 We wish the blessings of our Lord over each and every one of you, our friends and loved ones in Christ Jesus.

This month has been full of activities, and I want to share some of them with you. Since the last MS letter we have had three birthdays at our house, Mary Ellen, David and Cathy. It seems that I have spent about every day this month getting some kind of papers legalized or standing in line to have it done. After the fine offering that Brother Clark and the Grace Baptist Church made at the Thanksgiving Conference and designat-

ed \$2500.00 for us to buy a new jeep to be used in the work here in Sao Luis, I realized that I had better get busy and get a drivers license. I spent the next two weeks getting them. When the final test came it took five minutes for the sign test and five minutes for the road test. The rest of the time was spent in filling out paper work on top of paperwork. At the same time I was taking care of some things for Brother Abedom from the Peritoro Church as he is sick and cannot come to the city to take care of these things.

After getting my drivers license December 27 I then received word from Brother Overbey that the money was ready. I then made arrangements to buy a 1966 Willys Jeep. I have had some trouble with the jeep as it is a new model with the new alternator instead

Woman Saved After Years Of Witnessing . . . Priest Threatens War Against The Baptist . . . 200 Lost People Preached To . . . Hatcher And Three Young Preachers Arrive For Revivals And School

Cruzeiro do Sul
January 13, 1966
The year of 1965 has slipped by so fast that it is difficult to believe that it has been a complete year. It not only has passed very fast, but it seems there has been so little done for the glory of the Lord. This past year we did by the grace of the Lord manage to all stay alive, and at times we did not think even this would be possible. We are very thankful that we're at least able to start the new year in good health.

Several months ago I wrote about a lady in Colonia to whom I had testified many times and how she listened with such good interest and how I hoped that in the next letter I would be able to report that she was saved. I was not able to report it in the next months letter, but on the day we received that Mission Sheet we went to Colonia and were to have services in her home that night. After several years hearing the word, sometimes attending secretly, we are happy to report her salvation. We spent over two weeks in Colonia this time with services almost every night in houses wherever we got an invitation. There were only two nights that we did not have services and we had three services each Sunday. There was much talk about some that said they were going to trust the Lord, but as yet the Lord has not moved them. During the more than two weeks there I had the privilege of preaching to about two hundred lost people and perhaps more. We were to return to Cruzeiro do Sul on Thursday, but we received a notice on Wednesday that the Priest had said that the next service we had outside the church house he would bring a gang of men to war against us. I knew that if I left then he would say that we fled, so we decided to stay and take our beating with the rest of the Baptists if it was to come. We were asked to hold services in the home of the lady that had made a profession of faith. Saturday night almost all of the church went in the rain, but the army of the Priest did not show up. After this he had to cover that lie with another, so he said he did not say the first service, but the first service we held in the home of Senhor Chico Beserro they would fight. It turned out as we knew it would, with the army not showing up when we went to have services on Sunday afternoon. On Monday we left the brethren, with no battle scars, and returned to Cruzeiro do Sul. The next few days were spent getting things ready for Brother Hatcher who was to

come bringing three of the students of the Preachers School.

We now have had a good week of services each night and Bible School each morning here in Cruzeiro do Sul. We believe the church is being revived and souls are being saved. We have one more day here after which we will go to Colonia. The three students are working in Matai, Japiim and Barao this week and they will go to Moura-piranga and Barro do Jardin next week.

I told Brother Hatcher that we had Colonia all ready for him, but I could not tell whether it was for a great harvest or to get his head chopped off. Whatever the case we will know next week.

We ask all to pray for us and the work more in 1966 than you did in 1965.

May the Lord bless you and us as we wait for His coming.

Visiting the churches and the brethren has been real wonderful. The news that we get regularly from Iquitos, Peru shows that God is blessing there, even more than we expected. The fellowship with many of the brethren this time at home is so encouraging and also God has supplied our financial needs. The raise in salary, the Thanksgiving offering for our family for things that we need in Iquitos, the money to pay for the tonsillectomies for five of our children has all been blessings, but then at the same time didn't God say that He would supply all of our needs and never leave us or forsake us?

