Two Preachers Ordained . . . Hendersons Visit For Three Weeks . . . Mrs. Bean Home From Hospital . . . Moved In To New House

Dear Brethren,

It is with great joy that I am permitted to greet my brethren by means of the MS, desiring a great blessing from God's ever flowing fountain of grace for each one. Many things have happened since I wrote the last MS letter. December 28 the Hendersons and Bro. Sostenes and I went to Anajativa and met with the Baptist Church there for the purpose of ordaining Bro. Jose Ferreira to the Gospel ministry. I led in the questioning of Bro. Jose and after we had thoroughly questioned him on the doctrines of grace and the church doctrines we recommended that the church proceed with the ordination. Bro. Sostenes, the pastor from The Baptist Church of Peritoro, Maranhao, preached the message and Bro. Dempsey presented the Bible. Dec. 30 we went (same ones) to Villa Maranhao to ordain Bro. Agostinho, meeting with the Baptist Church there. Bro. Sostenes led in the questioning. Bro. Dempsey preached the message and I presented the Bible. Jan. 3 Bro. Jose came to my house and wanted me to meet with the church at Anajativa. Three of the sisters were fussing (just like cold backslidden Baptists). One of the sisters had said some hard things against the other. We met in a private home and I guess the church had the biggest crowd in its history. The people came to see what the believers were doing. I explained the responsibility to

each one of the three and then gave them opportunity to reconcile with each other. I am happy to report that they got right with each other and promised to stop tattling and backbiting. Bro. Jose told me the other day they are still at peace with each other.

It was our privilege to have Bro. and sister Henderson in our home for three weeks. We sure enjoyed them and hated to see them leave. Bro. Dempsey cooked our Christmas turkey and Dec. 23 he made Mary Ellen a cake for her tenth birthday. June was in the hospital with infected kidneys, infected sinus and a headache for 15 days with out letting up. We got a report from the Lab today and she still has a urine tract infection the doctor has given her some more medicine and said that she would be well soon. She came home from the hospital Christmas day. The New Hope Baptist Church SL excluded one young lady who went with the Holy Rollers. I had the privilege of baptizing two into the fellowship of the church. Sunday afternoon, Jan. 12, I was invited to Itaque. It was the birthday of Bro. Sartiro, a member of the Villa Maranhao Church. We had services in his home and after the services a 17 year old girl made a profession of faith. That night a young boy made a profession of faith at the church in town.

I am happy to report that we have moved into the house BFM has bought. It is not quite finished but we moved in because where we lived we ran out of water or the well went dry and we had lights about half of the time. Where we live now we have City water mains and sewers and it will also save me a lot of driving. May the Lord bless every one is our prayer.

Julio Dantas and Jose Alves graduates of our Baptist Seminary in Manaus, Brazil, both professors in our Seminary, are coming to the NINTH ANNUAL SPRING MISSIONARY CONFERENCE, Lexington, Kentucky, March 31, April 1 and 2, 1969, the Lord willing. John Hatcher thought that this would give the supporters of Baptist Faith Missions an eye and ear experience of the Brazilian preachers being turned out by our Preacher's School in Manaus, Brazil. The brethren are both pastors in Manaus as well as teachers. Julio Dantas is also Principal of the Baptist High School of the Americas. They will preach at the Conference and John Hatcher will stand beside them and interpret the messages from Portuguese into English. All will want to hear these Brazilian brethren preach. They will also be in a conference at Bible Baptist Church and Clarksville Baptist College, Clarksville, Tennessee for all in that area to come and attend, and in a Conference in Warren, Michigan for all in that area to come and attend. John Hatcher suggested that they come from Brazil and he offered to pay their way, but the brethren believe that many of the churches will want to have a special offering to help pay their plane trips. The cost for plane tickets and new suits, etc. for them will be about \$1,200.00. Mark your offering, "Brazilian Preachers Trip."

