SCHOOL YEAR NEARING END

The grade school will complete its work in November about the 15th of the month and the High School will finish about the 25th of November. God has given us good student bodies this year and many have attended our churches. Some have been baptized into the fellowship of Baptist Churches. Due to the fact that our teachers salaries continue through the month of December and start again for the new year in January, we do need your help if God so lays the burden of this work on your heart.

SEMINARY

The Seminary year will terminate the first of December and the graduation will be the first part of December. We are not sure how many will graduate but we hope there will be five or six. One young lady came and wanted to study in the seminary. She had made a profession of faith in another Baptist Church here in town and afterwards had started attending a Presbyterian Church. It was while attending this church that she started attending seminary classes. After talking to her about her baptism and showing her the baptism of Romans six she became disturbed and told the Presbyterian preacher that she wanted to wait awhile. Last night she was baptized into the fellowship of the Tabernacle Baptist Church.

This girl studied for 10 years to be a nun and became convicted of her lost condition when she picked up a tract in a hospital. Later she asked the priest to explain Psalm 115. He could not. At last the goodness of God led her to repentance.

HIGH SCHOOL EXPOSITION

Each year the High School has an exposition of their work during the year. Always along with the exposition there is a program. This year on the first night there were over 400 persons who attended and the second night there were about three hundred who attended but many of them were persons who attended the first night. We used the new auditorium and stage for the first time with curtains and all. Of course the auditorium is used daily for the school convocations.

TABERNACLE BAPTIST

During this month our attendance has been increasing. There were four baptisms during the month and a good interest shown in the Sunday School classes. Pastor Francisco Santiago is planning a trip into the Northeast part of Brazil to visit some of the places that he went before with Brother Sostenes and to visit the church in Pesqueira Pernambuco and then to spend some time in the State of Ceara. Pray for the old gentleman for he is willing in spirit but his 81 year old body is beginning to show its weakness.

Here we are looking forward to the coming of Brother Hille and Brother Clark to visit the work and to attend the graduation of the Seminary.

NEW HOPE BAPTIST CHURCH SAO LUIS, MARANHAO

We started a series of meetings at the church the 18th of September and ended the 25th without any kind of visible results or move. I taught The Trail Of Blood and the members, I feel, enjoyed the chart. June (my wife) made a large chart on white poster paper and this is what I used to teach. I believe we have some sounder Baptist now. At least that is my prayer and aim. Sunday night services October 9, a 24 year old man made a profession of faith. He has not missed a service in the church since he made the profession of faith.

VILLA MARANHAO

We started a two weeks meeting at Villa Maranhao the 3rd of October and it ended Saturday October 15. I also taught The Trail Of Blood at the Villa, and I left the chart there with Brother Agostinho so he can study it more. During the meeting there were five professions of faith. Saturday, October 8, I baptized seven into

the fellowship of our church. They all live at the Villa so they will attend services there in our mission. I forgot to say in the report for the church that we had to exclude one member from the Villa. He is the son of Brother Agostinho who began to live with a woman without marrying her. This woman has made a profession of faith and as soon as they get married by the government she will be baptized and he will be restored back to fellowship with the church.

ANAJATIVA

Sunday afternoons we drive out to Anajativa for SS and then we have preaching services. Yesterday there was an 11 year old boy who made a profession of faith. I also baptized one woman at Anajativa. We now have 10 baptized believers here with others to be baptized soon. They have started giving special offerings to finish their building. They want to build windows and doors and they also want to build up a

Three Weeks In Belem With Mike Creiglow To Get Things Out Of Customs . . . Starts Mission In Own House . . . Learning Portuguese

Dear Brethren,
At the time of the writing of my last letter Mike and I were preparing to go to Belem to try to get my equipment out of customs. We left Manaus on Tuesday, September 20, and were gone for 3 weeks. Many things happened of which I do not have space here to tell about. The good news is that we got the things out of customs for a minimum fee, and they are now in my home here in Manaus. It took weeks of praying, talking, and disputing, but with the help of the Lord we overcame, and they agreed to let us have the things for a 5% tax of their estimated value, which amounted to about \$60. This is quite a bit less than their original price of \$1270. I would like to say, too, that Mike really took the business of getting the things out of customs to heart, and he was indispensable to me in accomplishing what I did.

