Preaches First Sermon In Portuguese . . . First Service In Rented Building For Mission . . . Tape Recorder To Good Use

Dear Brethren,

Well, another month has gone by, and another year has passed into eternity, and with it has gone many unused opportunities to witness for the Saviour and do what we should do in the Lord's work, I am sure. As I look back over the past year, I have many things to regret; such as those lost opportunities and the fact that I have accomplished so little for my Lord. But, knowing that I can't call those things back and undo them, I have asked my Lord's forgiveness, who always understands and is ready always to forgive fully His penitent children, and am trying to put into practice the words of the apostle Paul, "Forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth to those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." Though there are many things in which I find no joy in remembering, yet there is one blessed thought that always brings joy—it never fails—, and that is the glorious appearing of our blessed Saviour; which ever

draweth nearer. Every passing day, month and year brings us ever nearer to that blessed day of "our gathering together unto Him" and His glorious reign on this earth. "Be patient therefore, brethren, unto the coming of the Lord." Jas. 5:7.

We are still rejoicing over the visit of Bros. Hille and Clark, and the blessing they were to us while here. The people here on our street still mention them and ask quite often about the "two fat Americans; one short and the other tall", and tell us to send them their remembrances. We were sorry to hear that they didn't get to Peru, but glad that they made it home safely.

We spent our first Christmas in Brazil with nothing out of the ordinary happening. We spent the evening of Christmas Eve at a birthday party in the home of one of the believers here on our street, and ate dinner Christmas Day in the home of her grandmother. Most of the people here are real nice to us in every way.

I spent most of the last part of December working on the building that we rented to have services in. We had to do a lot of carpenter and electrical work, painting, etc., but a lot of the believers helped in the work, and we only had to hire one man to help us with the carpenter work. Needs Now

TEACHERS IN BRAZIL

We need more designated offerings for Teachers' salaries in Manaus, Brazil. This fund is in the red a small amount now.

STATION WAGON FUND

We have two missionary families coming home on furlough in July—the Harold Bratchers and the George Beans. We need two station wagons to be purchased in June for them to use. Two new ones will cost about \$5500.00 and we have \$1244.05 in this fund as of January 1, 1967.

LAND TRANSPORTATION

The fund to buy Jeeps for missionaries to use on the field is \$1354.53 in the red as of January 1, 1967.

BUILDING IN PUCALLPA, PERU

We need the funds and need them now so that Brother Mayfield can finish up the building in Pucallpa, Peru. The City of Pucallpa has notified Bro. Mayfield that he must put in a sewer system and this will cost \$800.00 or more. This fund already owes the regular fund \$1800.00 and also for an extra lot that was recently purchased. We do not know the exact amount needed, but it is several thousand dollars.

There are also other funds, but these are greatly in need as of now. Pray and then give. Be sure and mark your designated

offerings for these funds exactly what they are for so the Treasurer will know how to list them.

Dear Brethren,
The news in our letter this month should have reached you last month. We are sorry that it did not, but hope that you will rejoice with us in all that the Lord has done for us.

HILLE AND CLARK VISIT

It was a real joy and thrill to see our brethren get off the plane here in Manaus. The plane was two-motored and the trip from Belem, at the mouth of the Amazon, to Manaus, had been a little rough which made the arrival for the two brethren a happier one. After our hand shakes and embraces, the baggage was received and from the airport we went to our house. Their arrival in Manaus was on the 29th, the day of the High School graduation.

Knowing the trip to be a tiring one, nothing was planned for Tuesday or Wednesday except the graduation exercises on Tuesday night.

HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION

This being our first class to graduate from the High School, our hearts were all "a flutter". Everything went perfectly. In the procession on the faculty, our visiting brethren Hille and Clark and the graduates. The graduates wore dark blue gowns and the girls had white collars.

SEMINARY CLASS NIGHT

On Thursday the graduating class of the Seminary had their program. This was composed of musical and literary presentations. One student gave a talk on "Looking Back" and another gave a talk on "Looking Forward". In spite of the fact that Brother Hille and Brother Clark could not understand the language, they were able to recognize some of the tunes and assured us that they enjoyed the program.

GRADUATION

The graduation exercises were held at 8:00 A.M. on Saturday. Mrs. Hatcher played for the processional as faculty, visitors and graduates marched in to take their places. Graduate Jose Alves Araujo brought the discourse on behalf of the graduating class. Brother Santiago read the Scriptures and led in the opening prayer. Brother Bratcher sang a solo, after which Brother Hille brought the graduation address. The message was excellent as he gave the graduates the scriptural admonitions to faithfulness and the need of the certainty of their call to the ministry.

