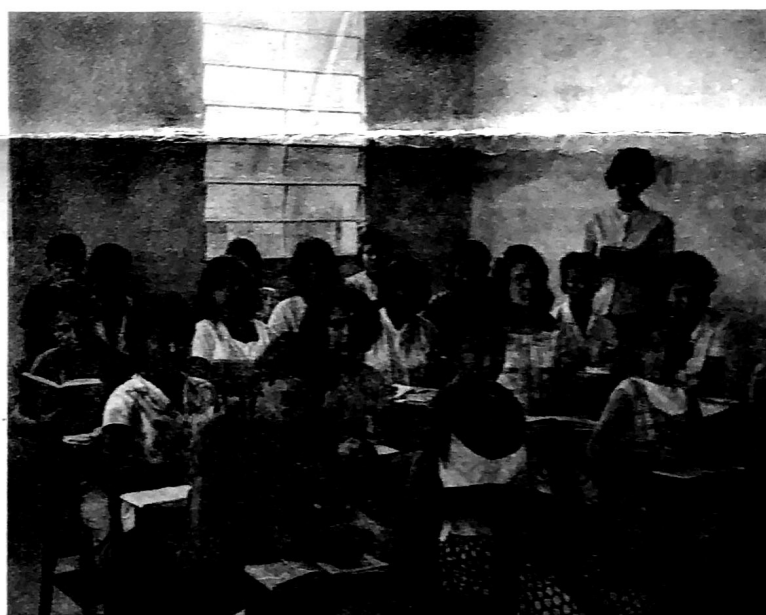

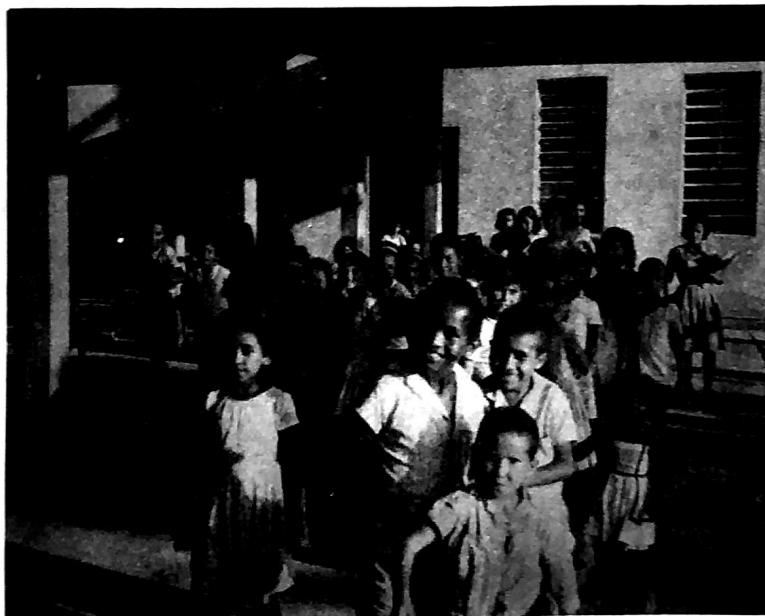

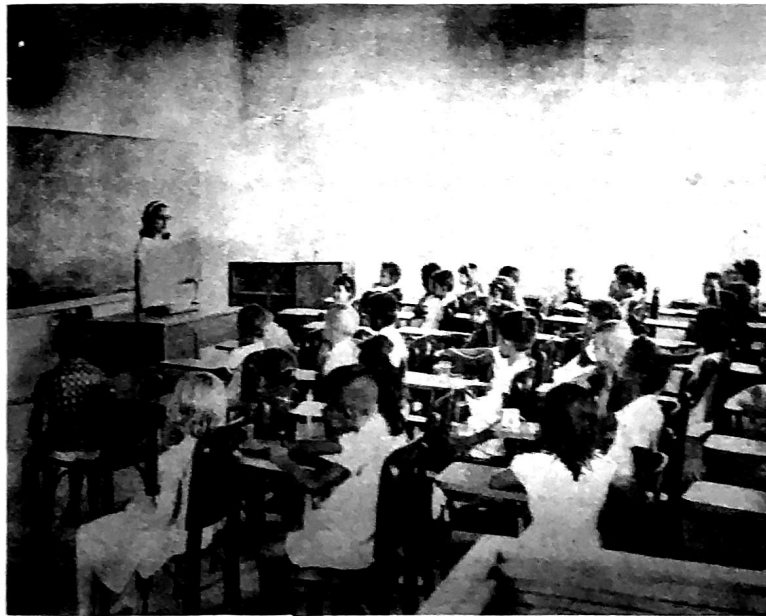

## AN OUTLINE OF WHAT A BUSY MISSIONARY DOES WITH HIS TIME ... SCHOOL AUDITORIUM SOON UNDER ROOF ... LAUNCH BEING FINISHED ... MISSIONARY TRIPS ... CHURCHES TO BE ORGANIZED ... CONVENTION COURTING OUR WORK

Manaus, Amazonas, Brazil  
Dear Brother Overbey, April 25, 1963

Trying to get this letter to you and those who faithfully support this work, reminds me of the parable of the man who did not have the proper wedding garment and when confronted with the problem was "speechless." It is not so much not having anything to write but rather so much to do that my brain doesn't want to concentrate. Bear with me a little in my folly and I will give you an idea of what I mean. Before leaving for our stay in the States, which is just 59 days off, we have the launch to try to finish, the auditorium over breezeway to try to get under roof, a trip to Manaus for the organization of the church there, plan and prepare the schedules and materials for the coming year of the High School and leave persons in charge with the proper instructions, prepare the materials for teachers record books etc. for the Primary school, plan the schedule for the Seminary, construct 14 benches for the Tabernacle church building to be used by the church and the school assemblies, make four more aluminum awnings for the school building, take care of sending all of the money of the teachers and workers to the different places, make out the financial reports on the launch, the building, the schools, the salaries, take care of the paying of the students and workers on the constructions, take care of the boys dormitory, do all of the money selling for the work in Brazil besides preaching five nights every week and teaching in the Seminary and the High School and in between times try to take a few photos and keep up the correspondence for the Mission Sheets and to the Mission. Now you know why I am speechless.