In the writing of the last letter, we were preparing to have services in my home. The day I wrote the letter Mike spent the day at my house making benches to be used for the preaching services, and I installed extra electric lights and switches in the old house, which is actually a part of the house where we live. That night some of the young people on our street helped me to arrange the benches in the house. After we had finished, they asked if we could have a service that night. They wanted me to preach to them, so after singing 2 choruses, which Dorothy had taught them to sing in English, I read from the Portuguese Bible the 23rd Psalm, some from the 3rd chapter of John, Acts 16:31, and some from Rom. 10, after which I made one or two feeble comments, and urged them to believe in Jesus Christ as their Saviour. There were about 10 or 12 present, and they all seemed to understand what I said and read, for which I praise the Lord. Because of our trip to Belem, we were delayed 3 weeks in beginning regular services here, but on Wednesday night, October 12, we had our first regular service, with Mike Creiglow doing the preaching. He also played the accordion and led the singing. We had 32 present inside the house and many more outside. They were all young people and children, my wife and I being the only adults. On Saturday afternoon following, Mike and I visited every house on the street where I live and invited the

people to come to the services. On Sunday night we had our 2nd service with 52 present in the house, and many outside. Many were adults, and there seems to be a great interest among them. Most of them said they were coming back, although the priest has already been visiting on the street, and has warned some not to attend the services anymore. I know that the Lord will work this out for our good, though. My wife was by no means idle while I was in Belem. She learned a lot of Portuguese from our neighbors, and took as many as 18 of them at one time to church with her. Some of them still go with us to Tabernacle on Sunday morning. And so the work of the Lord continues on in the Amazon Valley, and by His help we continue to this good hour.

This one last item in closing: We went to the School of the Americas on Thursday night past, where Brother Hatcher and the teachers had worked hard and had planned a wonderful program. Some of our neighbors went with us, and we all thoroughly enjoyed the program, and the exhibits of the many things that the students had made. It was all very beautiful, and I wish that every one of you could have seen it. Thank you once again for your prayers and support. May God bless you all in Jesus' name. We, with great joy, await the arrival of Brothers Hille & Clark.

Dear Brethren,
Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. We praise Him for His manifold blessings which He has given unto us. We are made to give thanks every day for you who stand behind us with your prayers and support, realizing that you make our being here possible. I will now try to share with you some of our activities of the month.

Last week was filled as we had classes for the preacher brethren, morning and afternoon, and evening services for everyone. These classes have been a real blessing, and our evening services are well attended. We have also had an increase in attendance at our regular services. Last month there was a picture of me baptizing seven, and I'm happy to report that they are all faithful in attendance and are growing in grace and knowledge of His word. A few months past I mentioned about moving a family in the Volkswagon and how little they had. They have attended about every service since moving, and last Sunday night during the invitation the man came forward trusting Christ as his Saviour. His wife then came saying that she had been saved, and that she wanted to follow her Lord in baptism. So moving a family in the little VW paid off. Thank the Lord for His saving grace. We now have several for baptism and hoping that next month I'll be able to report that we baptized them, and in the NEW BAPTISTRY.

The roof is now going on the addition for the building after several weeks of delay waiting for cement. After the roof is on we'll be able to use the building for classrooms even though it will not be finished, and this will also give us access to the baptistry. I'd like to thank everyone who has had a part in the building fund. All the money used for the building is designated for the building fund. No money is used from the general fund with the exception of the money we borrowed, and this must be paid back. I mentioned this because some have asked, and I also would like to say thanks to those who have given above and beyond your regular gifts. We're praying now that we'll not have to stop work on the building until it is

completely finished. I'm sure if you'll pray with us that He will lead you in helping us.

