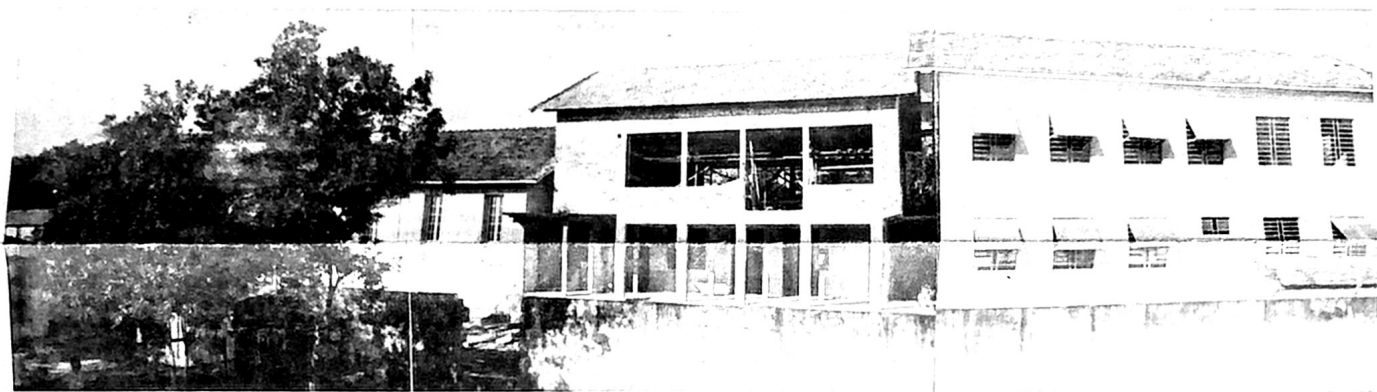

This month has been a blessed month for us. God has given us good health and peace for which we are thankful and praise Him. Brother Lee Creiglow, the brother of Bobby Creiglow has been with us for a couple of weeks waiting for the return trip to the States and we have enjoyed his visit very much.

### SCHOOLS GOING WELL

All three of the schools are going well and we are thankful to God. It is a blessing to see the effect of the gospel even on those who are not Christians. Many who turn up their noses at the preaching at the beginning of the school year soon change their tune when they hear the truth day after day. One or two of the students this year have made professions of faith

or been baptized into Baptist churches here in Manaus. Along with the regular subjects we teach a Bible course in each of the four years of school beside the daily convocation periods.

### STUDYING TRAIL OF BLOOD

In the third year of the High School we are now studying the Trail of Blood. You can imagine the blessing that this should be to the Baptist students and what an "eye opener" it should be to the Catholic students. How different our United States would be and how different our Baptist Churches would be in the United States if our children had been taught in Baptist schools. As a result of abandoning the education of our children and letting the world and the influence of the Devil train them you would find it difficult to teach the Trail of Blood in the majority of Baptist Churches.

## Sixteen Professions Of Faith . . . Three Baptized, One His Daughter . . . Need Native Preachers To Help

Dear Brethren,  
May the grace and peace of our Lord Jesus Christ rest in your hearts. This has been a busy month for us here in Sao Luis. We want to share with you some of the blessings the Lord has given us.

July 16 Brother Melo the pastor of the Peritoro Baptist Church and two teenage members arrived at our home. That night we had services at the mission house. Brother Melo preached.

Sunday, July 18 through July 25 we had a conference with Brother Melo preaching. Mon., July 19 through July 23 we had a Bible School.

During the week there were 18 professions of faith. Sixteen of these were children from the ages of 9 to 13. The last night of conference a man and a young woman made professions of faith. The man that made the profession has bought a Bible and seems to be a student of the word. We give thanks to God for this Brother as he is the first to lead in prayer. Our heart was made to rejoice the other day when I called on him to pray, and he offered us a prayer to our Lord. Soon this Brother wishes to be baptized. He would have been Sunday, the 8th of August but he had the flu. Of the 16 to make professions, 4 of them wish to be baptized. Some of the others are children of believers and will be baptized into the Churches where their parents are members. Others are from Catholic homes and their parents will not let them be members of a Baptist Church.

