George Bean Writes First Letter From Brazil

Manaus, Amazonas, Brazil

June 28, 1964

Dear Brethren,
 Greetings in the name of our Lord. This finds everyone here OK and enjoying the blessings of the Lord.

We left Ohara Field in Chicago Saturday June 20th at 10 A.M. and the Hatchers and Mayfields met us at the plane in Miami, Florida. The Mayfields had just arrived from Peru and we had a visit with them before they took a plane north. Brother Hatcher and I checked in our baggage and then were notified that our plane would be five hours late in taking off for Brazil.

LEAVE MIAMI

We left Miami at 10 P.M. June 20th. The Stewardess told Brother Hatcher that we were having engine trouble and would have a delay in Caracas, Venezuela. They had to wait for a part from the U.S. for the plane and we were checked through customs and taken in cabs to the finest hotel in Caracas. The next morning we were off in another plane for Belem. Our baggage was in two different compartments and about fifteen pieces were left on the plane they were working on and went on to Rio and Brother Hatcher will perhaps have to go to Belem to receive it.

IN MANAUS, AMAZONAS

We arrive a day late in Manaus because of the engine trouble. Brother Hatcher have been getting things straighten most of the week. We find that we cannot go as much as in the U.S. so we have to take things slower to start with.

HOUSE HUNTING

We have been trying to find a house to live in. We found one but not pipes for water and the man could not tell us when there would be pipes. We now have the house next door to the Preacher's School where the students have their meals. It has to be wired for electricity and I will put in plumbing and run the water to it and put in a toilet and shower. (Brother Bean is a plumber by trade-Editor). Then when I leave, some of the married students can use the house.

SOME PLACE EVERY NIGHT

Tuesday night we were at Brother Hatchers and the Ladies Bible Class from Zion Baptist Church gave us a welcome to Brazil with a song service and Brother Bratcher preached to us from the Book of Acts. Wednesday we went to a program at the Grade School and the High School. Wednesday night to Tabernacle Baptist Church and Brother Hatcher preached. Thursday night we went to Chapada Baptist Church for prayer meeting. This church has a service at their mission on Wednesday night. Friday evening we went back to Chapada for an hour of fellowship at the house of the blind man who is a consecrated member at Chapada Church.

Dear Brethren,
 Well the year has passed and the time has arrived for us to return to Brazil. Needless to say this year has been one of many blessings from the Lord, although there has been some disappointments. We had hopes of leading many more souls to Christ this past year, but we learned from the word of the Lord a long time ago that all we can do is tell them how Christ died for their sins and then it is between them and God. We will just try to be satisfied with those who God sees fit to save. We believe the Lord has used us this year, but we are glad that the time has come to return.

As I mentioned in my letter that I wrote last month, there were several churches that I had promised to visit, but due to the illness of my brother I had to cancell some of these visits. There were also some churches that had asked me to make the second visit. I want to apologize and say that I am very sorry and ask each one of you to forgive me.

We would also like to express our thanks for each act of kindness that has been extended to us and for the many love offerings given to us. We are most thankful for the many prayers that have been offered to God in our behalf. We trust that in the future you will not forget us before the throne of grace.

This past month I did have the good pleasure of spending a week-end with Brother Warren Wilkerson and the Jordan Baptist of Portage, Indiana, after which Brother Wilkerson took me to the Missionary Equipment Service where I bought several things to take back to Brazil.

Last week we pulled a trailer to Miami taking most of our luggage to the Varig Air Lines to be shipped. While we were in Florida we visited a number of friends of our home church, the Park Ridge Baptist Church. We also had a good visit with Brother William L. Stephen and the Jordan Baptist of Sanford, Florida. On the way

Ready To Meet Hatchers And Beans . . . Buys House To Live In . . . Eight Baptized . . . Twenty Three In Preacher's School . . . Visits Mission In Interior

Manaus, Amazonas
Dear Brethren, June 17, 1964

If all goes according to schedule, we'll greet the Hatchers, Beans, and Sherman Smith at the Airport this coming Sunday afternoon (June 21st) at 4:00. Several from the churches and schools are planning on being there also.

This month we have had to spend much time looking for a house. We finally found one and have made the down payment. Pray with us that the Lord will bless us in this venture.

We have had good services at Catorze church during this month. On May 31st I baptized eight into the fellowship of that church. I'm enclosing pictures of the baptizing.

On May 29th I preached at Careiro. We have a student from the school preaching there each week-end now. A man there loaned us a house to hold services in. The student fixed it up and the night I preached there was the first service held in the house. That night the house was filled. I was already into the last half of the message when three of the benches, which were only planks nailed to the wall, came loose from the wall and fell. Immediately there was confusion and then I heard a shrill cry of pain. I thought, "One of the benches fell on a child". Then we were all relieved to see a dog still yelping with pain limp out from under the bench and go out the door. I managed to finish the sermon after this interruption.

On June 1st we matriculated 18 regular students and 5 which we accepted as "special students", due to being under age or lacking in previous education, in our Seminary or Bible School. This gives us a total of 23.

On Friday afternoon, June 5th, I left Manaus with Pastor Manuel Costa. We arrived at midnight at "Usina do Brasil." The next morning we left Usina and walked for an hour and a half to another river where we were met by two men in a canoe with a small motor. The first half hour of trip was spent dodging trees. After that the traveling was better having reached the main stream of the river. We arrived at 12:35 p.m. at the house where services are held at Rio Urubu. This was my first visit at this mission station of our church.