At San Francisco the Lord continues to bless. We were there for a week preaching and teaching the word. We also attended the classes in the grade school during the day. Our school is coming along very well even though Brother Robenson is back in the hospital. I'm thankful for his mother who is also a teacher and has filled in for him during his illness. Brother Robenson is in bad condition and the doctor says that we must send him to Lima where they have instruments to X-ray him etc. He has a kidney infection and will possibly die with this illness except for a miracle from God. So I'd like to ask you to pray for him. He is only 25 years old. He is a saved man and has a wonderful testimony. When I told him the other day that we'd have to send him to Lima for tests as his condition was getting worse, he said thank the Lord, Brother Mayfield. I've a brother in Lima who is not saved, and this may be my only opportunity to speak to him about Christ. I told the folks at church last night that it is wonderful when a fellow thinks more about the souls of men than he does of his own condition. Since being in the hospital he has led many to the saving knowledge of Jesus Christ. We need teachers like him and are hoping that he'll be back on the job soon.

Last Saturday a lady from San Francisco came and asked me to go and speak with her grandmother who was dying. When we arrived at the little two room shack we were welcomed by several and I was given a stool to sit on, next to the lady dying in one corner of the room. I began by asking her if she had ever been saved and she shook her head no. I told her that she was going to die and that she would go to hell in that condition. The people in the room I'm sure didn't like that as they began to talk to one another, but I went ahead and gave the lady the plan of salvation, and asked her to trust the Lord, and she shook her head that she would. How we thank God for being able to witness for the Lord here in such a needy place. Upon returning home I told my wife this is like pulling one out of the fire of hell. Pray for us that we'll be found busy in His service when He comes. May the Lord bless each of you.

Dear Brethren,

A protestant preacher was visiting Brother Marcial Macahuachi and he told him he had traveled in every department of Peru for 20 years preaching, etc. and he said of all the others Loreto (Iquitos) was by far the worse to receive the gospel. We thought this all along so it was not hard for me to believe this. This month again we have seen a big drop in attendance in all the churches. Of course we blame it on sickness and the rainy weather, but it seems people here can do and go in all other things but are sick or the weather is too bad to serve the Lord. I just believe that God NEVER puts a thing in our way to serve Him that cannot be removed so He can be glorified in it all.

In Iquitos Church: average SS attendance 55, Monday night doctrine class 14, Saturday night class 17. We have only 22 members now and most of these are real good ones, but we sure would like to double that number this year, but with good and saved ones. We lost 7 in regular attendance also also with the Jorge Macahuachi family going to Hojeal. Starting November 1 Daniel Garcia will serve as assistant pastor to me and will be paid by the church here full time. We hope this will help our reaching of new people and also a new work in Iquitos as I have mentioned in every letter since returning here. Although all

my older children work or play, etc. in the services in the church they could be of more service in a new work. Pray with us about this.

I spoke too soon about the weather being cool last month. It sure has been hot. The rivers are way down again and traveling on the rivers is very hard and dangerous and one cannot get anywhere near the places on the small rivers and streams, etc. I have a new 40 h.p. Johnson motor but have not used it yet for the above mentioned reason. I went to Tamshiyacu last month in a cargo boat, etc. I am also waiting for a windshield and a top for the aluminum boat that the MISSION has bought and sent to Miami, but the airlines there have not shipped it as yet. These will be a big help, as I won't have to go in the rain and sun without any protection, as I have done in the past.

