We are still having lots of rain and the roads are real bad and the streets in Sao Luis are full of chuck holes. I do not know how a car stays together on these streets. Now to share the month's work with you.

NEW HOPE CHURCH, SAO LUIS

Dear Brethren,
Greetings in the name of the Lord. The news for the past month is as follows:
I made a trip into the interior with Brethren Hatcher, Santiago (82 yrs. old), Wilson, and John Mark Hatcher, up the Amazon River 1 1/2 days journey from Manaus, to a place where Tabernacle Church has a work. We left on a Fri. Morning at 6 A.M. and arrived back in Manaus the following Mon. afternoon at 5 P.M. Bro. Santiago preached on Sat. night, Bro. Hatcher on Sun. morning, and I on Sun. night. At the close of the service on Sun. morning, an elderly man made a profession of faith and

Heavy Rains Passed . . . Record 135 In S. S. . . Souls Saved . . . Needs Are Great

Dear Brethren,
Well things are about back to normal again here in Pucallpa. The rains have passed, at least for the last few days, and the river is going down. Supplies are coming in from Lima now over the new highway, for which we thank the Lord. This has been a good month here at the mission. We have had very good attendance. For several Sundays we'd tried to go over the 100 mark, in S.S. and last Sunday we exceeded our goal with 135 in attendance. Our evening services have always been well attended. God has crowned our services with His blessings. There have been 5 saved, for which we praise Him. Two of these being a man and wife who live across the river. They came to our service Sunday night. The three men came professing faith in Christ as their Saviour, but left under much conviction. On Wed. night they returned, and upon entering the church they said they had come to make their profession of faith publicly, as they had already trusted the Lord in their home. After the service or I should say after I'd preached, and had finished the invitation, and had called on one of the brethren to close our service with prayer he spoke up and said I want to know when we can make our profession. So I told him right now, and they came. All the folks rejoiced with them that they had found peace in the Lord Jesus. We had hoped to organize this month, but because of the weather we've waited, and as of yet there is no date set. Pray for us that we'll be sure and let the Lord lead. Our day school has been a blessing. We now have two teachers here, and the one

at San Francisco. My wife also is helping out with the teaching and seems to enjoy doing it so very much. Every Friday morning we have a service in the church building which is called "Un tiempo de devocion y oracion" A time of devotion and prayer. We're also teaching a course on religion (Baptist doctrine) every day. Our teacher at San Francisco has sure had his share of troubles. His wife gave birth to their baby last month who was born with its feet and legs looking as though they had been burned. When we took it to the hospital the doctors said they had never seen anything like that. I've been taking it back and forth to the hospital every other day. We didn't think she had a chance to live, but she is improving every day. Thanks to the Lord. Remember them when you pray. Brother Rucoba reports that the church is doing very well at San Francisco. Now that the river is back to normal we'll be traveling again with the houseboat, and hope to have a meeting there soon. The church there is also going to buy a boat for their pastor, and Bro. Roger Guevarra to use to do mission work. I'm hoping to help them by going with them to some of our mission points. Then I'm also going to start a Monday night Bible class for preachers especially, and for others who want to study with us. With this boat Bro. Rucoba can bring several from San Francisco to study with us, and then return on Tuesday morning.

I'd like to close by asking you to pray that God will raise up some to help as there is such a great need NOW. Let us do as Jesus said to "LOOK on the fields that are white unto harvest, then let us pray that the Lord of the harvest will send forth laborers into the harvest. That one may be YOU. May the Lord richly bless each one of you.

regularly. The others (man and wife) want to be baptized but will work this out after they are legally married, etc. The 16th of April I baptized two, one of these was mentioned above. The mission has started a school and the Sunday school teacher is the teacher and they have eight students. The government has a school there but the teacher makes the children worship false gods and bow down to saints. The believers would not send their children and I do not blame them for it, I would not send mine.

VILLA MARANHÃO

We have had a three day conference at VM the 27, 28, and 29th of April. Bro. Jose the preacher from Anajativa was the guest speaker, also the members from Anajativa went to the services and got acquainted with the mission there. The crowds were large and Bro. Jose preached some good evangelistic messages. One girl made a profession of faith and after we left on the last day the nephew of Bro. Agostinho made a profession of faith. Friday the 12th of May I baptized one young lady into our mission at V.M.

ITAQUE

Sat. April 29 I was called to the bedside of sister Maria of Itaque who had been quite ill for several days. Some other people went with me and we had prayer with her. I thought she had Malaria. I gave her some pills and she took them and when we went back the 2nd of May to have a service in her house she was almost well. There was a good crowd at this service. Someday I would like to see a Baptist Church here as well as many other places.

