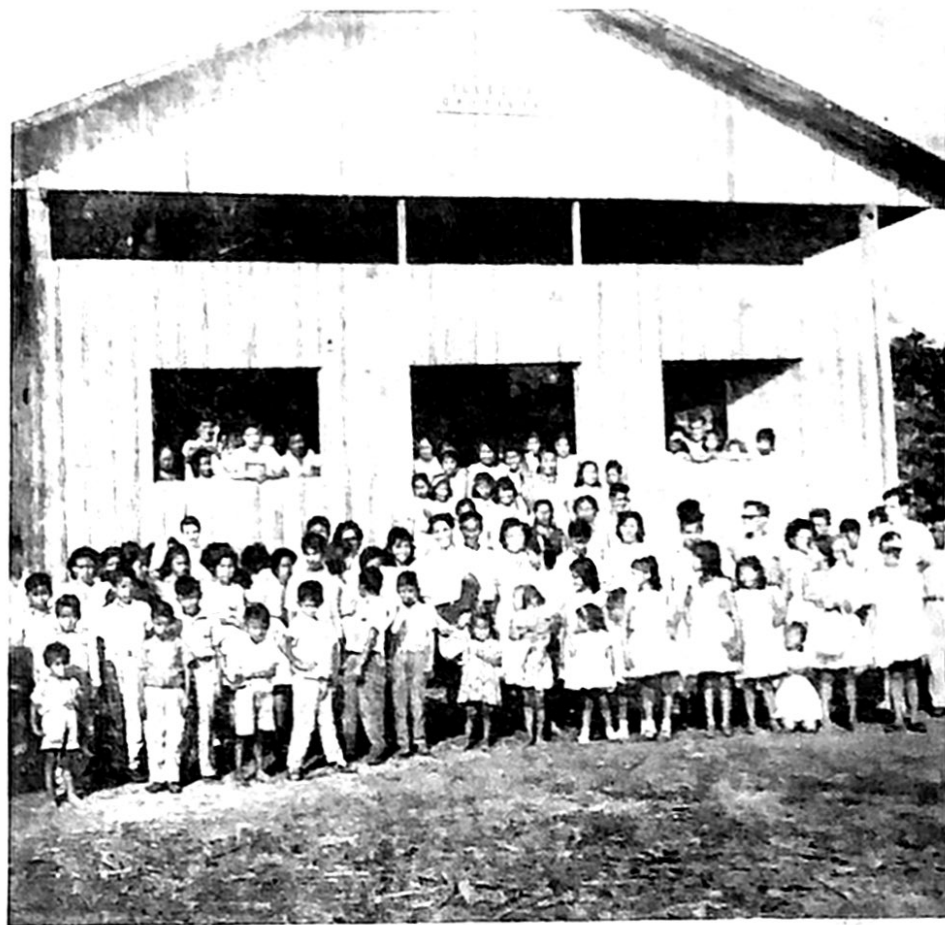

The fellowship at the Conferences is wonderful to us for it is one of the things that we do not get to enjoy in the land of Brazil. We thank God for all those individuals and churches that have this burden on their heart, to make our ministry possible. We are thankful that the fruit shall abound to your account.

The political situation in Brazil this past month has been of great concern to us as it has been to many of you. The Word of God assures us that it is God who sets up and puts down so we take this to be His will. Pray that we might have free course to preach the Word. We praise God for the Holy Spirit that does withstand for us. The earthquake in Alaska, the assassination of the President of the United States and the great political and moral upheaval throughout the world ought to make us aware as never before that it is urgent that we "redeem the time for the days are evil". May we pray for labourers, may we give, and may we preach as never, never before.

PRAY FOR THE WORK TO ENLARGE

We have felt for sometime that the Lord would have us to enlarge the extent of our work in Brazil. At the present time Baptist Faith Missions has work in three or four States. have been blessed with material things to send out these young people as God calls and prepares them to go.

A letter from Brazil tells us that the High School has 34 students enrolled this year for which we are thankful. Many have given for the supporting of Baptist students who are unable to support themselves.

Back In Pucallpa After Two Months Journey . . . The Lord Blessed In A Great Way . . . Houseboat And Motors Work Without Trouble . . . Many Professions Of Faith

Dear Brethren:

March 20, 1964

We are back in Pucallpa after two months of Bible schools, night services, and traveling. And we could not have wanted a better trip. The Lord blessed us with showers of blessings, and we do thank and praise Him for it. I'm going to try to start where I left off last month with the news about the rest of our trip.