We are already receiving letters from churches inviting us to come and visit. Believe me, my brethren, when I say that we will visit as many churches that we feel would be the will of the Lord and it is with regret that we will probably have to say no to many invitations due to the fact that we feel that it is the Lord's will that we spend the year studying the languages that we can use in the teaching program of the Seminary here in Manaus. Our visits therefore will have to be limited to the week ends. Last time I was home nine months out of the 11½ were spent away from home. Enough of the folly!

**SCHOOL AUDITORIUM**  
The Lord willing the School auditorium above the breezeway will be under roof before we leave Brazil. The concrete columns or rather the forms are all in place for the second floor over the breezeway and today the first ones are being filled. Within ten days work should be started on the roof trusses. The brick work for the front and back is up and the rest of the finish work will wait until we return from the states.

**PREACHERS' SCHOOL**  
The first quarter of study will end tomorrow and the second quarter will start the first of June. Brother Sarmiento and Brother Dantas two of the graduates have been a tremendous blessing to the school this term and I know Brother Bratcher will find them to be so too. Talk about green--some of these brethren come not even knowing what a test is. But God calls men and trains them. After three months some who have never studied have learned how to outline a simple sermon and are learning the Bible and God is already giving them places to preach. God knows what He is doing, may He help us to always remember this.

**MISSIONARY TRIPS**  
Pastors Santiago and Sostenes are already in their third month of travel in to the northeastern part of Brazil. They are now in the State of Ceara and God has blessed them in each place with the salvation of souls.