VISITS TO THE CHURCHES

During the rest of the visit Brothers Hille and Clark visited many of the churches on the invitation of the pastors, where they preached through interpreters. During the day visits were made to all the points of work so that the buildings and grounds of the churches could be seen.

TRIP TO THE INTERIOR

On Tuesday of the Second week a trip was made to the interior by launch. Our first stop at the Island of Anthony Maria, where one of the seminary students has a good work. The next night we were at the Island of Patience. With the exception of the first day the trip was very lovely as far as weather is concerned. The first day, how-

ever, was a real scorcher and was really hard on those who had left the land of cold and snow. The details of the trip I will leave to those whose first impressions will be more interesting. The only bad part of the trip was that Brother Henderson had a kidney stone attack and we had to return to Manaus before scheduled.

GRADE SCHOOL GRADUATION

Twenty-four students graduated from our grade school and the closing exercises were real nice. The teachers of the graduating class made the address and one of the students gave a talk. The boys wore shoulder length capes of blue and the girls capes of white.

PREACHING EVERY NIGHT

During this month the Lord has opened many opportunities. Eleven sermons were preached at the congregation or mission point that Brother Henderson has opened. Five sermons have been preached in the Tabernacle Baptist Church. One message was preached at the Peniel Baptist Church.

THE NEW YEAR

As we begin the new year your prayers are needed more than you know. God has done great things for us, whereof we are glad. Of ourselves, only failure could come. Pray with us that God will give us ears to hear and feet to follow His will in all that is done.

Jan.; which was the first day of Jan. Bro. Hatcher preached for us that night, and also every night the following week. We had real good crowds and wonderful preaching and singing every night. The first night we had about sixty inside the building and about half that many outside. We didn't have any professions of faith during the meeting. Bro. Hatcher preached messages mostly to strengthen the new believers—but two who had already made professions sometime before came for baptism, and I baptized them at Tabernacle Church following Sunday morning. That Sunday night a young preacher from the seminary preached for us, and immediately following the service Dorothy and I and all of the baptized believers in our mission went to Tabernacle Church to observe the Lord's Supper. It was my first time here in Brasil. On the following Wednesday night I preached my first sermon in Portuguese here at the mission. Everyone said that I did well and that they understood what I said. Of course I had to just about read it word for word, but I guess that is better than nothing. On the following Sunday night I preached my second sermon in Portuguese at the mission. Tomorrow, (Wed. nite) the Lord willing, I will try again. Bro. Hatcher came back and preached on Thurs., Fri., and Sat. nights, and we enjoyed three more nights of real good services. We are all so thankful for our building, and we have it fixed up real nice. It is very pretty.

We are now in the midst of the rainy season here. The weather is cooler, which is nice, but it is more difficult to visit and get people to come to church because of the rain. But considering everything, I think that we have had good attendance at our mission.

Dear Brethren,
Again we send greetings in the name of the Lord. The weather is hot and wet here now and so hard to get anything done. We finally got things we have been waiting for 7 months. They were the windshield and top for boat and the tape recorder that Home Church of Mt. Morris, Mich. bought us. The tape recorder is fine. We enjoy it very much and use it in classes and will also use it in services, etc. But we have not been able to use the boat yet with the top on. We had a trip planned last week to go up the Itaya river but Purification did not show up as he said and I did not know the river nor the places he wanted to visit. It was best though as my wife still was not well enough to leave for a week. She is better now and almost back to where she was before only with the same trouble that she has always had. After much time and examining and even x-rays, it seems she might have a slight hernia caused from the first operation she had in 1960 in the US. Pray for us as she gets well and that another operation will not be necessary the Lord willing.

In the work: In Iquitos we had 2 more professions of faith, 3 baptized. We are starting Bible School this week. One I baptized was to have been saved when Brother Lewis first came here, Francisco Amatte. He gave testimony of why he never

was baptized before because he never saw too much to be desired in the believers but he said before I came home last time if I came back he would be baptized as that was a sign to him that at least I meant business for the Lord. Sometimes I wonder if I had been a testimony to anyone at all here. We still have Bible classes on Monday and we have as high as 25 some nights. This almost encourages me to have more night classes. Saturday night we are still trying to sing better. Our S.S. attendance is always around the 65-70 mark and so many visitors. Pray that my wife's health will enable me to make a visit or two on the rivers before the water goes down again. I would like to visit the churches at least although I am of more good here in Iquitos than on the rivers. Also Brother Mayfield is to come here and preach 5 nights for our 30th anniversary from Feb. 22 through 26. We are hoping this will be a real good time in the Lord.