We left San Roque after a wonderful meeting and arrived at a place called La Pedrera. We visited many homes but were unable to find anyone that would let us use their house for services. The Priests had visited and had threatened the people, and everyone was scared of us. This was our first experience of this kind in Peru, and we hope the last. All the other places we were received very well. After leaving there we ran into some bad weather and had to tie up for the night at a place called Lisboa. From here we came to Monte Bello. We visited the Governor and was given permission to use the school house for services. We had very good service with the school house filled. This place is very large and we hope some day to have a good work here. Our next stop was a place called Derlicia. We also stopped here to look for a place called Mahuizo, and to look for a birth certificate for one of the members at San Francisco. I found a guide who said he would be glad to show me the way, but we would have to take the small aluminum boat as the water was too low for the house boat. After about two hours of turning, pushing, and cleaning a path, we arrived, only to find that they had burned all the old papers and that we would have to go to Dos de Mayo to get a new paper made out etc. Two of the officials of the town told me that they would go with me the next day and get it fixed for me. After returning to Delicia we visited and had service in the old school house that had not been used for several months. We just got the service started when Ada was stung by a wasp, and while she was getting it off of her one stung me. We found two nests and before we got them all killed the people had just about all gone. I'm sure this was the smallest crowd that we had during the whole trip. The next day I spent in Dos de Mayo getting the paper filled out for the birth certificate. We arrived at Orellana and spent the weekend there with old missionary, and had services in his home. We left there and our next stop was San Francisco. This is not the San Francisco where we have our church. In fact there are three (3) towns that have the name San Francisco. This is the middle one on

the river. We visited this place the last trip but were not received too well, but this time it was very different, and they gladly gave us their new school building for our services. We hope some day to have San Francisco number 2 on our list. We would have had Bible school at this place but had already promised two other places farther up river that we would be back.

When we arrived at Castilla we were met by several people, and the school house was all cleaned and ready for Bible school. The building was too small for the evening services, and every night there were as many outside as inside. Our Bible school was not as large as the other places, but we had 31 who came every day. We used the blackboard for our memory verse, and then at night I would put another verse on the board for the adults to memorize. At the end of the school there were 13 children who could repeat every verse without any mistakes and there were others who knew some of them. Many of the adults also learned the verses by memory. During the first nights of our meeting there was no one saved. Then on a Thursday night three men and three women came forward trusting the Lord to be their Saviour. Then Sunday came; that was our big day. The morning service was well attended and after the service I took pictures of the school and many of the parents.

River Churches Building . . . Trips Made . . . Canoe Made . . . Preacher's Classes Taught . . . Man Dies Of Snake Bite

Iquitos, Peru
March 21, 1964
Dear Brethren,
Simon Gaima still cannot see too clearly from the operation on his left eye. He says that it still is cloudy, so it is not known when the operation on the other eye will be as the doctor says that the one ought to be well healed before operating on the other one. The right eye also has cataracts, but not as bad as the left one had. The river