On January 24th our daughter Karen and son Paul will have their tonsils removed. This completes the five stated above to have this operation and will include the whole family. One or more of the children have been down constantly with tonsils since we have been home. This seems to be the only trouble that our family has healthwise, so we are looking forward to a sound family when we go back to Iquitos in June. We are awaiting this going back anxiously and many have written us from Iquitos desiring our return. We feel that we are going to have a real reunion when we get back.

Pastor Jorge Macahuachi of the church in Iquitos says that the church is still doing well, all but in attendance, which he feels is down because of the rainy weather. Jorge's son is very sick with rheumatic fever. Their Tuesday night preaching service in another part of Iquitos is doing well and some from this place have come to the church. The mission in Tamshiyacu has increased in attendance and offerings again. The Lord willing, this could be organized into a church soon. The church in Mapa Cocha is doing some better in spite of the rain and there were three young men that made professions of faith. Also their preaching point in Llanachama has shown some increase in attendance. The church in Astoria has shown much more interest since they had their revival last month. There were two professions of faith. The pastor did not get to the Itaya River this past month. The church which is in Hojeal but most of these 15 are practicing believers. Continue to pray for the churches and the brethren there, that when we ourselves go back with them we shall do a great work for the Lord's glory because we believe that the Lord's coming is near.

As far as my speaking engagements, they have been less this past month. On December 26th I spoke both times at the People's Baptist Church, in Alton, Ill. On January 8th and 9th we were with the First Baptist Church, Lucasville, Ohio, Brother H. C. Grooms, pastor. On January 12th we conducted the Lexington Baptist College Chapel service. This school was so faithfully started and carried on by Brother Clarence Walker. This school, to our knowledge, is the soundest that we know about in the Word of God and the service of the Lord, which is

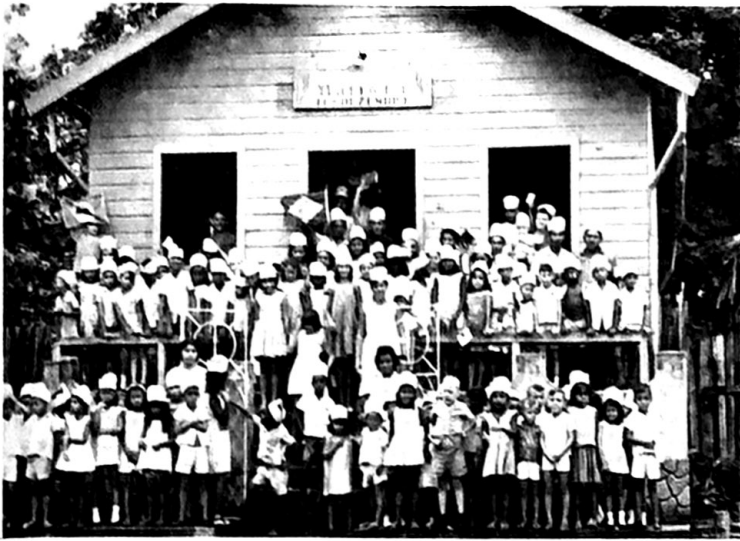

He preached for us in San Francisco, and also in the First Baptist Church here and is now leading the singing for us during our two weeks of Special meeting "Mission Bautista de la fe". I would like to mention this so you can pray with us about it. Brother Moreno is thinking about quitting his job in Lima and coming here to help us. He has a good job, and to sell out will take much grace, as we have told him we could never pay him what he is getting now in Lima, and if he comes it'll be on FAITH. Pray that the Lord will lead him here to help us. I'm sure he would be a great help to us now, and we need someone very badly. He told us it would take two months for him to write a letter to the company he is now with to get released from his job. Will you pray with us about this?