From what the brethren report this month on the rivers all is about the same. There were no professions of faith with attendance about the same. Pray for the work on the rivers. We are so sorry also that the Brethren Hille and Clark did not get to come on to Peru from Brazil and we try to understand but it sure was a big letdown. You cannot imagine how much so. We pray that the Lord would give us new desire and courage daily and that he would lead us to new heights for his glory. May the Lord bless you all and we thank God for you all in our prayers.

It is with great pleasure to write our many friends and the readers of the MS. I do not have much to report this month, as I have been sick with some kind of stomach disorder. I have been to two doctors, and as of now they do not know my trouble. I have had blood tests made and this morning I went and they put a rubber tube down my nose to my stomach to make a test with. The tube would not pass from my stomach into the duodenum to test the gall bladder and liver. I have had x-rays made of my liver and gall bladder but they do not show anything out of the ordinary, according to the doctors. They are going to treat me now with medicine to cure the spot that is infected that will

Enos Iberson In Dire Need . . . Twins To Care For . . . Miguel Iberson To Maita

January 12, 1967
Dear Brethren,
Because of negligence on my part I did not get a letter written for the Mission Sheet last month, so I will try to write the news for two months this time.

About two months ago Brother Enos who takes care of the church at Colonia, where I am pastor came to Cruzeiro do Sul and was telling me what a hard time he has been having trying to get along on the thirty-one dollars that the church is paying him and wanted to know if we could not help him. He said he knew the church could not do any more than they have been doing, but he was having to go in debt more and more each month and could see no way of getting out. Because of an operation that he is needing he can not work out in the hot sun and where he lives there is no other kind of work that he can do. His wife is also ill, both physically and mentally and was not taking care of their one year old daughter and the two month old twins, leaving all their care up to him and his younger sister. The operation that he is needing according to the doctor can only be done in Rio de Janeiro, but the operation on his wife can be done here. Brother Enos is one of the most dedicated men to the Lord's service that I have seen in Brazil. He is also studying the fourth grade of grade school in hopes that he will be able to go to Manaus to study in the preachers school. Many times he has left the babies in the care of his little sister at night while he went fishing. While he would be waiting for a fish to bite he would be studying either his Bible or school books by a small kerosene lamp that he took along for that purpose. Due to the constant rise in prices we were forced to tell him that we could not help him any more at this time. As he left our house that night we were all almost in tears and he appeared to be on the verge of a nervous breakdown. He returned to Colonia and a few days later, we went there, also. After talking it over among ourselves, we offered to take their twin daughters to rear until such a time that they would be able to take care of them or until we go home on furlough, so for the past two months we have been very busy taking care of these two little girls that have come to bless our home. They are now four months old. The last few times that I have seen Brother Enos he seemed to have had a heavy load lifted off his shoulders. When the church voted to pay him this salary of a little over thirty dollars he could get by on it very well, but since then prices have been going up by leaps and bounds and his family growing the same way. I am writing all these things in hopes that some of the churches there in the States will take this brother to heart and designate several hundred dollars to help this brother get on his feet and get the medical care that his family needs. If several churches together can not raise several hundred dollars I am sure several dollars would be a big help. As for our part of the bargain we are more than satisfied and wish they would adopt the twins to us.

In the two months that we have had the twins we have been through two kinds of skin infection, dysentery, hepatitis and colds along with ear infections. One is growing very well now, but the other is still not very well. We believe it was the providence of the Lord for us to have them in order that we may give them the medical attention that they need, which has been at least one visit to the doctor each week. We already are dreading the day, if, and when, we have to give them back. We have offered to keep them to rear as our own, but as yet they have not accepted our offer. Brother Enos said if it is the Lord's will

he would give them to us and we don't want anything but that the Lord's will be done in all things.

Brother Miguel Iberson has left the pastorate of the church here in Cruzeiro do Sul to accept the Church at Maita. He went there to hold services this past Sunday and plans to move the family this week. I am sure he will be good for the church there and the church will also be good for him. With Brother Miguel leaving, the care of the church here has fallen on me at least for the present. Brother Miguel recommended that the church call me as pastor, but I asked them to pray about it for awhile in order to be sure that the Will of the Lord is being done. In the meantime it will give me time to pray so that I may, also, know what the will of the Lord is for me, as to whether or not I should accept.

Brother Enos just spent a few days at one of the mission points of the church at Colonia and on his way home he stopped to spend one night at Maita to have services for the brethren there. The Lord blessed his trip with three professions of faith. I have not talked to him, but the brethren at Maita told Brother Miguel and he brought the news to us. There have been about fifteen professions of faith at this place, but Satan has been working overtime to lead them astray and it looks as though he has had success.

May the Lord bless you all always for His glory.