churches are coming along about as usual. Some are building, some traveling, some visiting in homes. The Iquitos Church had another slight increase in attendance. San Antonio had 2 professions of faith, and Tamshiyacu Mission had 1 profession of faith, and Mapa Cocha 1 profession of faith. I have just finished my classes with the brethren yesterday and they have all gone back to their respective places of service. I would like to say that the Tamshiyacu Mission is looking up and 2 families are thinking seriously about coming for baptism. This would give us 13 baptized members there, 11 adults and a good beginning for a church. I am trying to locate some good canoes for the brethren, so that they might be able to travel more and visit new places. I even made one this month myself from an old hull I had that was in good shape, by increasing the height with boards, etc. and tarring and painting. I just did this in my spare moments this past month and it came out better than any that we have bought. It took about perhaps 3 complete days to do it, so I am thinking of trying to do this more often, if I can find some good hollow logs, etc. I have visited 3 days with Jorge Macahuachi. It has helped a lot. I have been doing this the past several months with him, and we have noticed an increase since that time, so I am going to continue it for 4 or 5 days a month. Jorge of course is visiting by himself all the time. I visited one Sunday with the Mapa Cocha Church, and the others also. I was with the Hojeal Church, as they are without their pastor. I visited also Tamshiyacu and also Manacamira. Last week I also went back to Llanachama, where I had not been for over a year and a half, and was received real well, so I plan to go monthly to this place at least to see if we can start a permanent work there or not. The owner of the house where I go to stay when I am in Llanachama, died in January of a snake bite. From what I could understand of the snake that bit him, it was the equivalent of our copperhead snake. He was bitten about 9 o'clock in the morning and died about midnight that same day. The snake was not too far from his house, perhaps 5 or 6 blocks. The sad part of it was, that the man tried to capture the snake, after it had bitten him. They buy these here and send them to the museums. This man had made a profession of faith, so we pray that it was real and that he went to meet the Lord in Eternity. I preached twice again this month in the Iquitos Church. From the preaching in Simon's house on Friday nights, we now have several people that are starting to attend the Church services. There were 5 adults there Sunday night when I preached. There have been no professions of faith from those services, but last Friday we had 3 that came and asked just what it meant to accept Christ, and we explained to them, but no profession was made and we left it with the Lord. However, the same 3 came to the Church Sunday night, so they still are interested it seems. So we will continue to preach, explain and invite and wait upon the Lord. Not having received the Mission Sheet yet, I do not know whether I mentioned last month that my wife's arm from the operation, again has become stiff. They don't seem to know just exactly what it is. The rest of us have our good days and our bad days, of course. Again we say may the Lord bless you all.

Sunday night the house was filled again with many new ones for the first time. I preached on the subject of what the Christian has in Christ. After the message I asked all those who would like to be saved to come. The Governor was the first to come, El Senor Louis Gonzales. I mention his name for our son's benefit, as the last time we were there together we prayed that he would be saved, but the Lord did not see fit to save him at that time, and I'm sure that Ed will rejoice with us. There were others who came, also one blind man that had attended every night came feeling his way down the aisle; after that his wife came. I met him half way and asked him what he was coming for and he said he was coming to trust the Lord Jesus. He told me after the service that he was 82 years old. How we praise God for His saving grace. There was another man who came who had leprosy and another man who could not hear, but told me that he was trusting the Lord. I then asked all the other Christians to come as I wanted their names, and all together there were 25 and that is not counting the children who made professions of faith. Our hearts rejoiced over the blessings of God during that week. We hope some day to have a church there with a pastor. We are planning on visiting this place with our small boat before furlough time. Many came to see us off Monday morning. Leaving there, we arrived at Espinal, a new place for us, that is off the main river. The only time you can get there is when the river is high. Upon arriving we found everyone very happy that we had come. The Governor told us that they had not had any kind of a service for over two years. We were only there one night, as time was running out for us. We had a very good service with the school house filled. We hope to visit again there and have Bible school. Our last Bible school was at Caridad. We had a good Bible school but the evening services were not as good as we had at other places. I'm sure I have never preached harder and never enjoyed it more than at this place, although there was no visible results. The two Christian families that we have there attended every night and I'm sure that they feasted upon the Word of God. We hope that everyone of you will thank the Lord with us for this wonderful trip. We had no trouble with the motor or the boat over the several hundreds of miles that we traveled. I'm sure that we will never forget the many blessings that have been ours during these days.

Upon arriving back at San Francisco our hearts were again filled with gladness when we heard that they had continued with the services during our absence, and that only a few had not been faithful in attendance. We also attended the church at Pucallpa last Wednesday night and I was asked to bring the message and I enjoyed it very much. Pray for the work here and at San Francisco that the Lord will continue to bless and that we will have pastors for the churches soon. May the Lord bless each one of you for His glory.

