Souls Saved And Baptized In The River Churches Revival At Astoria Church . . . Mapa Cocha, Hojeal And Astoria Have New Church Buildings Completed . . . San Pedro Church Dies

Dear Brethren,
 As I write this letter, I guess many are preparing to go to the Conference in Detroit, as it is only about 28 hours until the beginning. Again we say we hope the Conference will be the best ever and hearts will be stirred to do the work that lies ahead.

Reports from the churches: In San Antonio the church has to finish one side on its building to be completely done. Of all the church buildings this one seems to have the neatest job done on it. The services are about the same as always. The pastor, Antonio Torres, preached twice in Orellana and had about 10 to 15 adults present. In Hojeal they had one profession of faith, two baptized and attendance and offerings about the same. In Astoria there were three professions of faith and five baptized. Attendance up to about 40 in all services now. The Astoria Church seems to have had a revival. I helped both the Astoria Church and the Hojeal Church to observe for the first time the Lord's Supper in their churches. In Mapa Cocha Sunday attendance 43, Wednesday 21, Friday 13. One profession of faith and several visits made in the village by the pastor. Service in Llanchara with attendance 36 more or less. Tamshiyacu Mission has around 15 or 20 in all of their services. This Mission has better offerings than all the churches, but they lack enough faithful men to organize. Marcial has a service in the village of Colpa on Saturdays. There are about 15 present. The Mission here has bought all the lumber for the posts, rafters, etc. to build them a Mission House. They intend to start putting it together. This building will have a palm tree roof, at least for the present until they get big enough and strong enough to organize into a church. In Iquitos, S.S. 74 and 35 in night services. This church this month has started Evangel-

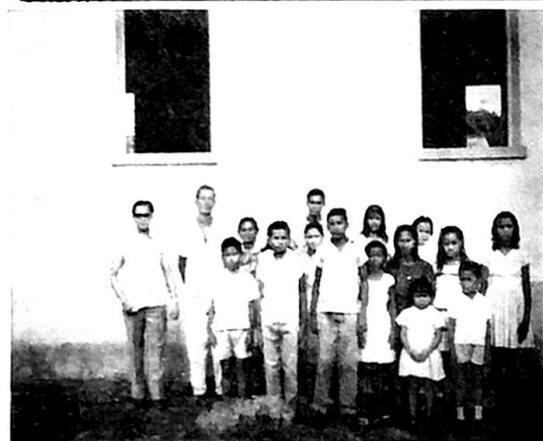
istic services on Friday nights in the church. Total offerings were 2,983 soles which is \$112. The pastor is doing more personal work these days and it helps the service. One of the men professing faith last month that was baptized lives on the other side of the Island that is in front of Iquitos, and he has to row across the Amazon to come to Iquitos for services, which takes about 2 hours to get to the church building. The man himself does this for almost all of the services (5) of the church weekly and his wife comes at least a couple of times weekly and of course he has no motor, just a little canoe that barely stays above the water and a paddle to push it and the Amazon River at nights especially with wind is pretty rugged in a small canoe. They have arrived at church soaking wet several times. These are the things that make you feel ashamed of yourself at times.

In three days with the Astoria Church there were 3 saved and they were baptized with 2 others that had been saved before. In the two days with the Hojeal Church there was one profession of faith and 2 baptized. Hojeal has 15 members, Astoria has 19 members, with the hopes of having 23 in the near future. Three years ago there were 5 members in Astoria and a run-down house to preach in, so you can see that Brother Purificacion has done a good work in his 3 years as pastor, perhaps a little slow but sure. Mapa Cocha Church, Hojeal Church and Astoria Churches have completed their buildings and San Antonio will in several months, and the Tamshiyacu Mission is starting on their building, and only Mapa Cocha owes very much on their building. Along with the classes with the preachers, I teach the same Bible Introduction Class on Thursday nights here in Iquitos in the church. Now the bad news about San Pedro again, as of my visit there last month we classify it as dead. This last month another family moved away, which now makes four families gone and one left. There have also been several other families that are not members that have left the village. This leaves only one family baptized there and they are terribly slack. The village itself does not care to have us there and with no saved ones and none attending services you see why I classify it as a dead work. We have taken the benches, pulpit, lamp, church sign and song books to Orellana in the mouth of the Napo River as previously mentioned, Antonio Torres is holding regular services here. All these things I either made or donated myself or others as members of the Iquitos church made and donated to San Pedro. The only thing that was not ours was the money, and of course that is not to be found. I feel badly about the work in San Pedro, but this is one of those unavoidable things. After the first of the year I intend to hold services in Orellana to see if we can get something started there again. Remember that we had a worker in Orellana for two and a half years.

