Homer Crain Visits The Del Mayfields In Pucallpa, Peru

I left Detroit Sunday night February 27, 1966 and arrived in Lima, Peru at 5:30 A.M. Tuesday morning March 1. Left Lima at 8:00 A.M. and flew over the Andes mountains and saw snow on the top of the peaks. Arrived in Pucallpa at 9:30 A.M. and went to the home of Missionary and Mrs. Del Mayfield. Wednesday night March 2 we went to the service in the beautiful new church building that you saw the picture of on the front page of the February MISSION SHEETS. Here we had a new experience for the first time in our life. I preached in English and Brother Mayfield stood beside me and interpreted the message into Spanish. There were 40 present and we had one profession of faith. Thursday, Friday and Saturday I helped Brother Mayfield work on the new church building and the new home he is building to live in. Sunday morning March 6 we had 44 in Sunday School and I preached again and Brother Mayfield interpreted. Sunday night I preached again and Brother Mayfield interpreted and a 72 year old man came down the aisle barefooted and made a profession of faith and eleven came for baptism and to be a part of the new church

to be organized here in the future.

DOWN THE UCAYALI RIVER IN HOUSEBOAT

Monday March 7 we had another new experience. We went down the Ucayali River in the Del Mayfield houseboat to San Francisco where there is a beautiful new church building that Brother Mayfield built with the help of the help of the natives before he came home on furlough. At night we had about 40 present and I had the privilege of preaching again with Brother Mayfield interpreting for me. There were two professions of faith in this service and three others came for baptism. Early Tuesday morning March 8 we started down the river in the houseboat and stopped at Castilla and told the people we would be back Thursday night for a service, the Lord willing. After 7½ hours from San Francisco in the houseboat downriver we arrived at Caridad and we had 92 present that night in the service. Wednesday night we had 32 present and two professions of faith and 18 came for baptism and to be a part of the new church to be organized here in the future, the Lord willing. Thursday March 10 we were back upriver

Trips Into The Interior . . . Baptist Couple Gets Married . . . Mike Creiglow To Seminary . . . Trip To Three Eastern States

Manaus, Amazonas
March 16, 1966

I am now preaching a series of messages from the book of Genesis. On a recent Sunday night I preached from Genesis 4:1-17, using as my text: Genesis 4:10, "And he said, what hast thou done? The voice of thy brother's blood crieth unto me from the ground." I used as my subject: "The Voice of Blood", using also the words of Paul in Acts 20:26, "Wherefore I testify unto you this day, that I am pure from the blood of all men." The theme of the message was the responsibility that we as believers in Christ have for the winning of the lost. We have the duty and responsibility to preach the gospel to all. I am my brother's keeper. Those without Christ are lost and need to hear the message of salvation through faith in Christ.

This month has not been an unusual month. We have not seen any great harvest but we have faithfully sown the seed. Our attendance in Sunday School at the 14th of December Baptist Church has been down as low as 121 one Sunday but last Sunday (March 13th) we jumped back up to 174. The people also brought in a good offering for Foreign Missions. I have made 2 short trips into the interior. On February 17th I went to Janaúca and held a service in a home where the wife and two of the children are members of the 14th of December Church. The day following on the way back we visited in two more homes.

February 25th our home was the scene of a wedding reception. A couple from Cambixé, members of our mission there, were united in marriage.

On February 26th and 27th I visited, with four others from the church, our work in Curari. Curari is the closest and smallest of our missions with only two members. We held three services. The services at

night saw 22 and 20 present. One reason was that to get to the house where we held services and spent the night it was necessary to wade water and mud at one place almost knee deep. Sunday morning our hearts were cheered when 76 people were counted present in the service. After the service one brother said that of the 76 people present only 18 were believers. No one made a profession but I was glad that I had the privilege of preaching to many lost ones in the same service.

Friday morning, March 4th, I visited and taught and preached at the last day of a Vacation Bible School at a mission of Calvary church called Vitoris-Regia. Elizario Candido da Silva has been directing the work there for over a month. There were 67 present.

Tonight, March 16th, at Prayer Meeting, Mike Creiglow, son of Brother and Mrs. Bobby Creiglow of Cruzeiro do Sul, will bring the message. Mike has recently felt called to preach and is now studying in the Seminary here in Manaus.

We are planning to begin construction soon of additional rooms for Sunday School classes at the church. We ask your prayers for this endeavor.

