### A Long Missionary Journey In Detail . . . Many Professions . . . Three Baptisms . . . Heaven Comes Down The Soul To Bless

 The words of 1 Peter 2:9-10 have impressed me during these recent days. Let me share them with you. "But ye are an elect race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people for God's own possession, that ye may show forth the excellencies of Him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light: who in time past were no people, but now are the people of God: who had not obtained mercy, but now have obtained mercy." This past month has been one of showing forth to others "the excellencies of him (the Lord) who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light." The Lord has blessed us in giving us the privilege of seeing others also enter into his marvelous light.

Two days after writing the October Mission Sheet Letter, I left Manaus. From the morning of October the 19th to the afternoon of November the 1st, I spent in the interior of the vast State of the Amazonas. At 9:00 P.M. I arrived at the house of Raimundo Gomes de Nascimento who lives on Rio Preto (Black River). The next morning I witnessed to a son of his who was preparing to return to Manaus. We all rejoiced in the Lord when the young man made a profession of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. That afternoon we made some

visits and that night I held my first service of the trip, preaching to 15 at his home at night. Brother Raimundo and most of his family have been believers for some two years now. Friday morning from 9 to 10, I taught a Bible Class for them. Afterwards we made some visits and that night we held a service in another home about an hour away by boat. In that service 25 were present and the owner of the house made a profession of faith.

Saturday, October 22-I taught a Bible lesson in Brother Raimundo's home this morning. This afternoon we journeyed on up the river some two hours, picking up people as we went, to the home of a Seventh Day Adventist who had invited us the day before to hold a service in his home. I chose as my subject—a subject which I thought appropriate for the occasion—"The History of the Sabbath in the Bible." We were made to rejoice again in the Lord when an old lady, almost blind, and her 14 year old granddaughter made professions of faith.

Sunday, October 23—This morning 30 of us were present in Sunday School at Brother Raimundo's house. At this service five were examined and accepted as candidates for baptism. The baptism was marked for tomorrow. Tonight I preached in a home on up river to 27.

Dear Brethren,  
 Another month gone and time for another Mission Letter. The Lord has been good again as always. The church here in Iquitos has been blessed this month. Although the attendance was down we had one saved and I baptized a young girl (15) and my daughter Deborah (11) who was saved about 2 years ago. We have a new young mens class in S.S. and had about 68 average attendance. Last night we just finished 3 nights of special services with the pastors of the churches on the rivers doing the preaching. They all came to Iquitos to vote in the municipal elections and we used this time as opportunity to hear them preach. We have from 5 to 20 visitors in all our services lately. The whole church is visiting and that is why we have so many lost now coming. The Lord one day is going to save some or maybe all of these if we stay

faithful in inviting them so they can hear and be saved. We have real good harmony and fellowship in our church now also.

I wanted to visit the river churches this month now as there is higher water. I have been waiting for a canvas top and a windshield for the AL boat that have been in Miami for months and was hoping that they would get here so I could put them on my boat before I wanted to use it, but the delay now makes it look like I will have to go on and use it again without the top some and then again bring the boat to Iquitos to work on, etc. when I get the top, etc. Also gas is (Continued on page 3, Col. 2) Lauerman

## Had Malaria . . . Trips Into The Interior . . . Twelve Professions Of Faith

Sao Luis, Maranhao  
November 15, 1966

Dear Brethren,  
By the grace of the Lord we have been granted the privilege to serve Him one more month here in Brazil. We are all well and happy in His service. Last Wednesday I was in bed all day with a high fever. I sent to the drug store to buy some quinine tablets and began to take them.

I thought I had malaria because of the symptoms that I had, and the pills soon had me back to par. I made a trip into the interior the week before and the water was bad and the mosquitoes nearly ate us up. I now will share some of the months' blessings with you.