May the Lord bless you all.

Dear Brethren,
 Last month I wrote about going on a trip to an island with Moses Lima, a student in the seminary. Moses has gone back every weekend this month. There have been two professions of faith in Christ this month. Since the Peniel Church started this mission work there have been around fifteen people that have made professions of faith. Soon the Church plans to baptize some of these, all of them we hope.

I have not traveled any this month. I have been studying the language with Brother Hatcher and I am still studying with Brother Julio Dantes. Brother Hatcher and I use a tape recorder. I talk into the recorder and then we play it back, this has made me notice my mistakes.

I am teaching a Sunday School class now and a Bible class on Sunday evening. This has helped me quite a bit with the language.

Sunday October 25, I preached at the Peniel Church. Wednesday October 28, I preached at Salem Church where Manuel Sarmiento is the pastor.

November 2, the Catholics have a day set aside to go to worship and pray for the dead. They go to the cemeteries and put candles on the graves. Four students from the seminary and I went to one of the cemeteries and passed out tracts and one of the students preached. There were about two hundred people stood and heard the gospel. I thought all the people in Manaus were there but Brother Bratcher said half of them were in another cemetery where he and some of the brethren had a service. There were so many candles that when we left and had gone about two miles the sky was lit by them.

Wednesday November 4, I preached at Peniel Church and November 6, I preached at a mission of the Tabernacle Church.

Pray for us here and may God's richest blessings be upon you and may all enjoy a Happy New Year.

Thanksgiving Conference

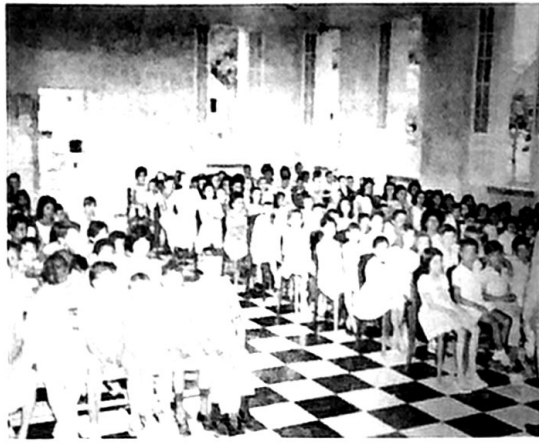

The Tenth Annual Thanksgiving Missionary Conference is now history. This conference was sponsored and paid for jointly by Grace Baptist Church, Warren, Michigan, Eugene Clark, Pastor and Twelve-Ryan Baptist Church, Warren, Michigan, Hafford Overbey, Pastor. The conference was held in the new building of the Twelve-Ryan Baptist Church. This building was designed by Hafford Overbey with the conference in mind. The women of Grace Baptist Church, furnished, prepared and served the Supper on Monday night and dinner and supper on Tuesday. The women of Twelve-Ryan Baptist Church, furnished, prepared and served dinner and supper on Wednesday and dinner on Thursday. Paper plates, cup and napkins were used so they could be burned and the women would not have to wash them. We started with exactly 2500 paper plates and had left over exactly 800 which means that 1700 individual meals were served during the conference. There were overflow crowds on Monday night, Tuesday night and Thursday morning. Brother Clarence Walker sent a check in amount of \$1,525.00 from Ashland Avenue Baptist Church, Lexington, Kentucky for the first Thanksgiving offering