**JOHN DIAS**  
John Dias is still in Manaus and I believe that there have been 23 professions of faith.

### TRIP TO CODAJAS

On the 10th of April I made a quick trip to visit the Codajas Baptist Church and God seems to have been pleased to bless the visit. This church has been courted by the Convention and Convention churches for years in spite of the fact that the Baptist Faith Missions built a beautiful building and pays the salary of a pastor, and in spite of the fact that there are hundreds of places without the gospel. So I put the cards on the table and called an ace and called the convention what was necessary and from what the letter of one brother said it seems that the Church is decided to continue working with BFM.

May the Lord bless you all and give us the privilege to see many or all of you in a few months.

## NEW SCHOOL STARTED AT COLONIA ... NEW SCHOOL STARTED AT CRUZEIRO DO SUL ... FATHER OF TEACHER DIES

**NEW SCHOOL AT COLONIA**  
In last months letter I told about getting ready to go to Colonia for the first day of school. We arrived there Thursday night finding the believers in high spirits and glad to see us. We had hoped to have our church organized long before this, but as always it is taking longer to do this than we had planned. With the Lords help we will have this done before time to write the next mission sheet letter.

We left here on Thursday afternoon March 14 getting there as always at night. We were soon in our hammocks. The next morning we were up early and soon we were all very busy getting ready for the opening day of school. All went very well and we were very happy to see 38 of the 43 registered present. I spent about thirty minutes taking pictures both inside and out of the school house of the students and teachers after which they got down to business getting organized into

their classes. Soon all were ready to study, so I asked Brother Mario who had come with the students from Japiim to read some scriptures for all of us after which I led in prayer. They were soon down to good hard study and we left them so as not to interfere with their study.

**NEW SCHOOL AT CRUZEIRO DO SUL**  
We stayed in Colonia holding Friday night services and also Sunday morning with good crowds and good attention. After Sunday morning service we visited a while and then were on our way back down the river for Cruzeiro do Sul for the night service there. On Monday morning we were up early again for the first day of school here in Cruzeiro. Here in the school they have the classes separated with part of them studying in the morning and part in the afternoon. There are about thirty registered, but as of that time they had not all arrived. I asked the teacher to have both classes to come in the morning so that I could take their pictures, but on the morning for the picture I got busy with something else and forgot to go there. Soon after the school started the father of the teacher died and she asked for a fifteen day leave of absence. We arranged for others to take her place and the school went on with missing one day of school only. In Colonia Brother Mario goes every Thursday to teach the word of God, the teachers read the Bible each day. I have been teaching Bible stories every Saturday in the school here. There is one little girl in the school here that has brought her parents to church several times. They are not believers so we can say already that the Lord has used the School for his glory as at least three more have heard of God's salvation.

The school teachers father that died was the man from Mourapiranga that has been in charge of the church services there for several years. He became sick one Friday morning and before they could get him to the port to bring him to Cruzeiro do Sul he had lost his speech. Before they arrived in Cruzeiro he was in a coma. On Sunday morning when we were opening the church for services they sent word for me to come to their house as he was much worse. Upon arriving there they asked me to come back as soon as church was over, but after looking at him I knew that death was not very far away. I did not leave right away and in about thirty minutes he left this world to be with the Lord. The family was sad, but soon they asked us to sing hymns, and sing we did, in thanks to God for His love and mercy, with some of the family singing also. This shows the kind of peace that God gives to those who trust in Jesus as Saviour.

**BLESSING AND FELLOWSHIP**  
One of our biggest blessings that we received this month was the return of the Lunsfords. We have spent several days in fellowship. Yesterday we received the first thousand tile and we left them get sore hands with us carrying them. I think they made out better than I did because they have spent the last month carrying things and were more used to it than I. We thank the Lord for them and for their safe return.

Please do not forget us before the throne of grace and may He bless you all always.