### TABOCA

This is the place that I have mentioned above. Monday October 31, I left the house at 6 A.M. for Arraial, arrived there 7:30 A.M. The owner of Arraial (A place where we have preached several times but now we do not hold services there) has three sailboats that he uses to haul lumber. He was sending one to Taboca to bring back a load of lumber. We left Arraial at 8 A.M. in the sailboat and the waves were so big they were coming inside the boat. We crossed an inland bay of the Atlantic Ocean and we arrived at Taboca at 12 noon. We arrived at a village way back in the interior and is located on a small bay, but not on the main ocean front. They bring all their supplies by boat as there is no road that a jeep or truck can pass over. We had services on Monday night with 60 people present of the 200 that live there. Five of these made professions of faith on Monday night. Tuesday night we had another service with 70 people present with 3 professions. There is not a Bible at this place. The Lord

willing, I am going to see that some of these folks have a Bible. Wednesday morning the boat returned to take us back to Arraial. (At times I thought the boat was going to turn over as the winds were contrary). We arrived at Arraial at 1:30 A.M. and I left for Sao Luis, arriving in time to prepare for mid-week prayer service in the church. We are planning another trip to Taboca in January and will stay longer, the Lord willing. The trip was fine except for the mosquitoes. We had smoke fires burning during the services, but I believe it made the mosquitoes madder and they bit harder.

### NEW HOPE CHURCH

There was one profession of faith at the church this month and our crowds are improving.

### VILLA MARANHAO

We have been to The Villa the three Fridays this month (I was sick one Friday and could not go) Brother Agostinho told me that one 13 year old girl made a profession of faith the Friday I did not go. I was there November 11 and after I preached there were two people that made professions of faith.

### ANAJATIVA

We have been to Anajativa every Sunday afternoon this month. There were two professions of faith there also. There are two 17 year old boys that are members there that went on the trip to Taboca with me. I thank God for these boys that have expressed a desire to serve the Lord. I am praying that they will go to Manaus to study in the seminary. I have also been to Itaque, Formiguero, and Querba Pote one time each this month with no visible moves made. May the Lord bless each and every one. We thank each one that makes this ministry possible.

Brother Raimundo's house we returned to the home where we held services Friday night and after a short service I baptized the 5 boys who were accepted yesterday. Tonight another service in another different home.

Tuesday, October 25 - We returned to the home of the Adventist and baptized the two (the old lady almost blind and her 14 year old granddaughter) who were converted Saturday night. These as all the others on the trip were baptized into the fellowship of the 14th of December Baptist Church until if and when a church is organized on Rio Preto. After the baptism we traveled on up the river another two hours to a little village, Duririca, where the few families and single men that live there are employed at a sawmill there. We were given permission to hold the service in a building close to the small Catholic Church in the village. There were 25 of us present for the service. The people listened well but there was no response to the invitation.

Wednesday, October 26th - We left Rio Preto at 12:10 p.m. Romualdo, Brother Raimundo's son accompanied us to help with the services. Romualdo is 17 years old and preaches regularly at his home and other places on Rio Preto. He was a good helper to me in many ways during the rest of the trip. We arrived at the Novo Remanso Church at Usina do Brasil at 3:00. I preached to 30 in their regular Prayer Service, tonight.

Thursday, October 27th - Before leaving Usina I witnessed to a young man who made a profession of faith. We then journeyed on down the river to Costa de Sao Jose de Amatori. Last year I held a Vacation Bible School here for at that time we had 7 members here. All 7 have moved away but a Presbyterian man invited us to preach tonight in his yard. There were 45 present and one of the best services of the trip.

Friday, October 28th - We visited and held service and Bible Study in the home of Veridiano Gama da Silva. Brother Veridiano, his wife and oldest son were baptized by me last year. He rejoiced in the Lord at our presence in his home and shared with us different produce of his farm as well as sending an offering for the Church. I pray that the number of believers with his spirit will increase! Tonight we held services in a home at Coionia de Amatori with a good number present but not as good a service as yesterday.

