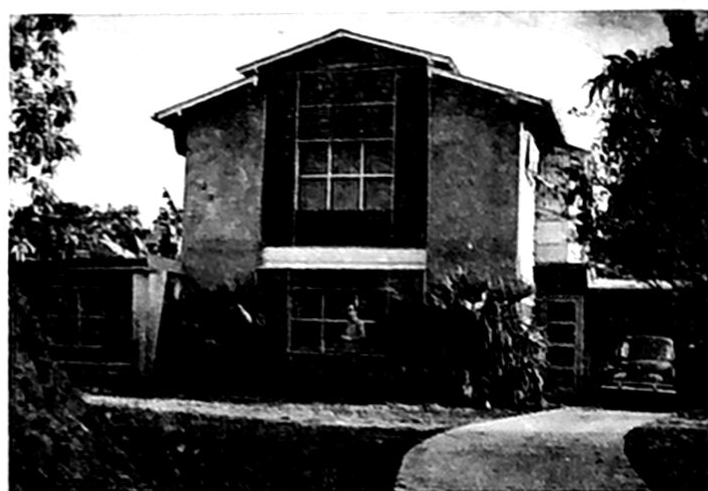

Report On Thanksgiving Conference

The Fifteenth Annual Thanksgiving Conference as usual was well attended and another good one. The Special Thanksgiving Offerings were \$32,093.35, the largest of any Thanksgiving Offering thus far. The total offerings for the month of November were \$41,355.49, the largest for any month in the history of Baptist Faith Missions. We thank God, give Him all the glory, and we take courage. The two churches that put on the conference took the lead in offerings; Grace Baptist giving \$11,645.30 and Twelve-Ryan Baptist giving \$7,431.58. This is the largest Special Thanksgiving Offering ever for these two churches and does not include their regular offering for the month. Now is the time to begin to plan for your Thanksgiving offering for next year. We are hoping that the total for November 1970 will reach \$50,000.00.

Arrive In Iquitos Peru Nov., 22, 1969 . . . Things Through Customs . . . On To Lima For Language School

Dear Brethren,
Greetings to all our friends in the Lord. We left Detroit Metropolitan Airport at 10:00 a.m. on November 17, 1969 on our journey to Peru, S.A. with many of our friends there to say goodbye. We arrived in Miami two hours and 30 minutes later. In Miami we found all our shipment in good order and had them delivered to COPICA Airlines. However, we were promised each day that we would be able to leave, but were delayed until Thursday night at 11:00 p.m. Five hours later we were in Panama but again we had a delay of 30 hours. The airlines took us to a beautiful hotel where we had a good rest and very good food. We were worried for awhile as the Panamanian Customs Officials had taken our passports and we had no one to speak for us. We finally continued

our journey at 10:00 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 22 arriving in Iquitos, Peru at 2:00 p.m. We were so late in arriving that the Lauermans were not expecting us. After we checked through customs, without too much trouble, my wife took a taxi to the Lauermans, while I stayed with the balance of our luggage. The Immigration Officer took our passports because we did not have a visitor's permit, even though we have a visa which is good for one year. Today we cleared all our things through Customs and were not charged much for what we brought. We also got the necessary forms completed and now have our passports back in our possession. Now we are waiting to fly to Lima where we hope to enroll in school by Monday. We want to thank the Directors of Baptist Faith Missions and also all the churches that have made it possible for us to come here to work. Pray for us as we begin to learn the language.

Work Of The Church

This month there have been four professions of faith in connection with the work of our church. One girl made a profession of faith in the church service one man made a profession of faith in the hospital and one man made a profession of faith in an open air

The Tabernacle Baptist Church also started a new mission point this month and it is being pastored by one of the preachers in our church. This mission is in a new area made up principally of families in the lower bracket of earning but the prospects for teaching many many people are good. The church has brought a house frame which is ready for putting on the palm leaf roof. The members of the church seemed to really be interested in the new work and were ready to take up special offerings to help buy the place. The services now are being held in houses where the preacher is invited but the meeting house should be ready (that is, have a roof on and the ground cleared off) within a week or so.

Grade School Graduation

Last Friday afternoon the grade school graduates received their diplomas and among them was our daughter Kathy. There were about 30 who finished but none were more proud than our Kathy.

Extra Special Needs

Houses For Bobby Creiglow And John Hatcher

The two churches putting on the Thanksgiving Conference had already given \$1,000.00 each towards buying the Hatcher house. These two churches have now given 1,000.00 each towards buying the Creiglow house and Twelve-Ryan Baptist gave an extra \$1,000.00 towards buying the Hatcher house also. As of now we have \$10,965.97 towards the Hatcher house and need \$5,004.03 more. We have \$4,170.50 towards the Creiglow house and need \$1,029.50 more. Are there other pastors who will lead their churches to give a special offering towards buying these houses? The need is urgent and now. Is there some one person who will give all the balance needed, or a large part of it? When these two houses are bought they will make a total of six houses owned by Baptist Faith Missions on the mission field and the missionaries will live in them, rent free, beginning January 1970, the same as a pastor lives in a parsonage here rent free. Doesn't your heart yearn to give? The Lord willing, after these two houses are bought we will run a picture of all six of the houses and tell who lives in them.

Household Needs For Missionaries

From time to time when missionaries are home on furlough we try to buy them some household things they need on the Mission field. These are personal gifts to the missionaries. Refrigerator, washer, etc. were bought for the Hatchers and Creiglows when they returned to the field in July. They have these things now and are using them. These household things for these two families, cost \$1,271.65 and we still need a total of \$403.41 towards them. From time to time some ask about a special need they can give to. Well, here it is. Mark your special offering "Hatcher-Creiglow Household Things." At the Thanksgiving conference we raised \$513.76 towards refrigerator, washer and dryer for the Mayfields. This is the first time we have bought anything for the Mayfields and we estimate that we need about \$300.00 more. Mark your special offering "Mayfield Household things".