for Baptist Faith Missions. Grace Baptist Church, Warren, Michigan gave the largest Thanksgiving offering, \$4,253.00. Twelve-Ryan Baptist Church of 74 members gave \$3,747.00 Thanksgiving morning, an average of over \$50.00 per member, men, women and children. Bryan Station Baptist Church, Lexington gave \$2,500.00. Thompson Road Baptist Church, Lexington, Kentucky gave \$1,700.00. New Hope Baptist Church, Dearborn, Michigan gave \$1,030.00. First Baptist Church, Alexandria, Kentucky gave \$1,069.00. Julien Baptist Church, Gracely, Kentucky gave \$936.00. Faith Baptist Church, Genesee, Michigan gave \$900.00. Waverly Road Baptist Church, Huntington, W. Va. gave \$815.00. and Riverside Baptist Church, Richmond, W. Va. gave \$568.00 and many other churches also gave. The Lord willing we will list all the churches that gave Thanksgiving offerings in the next issue and give an accounting and tell how we stand in all the funds of Baptist Faith Missions. It was truly a great Conference. Many said it was the best ever. We invite you to come to the Eleventh Annual Conference next Thanksgiving time in 1965, the Lord willing. 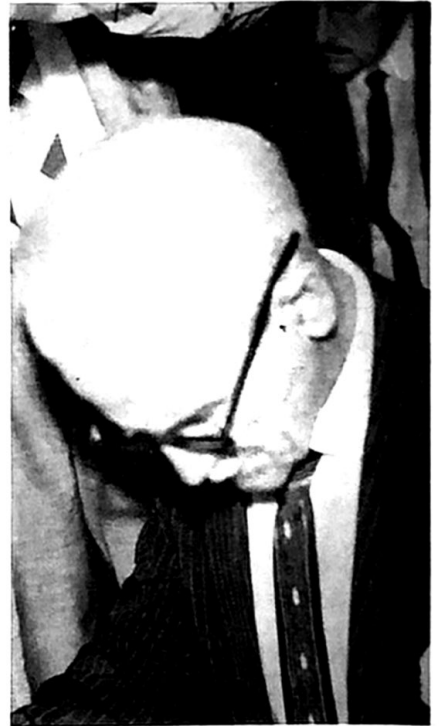

Dear Brethren,
During these past few days our thoughts have been turned somewhat to think about many of you who attended the Thanksgiving Conference. Here by the Grace of our Lord and Saviour thanks was offered to God for the privilege to be here in Brazil to preach the Gospel of an All Sufficient Saviour. At the Chapada Church I am preaching through the book of Hebrews in a verse by verse study. How wonderful it is to have the truth of a better covenant through the ministry of the Perfect High Priest. The truth of the book of Hebrews is so foreign to this land where such confidence has been put in ministry of insufficient and everfailing priests.

ISLAND OF PATIENCE

Tomorrow morning, the Lord willing, son Paul and I will travel by boat with brother Altacir to the Island of Patience. Brother Santiago and Brother Sostenes have been there for a few days and Sunday the organization of the Island of Patience Baptist Church is to be organized. News of the organization will be sent the next time. This work has been carried on by the Bethel Baptist Church and later by the Zion Baptist Church and through the personal efforts of two or three preachers who have gone regularly there. Brother Sostenes has certainly lead the work in a good way. Brother Altacir a member of the Zion Baptist Church and a student of the Seminary is married and has two children. He has been going every weekend to take care of the work, and the new church will probably call him as pastor.

TABERNACLE CHURCH TO ORGANIZE NEW CHURCH SOON

YEAR BAPTIST HIGH SCHOOL FINISHES SECOND YEAR

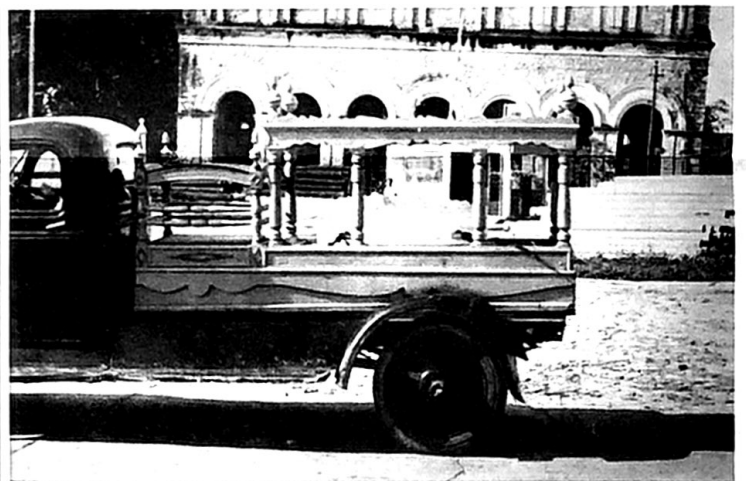
This month the school year has closed. God has blessed us and the Gospel has been preached to the student bodies for 180 days throughout the school year, both in the Grade School and in the High School. The teachers for both schools are faithful members of Baptist Churches. In a section of the country where 80% of the people do not read and write these two schools are a blessing to the young people of our churches. The Lord also has blessed us in the financial part of our schools.