The building is not completed yet, but we are in it and very happy about it. We would like to finish it and start building on the back of the building, not only for a school, but would be used for Sunday School classrooms, but will have to wait for funds. May the Lord lay on your hearts, brethren, the need here, and that you'll do something about it. We're not complaining, just reporting. Pray for us, as we try to do His will.

Watch Night Services Of Prayer . . . Membership Day . . . Annual Report . . . Six Mission Points In The Interior

Dear Brethren,
Since my last letter for the "Mission Sheet" another year has passed into eternity. How we need to remember the prayer of Moses in Psalm 90:12 "So teach us to number our days, that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom."

We spent the closing minutes of the old year and the first minute of the new year leading the 14th of December Baptist Church in prayer. This prayer terminated the Watchnight Service that began at 7:30 p.m. We ate dinner New Year's Day with the Hatchers. I warned Brother Hatcher beforehand that I had always heard that what one did on the first day of the new year he would do every day of the year.

Each morning Monday through Friday of the week of January 2nd, all of us assisted and my wife and I taught in a Vacation Bible School at the 14th of December Baptist Church. I also served as director of the school. I fear sometimes that statistics are just cold, uninteresting figures but remember each unit represents a person—a possibility—one more person who, at the close of life's way, will enter into Heaven or into Hell. Thus I present to you the statistics of our school. Number enrolled—151. Average attendance—94. 1 for baptism. Also many learned more about the Lord.

At Prayer Meeting, Wednesday night, at the church, January 5th, we had an unusual service. It was unusual in that we had the largest number present at any Prayer Meeting at the church—120. Also it was unusual because the message was brought by a young man, 16 years old, less than a year a saved person, who surrendered to preach in November of last year. He preached his first sermon that night. We have all heard of first sermons being of only 5 or ten minutes because the new aspirant for the ministry in spite of all his preparations runs out of anything to say in a short time. With this youth it wasn't that way. He preached with zeal and enthusiasm for 50 minutes. Remember this promising Brazilian youth when you pray. His name is Aluizo Felipe da Silva. He is the only believer in his family.

Yesterday was "Member's Day" at the Church. Once a year (the second or third Sunday in January) the roll of the church is called. I want to share with you some of the happenings of the day. The weather was a hot, clear day, like a hot July day in the States. We set a new record in Sunday School attendance with 183 present. I presented the following report to the Church: Number of members on last "Member's Day" (January 17, 1965)—158. Losses during the year—61. (50 by letter—9 by exclusion—2 by death.) Note: Practically all who were given letters were those who entered into the organization of two new churches. Gains—97 (81 by baptism—nine by letter—7 by restoration and/or relation.) Total number of members as of January 16, 1966—194. 71 of these 194 are found in the six missions of the church in the interior of the State of the Amazonas. The missions and number of members in each are as follows:

Rio Urubu (Buzard River) 21 (two days trip into the interior)
Cambeze 18 (three hours by boat)
Monte Verde (Green Mountain) 14 (5 hours by airplane)
Amatari 9 (1 day by boat)
Rio Preto 7 (6 hours by boat)
Curari 2 (2½ hours by boat)

Of the remaining 123 members, 12 of these are non-resident. Also, the church has

13 other believers who are under our watchcare—awaiting letters or the next baptism or until certain difficulties are resolved so they can be baptized or received by letter. Of the 111 members living in Manaus, 86 responded to the roll call in both or at least one service. Eleven of the absent ones sent their offering envelope. Our special offering to pay up all of the "bills due and not paid" amounted to almost \$55.00 or in cruzeiros Cr\$ around 118,000. Sunday morning a little girl made a profession of faith.

I trust I am not wearying you with numbers. Bear with me and I will close by copying from my record book "My Pastoral Record" the following information which causes me to rejoice and praise the Lord because "the battle is the Lord's." Total number of Sermons preached in 1965 (not including Prayer Meetings messages) 229. Total number of professions of faith—92. Total number of other decisions—72. Total number baptized—86.

