Back From Manaus Conference In The Work At Home . . . Trips To Colonia . . . Witnesses To Priest . . . Revival At Cruzeiro do Sul

Dear Brethren,
After attending the conference in Manaus, we all returned home and by now we are all back in the swing of things.

I have made two trips to Colonia this month. On the first trip it was necessary for the church to exclude one member. In the same business meeting it was, also, resolved that the grade school would not be functioning in the future, at least for this year due to the lack of teachers who have moved to Cruzeiro do Sul. When we returned from furlough in 1964 the church had forty-five members, but since that time it has lost twenty-five of them that have moved away. The church has suffered much from this, but the attendance has remained good and has even increased some with many more lost attending. On the second trip, while I was walking up the road I met the priest, whose jeep was stalled. During the two days I had been there I had talked to him several times

and he was very friendly as he has always been, so I helped him get it started. I went on my way and he went his, but some time later he sent a young man with an invitation for me to eat lunch with him the next day, which I accepted. That night while I was talking to Bro. Joao in my home, someone knocked on my open door asking if there was anyone home. It was dark and without rising to see who it was I said, "Yes, come on in" and to my surprise it was the priest who had come to confirm the invitation. We talked for about an hour about the condition of the world and then came the subject of religion. This is a German priest and is not one of them that have given us so much trouble in the past. This one has enough respect for another person, that after he would say what he had to say on a certain subject, he would listen to what I had to say on the same subject. We both enjoyed the discussion which lasted about two hours. He said that he knew that neither one would convert the other, but before he left he said he believed that some day I would preach in his church and I told him that I would be glad to do so. He did not get even a hint toward an invitation for him

Dear Brethren,
Well, praise the Lord! We have started on the new building for our mission. We have not gotten the building permit yet but it is in the process and ought to be gotten this week so I got the municipal engineer to let me start this week. We hope to start pouring the footing tomorrow. Pray with us that no more things will disturb now. We really need the space. We had 59 and even 62 this month in the mission and I am sure with more room we will fill the house. By the way, the main reason I have not gotten the permit is because we are having to not pay any social pay whatsoever as it is a church, etc. It looks like now we will get it, etc. In the church here we had a bad month. Attendance was down a lot but the offerings stay real good and still we have many visitors. I forgot to say we had a profession of faith in the mission from my wife's Sunday School class. We have two now that are really thinking about being baptized there in the mission.

Overbey does, get these names and places on your heart then your mind will remember them and you will pray regularly for them automatically. Pucallpa, Peru Buildings

Here is a report on the Pucallpa, Peru buildings as of December 31, 1967, by Del Mayfield:

Total cost to buy four lots and build house, church building, school building, tool house, well, sewer system, light plant and part of wall fence, \$29,610.00. Note Carefully: This is all paid for in Peru with no bills due. BUT, as of February 29, 1968 the Pucallpa Building fund is \$1,866.94 in the red. This means this amount of money has been used over and above the DESIGNATED OFFERINGS and that this building fund owes the regular fund \$1,866.94. What is yet to be done? A boat garage to keep the boat, outboard motor and boat trailer housed in when not in use, and the building of the wall fence. This fence is already partly built, only a small bit of it. This wall fence must be built completely around the entire property of all four lots. This is required by law. Brother Mayfield plans to go ahead and have the wall built and build the boat garage. How much more will this cost? We do not know exactly. It is estimated that it will take at least a total of \$5,000.00 (maybe more) to finish everything and be out of the red in the Pucallpa, Building fund. If we have not made ourselves clear and you have questions, write to: H. H. Overbey, 28855 Wexford, Warren, Michigan and we will try to answer all questions. We hope that all will be completed in a few months and when it is we will run pictures of the whole thing the Lord willing. Now give as the Lord leads you to do so and mark your offerings for "Pucallpa, Buildings".

Two Couples Marry To Get Baptized . . . Building New Church Building . . . Burying The Dead . . . Looking For The Crains To Arrive

Dear Brethren,

We greet you once again in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. It seems that the time goes so fast, and that we get so little done for the Lord. Each month seems to pass just a little faster, and we realize that we're that much closer home. The Lord has been so good to us, and we praise Him for the good health, and blessings that have been ours to enjoy. As you may know, a missionary is called upon to do about everything, and this month has been no exception, as I'll relate a little later. We count it a real privilege to be able to serve wherever and whenever we may be able. We want to thank each one of you who stand behind us each month with your prayers and support. Now to recall some of the activities of the month.

We have had a very good month here at the church. There has been one saved, and we baptized four. The four that were baptized were couples. They both had to get legally married before being baptized. The one couple lives across town at Arinal where we're building a new building for a mission, and we believe that we'll have a church there in a few months. As I wrote in my last mission letter the church bought a lot, and had plans to build. Just a few days later a fellow offered me another lot, and a much better one so we bought it also. Now we have two lots. I'm also glad to report that the roof is on the building, and the walls are going up. We also have the floor done. I'm planning now to have a revival meeting the last of next month, the Lord willing. The brethren here at the church have been wonderful in helping. Last week there were 8 fellows helping most of the time. Also Bro. Lucho Rucoba from San Francisco and some of his members have come up a few days to help. In fact we could not get the material cut fast enough to keep them all busy. I also had to get a special building permit from the Minister of Works until our plans could be approved. We got them today. I'd also like to add that while we were home and visiting the Liberty Baptist Church they asked me what it cost to build the building at San Francisco and we told them about \$600.00. So they voted

later to build two more buildings on the river. We had planned to build at Castila, but the river changed its course, and they gave us permission to build at Arinal. We appreciate Bro. Hooker and the people who have helped also to build. We also thank the Lord that He led them to give, and we are praying that others may see the need.