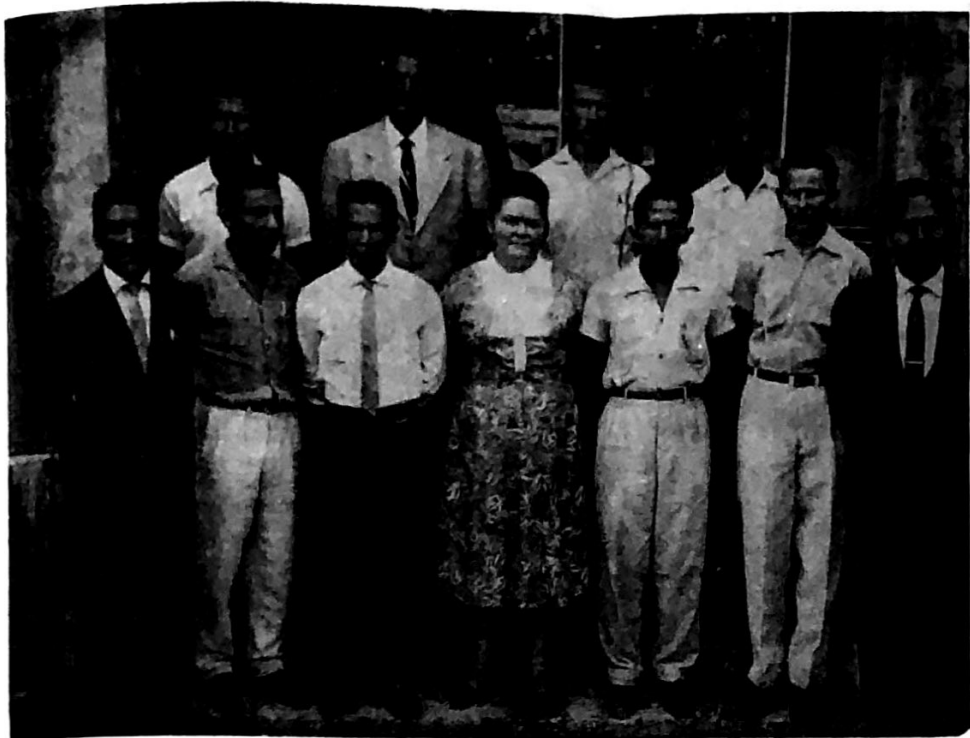

## REPORTS ON ALL THE CHURCHES ... SIMON GIAMA PASTOR AT HOJEAL ... MARCIAL IN CHARGE OF MISSION AT TAMSHIYAGU ... MAPA CHOCHA HAS BUILDING SITE

Iquitos, Peru  
April 19, 1963

The San Pedro Church has had another good month, 25 average attendance and there was one profession of faith and this one baptized the 23rd of March. Besides the regular services, Sunday morning and night, Wednesday and Friday night, the church invited Antonio Torres for 2 nights of special preaching, but there were no moves. The men of the church have gotten part of the lumber in which to build their new building. Manuel Taricuarima pastors this church. The San Antonio Church reports 30 average attendance with visitation by the pastor several days. The pastor preached 2 nights in San Pedro and 1 night in the Astoria Church. The Pastor, Antonio Torres reports a better spirit in the church than he has ever known. Brother Marcial Macacuachi resigned the Hojeal Baptist Church so as to work in our Mission in Tamshiyacu.

### SIMON GAIMA AT HOJEAL

The Hojeal Church called Simon Gaima as their pastor. I thank the Lord that in his old age and after working so hard, paddling and motoring to many places, the Lord has seen fit to use Simon in pastoring a church. Simon could not have had asked for a bigger blessing, because the Hojeal Church is a real church. They seem real happy with Simon and he seems happy with them. May the Lord bless them together for His Glory. Pastor Purification of the Astoria church reports things going about the same in Astoria this month. The pastor has built him another house this month as the bank caved in near his house on the Amazon River. He is now inland some 100 yards. They hope to get started this month on their church building or as soon as the man brings the lumber that he has promised.