Thus brethren, "... let us love one another: for love is of God; and every one that loveth is born of God, and knoweth God. He that loveth not knoweth not God; for God is love." 1 John 4:7-8.

instead of the generator and it came from the factory with a faulty voltage regulator. Being a new model the 65 parts will not fit or else the voltage regulator will not work. The owner of the agency sent to Recife to have one sent by plane, but as yet we have not received it. We want to thank the Grace Baptist Church for making this blessing possible as it is a blessing to go and come and plan our trips with time to visit and get to know the people better in these places the Lord is opening up for us.

Our work here in Sao Luis goes well, we have several folks coming regularly to the services that have shown an interest in their soul's salvation. There were two professions of faith in our mission in Sao Luis this month. Two teen-age boys who are friends of David and Fran went to the services with us and they made professions of faith.

Our work in Arraial goes well. We had one profession there this month, a 12 year old girl on Saturday, January 7. We hope soon to be able to baptize there.

OPEN NEW PREACHING POINT AT VILLA OF MARANHAO

Brother Agustino was having difficulties with his money so he moved his family to a farm about 1 hour drive from Sao Luis. I estimate this place to have somewhere around a thousand people living there. Sunday January 8 we went there to baptize the wife and two children of Brother Agustino. We also took two from Sao Luis to be baptized. After the baptism we went to the front of Brother Agustino house and we had preaching. This was in the afternoon. We plan to go there each Sunday afternoon, if the Lord wills.

I go back for Xrays the 17th to see if the ulcer is well. I feel great and glad that I can be a witness for the Lord Of Lords and the King Of Kings. If you do not feel that way there is something wrong with you. You either need to be saved or rededicate yourself anew to the Lord of Lords.

May God bless each one of you is our prayer. And we thank God for each remembrance of you.

A Good Year Finished . . . School Building Almost Finished . . . Repairs To Temporary Dormitory For Young Preachers . . . Revival At Chapada With Six Saved . . . Revival At Tabernacle Mission With Two Saved . . . Trip To State Of Acre And Services With Creiglow . . . Eight Saved To Date

January 13, 1966
The year 1965 was a good year for us but it seems as if the months went by faster than usual. May God be praised for all that He has done through the year.

The Seminary finished a good quarter in December and already there have been two or three new prospects which have talked to us about the new quarter in January. Two of these are members of the Fourteenth of December Baptist Church. This next quarter we are moving the Seminary classes to the evenings. This is only a temporary arrangement. First reason is that here there is no prospect of part-time jobs for the students. This affords an enormous problem in the support of students. There is only a limited amount of work that the Schools have to offer the students which means that married men are almost prohibited to attend classes during the day. Another problem in the Seminary is the lack of teachers to maintain day and night classes. With this new arrangement more married men will have opportunity to study and we trust that in a year we will have enough help to maintain day and night classes and so go back to the day classes. With the new schedule at night the students will carry a full load of studies as they did in the day classes.

SCHOOL BUILDING ALMOST FINISHED
This letter is being written in Cruzeiro do Sul, Acre in the home of Brother Bobby Creiglow. Just before leaving Manaus materials were bought for finishing the school building. These included tile for the floors of all the classrooms, halls etc. Also included cement, wood flooring for Seminary chapel room, and wood for building 20 large benches or pews for the School auditorium for the seating of about 180 students. The benches we will try to get made during the month of February after returning from the Acre.

REPAIRS OF SCHOOL DORMITORY
The city building permit has already been obtained to make repairs on the Boys Dorm, that is the wooden house which was bought and is being used for a dorm until the new dormitory can be built. There will be one or two rooms added on and a new bathroom built with facilities for about 18 boys.