Special Needs Now

John Hatcher bought a new A.B. Dick Offset Printing Press, Folder, etc. before he came home on furlough so that he can print a Baptist Paper to mail to the churches in Brazil and tracts and papers in connection with the churches and schools. Brother Hatcher also plans to take back an Electric IBM Typewriter to set the type for the paper and special camera for pictures for the paper and other equipment needed. The A.B. Dick store turned him over to the man in charge of their printing and Bro Hatcher is working two days a week (without pay) to learn from start to finish: composing, Layout, Dark Room Work and also how to repair and make adjustments. This will be a big boost to our mission work in Brazil. This will cost a lot of money. Maybe the Lord will lay it on the heart of many pastors to lead their churches to have a part. Three Weeks With The Beans . . . Two Preachers Ordained . . . To Visit Work In Pesqueira And Rio

Dear Brethren,
Jan. 15, 1969
Since my last letter, another month has passed, and we have also entered into another year. Already half of the first month of this new year is gone. Truly, the years of a man's life on this earth come and go as fast as a weaver's shuttle. "O Lord help us to make every day, every thought, every action count for Thee!"

We spent 3 weeks with the Beans in Sao Luis, and though we spent more time than we had planned to spend, we thoroughly enjoyed our stay, and the Lord blessed us with many wonderful services and fellowship with the brethren of the churches there. When we arrived in Sao Luis Bro. and Mrs. Bean were both under the weather, but thank the Lord that they were both much better, when we left, and we trust that they are both in excellent health by now. We did not get to visit all of the places that we would have liked to visit, though we did visit some of Bro. Bean's new work, ordained 2 pastors, and preached many times, both in the interior and in town. There were professions of faith and additions for baptism in some of the services, for which we thank the Lord. Bro. Sostenes Melo also came from Peritoro to be with us and help in the ordination services. He spent a few days, and also preached in a number of services. I will let Bro. Bean fill in the details of the services and activities, while we were there.

We left Sao Luis on Monday, Jan. 6th, at about 2 p.m., for Recife, arriving there at about 5 p.m. There we spent the night, and the following day at 12:30 p.m., we caught a bus for Pesqueira, Pernambuco (Recife is the capital of this State), where we have work. This work I found very weak and in the hands of a Convention Baptist Church of another town near there. I might say just here that the work wasn't "stolen" by the convention church, but rather the believers in Pesqueira went to this church and asked them to take charge of the work there. Due to this fact, and due to the fact that they had a revival meeting planned for the following week, with prayer meetings every night the week that I arrived there, I only stayed 2 nights. The first night I went to the building where they meet and met some of the brethren. We talked about the work and the problems that they had encountered, and of their struggle to keep the work going, etc. On the 2nd night, Wed., we attended services with them. Dorothy and I sang and I preached. We enjoyed being with the people, and the place reminded me very much of a western town in the USA; complete with cattle, cowboys, prairies, mountains, dust, and cactus. The problem with the work there was that they were organized into a church and called one of our native preachers as pastor, with the promise from him that he

would go back to Manaus and get his family and move back to Pesqueira to work with them as their pastor. He returned to Manaus, but there he ruined himself with women and had to leave our Mission. The church in Pesqueira waited, wrote letters, and waited some more. For 3 years they waited, without so much as an answer to their letters or an explanation as to what happened to their pastor. They finally lost hope and patience and asked the convention church to take over their work. They are now a mission out of that church. They are still willing to come back to our Mission, if someone from our Mission will come there to be their pastor. The field is wide open and ripe for harvest. Pray that the Lord of the harvest will send the laborers.

We left Pesqueira at 6 a.m. Thursday the 9th, and returned to Recife, where we caught a plane the same afternoon for Rio de Janeiro. We have been to look over the locations of the new work of Bro. Newton. He has worked hard, but with very little visible results, as of yet. Bro. Santiago has been helping him. We will return to Manaus soon, and Bro. Santiago will be going back with us. I will close this letter now and write a more detailed report about the work here in Rio and what we accomplished while here in my letter next month. The Lord bless you all richly is our prayer. We are so thankful for you all and your sacrificial giving that makes our work here possible. We would like to especially thank the Mission and all of our brethren for making possible these trips to visit our other work here in Brasil. May God be glorified in it all.