IGRAU

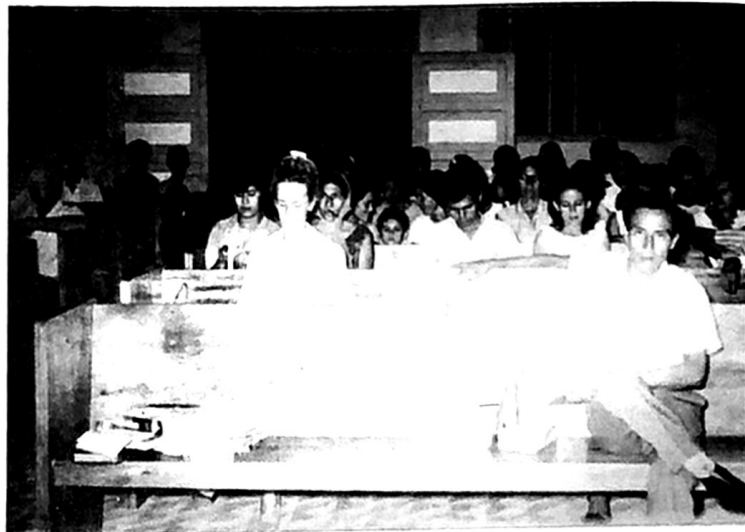
April 18 I went by Anajativa and three brethren went with me to I-gra-u. It had rained all day and the road was muddy. We arrived without any trouble. We talked with the old mayor and his mood was different than it was the last time we were there. It

seemed his wife was causing all the trouble and would not consent for us to have services in her home. The man that owned the dance hall we used when Bro. Henderson was here was mad at us (or mad at the mayor) and we could not use that house. We were without any other means or house to use for service and it was drizzling rain. The old mayor told us we could use his table and chairs and benches. About ten people sat while we preached and it began to rain harder. I thought while these people sat outside and listened to the Gospel what must be going through their minds and thinking to sit and hear the Gospel. Many people would make an excuse and say they could not go because it is raining. After services we started for Sao Luis and the jeep got buried in the quicksand. We worked until mid night (still raining) to free the jeep but it was no use because it was dark and the sand was deep and wet. Three of us sat in the front seat and tried to sleep, stuck in the jungle. The mosquitos nearly ate us up. Daylight some men came and helped us jack the jeep up with poles and we dug it out and were soon on our way to SL. Remember to pray for us, and may the God of peace bless each one is our prayer.

Once again we write. Yes, time does fly but we fly also and many times in the wrong direction. It is always my prayer that I have done what the Lord wants me to and ask if I did as he wanted me to. This month the river churches report good times in the Lord. One was saved and crowds growing more. We do not get too much out of saying only one saved, but also we know that God has to get the glory and give the increase. We are hoping always for better things and wait on the Lord to give them. Pray for our river work please.

Here in the First Church the crowds were down some (about 65) because we have had so much rain. The evening crowds were up, however, it seems after the exclusion of the member mentioned last month we have even better harmony now than ever. This has been rare here. We have had some come and thank me for the sermon, etc. It has been real wonderful lately. Pray with us. We have received two members back into our membership also this month, and I baptized one last Sunday night. This one baptized was saved at home with my wife being the one responsible for leading her to the Lord. I still have a Monday night class and I am also teaching our teachers on Monday night. We are now working on ways to reach more in our Sunday School by visiting in the needy and poor areas. All our visiting now is a house to house plan both here for the church and the new mission on the other side of Iquitos.

Speaking of our new work we had real good crowds for our opening week of preaching. Some from our church were so faithful and came every night. Many from the area came and of course 40 or 50 children. No one saved but much interest shown. In our first two Sunday schools we had 36 and 39 and this all from this neighborhood. So we are real happy about this. We feel sure that the Lord will bless and raise up another church there. There is one family already lined up with the work and another will be as soon as he gets his marital status fixed up. Then there are 3 other families that could line up there also. We are now trying to get a larger building. The one we now have is only 4 meters by 11 meters and is

not too large for Sunday school. My daughter Karen plays there and teaches the children for me in S.S. She has always been such a big help to me in many ways. I sure will miss her when she goes home this summer to continue her schooling. I am sure her mother will miss her more than I. Barbara also helps me much especially in preparing the hand work for S.S. She also does this here for the church. Our offerings in our new mission are about \$10.00 a week. I do not help in this either. All my tithes and offerings go directly here in the church and have for the past 10 years. Our daughters have been a blessing to us all our time here in Peru. I wouldn't take anything for any of my children. My only wish is that they will always be fully dedicated to the Lord.