SCHOOL YEAR FACES BIG PROBLEMS
The problems which we face this year are big in many ways. The monthly fees of the students have been more than doubled in the grade school and doubled in the high school. The teachers' salaries have been doubled. The communist threat and the

the Catholic grip here in Brazil is far more tremendous than you can imagine. The value of these schools in the preparation of young men and young women is far more than even I can imagine. If the apostle Paul asked the churches to give offerings for the old saints that were ready to finish life would it be wrong for me to ask you my brethren to help us in the training of young Baptist people who still have all their lives before them? This phase of our ministry needs your help in the year of 1966.

REVIVAL IN CHAPADA—SIX SAVED

During the last week of December, Brother Santiago invited me to preach a weeks revival in their mission. During the week there were good crowds and two of brother Santiago's granddaughters made professions of faith. We are looking forward to having another weeks service there in the near future.

TRIP TO ACRE WITH THREE PREACHER BOYS—VISIT WITH CREIGLOWS

A more complete report of our trip will be given in the next letter, the Lord willing. We are spending three weeks with the Creiglows and having revivals and Vacation Bible Schools in the churches here in the Acre. This week Raul Vera is in Humaita, Moises Lima is in Barom and Jose Araujo is in Japiim. We have not heard the results of this first week in the other places but here in Cruzeiro do Sul there have been eight professions of faith and one reconciliation, I am having a great time of fellowship with the Creiglows. Next week we will all be working in other churches and the last week Brother Creiglow is planning a week of Bible Conference and Bible study for the preacher brethren. May the Lord bless you all and grant each of you the grace needed for each job to be done and each burden you might have to bear.

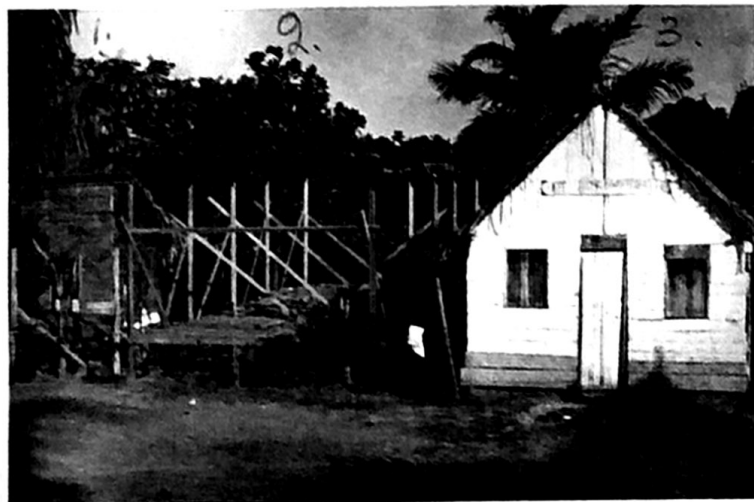
We continue to covet your prayers for all of our family as we prepare to go back to Peru and which we desire as much as anything even now.

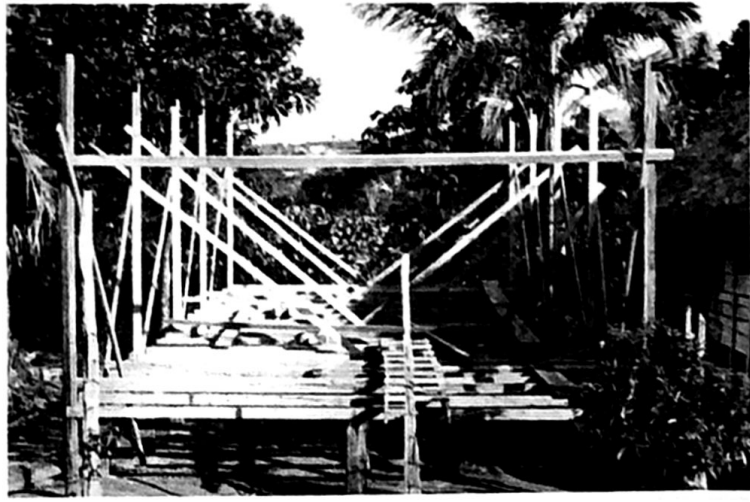