Cade told him I was there he asked him to bring me to his church at Hurricane, W. Va., so instead of me getting to sit in on some classes I showed the slides of the mission work to the church. I spent the week-end with Bro. Ray Wood and the Lilly Valley Missionary Baptist Church in Rainell, W. Va. On Monday after spending Sunday Sunday night with Deacon Clyde Trincer I went to Rupert, W. Va. where I spent one night with Bro. Ernest Martin and the Rupert Missionary Baptist Church. On Tuesday I returned to Edmond, W. Va. to be with the Beauty Mt. Baptist Church. I did not get to meet their pastor Bro. John Smith who had to work that night.

On Wednesday I traveled to Island City, Ky. to be with the Missionary Baptist named after that city. Bro. Ruel Conner is the pastor there.

I returned home on Thursday and will be leaving again Saturday. The fellowship has been great.

We wish to greet you in the name of our Lord, and share some of our blessings as well as trials, with you, this month.

Ada will write this for me upon arriving home, because I am in the hospital. I hoped to be home sooner but due to infection, I am having to stay a few more days. I am dictating this to her so she can get it in the mail, and to you on time. I entered the hospital last Sunday afternoon and was operated on Monday afternoon. I have been suffering with my appendix for two months, constantly, so finally had to have them out. I'm feeling fine and hope to be home soon. The work is progressing real well. The second floor of the school addition is almost completed. The roof is on. The walls are up and plastered inside. Now to plaster outside and pour the floor and we should be done in two weeks. Our church

attendance here is staying the same, and we have had two women saved since last writing. Don Lucho Rucova reports that the services at San Francisco are well attended and several new ones coming from across and down the river. Pray for us brethren, as we enter this meeting, that the Lord will bless and give us souls, and that I will be able to have the strength to do the visiting that needs to be done.

We leave you with the thought of Romans 8:28 as it has been with me very much this week, and hope to be able to write more in detail next month.

Report From All The Churches . . . Native Workers At It . . . Four Baptized . . . Two Bible Schools

Dear Brethren,
Bro. Purificacion Taricuarima has resigned as pastor of The Second Church to work as a missionary of The First Church and is now gone to the Napo River for a month to see and plan for a place to live and work out from there. We hope the Lord will lead and use him greatly. The Second Church immediately called Bro. Jorge Macahuachi to be their new pastor and he accepted and is already living on the church property in a house that he and Bro. Garcia and I built. We are sure this will help the work to have the pastor right on the field and even the same lot.

Bro. Jorge Ayanbo has accepted the call of the Hojeal Church and perhaps will be called also to the Astoria Church as Bro. Macahuachi was pastor of the two. Bro. Ayanbo is there now for a few days and then will also return to live and pastor as the other Jorge did. Bro. Marcial, pastor of Tamshiyacu (the church that Bro. Ayanbo is from) is accompanying him on this trip. It is looking more every day that God could do great things with our work here if our brethren keep at it. I think that is my biggest job (and I think the most important) here, and if I am successful in this I will feel that I have accomplished a lot. In Mapa Cocha there are 2 to be baptized and also two were saved in a place up the Nanay River from Mapa where Abram Gaima, the pastor, preaches monthly. The place is called Nini-Rumi (some Indian name for small turn) and these two desire to be baptized. Bro. Enriquez at San Antonio reports 3 saved, one in San Antonio and two in a place he preaches called Catalan. This place is up a small creek across the Amazon River from San Antonio. He has been preach-

ing there for about 8 months now. Bro. Marcial Macahuachi is to go up the Maranon River to the place I spoke of several times where they have services without a pastor and have collected almost \$50.00 now to help pay on pastors salary if and when they can find one. Bro. Marcial hopes to be with them for about two weeks and teach them some and hope that we can from here send a pastor for them. Pray with us about this. It sure would be wonderful to have a church up there on that river, don't you think?