That night there were 40 present. We announced services for the next morning and also that we would leave immediately after in order to return to Usina for a baptismal service there Sunday afternoon. The next morning we had another good service but didn't get to leave until 2 in the afternoon. We didn't get back to Usina until 7:30 p.m., too late for the baptizing. I preached to some 35 there that night. We left Monday morning at around 5 and I arrived home after midnight.

I close with the words of Psalm 67:1-2 "God be merciful unto us, and bless us; and cause his face to shine upon us; thy way may be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations."

News From Churches . . . Journeys Made . . . Some To Get Legally Married To Be Baptized . . . Three Days Of Classes For Preachers

Dear Brethren, June 21, 1964

There is not too much to say about the river churches as they have about the same report as last month. The brethren have all planned to visit several new places this month, so we hope they keep their word. I would like to say though that Manuel Taricuarima is now pastoring the Hojeal Church as Simon Gaima said that he was unable to go back and keep up the church at least for the present because of his ill health. I ask all of you to pray about Simon and his condition. In Hojeal the new pastor has already been received well just in two weeks and they had 51 in Sunday School last week, which is more than they have had for the past two years. In San Pedro where Manuel left there is a young man there that has said he will preach and with a weekly visit from Brother Torres pastor at San Antonio they will handle the services. I pray that this young man will turn out to be faithful and that Brother Torres will be faithful in teaching him. I hope to have a picture soon of the completed building of the Astoria Church. The Mapa Church and the Tamshiyacu Mission have nothing in particular to report. In Iquitos it seems like that there is always a small growth monthly. We hope by next month, the last one to make a profession of faith will have all of their papers ready to get married so as to be baptized. There are two in San Antonio and one in Tamshiyacu that are to get married soon so as to be baptized.

There was one profession of faith in "Tapira Nueva," where Brother Marcial preaches.

I visited two Sundays with the Hojeal Church, one day each at San Antonio and San Pedro, and last Sunday night I went to Mapa Cocha to help them to observe the Lord's Supper for the first time. I had to go by water because the road is too bad to travel on usually from November until June. I also preached one Sunday night for the Church in Iquitos. I am still preaching in Simon Gaima's house on Friday nights and still have many lost come but after more than six months we have not had any professions of faith, however we see always some of these lost people that attend this service attend the Church's services. Of course we had also this month the three full day of preachers classes.

We suppose by now that the Mayfields are in the US and the Hatchers are back in Brazil. Time sure does fly. All the family sends their greetings and we thank the Lord for all.

Last Letter From Peru Before Furlough . . . Lots Of Paper Work . . . Baptizings At San Francisco And Pucallpa . . . Ready To Visit Churches In The U.S.A.

June 13, 1964

Dear Brethren,
I'm writing my mission letter early because we plan to leave for Lima Monday the 15th, and as soon as we can get our papers in order to leave for the States. We also are hoping to meet the Hatcher family in Miami on their way to Brazil, and fellowship with them a few hours. As we look back at the last three years and two and a half months we realize that we have not accomplished all that we would have liked to, but rejoice in that the Lord called us here, and has blessed us during these past few months. We would like to thank all who have given to make our ministry possible here. We would like to use the words of Paul as he wrote to the church at Philippi "I thank my God upon every remembrance of you, always in every prayer of mine for you all making request with joy." We hope to visit many of you and we hope that others will write so we can make out a schedule and can visit as many churches as possible.

This month has been filled with work. Getting the house boat painted and in good shape. Also we had to get papers fixed out with the Captain of the port, and for the guard that will be watching the boat for us while home. We believe that the boat will be OK and is well preserved. We also had more paper work getting the teacher and his wife married legally. The most of the paper work here is only graft, but it is their law and we have to abide by it. The reason so many are not married legally is because of the cost of the paper work, and the time that is involved. You have to wait 8 days after all the papers are in order. This waiting period is for those who may have two or three wives. They post their names on the bulletin board in front of the Municipal Building for 8 days, and if no one claims to be their husband or wife they have the ceremony.

Last Sunday we went to San Francisco in the Aluminum boat and last service in the morning and baptism in the afternoon. This being our last day before coming home everyone came. We had a good number for Sunday School and others came for church service. I enjoyed preaching on the subject "Servant of God" that gave an invitation and the teacher's wife came and made public her profession of faith in Christ as her Saviour. There were three who came for baptism. At the baptismal service I experienced something new. I baptized in mud that came up past my knees. The river is going down and before it dries good there is nothing but mud. But we had a good time and a great day of fellowship with the people. I baptized the teacher and his wife, and the lady whom I wrote about last month who made profession of faith. Senora Ponce. The school at San Francisco is doing very good. We also have all the paper work done to get it an accredited school, and we rejoice about that. Some others have had to wait as much as two years. The Lord has blessed the work at San Francisco and we praise Him for it. We only wish we had the same here in Pucallpa. The church here is still in a rented building, and looks like now they will not get out from under it until we return. Brother Alberto Britto is a good preacher and we hope will be able to lead the people to see their need. We hope to have a baptism service Sunday our last day with them before our trip. Pray for them here that they will go forward and not be content just to stand still. There is much to be done here, and we plan to concentrate on the work here when we return, and believe He will bless in a great way.

Looking forward to meeting many of you and seeing our many friends, and until then, may the Lord bless you all.