### MAPA COCHA CHURCH GETS BUILDING SITE

The Church in Mapa Cocha, after much rambling with the village officials, has finally got a site to build their building. It is a nice high place, directly in front of the house where they hold services now, which is also Abram's home. I am to go Monday and Tuesday to be there on their beginning of the work. We hope to get this building up fast because the Church needs the space and also Mapa Cocha is in the process of incorporating, but they have been in this process for about a year now. The attendance has been up this month with several new faces, Pastor Abram Gaima and wife visited Llanachama 1 day and another village called Tarapoto also. These both are up river from Mapa on the Nanay River. There was one profession of faith also this month. The Lord continues to bless in Mapa in spite of all the difficulties.

### MARCIAL AT TAMSHIYAGU

As stated above, Marcial Macacuachi is preaching regularly in our old but neglected

work in Tamshiyacu. The 25th of March Brother Marcial, his brother Jorge and I went to Tamshiyacu. Less than an hour after arriving, we had rented a house to hold services in and a house for Brother Marcial to move his family into. This was a direct answer to prayer. Our only member there, an old lady, Paula Tenazoa, was real happy to see us again and to know that Marcial was coming to live and preach. The first service Marcial had only one other person besides his wife and the old lady, but 2 weeks later he had 12 in Sunday School. I feel that God will bless this work with Brother Marcial being the missionary there. This place has always been on my heart from the first time I went there over 3 and a half years ago. It will be a rough hard work because it being neglected. We pray and we believe that there will be a church here someday. The First Baptist in Iquitos shows another attendance drop, but our members have been faithful and we always have several visitors. The Sunday School average this month was 40. The Women's class on Thursday nights has from 4 to 6 present, the Men's class on Friday night has 8 to 10 sometimes. Of course we have just finished our classes again for the month. I enjoy these more every month as these brethren are grabbing more truth as we are getting down to business more all the time.

### SPECIAL SERVICES IN IQUITOS

We also had 3 nights of special services this past week. On Monday night, Brother Marcial preached on the Church as the Temple of God, The Body of Christ, and the Bride of Christ. Tuesday night Brother Antonio Torres preached on the Four Essentials of Baptism, Wednesday night Brother Jorge Macacuachi preached on the Two Aspects of Christ's Second Coming. All three of these messages were well rounded rich messages. I can see teaching paying off in the doctrine and also assurance of how to preach. We really had a good time these nights, although the crowd was not too good. Our daughters, Barbara and Karen, along with another member of our church are taking turns playing the piano. Barbara for the Sunday School, Yolanda for the after service and Wednesday nights, Karen Sunday nights and special services. All three play well, but Karen does real well especially on the choruses that we have on Sunday night. We had one profession of faith this month also in the church here. Brother Jorge Macacuachi is now doing a lot of visiting and plans much more of this in the future. With us losing so many members and our attendance down the Lord has shown us the need to reach lost souls more. I made 3 trips to Hojeal this month and 1 to Mapa Cocha, one to Astoria last Sunday beside the other day that I went to Tamshiyacu. So the Lord is blessing and we are thankful and happy and praise His Name. May the Lord bless all of you.