Saturday, October 29th - At 6:30 A.M. when we were eating breakfast, Manuel

Costa arrived from Manaus to complete the trip with us. That afternoon we visited a family of members of the 14th Church that live on "Ilha de Beija-Flor." (Humming Bird Island). He suggested that we hold services in another home near-by. We went there and the man gave us permission. However as we visited in the afternoon inviting we learned that he and some of his neighbors were at outs with each other so our attendance was small. However when Brother Costa gave the invitation after bringing a clear gospel message, 3 adults made professions of faith.

Sunday, October 30th - We returned to the Novo Remanso Church where Brother Costa is pastor and I preached there Sunday morning. We made visits afterwards. Soon after dinner we (Brother Costa stayed to preach in the Novo Remanso Church tonight) left to go to Varro Vento. This is a new place for me but two families of believers are living there - 1 from the Nova Remanso Church, the other from the Rio Urubu mission of the 14th of December Church. We arrived there at 2:00 P.M. We made several visits and almost everyone invited came! There were 66 present and the people gave excellent attention. There were no moves made when the invitation was given but after the service the people showed their interest in indicating that they wanted us to return for other services in the future. We journeyed for some 5 hours to return to Rio Preto to spend the rest of the night at Brother Raimundo's house.

Monday, October 31st - We left Raimundo's house at 8:30 A.M. and took a couple to the Judge's house to be married. The groom is 61 the bride is 63. The groom had already been married 4 times before but never legally. He told the Judge that no. 1 and 2 died. No. 3 and 4 he left but they were no good, he said. After becoming a believer in Jesus Christ he requested that we help him to legally marry with no. 5 so they both could be baptized. Thus after the wedding and a late dinner, we went to the water to perform the baptism. At 5:00 p.m. I entered into the baptismal waters for the third time on this trip and buried Raimundo Lopes Feitoso and Maria Paulino Feitoso in baptism with Christ. The Holy Spirit didn't appear in the form of a dove but He was present. No, friends, God is not dead! He watched with approval as poor Brother Raimundo Lopes Feitoso limped into the water to be baptized. Yes, he had to limp into the water because of a cut foot which

Dear Brethren,  
In last month's letter I was telling about Brother Enos returning to Colonia with his wife to await the birth of their second child which the doctor said would not be born for at least another month. About two weeks after returning to Colonia his wife not only presented him with his second daughter but, also, the third. One was born just before midnight and the other just after, making their birthdays fall on different days. I am sure they have their hands full taking care of three babies, their oldest being less than eleven months when the twins were born. We have not been to Colonia this month, therefore we have not seen them, but we are told that all are doing fine. Brother Enos had planned to go to Manaus to study in the

has been very slow to heal and is still an open, running sore. Heaven was near as I baptized the newlyweds in the name of the Triune God. A couple without anything of this world's goods (the Church had to pay the Wedding expenses) but a home in heaven now awaiting for them.

Tuesday, November 1st - At 1:30 A.M. I managed to wake up and at 2:00 A.M. we were on our way. We arrived in Manaus at 3:00 P.M. I found the family well except for Marie (my wife) who is suffering with a skin rash. (It cleared up in a few days after my return).

Wednesday, November 2nd - I visited the Saint John the Baptist Cemetery here in Manaus this afternoon and preached at the tomb of E. A. Nelson. Today is "All Soul's Day" in Brasil and thousands of people were present in the Cemetery.

Thursday, November 3rd - I took Brother Raimundo Gomes de Nascimento, the man in whose home we stayed on Rio Preto, to the Doctor. He has been sick for two months and came to Manaus with us Tuesday. The Doctor told him that all of his sickness was because of worms.

November 4th - 15th - Regular work and services at the 14th of December Baptist Church. Attendance in Sunday School has run between 132 and 142. Last Sunday night we received 2 by restoration and 1 by letter.