August 2 Brother Ricardo, the Sunday School Superintendent and lay preacher of the Peritoro Church spent the week with us. He preached Wednesday August 4 for us. August 8 I baptized 3, one of these being our youngest daughter Mary Ellen, who made a profession of faith before we left Manaus. We have three more to baptize but they were sick with the flu and will be baptized at a later date.

August 10, a 20 year old boy that lives on our street and usually comes every night to talk to David and Fran and the other boys that gather in front of our house. He was talking to David and Fran about being saved and the Catholic religion so David invited him into the house. I then gave him a Bible and I took one and the next two hours was spent preaching and teaching the word of God. He then asked "How can I become a believer?" I told him to accept the Lord. He said I do with all my heart. He is going to church with us tomorrow.

We request prayer from you, our faithful Brethren, that make this ministry possible. The need here is native workers. We are waiting on the Lord to raise up some. We have had the offer of two but they are not sound in the faith so I discouraged them. They are already preachers. One is from

another denomination and one who is a Baptist, but is not sound in the faith. They wanted to work with me and draw a salary and stay members of their groups. I told them no I could not use someone like that.

May the God of Grace keep each one of you, is our prayer.

### SEMINARY QUARTER ENDS

This week ends another quarter of seminary work. Several of the students are now in full time work. During this month of vacation several will be making trips for conferences and Vacation Bible Schools. Pray for these young men.

### SCHOOL COSTS ARE RISING

The financial costs of our work are rising due to the rise in the standard of living and inflated costs. We ask you to pray for us and also that the Lord will provide the needs which we have. We ask not for ourselves but for others. My family and I are putting not only our money into the work but our lives and so we do not hesitate to ask you to join us.

### LIBRARY NEEDS

One of the needs which our schools have is books for our libraries. This is a big problem due to the high cost of books and also due to the fact that we have to buy books in the Portuguese language. This is the reason that we can not ask for used books to be sent. Our library for the Seminary does not have a set of reference books which is much needed. Our High School library is so small that it can hardly be called a library. Recently we bought a set of pictured reference books for the High School and they have captivated the teachers and students.

### CHAPADA CHURCH

The Chapada Baptist Church recently called one of the young preachers to work in evangelizing from house to house in the area of the church house and into another community where we have weekly services. Last night there was a married couple which came to the services as a result of the visitation and both made professions of faith. The church has just repainted their building and benches. We think it looks real nice.

### STUDENT INTEREST

Up to this time there has been one of the high school students baptized into the fellowship of a Baptist Church and another recently made a profession of faith in a Baptist Church. Several others have shown and are showing interest. Pray for them.

## Revival At Catoze Church . . . Annual Report Of Church . . . New Record In S. S. 162 . . . Nine Days In The Interior With 7 Baptized And A New Mission Established

Dear Brethren,  
Last night I preached from Ephesians 6:24, "Grace be with all them that love our Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity." The word translated "sincerity" may be translated "incorruption" or as Williams translates it: "Spiritual blessing be with all who have an undying love for our Lord Jesus Christ." We trust that each one of you who reads this letter "have an undying love for our Lord Jesus Christ." If you have, then we pray the Lord's blessings upon you. If you do not, then we pray that you will love Him because He first loved us and gave himself for us.

We are happy to be able to report that the Lord has blessed us in many ways since the date of our last Mission Sheet letter. From July 18-25, I served as the evangelist in a Revival (Brother Costa led the singing) at the 14th of December Church. Close to 3,000 printed invitations were distributed. The smallest attendance during the meeting was 117. The largest was Saturday night, the 24th which was also the celebration of the 5th anniversary of the organization of the church. That night, 256 people filled the church building to overflowing. As part of the service, that night, a report was given of the work of the church from July 24, 1964 to July 1, 1965. I'll share with you part of the report. Pastors Harold Bratcher and Manuel Costa. Deacon Jose Olimpio de Freitas. Licensed preachers, 4. Students for the ministry, 3. Total number of members on the 24th of July, 1964-114. Gains: By baptism-94. By letter-24. By restoration-6. Losses: By letter-46. By exclusion-17. By death-1. Total number of members as of July 1, 1965 (including the members of the 4 missions of the church)-174. The Missions: (and number of members in each: Buzzard River-21, Cambie-17, Green Mountain-14, Amatori-5. Other believers under the watch-care of the church-8. Vacation Bible Schools held-4. Revivals-1. New churches organized-2. Total enrolled in Sunday School (not including the missions)-171.) The report was closed with the reading of Psalm 115:1 "Nao a nos, Senhor, Nao a nos, mas so teu nome da gloria, por amor da tua benignidade e da tua verdade." "Not unto us, O Lord, Not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory, for Thy mercy, and for Thy truth's sake."