Annual Reports . . . Leaving On A Ten Day Trip With Family Into The Interior . . . Four More Extended Trips Planned Before Furlough

Dear Brethren,
The past month has been spent within the city limits of Manaus except for a visit and service held in a hospital about five miles out in the country from Manaus and a three hour boat trip to Cambize to visit three families, members of the 14th of December Church.

The work at the 14th of December Church goes well. The largest attendance in Sunday School for these days was 156 on January the 8th. Day before yesterday, Sunday, January 15th was "Member's Day." This is an annual special day in our church when the church roll is called and a special effort is made to contact each member and urge them to be present to respond to the roll call. Sunday morning it started raining early but in spite of the rain we had 99 in Sunday School with 67 members present. That night 85 members were present with a total attendance of 180. Here is the report of the condition of the church as read that Sunday: Number of members-January 16, 1966 (Last "Member's Day") 4194. Losses during the year-29 (7 by letter and 22 by exclusion). Gains during the year-73 (18 by letter or statement, 3 restored and 52 by baptism). Number of members-January 15, 1967-238. Other believers awaiting membership-13. Non-resident members unaffiliated with one of the 5 missions of the church-12. Missions of the church: 5. These 5 have a total of 84 members (included in the 238).

Disappointed That Hille And Clark Did Not Come . . . Trouble With Two Native Preachers . . . Seven Baptized In New Baptistry . . . Needs To Finish Building

January 17, 1967
Dear Brethren,
We just finished reading the most awaited paper that we receive each month the "Mission Sheets." We rejoice with the brethren over the good trip and the blessings they received with all our missionaries in Manaus, Brazil. We were never more disappointed and sad when the telegram came saying that their flight had been cancelled and that they would not be able to visit us. I'm sure our people here and at San Francisco were very disappointed also, as they had planned several days for their arrival.

Here we had a big fiesta planned, and many of the folk from San Francisco came to the airport as we didn't have time to get the news to them that they were not coming. We had moved back the date for the graduation of our school until Monday so the brethren could speak to them, and they had prepared a big feed also. Let me say brethren that I attended and enjoyed my share and a part of yours. I've told the folk here and at San Francisco that you would have to come at another date and that we would not take no for an answer. We do thank God for the good trip He gave you and the blessings all our missionaries there received by your coming. We've had some other disappointments this month. Our helper Nicolas Moreno went to Lima for the month of December and will not be returning, and also Antonio Torres who we said would be going to Caridad, is back in Iquitos.

After taking me to court asking for 43,000 soles or about \$1700.00 in back pay and vacation pay. But of course he didn't have anything coming, as I had all the receipts showing that he had been paid. This took several days of my time, and I'm still wondering, why! The three months he was here he made two river trips (8 days) and I had to push to get that from him. We still have two workers at San Francisco but have no one here. Will you pray with us that God will give us faithful men that will want to preach the gospel? In spite of all the troubles and disappointments, God has wonderfully blessed.

Our Sunday School attendance has been very good. We've had between 70 and 86. Our new classes have proven to be a blessing. Hope to start other classes as soon as there are teachers and the building is plastered. Last Sunday night we had our first baptism in the new baptistry. There were seven, 6 adults and one young fellow that followed their Lord in baptism. This was the first of its kind in Pucallpa, as we're the only Baptist church and the only one with a baptistry. The building was filled, and I had the opportunity to preach to all of them before the baptismal service. I'm hoping to have another baptismal service Sunday, the Lord willing. I'm sending some pictures, and hope you'll rejoice with us in what the Lord is doing, with your financial help and support for the work. We also have helped two families get married legally so they could be baptized. This not only is expensive, but takes a considerable amount of time.

The addition is being plastered a room at a time, as cement is very scarce and very expensive. Also, we can only buy and work as the money comes in for the building fund. We hope that many of you will pray with us as we'd like to start the day school the first of April, if at all possible, and there is much yet that must be done. I'd like to thank all who have helped us with the needs and only pray that God will richly bless you for it. We'd also like to thank those who are helping pay teachers, and hope that others will see the need. We'll need two more for Pucallpa next year, and then the two we now have in San Francisco. The Lord has wonderfully blessed at San Francisco. Our graduation went off very nice. We also presented legalized papers to the Inspector of Education and now have the school at San Francisco credited so our students can pass to any other school with their credits. The school there has proved to be a blessing to the church. We only wish the students from there could come here and continue their studies, but looks like that will have to wait. Pray with us that we might see our plans completed.

We've had three professions of faith here, with one of them being baptized last Sunday night. This has been one month we'll long remember with all the trouble and disappointments, but one also filled with blessings. We'd like to wish everyone the best for 1967, and it may be the year that our blessed Lord will come. May He continue to bless each of you.