Thus we have shared with you a detailed report of a month's work here in the Amazon Valley of Brasil. We ask your prayers that we may continue to fulfill the task that God has called us to do. Read again the words of 1 Peter 2:9-10.

seminary, but I am afraid with this added responsibility he will not be able to make it.

The pastor having left the church and the ministry at Maita that I, also, wrote about last month has left me almost tied down as far as making any trips. The attendance had fallen off and the church is in a general state of confusion. Since I have been going there I have not missed a Sunday, but due to muddy roads I have had to miss a mid-week service or two. I have had the opportunity to do favors for two men here in Cruzeiro do Sul each of which have Jeeps. They told me any time I wanted to use their Jeeps they would turn them over to me, so I have been taking advantage of this to go to Maita. Even with a Jeep there are two hills that are difficult to climb when it has just rained, so the Jeeps not being mine I have not taken chances when the weather is bad.

The attendance has picked up once again and we have started studying the gospel according to John in Sunday School and already there are about one third of them that prepare their lesson which is more than I have been able to get any other church to do here in the Acre. From where we leave the Jeep it is about a forty minute walk to Maitai, but on Sunday afternoon the church goes with me to this place and we have a service for the lost. We have had about twenty lost people in these services with good attention. This church seems to be growing in grace, so please pray for it. With this Brother leaving the Ministry it leaves us once again with eight churches and only four native pastors. Pray with us that God will send us some of the graduates from the seminary to pastor these churches, if it be His will. One Sunday night as I was returning to Cruzeiro do Sul on the scooter I ran into some loose sand and the scooter and I parted company, with it going one way and I the other. We both saw that one could not get along without the other, so after I picked me up I picked up the scooter and we continued on our way. Neither of us suffered much from the parting, but I think I got the worst of it, a skinned elbow and a torn shirt.

I took the speedboat out of the water to repaint it and found there was a hole that needed fixing. The hole has been fixed and I hope to have it painted within a few days. The way it has been raining it will not be long until we will be able to use it again.

We are all well at the writing of this letter and hope you all are the same. May the Lord bless each one of you.

Dear Brethren,

Well, another month has "flown" by, and it seems that "the hurrieder I go, the behinder I get." The Lord is doing so many things for us here that I can't keep up with Him. While I am trying to thank Him for one blessing, He has already poured out a half-dozen more. It seems that I can't find time to study the language for talking to people who want to know more about the word of God. Hardly a day passes without someone either coming to our house or inviting us to theirs to talk about His word. The Lord's blessings upon us have been manifold, and our activities varied this past month. I will now try to share a few of them with you in this letter.

I failed to mention in my last letter that I preached in a place called "V-8" where the Tabernacle Baptist Church has a mission. We had a good service, though there were few present. Paul Hatcher led the singing and interpreted for me. I thank the Lord for the dedicated children of our missionaries. They have meant much to my wife and me in the work here.

We have been busy in the study of the language this past month; though it seems that I have made very little progress. Dorothy is really learning fast, for she is able to hear and understand better than I. I had hoped that in this letter I could report that I had preached my first sermon in Portuguese. But this is not the case. I will just have to be patient and study harder. Pray for us in this matter. Brother Hatcher is still our faithful and competent teacher, as is Darcy Pessoa.

Tabernacle Church received our letters from Julien Church this month, and granted us the authority to do mission work through that church. We have been busy visiting, witnessing, and working in our mission, which we have now established here. We are having services every Sunday and Wednesday in our home. Mike Creiglow works with us, playing the accordion, leading the singing, and preaching or interpreting for me. The Lord has really blessed the work here. We have had 16 professions of faith, and have 4 awaiting baptism now. I am to baptize them at Tabernacle Church this Sunday morning, the Lord willing. I pray that by then there will be others.

We have already outgrown the room we have been using for services in our house. We have been having from 25 to more than 50 in our services, and we have only visited our closest neighbors so far. I am now in the process of renting a large house just across the street from us. It has a large auditorium and 2 smaller rooms and a restroom. It also has about 40 chairs that we can use. It is ideal to have services in. The building is in need of some minor repairs, but we can rent it for \$25 or less per month.