ALL FUNDS FOR PRIMARY AND HIGH SCHOOL ARE DESIGNATED FOR THIS PURPOSE

The people in the United States do not know what it is to have to sell and change money. Here in Brazil and in other countries this is a common thing. The inflation in Brazil is unprecedented. When our family arrived in Brazil the first time the dollar was being exchanged at the rate of 65 cruzeiros per dollar. Today, after nine years the exchange of one dollar is 1,650 cruzeiros. This means that the value of the dollar has increased over 25 times. This means a raise in prices every month. In many ways this is bad but in relation to the schools it has helped. I shall try to explain.

When we returned to the United States for furlough in 1963 the dollar was selling for about 700 cruzeiros. At this rate we needed about 375 dollars a month to run the two schools. This amount is received from two sources. (1) Designated funds, (2) from monthly payments of the students and offerings from churches here. As I have already stated, we needed about \$375 dollars per month to run the schools when we came home in 1963. This amounted to about 400,000 cruzeiros. The students pay about 100,000 cruzeiros per month. As the rate of exchange goes up it means that we sell the dollar for more cruzeiros which means that each month that the dollar is sold for more we need less dollars to reach the amount needed to pay the teachers in Brazilian money. This means that to pay the balance at the present time is not \$375 per month but only about \$180 per month, as of now. Naturally, in the new year the salaries will have to be adjusted due to the high cost and this will increase our needs. God will supply all our needs and we look to Him. We thank God for those who have helped us so much.

Report On A Month Of Work In Manaus . . . Service At The Cemetery . . . Revival Meeting At 14 th Of December Baptist Church . . . Preparing For A Journey Into The Interior

Dear Brethren,
My Bible is open to Psalm 90. This Psalm is "A Prayer of Moses, the man of God." The divisions given are vs. 1-9 "Moses sets forth God's promises and chastisements." Vs. 10-17 "The brevity of life." Let us pray the prayer of Moses in verse 12. "So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

Some 30 days have passed by since my last "Mission Sheet Letter." During these 30 days we have suffered some from the heat, noticed the reports in the paper that the river is still going down (it's the time of the year for it to begin to rise again) and prices are still going up! We can also report that the Lord has blessed us in many ways.

I have stayed in Manaus these 30 days working with the seminary and the 14th of December Church. I have majored on personal work and visitation during these days. Practically 99 out of every 100 homes I visit, I'm well received and my message listened to. We thank the Lord for that. Our Sunday School attendance has been good. October 25th there were 115 present, November 1st, 101, November 8, 118 and November 15, 125.

On November 2nd, I, with thousands of others visited the "Saint John the Baptist Cemetery." November 2nd, (the Day of the Dead) in Brazil corresponds to our "Memorial Day" (May 30th) in the States. I took part in a service at the grave of E. A. Nelson pioneer Baptist missionary to the Amazonas.

A large number of people listened to the service.

In preparation for a revival in our church, I attempted to visit all of our resident members and have prayer with each one. Except for perhaps 1 or 2 members, I was able to visit in the homes of all of our some 60 odd resident members.

November 8-15 was a special revival week in our church. We distributed more than a 1,000 printed invitations. I began the revival on the 8th preaching the first night to 148 and concluded the revival on the 15th preaching to 147. Each night during the week we had a different preacher to bring the same message, salvation through faith in Christ. Our attendance during the week was not as large as the Sunday nights but was 100 or more each night except Wednesday night when "the rains came" and cut our number to 50. There were 4 professions of faith during the meeting, 3 women and 1 man.

Thus we share with you a brief report of another month's work. As I write this letter I am thinking of my trip to the interior Saturday, November 21st to return to Manaus on November 30th. Also I'm praying for the Thanksgiving Conference that will already be history when you read these lines. I close with the command of the Lord in Philippians 4:4 "Rejoice in the Lord always; and again I say, Rejoice." Let us all say "Amen" and do it!

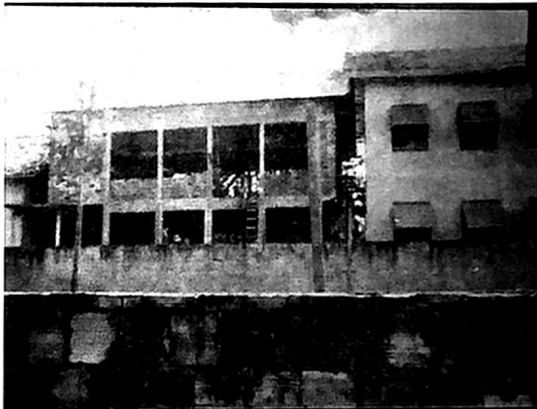