Sunday morning, July 25th, we set a new record in Sunday School attendance, 162.

There were ten professions of faith during the meeting. Also during the meeting an offering was received each night for the four preachers supported by the "Diretoria Missionaria Brasileira" the Mission Society of our churches here in Manaus. The total offering was Cr\$208.952 or in dollars

\$112.97.

On the 24th the Creiglows returned to their work in Cruzeiro do Sul. Always remember this faithful couple in your prayers.

On the 30th of July, Brother Costa and I left Manaus, traveling aboard the "Euncie" which is now the Mission's boat. Baptist Faith Missions recently bought it from the Deacon, Antonio Eugenio de Nascimento, who is now pastor in Codajas. We traveled that same day to Usina do Brasil, or Remanso. We met with the church there that night and then accompanied by a few of the brethren from there, we journeyed on the next day to Rio Preto do Eva. There we spent 9 days preaching and teaching the Word. Our Vacation Bible School was small (25 enrolled with an average attendance of 22) but the few students we had learned well and learned a lot, according to their recitations. Except for three nights, we journeyed from 45 minutes to two hours to hold services in different places in the neighborhood. These services were well attended with many different people hearing the gospel, some for the first time. The people on Rio Preto, (Black River) live quite a distance from one house to another. Each night, the mosquitos were always with us to sing and bite.

On Sunday, August 8th, I baptized 7, (father, mother, and 5 children of the same family,) under the authority of the 14th of December Church. Brother Costa baptized two from the Remanso Church. A group from that church visited us on the last Sunday morning. The last service that night resulted in 4 other professions of faith. Thus by this trip, the 14th of December Baptist Church gained 7 new members and a new congregation or mission.

When I arrived home, the 9th of August, I found the wife and 3 boys all well. The baby, however, had just gotten over a severe cold.

Yesterday, August 14th, we had good services at the church.

Today, as I write this letter, I am conscious of the fact that more than three weeks have passed without rain. We are now in the midst of the hottest and driest part of the year.

On September 3rd, I'll be leaving Manaus again to spend about 10 days with our mission station on Buzzard River. We ask your prayers for the work there.

Let us all check our love for the Lord to see if it is the love of Ephesians 6:24.

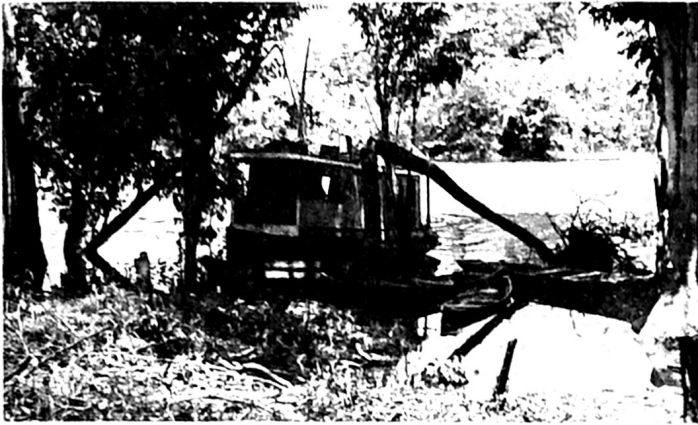




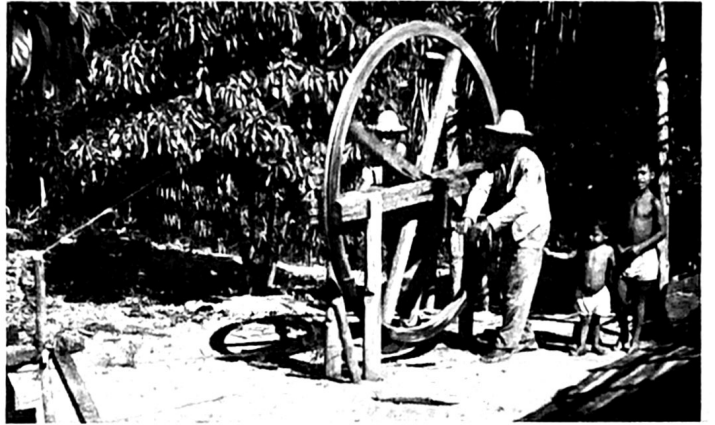

## Lot Cleaned Off And Footings Dug For New Church Building . . . Houseboat Being Repaired . . . Need Offerings To Build With

