Cocha were fruit of Simon's ministry. Simon has gone to Sargento Lores, Shiwa and Santa Maria in the Nanay River and several places on the Momon River, this month.

Juan Ruis' wife is much better and Juan is preaching in the Mission with Brother Mayfield. The Celedin Mission, where Alfonso Varsallo preaches, has had 2 more professions of faith and Alfonso says that they desire baptism. Pray for Alfonso and these folks in this new work. We are also glad to report that Purification Tarcuairima, a preacher in the church here, has accepted the call of the church at Astoria. The work is already showing improvements and he plans to move on the field soon. Brother Mayfield and I plan a trip to visit all the churches and most of the preaching points on the Amazon River. We also have planned a trip up the Momon River just as soon as there is enough water to go a good distance. Brother Simon reports at one place in the Momon that seems very promising.

I taught 2 nights this week on the Tithe and the Offering, while all the preacher brethren from the river were here. I plan to take a doctrine and preach several nights this way every time all the preachers are here in Iquitos. We have felt the need to teach the preachers here more in the last month more than ever before. We may have 3 to 4 days of doctrinal study in the near future when they are here, Pray for us that we will be faithful where God has called us to serve Him. Pray for the Mayfields also as they continue to study hard the Spanish. We thank the Lord for them and that He sent them this way to work. We have asked Brother Mayfield to preach for us here in the church, so maybe in the near future he will do so.

Learning the Language Right . . . Rents Building For New Mission . . . Work On Rivers Being Blessed

Dear Brethren:

This month has been a month of many blessings, hard work, and much study. And it has passed so fast it doesn't seem possible that its time once again to share with you some of the things that have happened. We all are enjoying good health, and we do thank the Lord for this. There has been many here who have had the flu including Bro. Lauerman. But after I acted as doctor and gave him a couple of shots of penicillin he's up and about and doing fine.

We are enjoying our studies in the Language Institute, even though our professor doesn't have any sympathy when it comes to assigning home work.

But I'm sure this has helped our Spanish very much. Pray for us that the Lord will help us to learn it and learn to speak it well.

New Mission

The Lord has blessed the work here this past month. The first of the month Bro. Lauerman and I found a building near Belen for rent. After asking if we could use it for services, and we were told we could, we rented it. The next day we started cleaning it up, and had Bro. Juan Ruis painting the front while Bro. Lauerman and I were building benches. We had it just about ready for services when a fellow came in and told us in many unkind words the we could not preach Christ in this house, that it belonged to his father and that he was boss and etc. So after a lot of talking we finally got our rent money back even though all our painting and cleaning had been in vain. We felt real bad about the whole thing, but just as we were about to leave a fellow told us that he had a building that we could rent and that we could preach all we wanted to in it. So we went to look at it, and when we saw it our hearts sank within us, because it was a much nicer building, on the corner, newly painted inside and out, and we just knew that the rent would be three or four times higher. But after we talked to the fellow and his wife they said we could have it for about the same as the other place. So we rented it and had a sign put on it "Mission Bautista de fe" which in English means Baptist Faith Mission. We had our first service on Sunday the 8th. Bro. Juan Ruis was in charge of the morning service, but that night had to preach for Bro. Lauerman who was sick. So I had the service all by myself. This was the first time for me to lead the singing do the praying and the preaching, all in Spanish. The Lord sure was good to us and helped us through the service. On Sunday the 15th, I preach-

ed at the evening service also, on the subject the Blood of Christ. We do thank the Lord for His help in what little we do know of the language. Starting Tuesday night we are having services and when the water comes up and we have trouble getting in and out of Belen we will move our Friday night service there too.

On The Rivers

All the brethren on the river reported good services this month. The church at Astora called Bro. Purification as pastor, and he takes his family every week with him when he goes. They plan to move on the field in December when their children are out of school.

Bro. Marcial Macahuachi pastor at Hojeal bought lumber and material this month to complete their church building. I took the Aluminum boat there that has no top and delivered it for them. We had a good trip, but after we returned we found that Bro. Marcial had forgot his case that he carries his bible in. So Bro. Walter, Eddie and I went back today and took it to him. What a blessing it was when we arrived and saw many of the members including some of the women working on the building. It was a real joy to our hearts. This pastor and his people are doing a good work, and we thank the Lord for them.