DVB School And Revival Services . . . 19 Professions Of
Faith And Ten Baptized . . Julio Dantes Injured . . . 44
Students In High School And 184 In Grade School . . .
Eight More Baptized . . . Praise God From Whom All
Blessings Flow

Dear Brethren:
March 16, 1964
I wrote in last month's letter that I was planning a trip to Murituba. I had asked to go with me Brother Alacir Bastos, who is a deacon of the Codajas Church and who was with me on the two previous short trips I had made there, and Silas Oliveira, the young man who plays the accordion at the 14th of December Church. We three arrived at the airport early Wednesday morning, February 19th, with all our baggage, ready to go. We were told that the plane hadn't arrived and perhaps the flight would be in the afternoon or the next morning. We all returned home and later that day learned that the flight had been cancelled. What should we do? I decided to ask the Deacon, Antonio Eugenio do Nascimento to take us on his boat. How long would it take us to get there?
At Prayer Meeting that night we made arrangements with him and at 11 a.m. Thursday morning we finally left Manaus, five of us, instead of three, in a small boat instead of an airplane. By traveling practically day and night we finally arrived in Codajaz at 10:00 Saturday night. The trip we would have made in less than two hours by plane, took us 57 hours by boat.
We decided to stay in Codajaz until Monday morning and worship with the Codajas Church on Sunday. The church is without a pastor but services are held regularly and a deacon of the church preaches. They asked me to preach Sunday morning and Sunday night which I did. Sunday afternoon a service was held in a home and Brother Antonio Eugenio preached.
Daybreak, Monday morning, found us already well on our way to Murituba. We arrived there at four and after the owner of the house where we always stay came in from work, we decided it would be better to visit and invite as many as we could for the services every morning (Vacation Bible School) and night throughout the rest of the week rather than attempt to have Services that night. This we did and visited inviting until sometime after dark. We returned to the house, and as for me, tired and foot-sore.
Tuesday morning we enrolled 25 in Bible School. That night I preached to 70. Each morning the attendance in Bible School increased until the next to the last day we had 70 present. Saturday morning our attendance fell because of heavy rain. Each night also we had good attendance. After a few nights we began to hold services in a different home each night. One night as I was leading the singing before preaching I noticed a ladder being placed to the window. The house was small and was already well filled. Two young men climbed up and stayed on the ladder the rest of the service to hear the preaching.
I am happy to report that the Lord gave us among the students of our Bible School, 19 professions of faith. Sunday afternoon it was my privilege to baptize 9 of these and the owner of the house, Silas Florença Batista, who had already been a believer for 7 years. Thus when we left Monday morning,

March 2nd, we left behind 10 new Baptists, baptized into the fellowship of the Codajas Church.
Monday afternoon we arrived in a small settlement known as "Boca de Miao." There we held services in a house directly behind the Catholic Church building.
After services we went on to Codajaz and arrived at midnight. We spent the rest of the night in the church parsonage.
Tuesday night we crossed the river to visit the Curicuri Church. After we left the boat we found that the only way to reach the church would be to wade through mud and water for some several yards. I took off my boots and with the rest waded through, at places, almost knee deep water and mud. I guess then I was not a "foot washing" Baptist but a "bare-footed" Baptist. Anyway, we finally arrived and had a good service.
Wednesday, March 4th, we spent the morning preparing to leave, and to our joy, at 1:30 p.m. the plane arrived on schedule. Three of us returned on the plane. Brother Antonio stayed with the boat and also the Codajas Church requested him to stay with them to supply the pulpit for a few days. He plans to return later this month. In an hour and a half we arrived in Manaus. When I arrived home I found that all was well except my wife who had developed an infected thumb during my absence that had sent her to the doctor several times. Also I soon learned that a few days after I left, Julian Dantes, pastor at Chapada and teacher in the Seminary and High School, with Pastor Sarmiento Lima and one of the students were hurt when Brother Dantes' motorcycle overturned. He was hurt the worst with a broken collar bone and wrist besides bruises and cuts. He had to stay about 10 days in the hospital, and is still in a cast over most of his body from his waist up. The other two were not hurt near as bad. Thus in my absence the Seminary had not had many classes. We are still feeling the lack of Brother Dantes in all the school (the High School and Grade School started again the first of this month) but are continuing as best we can. The High School has 32 in the first year and 12 in the second year. The Grade School has a capacity of 184.
Since returning home, I have been busy in the work of the schools and church.
Yesterday it was my privilege to baptize seven into the fellowship of the Catoreze Church and one for the Calvary Church.
Thus as I look back over this months work, with 18 baptized, it causes me to want to sing the doxology:
"Praise God from whom all blessings flow,
Praise Him all creatures here below,
Praise Him above, ye heavenly hosts,
Praise Father, Son, and Holy Ghost,
Amen."
We ask your prayers that the Lord will continue to bless our labors for Him here.