Dear Brethren,  
Greetings from the land of eternal summer. It sure is hot here, and has not rained in over a month. Most of the wells are dry, and for the most part people are buying water. But we thank God for His continued blessings, and the good health that He has given us.

We have had a very good month at San Francisco, where we are now members. The work there is very good, and the Lord has blessed the people there. We have been visiting here in Pucallpa and are starting a new mission near the lot where we're building the building.

There are some 40,000 people here in Pucallpa, and, the Lord willing, we hope some day to have several Baptist churches. We are also going to paint the building at San Francisco with the money that the people gave during our furlough home. How we thank God for the faithful ones that we have there. My wife has been teaching a class of children and has really enjoyed the work with them. We're planning a Bible School there in January when the school is out. We also want to have several other Bible Schools during that time. The schools on the river and here in Peru are out during the months of Jan., Feb., and March. The river also will be full then and that will make traveling much better on the river. It is about impossible to travel the river now as it is so low.

The houseboat is being repaired. We have to change several boards that rotted during our year home. I also had the motor checked over and have it running good. It is in fair condition, but wood here deteriorates very fast because of the humidity. This has been a month of making out papers and plans for the building. I'm glad to report that we have the plans and the permit for the building and are going ahead with the building. We have the lot cleaned off and the footings dug, and hope to start pouring tomorrow. I'd like to report that many things have changed here in Peru. Now we have to have a plan, and a permit to build. This is all new, and all of this costs money. We had planned on spending not over two thousand dollars, but now looks like we'll have to double that figure. New laws have stopped us from using our own help. We have to have a contractor, and he has a set price (high one) by the Peruvian Government. Now I'm not complaining, just reporting. We do hope and pray that many of you will pray and let the Lord lead you in what you should do for the building here. We bought the lot out of our own pocket before coming home. We're giving our tithes and offerings through the San Francisco Baptist Church. Also the church here has given us the money they had in the

building fund toward building of the building. We were blessed today when we received a letter from Brother Overbey telling us of Brother Kirkman and the people of Grace Baptist Church of Fairborn, Ohio and their good offering, that will show on the next mission sheet. We pray that many others will do likewise, and will give so we can continue with the work. We are working on FAITH and praying that the Lord will supply, as we're sure He will and through YOU. Hope that next month we'll be able to send a picture of the walls up, and possibly the roof. Continue to pray for us, that the Lord will use us for His glory, and souls will be saved and the saved added to the church.

## News From Peru . . . Visits Churches . . . Revival Meeting . . . Missionary Conference

September 1, 1965  
Since last writing I have received two letters from Brother Jorge Macahuachi, pastor of the Iquitos church. In these letters all the pastors send word and report of his work where he is pastoring. In Iquitos the work is going real fine. The offerings have increased and the attendance is holding all. There have been two saved in Iquitos and 5 in the river churches in these two months. In Iquitos the brethren go out visiting on Sunday afternoon and this has helped the attendance. Brother Antonio Torres reports real good crowds in Huanana on the Napo River with two saved. His church in San Antonio is doing about the same. There is no new word about the priest and the land in Hojeal. Brother Purification besides his church in Astoria has a mission and the last two months has made 2 three day trips up the Itaya River and has had about 50 in attendance. This is a river we want to work much when I return, the Lord willing. Mapa Cocha has two for baptism and has excluded two for unfaithfulness. In Tamshiyacu, Brother Marcial reports a 600 soles (\$22.50) offering and an increase in the services. Also he has had built for himself a house to live in. I believe this is all of importance from the letters I have here.