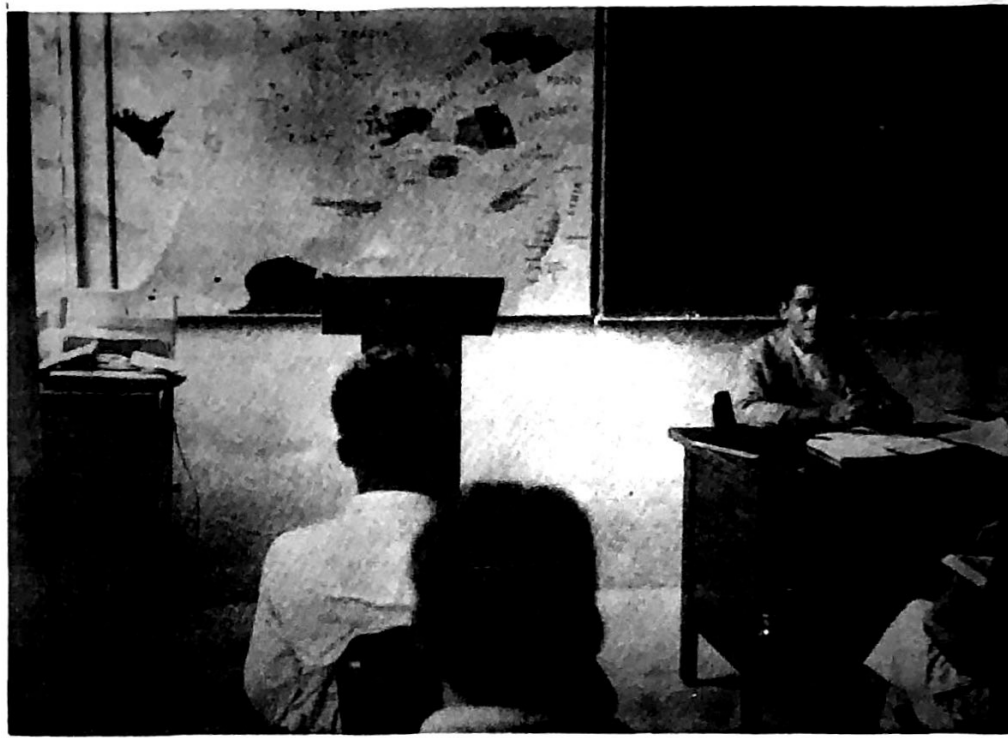

### MAYFIELD HOUSEBOAT

Several months ago a storm wrecked the Mayfield Houseboat in the Nanay River at Iquitos, Peru. The boat was raised and pulled ashore and repaired and the first trip in it was made while Brethren Overbey and Henderson were in Peru. This houseboat has a Ford Falcon engine in it and the unit that drives the propeller burned out as we returned from the trip to visit the five churches on the river. Brother Overbey brought the burned out parts to the U.S. and got a new unit and sent it to Iquitos, Peru. Brother Mayfield came down from Pucallpa and had a new steering outfit installed and he and Brother Lauerman are to try out the new unit and boat on a trip down the Amazon to San Pedro the farthest away church and then visit the other churches as they come back upstream. Then Brother and Mrs. Mayfield will travel up the river several hundred miles to Pucallpa, Peru, stopping at the towns along the way preaching the gospel and establishing mission points. All this the Lord willing. Pray for them, and send an offering for the Launch Fund.

We have been busy as usual during the past month, mostly in revivals. I first want to report a visit to a church that should have been in last month's letter but it slipped my mind. On Saturday night, March 16th, I told of the work in Brazil at the Pilot Knob Baptist Church, Madison County, Ky. where Brother Lewis Dean is pastor.

March 18-29-Revival at the Northside Baptist Church, Lexington, Ky., Brother Sam Dennis, Pastor. The Lord gave us 1 profession of faith and 1 by letter. Also, I had the privilege during these same two weeks of speaking eight times at Chapel Services at the Lexington Baptist College.

March 30-At the Providence Baptist Church, Estill Co., Ky. where Brother James Sparks is the pastor.

March 31-We enjoyed a good day with the Bryan Station Baptist Church where Brother Al Gormley is pastor. We enjoyed being in the pulpit and also the good meal in the home of the pastor. It was also a blessing to us to see and fellowship again with Brother

Jim Masterson, former pastor or I would imagine pastor emeritus, and still member of this good church.

April 1-3-Attended and preached the first night at Spring Missionary Bible Conference in Lexington, Ky.

April 5-I preached and told of the work at the New Testament Baptist Church, Creve Coeur, Illinois, where Brother Mitchell Lewis is pastor.

April 3, 1963

Received a letter from Brother Lauerman saying that the plane was to arrive that day (April 1st) with our parts, and that he'd let me know as soon as he had them out of customs. That should be next Monday or Tuesday so he said. We're not sure yet just when we can leave here, but I know it will be after the 15th.