Bro. Antonio Torres pastor at San Antonio is also doing a good work there, and is preaching at four other places each week. Sapó Playa, Vamilla, and San Pedro that are on the Amazon river, and Huanana on the Napo river. Bro. Lauerman and I are going to visit these places the last of the month the Lord willing. Bro. Javier Freitas reported good services also, and told us of one member dying and having his first funeral service. Pray for the brethren on the rivers that the Lord will bless them and they'll continue to be faithful.

We are praying that the Thanksgiving Conferenc will be the best and the Lord will bless you all, and make you to set in heavenly places in Christ Jesus.

Dear Brethren:

When the time came to write a mission sheet letter for last month we were still a long way up the river and no where near any place to mail a letter. Although we did not write a letter we will be very glad to read what the others are doing in the other parts of our work.

Since writing the last time we have had many days to rest and in fact many more than any of us wanted. Due to the fact that this is the time of the year that we do not have much rain the water in the rivers is very low. Here they always like to paint the picture of everything much darker than it really is so they told us that it would take from thirty to forty days for the trip. I don't think they took into account, the fact that we

portions of the Bible anyway.

One old man had died since I was down the river in 1958. When I heard about it, there was one thing which made me glad. He had made a profession of faith at a service in his home. I was looking forward to seeing him again, but before we reached his place I was told that he was dead. It gave me a good personal illustration to use on the remainder of the trip, to tell about his profession of faith, how he never was baptized, yet if he really did trust in Jesus that he was saved, saved without baptism, church membership, a life of good works, without taking the Lord's supper, or fulfilling the law.

Since arriving here, Bro. Creiglow and I have both preached in the church here. The people seem to be happy over our arrival. There has been much said about the need in the different places, but that was already known to us. We hope to be going to different places soon, but we have arrived here in a time when gasoline can't be bought. They say before many weeks that there will be plenty. It has been selling for \$6.00 for five gallons. Maybe after the new shipment comes in it will drop back to a lower price. It may result in us having to get someone in Manaus to buy several cans at a time and send them to us. This would also save some of the middle man's profit.

Remember us as you pray.

would be traveling on a boat that was made in 1911 and that we would be taking a barge along with us. Not only did we have many breaking downs, but there were several times that there was no wood to be had, therefore, the only thing that could be done was to stop for about eight hours while the crew went into the forest to cut some and it seemed that the break downs and the wood cutting hardly ever came at the same time. This is a steam boat and the boiler was leaking and each time it was necessary to put out the fire, wait for it to cool off, take several hours repairing it and then about two hours firing before there was enough steam to travel. They took very little care in being clean in their cooking and did not have much of anything but meat to eat, but we all arrived in better health than we expected and was very glad to end our time of rest which lasted fifty days.

There was only one of the crew that was not catholic and it seemed to us that they tried to stop at night where there were no houses many times. Some of the places that we did stop we were not permitted to have services because the owners of the villages were catholic and would not let their laborers permit us to have services. We were only able to have three preaching services during this entire trip in which there were nine professions of faith, but we doubt very much that they were all saved. We feel that the most good that we were able to do was in the personal witnessing among crew members, passengers and people along the river. We believe that the Lord will use the words that were spoken to bring glory to His name. In the mid-week service here in Cruzeiro do Sul we were happy to see several of the crew members attend while Bro. Rodrigues preached a good sermon.

The Lunsfords have rented a house and have moved in and we are eating with them, but are sleeping on the large house boat. We also hope in a few weeks to have the boat ready to travel.

During the trip from Manaus to Cruzeiro do Sul which was about 2600 miles we talked to many people who had never heard the gospel of Jesus Christ and there are many more that may never hear it. In all this distance we do not have one church except Codajas which is near Manaus. This will give all of you some idea of the great need of more missionaries and native preachers. Pray with us for both.

Preacher's School

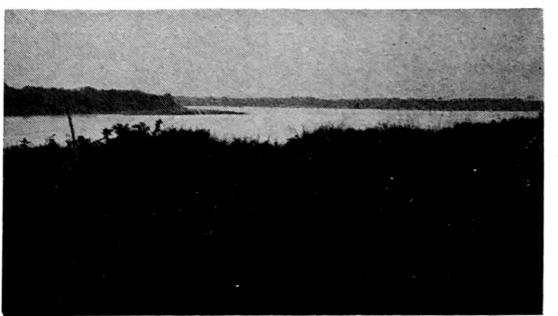