Our attendance has been very good this month. We're looking forward to the time when we can have open air meetings. We hope to start the wall around the back of the building as soon as we can get the material together, and then we'll be able to use the large lot for services. Continue to pray for us as we try to finish the work the Lord has called us to do.

At San Francisco they have had an increase in attendance also. There have been three new families coming and Bro. Lucho seems very much encouraged. We're also happy for him, as he has been through a time of testing, and has come through it all, a fine man of God.

Now for to relate my new experience. On Sunday night the 4th of this month, we were called late in the night to take a little girl to the hospital. Upon arriving at the home I found the child dead, and told the parents that there was no need to take it to the hospital. The mother asked me if I'd take care of the body for her, and of course the missionary never says no. So I washed the little dirty baby, combed its hair, and changed its clothes laid it out on an old dirty table. I arrived back home about 4:30 A.M. Monday. We had just got to bed when another brother came saying that his child had died, and asking me to come and preach for him that day. So I preached for him that same day and buried his baby, and that same night had a special service for the other baby in the home, and then on Tue. morning another service at the graveyard. That same day there were four children died here in Pucallpa. We thank God for the opportunity that has been ours to preach the gospel. The victory that is ours through our Lord Jesus Christ. May the Lord bless each one of you as we go forward for Him, who loved us, and gave Himself for us.

Back Home From Manaus Conference . . . Work Going Visiting Churches . . . Showing Slides And Souls Well . . . Native Preachers On The Go . . . Some Went Out From Us Because They Were Not Of Us

Dear Brethren,
At the close of my last letter, I was still in a meeting with the Martin Ave. Mission in Manaus. I shall begin this letter by giving an account of the rest of our activities while in Manaus. Just here though, I would like to take the opportunity to thank all of those who remembered us at Christmas time with special offerings, gifts, cards and letters, and also all who have been so thoughtful to write to us during the year and a half that we have been here on the field. I know, also, that there are many who, though you haven't had the time to write to us, you have supported us faithfully with your prayers and offerings, and we wish to thank you for your kindnesses, also.

We closed the meeting at Martin Ave. Mission Sunday night, Jan. 21. There were no professions of faith and no additions to the mission, but we had large crowds every night, with much interest shown, and the believers at the mission seemed to be strengthened in the faith. For these things we praise God and take courage. Our final week was spent fellowshiping with the Hatchers and other friends in Manaus. I didn't get to make a river trip into the interior, but I did help Bro. Hatcher work on the church building of the Beautiful Garden Baptist Church, located about 7 miles out of Manaus. We certainly had a wonderful time in Manaus, in every way.

We left Manaus on Jan. 30, at about 7 A.M., and arrived in Sao Luis in the afternoon of the same day, at about 2 P.M. We had a safe and relaxing trip home, and found everything in good order here, for which we thank the Lord.

We got right back into the full swing of the work here, beginning with the Wed. night services here in town. The work at the church here in with and at Tirirical seems to be about the same. The Lord is blessing us with new visitors in these places from time to time, and we hope to be able to reach some of them for the Lord.

I have made the trips regularly to Vila Maranhao, except last Fri. night, when I was sick and unable to go. The work there is going along very well. We always have good crowds for the services there. We lost one family to the Holy-rollers, but they are welcome to them. It seems that they were, like the multitude that walked out on Jesus and never came back, more interested in what they could get to eat than in hearing and obeying the truth, so they went after the food that the holy-rollers are passing out. The most disgusting thing about it is, that this food that they are using to gain members and deceive people with, is sent here by the U.S.A. and paid for by the American taxpayers, and yet, churches and preachers are allowed to receive it for such unscrupulous purposes. It is a shameful practise, and we will have no part of it. Of the family who left, only the girl was actually a member of the church, as the man and woman were not legally married and could not be baptized. The evangelist of the church reports good services at the church's mission in Itaquí, town 8 awaiting baptism. I plan to go there this coming Monday. He also plans to open up 2 new preaching points. Results of Manaus Conference.

The work in Anajatua is still doing real well. The girl who was excluded from the church some time back for adultery is pregnant and is living with the man but not married to him, and she has now joined the holy-rollers, and they took her right in, sin and all. Oh well, the judgement of God is yet to come. The evangelist of the church at Anajatua made a trip to Tobaca, after returning from Manaus, and he reports that everything is going well there. We plan to make another trip there a week from Monday, the Lord willing.

More witchcraft! The day we arrived home from Manaus, our maid and a girl next door found a big frog in our back yard. Its stomach had been cut open and sewed up with red thread. It was all swollen, but still alive and hopping around. This is a form of witchcraft in which the person performing the witchcraft cuts open the frog and puts a piece of paper, with the name of the person that he wants to kill written on it, along with certain other things, inside the frog and then sews it up again. When the frog swells up and bursts, then the person whose name is written on the paper is supposed to swell up, burst, and die, in the same manner and at the same time that the frog does. And this is not something practised among ignorant natives in the wilds of the jungle, but in a modern city among educated people!

Beloved friends in Christ, I will close for now, as I have already taken more space, time, and paper on this letter, than I should have. But I do covet an interest in your prayers, and especially at this time, as I am faced with a very important decision, which I must make soon. I have only 4 more months here before Bro. Bean comes back, and I do want to go where the Lord wants me to go and do what He wants me to do, when the time comes for me to leave Sao Luis. Thank you so much for your interest in my ministry.

Bro. Raul Vera Rodrigues, a graduate of the seminary in Manaus, has come to work with us here in the Acre. We thank the Lord for him and ask you all to pray for him that the Lord will use him for his glory. Also, remember us as you pray.