The river churches: 4 professions in San Antonio where Brother Purification is now the pastor. Real good attendance in both Hojeal and Astoria churches which Brother Jorge pastors. Mapa Cocha about the same (bad). Tamshiyacu had a very good month again. They have a young man that wants to start taking music lessons so as to play in the church. I hope he stays with it. We have helped 6 people in paying for their music lessons and only one really has stayed with it and plays well in the services, etc. He is Pedro Pilco our most faithful member. Pray for our preachers on rivers and the churches they pastor. We are hoping for at least one new river church, and new church here in Iquitos and 100 in SS within the next year, the Lord willing. It will have to be of the Lord as we intend to depend simply on Him for it all.

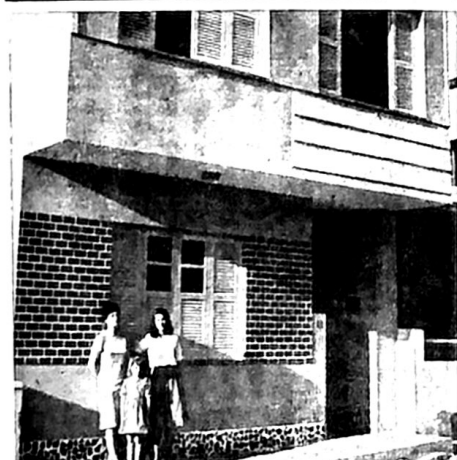
The family all send their greetings. Many times I would be a big flop without them, all of them. This month I was in bed 3 days with a slight fever and exhaustion (reason not known) and my wife went to the bank, made out receipts, paid bills and workers, etc. besides teaching 4 grades of the Calvert schooling to our children, teaching in church and SS and keeping up the house, etc. as we do not care to have help in the home, God was good to me in many ways but none more so in when he gave me my family. This is a little off the subject but maybe it was needed also. I have been sorry for many things in my 40 years (yesterday was my birthday) but never for one minute for having my wife and every one of my children. I pray that every one of them God will save and above all use for His glory. Karen is the biggest help, I guess, outside of her mother.

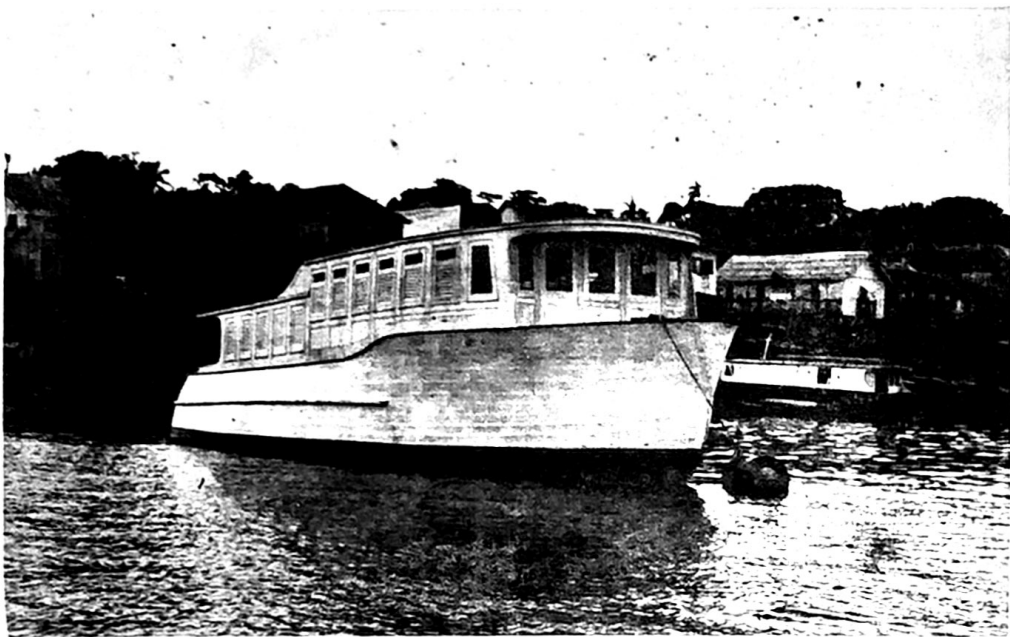