Next month, the Lord willing, I shall tell you of the trip to three eastern States of Brazil. I plan to leave Manaus on March 24th and return on April 13th. I'll help in the organization of a church in the State of Pernambuco, visit the capital city of Sierra, which is Fortaleza and then help Brother Sostenes Melo in an eight day revival in the city of Peritoro and then visit Brother George Bean one or two nights in Sao Luis, Maranhao.

Thus, brethren, we close as we began. Can you say with the Apostle Paul that you are pure from the blood of all men? We are our brother's keeper. Let us pray that God will enable us to be faithful to this trust.

The work in Arraial is somewhat cold. The people have just about quit coming to the services. It seems the only time they come is when they want some material thing. I plan to spend some time there visiting and then if no interest is shown I want to move on to some other place.

ANAJATIVA

I spent today at Anajativa visiting the

believers there and I found five that are interested in being baptized. There are seven more that would be baptized if they were legally married. This is a problem that every preacher and missionary faces in a country like this. A young woman made a profession of faith there this month.

VILLA DO MARANHÃO

There has been a lot of activity at the Villa this month. We have bought land and Brother Agostinho is building a meeting house there. There is more interest shown here than in any of our other work. Brother Agostinho is doing the preaching when I cannot be there. Six people made professions there, five of which can be baptized.

PERITORO CHURCH

I was in Peritoro the 7th and 8th of March, and preached in the Church there Tuesday, March 8th. The Church seems to be in good spirits. Brother Sostenes has started a school in his home, which was badly needed. The children that attend are the believers children.

There are 190 children enrolled in the grade school and 75 students enrolled in the high school. This makes a total of about 265 students. THREE BAPTIZED INTO FELLOWSHIP OF CHAPADA CHURCH

On the 13th of this month a young married fellow and two children, a boy and a girl, were baptized into the fellowship of our church. The young man was saved about two months ago and two weeks ago his wife made a profession of faith but was not baptized at the same time due to sickness. She is awaiting baptism.

SUNDAY SCHOOL GROWING

During the last month our church had its highest average in Sunday School attendance.

RESIGNED PASTORATE OF CHAPADA CHURCH RENATO LIVINO DA SILVA ORDAINED

The month of February ended my work

as pastor of the Chapada Baptist Church. The church has called a student from the Seminary as pastor. Brother Renato has been with the church for several months as evangelist supported fully by the church. Yesterday, March 20th, he was ordained to the ministry. There were 8 pastors present at the ordination. Brother Julio Dantas brought the message on "The responsibility of the church and the pastor."

NEW FLOORS IN SCHOOL BUILDING

The new tile floors have been laid throughout the school building. They are really nice and make the building so much cleaner. We have been using the rough concrete floors until now.

MAKING BENCHES TO SEAT 200

In our spare time some of the students, my sons and Mike Creiglow have been making pew type benches for the school auditorium. There are 20 pews and each is about five yards or fifteen feet long. To plane, sand, cut out, put together with screws and putty and varnish is no little job.

DORMITORY REMODELED

The process of repairing and remodeling the Seminary dorm is under way. One room has been added and a new roof over half of the building. Next week we hope to start on the new bathroom which will be complete with showers, etc. The plans were to start on the new dorm but time and other elements prohibit this at the present so the remodeling had to be done.

There is so much to be done. Pray for us brethren, for the doors are still open.

Mike Creiglow To Seminary In Manaus To Study . . . Trips To Colonia, Parana Dos Mouras And Campo De Santano . . . Priest Threatens Bodily Harm

Cruzeiro do Sul, Acre
Dear Brethren, March 17, 1966

After writing a letter for the Mission Sheet last month, Mike and I spent the next two days preparing for a trip we had planned to make together. We were almost ready to leave when we received a letter from Brother Hatcher saying that Mike had been accepted to stay in their home while studying in the Seminary and that so as not to lose too much time, he should arrive there no later than March 1. This of course changed our plans some as far as the trip was concerned, but within a few minutes they were all changed and the whole family was on the way to Colonia where we are members to spend a few days before he was to leave for Manaus. After hearing Mike preach both in the morning and evening services, the church wrote a letter of recommendation to the Seminary for him. We returned to Cruzeiro do Sul on Tuesday and the rest of the week was spent getting ready for him to travel to Manaus on Saturday. All went well until Saturday morning. We waited and waited for the car that was to take us to the airport at 5 o'clock, but when he did not arrive at 6 o'clock we had to get another, and almost missed the plane. We managed to get another car and arrived at the airport just a few minutes before the plane left.