We have just finished two weeks of Bible school, one in the First Church and one in the Third Mission. Average attendance was 67 in the First Church and 74 in the Mission. I hope we did some good in these two weeks. At least we were busy before and through the 2 weeks. Our Third Mission is going real well and had 2 more saved and I baptized four Wednesday Jan. 15. I think now we have 15 baptized in all in this work and we hope to have them as a church soon, the Lord willing. This work is only about 6 months old. My wife again had to drop her school with the children to help these two weeks of Bible school. It gets her all off schedule and makes the job of teaching in the home even more difficult. I agree with Bro. Bean, when you get, the mother, wife, school teacher, cook, home manager, etc. out of action you might as well quit. When my wife is sick we are all sick in many ways. Barbara, our second daughter is such a help to us here also and she is missed also when out of action. She plays in all the places we preach, sings very well and teaches the children in our Sunday schools and Bible schools, etc. and she still has her schooling to do by correspondence. Praise God for a family like I have. I always promise not to say too much, then I go and do it over again. May the Lord really bless you all.

These days since our return from Manacapuru on the 2nd of December have been spent here in Manaus working with the 14th of December Baptist Church. The assistant pastor of the church, Elizario Candido da Silva spent from the 31st of December until the 16th of January with the Monte Verde Baptist Church near Boca do Acre, Amazonas.

The Sunday School attendance was up to 153 the last Sunday of December but down to 110 the first Sunday of 1969. Yesterday was "The day of the Members." This is an annual event when the church roll is called at both services. The Lord blessed with 171 in Sunday School and 1 received under watchcare and 1 profession of faith at the conclusion of the Morning Worship hour. The Sunday night attendance has run from 103

to 136.

On December 27th Hattie Marie and I celebrated our 14th Wedding Anniversary. On December 31st the church held a watch night service from 7:30 p.m. to 12:00 midnight. Over 100 people were present to welcome the new year.

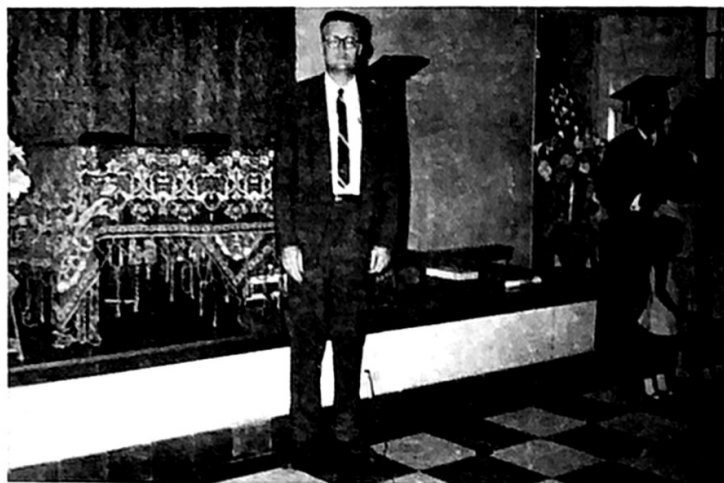
On Thursday night, January 2nd I preached at the Avenida Martins Mission. The mission was celebrating its 2nd anniversary. Jose Araujo is the pastor.

On Friday night, January 3rd I preached at a home in a small community known as "Fazenda de Santo Antonio." We journeyed (a group from the 14th Church and a group from the Bairro Vermelho Church) about an hour in the launch. It was a rainy afternoon and evening. We had to wade in the water and mud to reach the house where we held the services. Only a few of the people who live in the community attended but we had a good service. During these days we have done more sowing than reaping. However we can report 5 professions of faith and 3 received under the watchcare of the church. Three of the professions were made at the hospital that we visit once a month.