Brother Purificacion reports about 30 in all the services in the new work in the Itaya River. He has gone back this month hoping to get a house up if possible. We are praying for this work also and feel God will "give us" great blessing from it. May the Lord bless you all.

Preacher Ordained . . . Trip To Fortelaza . . . Eight Professions . . . Five Baptized . . . Another Trip Planned

Dear Brethren,
 Sunday night I preached on "The Life Story of A Leper" combining Luke 5:12-16 with Leviticus 13 and 14. I described how when the first sign of leprosy appeared on his skin he tried to dismiss it saying it was only a minor skin disease or just a rash which would soon disappear, but it didn't. Soon he was declared a leper and had to spend his days away from society and when anyone came near him he had to shout: "Unclean, unclean." What a happy day it was for him when he came to Jesus and was healed of his leprosy! I used the message not only to appeal to the lost to come to Christ and he healed of their spiritual leprosy but also to appeal to the believers to realize and consider that all men that are not believers in the Lord Jesus are in need of being cleansed and if not will be unclean and separated from the Lord forever. Let us all remember that we are dealing with lost people with a sickness worse than any physical sickness and that Jesus is the only one who can save. Later in this letter I'll tell about some that have come to Jesus saying as did the leper "Lord, if thou wilt, thou canst make me clean."

On the 18th of April the 14th of December Baptist Church ordained to the Gospel ministry one of its members-Elizario Candido da Silva. This young man was recently called as pastor of the newly organized Monte Verde Baptist Church.

On the 19th of April at 7:15 A.M. I left Manaus on an airplane-destination-Fortaleza, Ceara. After a pleasant trip I arrived at my destination and was met at the airport by Pastor and Mrs. Sostenes Melo. Brother Sostenes who is pastor of a church in a nearby State also has a house rented in Fortaleza where it is necessary for his wife and two of his younger children to live during the school months. I stayed in his home during the 13 days I spent in Fortaleza. Fortaleza is a city with a population of 700,000. It is the capital of Ceara and is a waterfront city located on the Atlantic Ocean. Fortaleza is almost three times larger in population than Manaus. It has fewer Baptist churches. The section of town where we worked is located "on the other side of the tracks." Actually it is between the train tracks and the Ocean. The second or third day after we arrived, there appeared an article in one of the newspapers of the city referring to the section of town where we held services for 11 nights-"Na Toca do Diabo." (The Devil's Den.) If we weren't in the middle of the "Devil's Den" we were close to it in what must be the poorest and most miserable part of the city. We held services each night in several different homes either preaching inside or in front of the houses in the open air. One night 135 people were counted as being present to hear the Word of the Lord.

During the two Sunday mornings and from Sunday to Friday afternoon we held Sunday School and Vacation Bible School in a small house that we rented and enlarged by tearing down a wall between two of the three small rooms. I have never in my life tried to hold a Vacation Bible School with a more noisier and misbehaved group of children. I hope they learned a little but I'm afraid they didn't learn much.

In spite of this difficulty the Lord blessed with some 8 professions of faith during the services at night and I baptized five on the 30th of April. Thus when I left Fortaleza on the 2nd day of May I left behind a new mission of the 14th of December Baptist Church of Manaus. A mission with 6 members-5 that I baptized and a blind lady that I baptized in Manaus some two years ago that lives now in Fortaleza. She lives some 20 blocks away but attended several of our services. Bro. Sostenes Melo will serve as pastor of the mission and will divide his time with the mission and the church in Peritoro, Maranhao where he is also pastor.

Tuesday, May 2nd I arrived home at 5:30 P.M. after a pleasant trip. It was good to get home and find the family well.

Since returning we have worked as usual with the 14th of December Baptist Church. The attendance in Sunday School for the last 5 Sundays has run from a low of 104 to a high of 155.

On the 25th of this month I will be leaving Manaus to make a short visit to our missions on Rio Preto, Amajari and Rio Urubu.

We pray the Lord's blessings to rest upon each one of you. We ask your prayers.