I have spoken at the following churches this month: East Keys, Springfield, Illinois. Brother Jim Hicks Pastor; Pleasant Plains

Church, Pleasant Plains, Ill. Brother Merritt Pastor; Mud Creek Church at Amba, Kentucky. Brother Chewing Pastor; The 3 day missionary conference at Bible Baptist Church in Clarksville, Tenn. Brother Elton Wilson Pastor. A two day homecoming service at the Calvary Church in Crestline, Ohio. Brother Elwood Hensley Pastor. A week of revival at the New Testament Church in Creve Coeur, Illinois where Brother Mitchell Lewis the former missionary to Iquitos is pastor. While at Creve Coeur I preached a morning service for Brother Bill Roberts at nearby East Peoria, Ill. in the Chicago Street church there. This service was because all the men work at night and therefore they have the service in the day. All these are Baptist Churches. I say this because I notice I forgot the word Baptist at times in naming the above mentioned churches. It was a busy month but a real good one. I love to go and preach and tell about the work the Lord is doing in Iquitos. The fellowship with all was great and will not be forgotten soon. Thanks to all for all the hospitality. It is good to know these kind in this day when all is hate and sinful. May the Lord bless you all.

## A City Of Idolatry . . . Visits From House To House . . . Girl Saved In Home

(This letter was for last month)

Dear Brethren,  
Greetings in the name of our dear Lord. Only one life will soon be past and that's done for Christ will last.

Sao Luis is a City, with the exception of the believers that live here, that is wholly given over to idolatry. For example, in our mission there is a boy that is five years old that has never had a haircut. His mother made a promise to the Catholic Church that she would not cut his hair until he reached eight years old. I thought he was a girl until someone called my attention to the fact that he was not a girl. My prayer for us here is that we may shine as lights for Him who died, was buried, and rose again the third day according to the Scriptures. Philippians 2:15 says "That ye may be blameless and harmless, the sons of God, without rebuke, in the midst of a crooked and perverse nation, among whom ye shine as lights in the world."

June 20 I opened the building at 255 Bom Milarge (good miracle) for services. Now we are having around 20 in average attendance in Sunday School. At night we have our greatest crowds. Here, Sunday morning, it seems the people go to market to buy their food for the week as they get paid very late on Saturday. Sometimes I am preaching to a house full, then in a few minutes about half will leave and some more will come in their place. Thank the Lord they all are not like this as this is very distracting in the services. We have not had any professions of faith but I believe we will have soon. Some have told me in private that they are considering our Saviour.

I spend four or five afternoons each week visiting from house to house and in some homes I am received, while in others I am not received too well. We are to start a Bible school and conference with Brother Sostenes Melo doing the preaching next week July 18 through the 25.

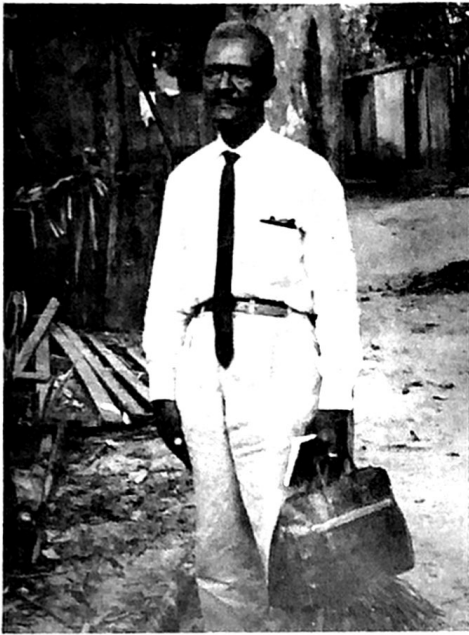
July 5, a girl we had working in our home was very ill. I had given her a shot of penicillin and we were getting ready to send her to the Dr. when she decided she would go to her home in the interior. She had attended the services some and had heard the gospel. I preached to her again the plan of salvation and she said she was trusting in the Lord as her Saviour. She is still in the interior but may return the last of the month.

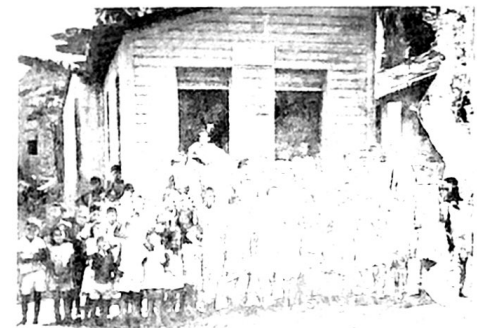