The believers are really interested in learning about the word of God. At their request I have started an informal Bible study on Thursday night. I am sure they don't learn much from me, but we enjoy it anyway. I have purchased about \$50 worth of Bibles and songbooks to give to the believers and to use in our services. Just getting the printed word to the people is almost a ministry in itself. Oh! I wish I had the space to tell you in detail of the marvelous way in which the Lord has worked in raising up this work and blessing it, but I must close this letter now.

I would like to add just here that the Lord's blessings have not come without the opposition of Satan. There truly have been fears within and fightings without, but the Lord is enabling us to overcome them little by little. We have been having some opposition from the Catholics, especially since one of their most devout followers has been saved and has asked for baptism. One boy came up to me on the street and said, "The priest is mad." My answer was, "The devil is mad too." They

have been visiting in the homes and telling the people not to come to our services anymore, and especially trying to turn back the believers, but this has only served to make them stronger. Please pray for us and them.

I will close by saying that we are preparing for and joyfully awaiting the arrival of Brothers Hille and Clark. I have spent a lot of time this month working on the launch, painting, etc., getting it ready for the trip into the interior when the Brethren arrive; also for Brother Hatcher to use during school vacation time. May the Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you all.

very scarce and expensive now. I have been able to get only one 50 gallon drum since coming back here and that with a special order from the head man at the refinery. It cost almost double also. I am still hoping to get a house in the hospital area here as I have been mentioning every month. Although it looks very hopeless at times I still think God will open up something there. Pray that it will be this month. We also have been praying about a worker for the Itaya River here. Join us.

The river churches: One saved in Hojeal, San Antonio and Tamshiyacu. Special services are planned the 27 through 30 of November in the Hojeal church. As yet they do not know who will be preaching. Please pray with us for our churches and people here on the rivers as well as right here in Iquitos.

As you read this the conference of course will be history. We pray it was the best yet and give desire for better things in the future. We want to take this space also to say how we all appreciate Brother Z. E. Clark for the faithful years of service to the work of Baptist Faith Missions and to the work of the Lord in General. May the Lord see fit to give him and his wife yet more years to serve him while here in this world. As I write, my wife is sick, with several things perhaps more with nerves than other things. We found out that in the last operation she had here that she did not have a complete hysterectomy and left the ovaries which have given her so much pain and trouble through the years. We thought this ever since she was operated on in 1963, so it looks like to get all well this operation will be necessary. She has been in bed almost 3 weeks now and still runs a slight fever and bad pains in the stomach area. She has lost over 5 pounds and at her weight she cannot afford to lose even one. Pray for us as the Lord leads you, and as He wills us to do what should be done and wait on Him.

## The Rainy Season . . . Six Professions Of Faith . . . Eight Baptized

Dear Brethren,

As I begin this letter the thought comes to me that the Thanksgiving Conference will be history when you read this, and many are still remembering the good eats, and blessings of the Lord. We're praying here that the conference will be the best ever, and that every heart will be filled with a renewed zeal to reach more souls with the Gospel of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

This month has been a month of excitement, new experiences, and blessings. I'm sure many of you read or heard of the earthquake that hit Lima. Several hundred