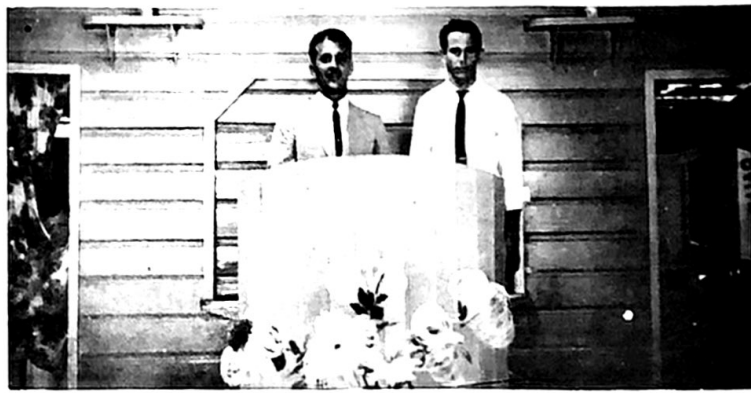

19½ Hour Launch Trip . . . Week End Revival . . . Ducks And Fish For Supper . . . Mrs. Hatcher Buys Food For Journey . . . Back Teaching At Preacher's School

Dear Brethren,
 The Lord has been good to us and has given a very busy month. Manifold blessings have been ours. Souls have been saved, baptized and many have heard the gospel.

LAUNCH TRIP TO ANAMA

In the month of March a young man, who had studied in the Seminary and now lives in the interior, came to visit the Tabernacle Baptist Church where he is a member. The reason of his visit was to say that he was preaching regularly in the place where he lives and that nine persons had made professions of faith and had asked to be baptized. He had come to ask the church to send the pastor to baptize them. We set the date and on the 21st of April, Brother Henderson, Brother Santiago, John Mark, Wilson the boatman and I set out on our trip. Leaving Manaus at six in the morning we traveled until about 5 in the evening. There is much work in preparation for a trip. Mrs. Hatcher did all the buying of the food for the trip. Very little is said in the mission letters about my family but they deserve to have a whole lot said in their favor. Mrs. Hatcher teaches in the High School six days a week. She does all the marketing for the family which is no little job. She does the buying for trips such as this one and plans how much we will need in accord with the number of days, etc. God has blessed me with a great wife and family.

After 11 hours of traveling we anchored in the lake which we had to pass through. It happened that the trees were full of ducks which were coming in to roost for the night. Bro. Dempsey shot five of them and Brother Santiago was just about to shoot at the way Dempsey would knock them down. We prepared supper and after a night's sleep were on our way at 6:00 A.M. the next morning. After 8 and one-half hours of traveling we arrived at our destination. Brother Oseias, the young preacher was not at home when we arrived. He came in a little while later and had three large fish and a large game bird about the size of a medium sized turkey which he had shot. His wife prepared one of the fish and sent on the launch to us for supper and it was really delicious.

SUNDAY SERVICES AND BAPTISM

The next morning services were held on the other side of the stream so we went by launch. After preaching a double header which lasted about an hour and a half (or a little over) Brother Santiago led the eight candidates into the river and baptized them. That morning I preached on the "Bible-

God's Eternal Word" and then followed with a message on "One Baptism". During the sermon when I stressed the fact of one baptism one young man about 25 spoke up and said he was there to testify that there were two baptisms for he had had them both. But as a reply to his words the Holy Spirit brought to my mind the words that state that Jesus would not let men testify of Him for He knew what was in man. When these words were quoted he remained silent through and after the service. When I quoted these words Brother Santiago just about shouted as he almost did when he saw Dempsey bringing down those ducks.

That afternoon Brother Oseias brought a large stalk of bananas for each of us. Night services were held at 6:30 and Brother Dempsey brought the message. After the service we traveled about two hours since it was a moonlit night until we arrived to where the small stream passes into the mighty Amazon. Here we anchored and had supper at midnight. At six the next morning we were moving downstream toward Manaus after having made minor adjustments on the reverse gear box.

SEMINARY CLASSES

At 5:00 P.M. we were docked and this allowed plenty of time for me to get to my classes at the seminary at 6:30.

SCHOOL GIRL BAPTIZED

The following Sunday I baptized one girl into the fellowship of the Tabernacle Church who had made a profession of faith at the end of last school year.

PROFESSIONS IN SCHOOL ASSEMBLY

There were seven professions of faith in one of the assemblies of the grade school. Lynn had given a Bible lesson and at the end two children said they were trusting Jesus as their Saviour. These are regular in Baptist Churches.

LAUNCH REPAIRS

Due to leaks the launch was pulled out and the hull recaulked below the water line. This is a job that has to be done at least every two years.

In closing I want to say to our brethren Lauerman and Mayfield that their letters are always a blessing to read as they tell of the work of the Lord in Peru. Also the letters from Brother Bean and the good work there in Maranhao. Even though we are on the same continent we never see each other except maybe in passing to and from the United States. But if there are things worth talking about we will have an eternity to do so as we walk together in the presence of our Lord. That is a wonderful thought.