### GOOD ATTENDANCE AT PUCALLPA

We had 62 in S.S. Sunday, and several came after S.S. for the preaching service. I had a packed house for my Friday night class, and I'm sure will have the same this week if it don't rain. I am also teaching the adult class in S.S. 1 Cor. chapter by chapter verse by verse. I'm enjoying this very much.

Tomorrow nite I'm going to preach at Kilometer 17 on the new highway at a mission. The preacher visited our church some time ago and asked if I'd come, that he had several that were saved but wasn't baptized as yet. I went out and talked to him the other day and gave him our articles of faith and the book strange Baptism. Hope he'll see his need of being baptized and all the others too. I'll let you know how things turn out.

### LIMA PAPER PRINTS ARTICLE AND PICTURE OF HOUSEBOAT

I'm sending you a clipping out of the Prensa paper. The head lines says: They praise the work in Pucallpa of the Baptist couple. Under the picture say's the forceful declaring launch, "The Victory". The Prensa is the largest paper (daily) in Lima. So we feel its a real plug for our work.

April 16, 1963  
Received a telegram from Brother Lauerman Saturday 13th saying that things had arrived. I wired him back saying we would try to get reservations for the 19th and hope to leave then the Lord willing.

April 19, 1963

### TWO EXCLUDED

We are still in Pucallpa waiting for the rain to stop. It will probably be Monday before the airfield is dry enough to land on. We had our monthly business meeting Wednesday night in the church and the church excluded two. One of the excluded ones was the charter member who was baptized in Brazil. His brother-in-law presented the accusations against him and said that he had

been married and left his wife and was now living with another woman and also that he did not believe what we do but believed as the Pentecost do and was attending the Pentecost church. The other one excluded is in Iquitos, Peru. I talked to him when there about moving his letter to the church in Iquitos and he laughed and said that he was going to the Catholic Church.

### IN IQUITOS

April 25, 1963

Here we are in Iquitos after a five day delay. The new unit for the houseboat and outboard is here for the houseboat in good shape. We brought the boat around to get them mainly to change the steering. The new unit is much better than the one that was burned out, less speed but more power. The man said he would have the steering done in a couple of days and we hope to go down the river to San Pedro next week and visit all the churches before leaving for Pucallpa, as this will probably be our last time in Iquitos. Had a good day here Sunday with 62 in Sunday School.

April 27, 1963

We are still waiting for the man to finish the steering on the houseboat. Am also changing the board on the back of the Aluminum boat as the old one is rotted out. Brother Lauerman is going with us down the river to visit the churches. We want to leave Wednesday if possible. I will let you know how the steering and unit etc. work out after this tryout on the trip to visit the churches. I think it best to send our mail to Pucallpa, while we are on the way up the river. I will try to keep you informed where we are at on the river from time to time and how the trip is going. May the Lord bless you all.

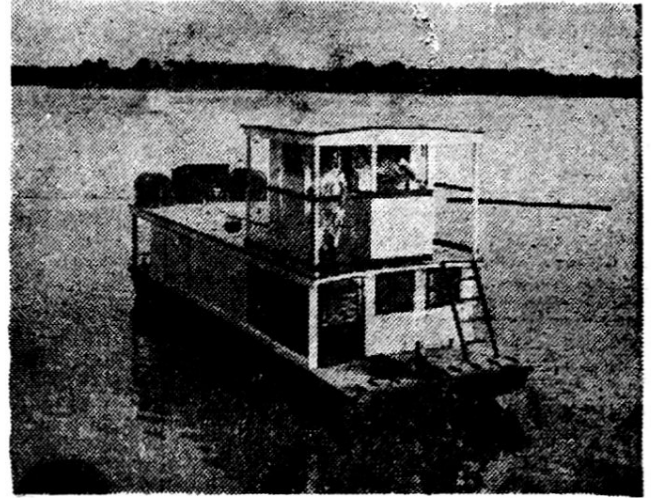