While we were at Colonia, Brother Enos and I made plans to make a trip to Campo de Santana the following week. He stayed in Colonia to take care of services on Sunday and then came to Cruzeiro do Sul on Monday, arriving while I was downriver helping to move a house for one of the believers of the church here in Cruzeiro. We left Tuesday about noon in the speedboat and arrived early in the Parana dos Mouras where we had a good service and fellowship with the brethren. There are several young people there that want to be baptized, so plans were made for this in the near future. Brother Sabastion has been repairing the small houseboat and will soon bring it to Cruzeiro do Sul. When he comes we are going to take the large one up there for repairs and we will do the baptizing at that time. Some of these made professions of faith when the students from Manaus were there and one when I preached there about three or four years ago. Two of these are the daughters of Brother Sabastion. The next day we arrived in Campo de Santana early and to our joy, found the church in much better condition than we expected. This church has been without a

pastor for about eight or nine years, some have died and some moved away, but still it stays alive as a proof that its founder is Christ. We had five preaching services and three days of Bible School for the children. Brother Enos was amazed at the way they learned and sang and said they did much better than some of the churches where they have pastors. One of the members had a cow that he said was his tithe. He sold the cow and with the money they were rebuilding the church building and said this time they were going to build it with doors and windows and paint it. When we left they were in the process of recovering it. We could not spend longer there because Brother Enos is going to study in the school at Colonia and classes were to start on Monday.

When Brother Enos came to Cruzeiro do Sul he told me about the persecution still going on at Colonia. One night while he was holding services in the home of one of the believers the priest came with some of his armed men to put a stop to the services but didn't, only because some unbelievers who were there threatened their lives if they caused any trouble. We went to the Chief of Police here, asking if he wouldn't put a stop to it. He in turn sent a letter to the policeman there giving him orders as to what should be done and he, upon receipt of the letter, sent a copy to the priest. The priest sent an answer to the Chief of Police saying that if we didn't stop visiting from house to house with our lies they would put a stop to it with clubs. The Chief stopped me on the street to tell me about it and said the priest is crazy and is now messing with the Department of Justice and would be in serious trouble if he didn't watch his step. We don't expect this to stop them from persecuting, but it may slow them up for a while.

Last weekend we made a surprise visit to the church at Maita and found the attendance good and the church in good spirits. The pastor and I plan to make a trip to a place where he and Brother Enos have gone several times. We hope to spend a week or more there with services each night and a Bible School each day. This will be all new for them and in a way for me also, as I have never held a Bible School in a place where we do not have a church. Pray for us as we try to reach the lost in this place as well as others. Desiring the Lord's richest blessings for each of you that labor with us in the services of our King.

for a service at Castilla and had 86 in the service. Friday March 11 we were back in San Francisco and at the close of the message the young man who had been taking care of the services when Brother Mayfield was away came forward and surrendered to full time service and one made profession of faith. Saturday March 12 we arrived back in Pucallpa and tied up the houseboat and took our things in the station wagon to Brother Mayfield's house. Sunday March 13 we had 42 in S.S. and 56 in preaching in the new church building in Pucallpa. In the afternoon we filled a rented bus, the station wagon and a truck and in all more than 100 people went to a baptizing service to see Del Mayfield baptize eight people. At night I preached again and Brother Mayfield interpreted for me. There were 76 present and two made profession of faith.

Wednesday March 16 we left Pucallpa and flew over the Andes to Lima, the Capital city of Peru and, with Missionary Paul Mulling and preached that night for him in the Bible Baptist Church and Brother Mulling interpreted for me. There were 42 in the service and one was restored to fellowship. Thursday we went sight seeing in Lima and took pictures. Friday March 18 at 9:00 A.M. we left Lima by plane and at 1:50 A.M. Saturday we arrived back in Detroit. Brother Mayfield has a truly great mission work and it is growing. He is finishing the building of a new home in Pucallpa to live in, and will soon build a new building at Castilla and Caridad on the Ucayali River and organize churches in these places, the Lord willing. Pastor John Hooker and the Liberty Baptist Church, Flint, Michigan has designated the money to build the new building in Castilla and Caridad. Brother Mayfield needs about \$6,000.00 to build the new Sunday School building in Pucallpa.