were killed and thousands injured. Here in Pucallpa as far as I know no one was hurt but things sure rocked around for awhile. This makes three that we've had here since returning from furlough. I'm sure glad that we put plenty of steel in the buildings, and that God was merciful in that we didn't get one crack. Another thing here that aroused much excitement was the election of mayor. Sunday the 13th we were not permitted to have services because of the election. There were several street meetings that turned into fighting. Many of the army men were called in to restore order. Everyone I'm sure is glad that it's all over, at least for three years. Now for some of our experiences of the month. We sent the school teacher from San Francisco to Lima for X-rays and treatments that he can't get here. The day after sending him a man came to our home asking if I'd talk to him some more about Christ, and that Brother Robenson the school teacher had talked to him while in the hospital here, and that he wanted to know more about the Christ. We invited him in and after a little while led him to the saving knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ. The following Wednesday he came to the church and during the invitation came confessing Christ as his Saviour publicly. Later his daughter came trusting Christ also. This man lives up river, and has asked us to come and preach there. We hope that soon we'll be able to go. We also had another visitor this month, a German man came by asking if he could spend the night with us that he didn't have any money and no place to stay. So we asked him in. After supper I began to talk to him about the Lord. He turned out to be an

infidel. He said that he could never believe that there was a God. But after preaching to him about an hour he changed his mind about God, and said that he wanted to know more about Christ. He left our home with a Bible in his hand, promising to read it and believe it.

Our houseboat has been out of the water, in the water, and out of the water. The first time we had it pulled out the same day the river came up and we had to have it pulled out the second time. We had to put two new sides on, and both ends. I'm happy to report that the work is finished and that we'll have no problems with the houseboat for some time. We're going to wait for the river to come up instead of pushing it back in the water. Looking forward to Bible schools in January and February on the river, along with preaching to many who have never heard the Gospel. The houseboat is a real blessing to the work. One afternoon while working on the houseboat a man came to me asking me to haul a child to the hospital, and that he was a missionary with the Swiss India Mission. I've never seen a child burned so badly and still living. They had a bed made out of small poles with two longer than the others to carry it. Two-thirds of the child's body was burned. During our trip to the hospital the missionary talked to the parents telling them how God had led me there with the car, and how God watches over His own. The Doctor told me that the hospital it was only a miracle that the child was still alive. I ended the day with the car breaking down, but thankful that I'd been of service to a burned child.

Here at the mission the Lord has blessed. We've had 70 in SS and many more attending the evening services. The building is going up but very slow. Prices go up every day. We're paying 60 soles for a bag of cement now, as compared to 42 soles when we started the church building and our home. Pray with us that we may be able to finish it, and for the glory of God. Brother Torres and Nicolas made a trip to Caridad this month and report one saved and many blessings. The work at San Francisco is doing very good. The school is going right on even though the teacher is in the hospital. His mother is filling in very good for him, and we thank God for her. We appreciate your prayers and support in our behalf, making our ministry possible here. May the Lord richly bless each one of you.

Dear Brethren,

Here in the Acre of Brazil we have but two seasons of the year and they are the dry and the rainy. The dry season this year has not been as dry as in other years and now the rainy season has started. For the past two weeks, it has rained very hard

almost every day and there is mud and water everywhere. The rainy season is very good for us that travel the rivers, but for the housewife it brings the problem of how to get the clothes dry on wash day. During the rainy season the housewife cannot have a routine, but must take advantage of any amount of sun whenever it should happen to appear. As far as I know we have the only washing machine in Cruzeiro do Sul. This machine was bought by the two families of us before we moved to the Acre the first time and has been a real blessing to us, when the sun shines. Betty has been waiting all week for the sun, last week we had just a half a day of sunshine, but this week none yet.

This is election year here in the Acre

and for the past several weeks that is all we have heard and if you want to see some corrupt politics you should come to visit us during an election. To give you an idea of how slow things go here, there are about three thousand voters here. The election was Tuesday, this is Friday and still they do not have the votes all counted. The candidate for mayor that is leading at the present is a man that during the great persecution of the Christians in Japiim some thirty years ago carried food to them out in the swamps where they were hiding. God used this man to take care of the people of God, but as yet the man is not saved. Perhaps the Lord will use him again for His glory. We would like very much to see God glorified through the salvation of this man.

The work at Maita has been going well this month. The attendance has been good with some lost in almost every service. We have had six professions of faith there this month. Last Sunday I baptized eight into the fellowship of that church. All were young people, children of the members of the church.