Debutation Work For Regular Offerings . . . Begging In Jesus' Name

The James Kissels arrived in Iquitos, Peru on Saturday, November 22, 1969. They went out on faith. They did not visit churches to raise their salary and expenses, and live a year or more on mission offerings while doing debutation work. Instead, they went on salary one month before leaving for Peru. They have no promise from any church to support them and neither do the other missionaries of Baptist Faith Missions. On Monday November 24, 1969, the day the Thanksgiving Conference started, Baptist Faith Missions had on hand in the regular fund about \$1,500.00, or about one fifth enough for an average month for salaries and expenses. Baptist Faith Missions has applications of those who say they are called to Brazil and Peru, now for some "debutation work" by Baptist Faith Missions. We pray, we beseech you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, we beg in Jesus' name that all pastors will lead their churches to increase their monthly offerings to Baptist Faith Missions. We need \$3,000.00 a month extra over and above what we are now receiving on the average, in order to send out and support several other missionaries. Remember that all offerings are used 100% for mission work. None of the Directors of Baptist Faith Missions get one cent out of mission offerings. Our labors are labors of love for this work. This is a faith work and requires a lot of faith and a lot of prayer, and we make no claim as being strong on either. Great is our God. Now, Brother Pastors, and churches, will you join us in increasing your monthly mission offerings to Baptist Faith Missions? This is our "Debutation Work" for this issue.

the work for the new school year, see that the buildings etc. are kept in repair, see that all the money is dispersed properly as well as teach and a thousand other things is not going to have a lot of time for printing. However, we do get a Sunday School lesson out each week and usually a small church paper out every two weeks which some of the members distribute from house to house (usually about 500 per week). We are getting the equipment under control and besides the church work we printed a tract on tithing for one of the pastor's. David and I also printed the invitations for the high school graduating

Another news letter. Five have made professions of faith in almost 6 months in the Fourth Mission but none are too faithful and not one has shown desire to be baptized. Pray for this work. We need a worker here as I just cannot get it all done as it should be, since it is a new work. I painted the building this month and it is nice. At my last writing we were in middle of the revival at the Third Church. We had a good time there but no moves and not too good attendance outside of the members. The Mission runs about 50 in S.S. Also, last Friday we all met and ordained Bro. Daniel Garcia to the Ministry. He is pastor of the Third Church. Bro. Jorge Macahuachi has resigned as pastor of the Second Church to go and work on the Marañon River where Bro. Marcial has a work that we talked about in the last letter. We hope Jorge does a good job up there and he hopes to start several other works up there. Pray for him and also the Second Church as it seeks to call a new pastor. It seems like there is always something to keep one wondering and busy and the devil tries to get in when a pastor is sick or resigns, etc. Jorge Ayanbo, pastor at Hojeal and Astoria will have to resign as it looks like he is home now (his native home) in Tamshiyacu to either live or die as he puts it and leave it up to the Lord. He has cirrhosis of the liver and as you know, it will be fatal. Now to help these churches again to call a pastor. Both are having services on Sunday and our new preacher,

Julio Arevalo that I spoke of last month goes during the week to lead them, etc. So down there it does not look too bad at this time. It is just that the devil is waiting for every little change to step in and take over. But God is still the Supreme, so why worry. It is in the end HIS work. Also, the other groups that take the name Baptist have the big programs, such as mixed swimming for the young folks, basketball, football, eating feasts and what have you to make all worse. I am still bound and determined MORE than ever to leave ALL other things out and stick with the word and the word alone. It is not that I am getting too old to make a change, as some say, but I am getting too old to be that dumb. In the First Church we have had 3 saved this month and one coming for reinstatement. Also, our attendance is up to the seventy mark again. So where one place gets down it seems God has the other ready for blessings. Because of the demand for it (we have 12 preachers in our churches) I am starting preachers' classes. I had told Bro. Overbey that this was my main aim after furlough for over a year now but I thought with these preachers all young and needing teaching, why wait. The Lord may come before I go home next year. We are awaiting the arrival of the Kissels, which is only two days off at this writing. Pray for them in the Spanish and all the rest that goes with being a missionary, which is more than one can think of at times. May the Lord bless you all for His glory and use you accordingly.

Manaus, Amazonas
November 11, 1969

Tomorrow I must travel. I don't know yet whether I'll go to Manacapuru by boat or in the jeep. If I can rent a boat to take the jeep-to-the-Manaus-Manacapuru Road (about an hour's journey, crossing the river) I've about decided to go in the jeep. By the highway it's only about a five hour trip. By boat with the river low as it is at this time of year it would be about 12 hours. As always there are so many last minute things to do-one is to write the Mission Sheet Letter for this month as I'm afraid that if I wait till I return on the 24th of this month it might not reach the States in time to be published. This p.m. we had a shower, the first rain this month. It has been quite hot and dry. The rainy season hasn't set in yet.

Only three Sundays have passed since the date of the writing of the last Mission Sheet Letter. These three Sundays the Sunday School attendance has been unusually high-

179, Oct. 26th- 182, Nov. 2, and 174 Nov. 9th. The attendance at night has been around 150. We have had professions of faith and or other moves at most of the services these three Sundays. We've held several open-air services in various places in the city, including services in the two city cemeteries on "the day of the dead" on November 2nd.

We've made several visits in the homes of the members and others. Last Sunday afternoon we held a short service in a home of a very poor couple (for several years they made their living by begging on the street). The man is blind and his wife can no longer speak above a whisper because of cancer of the tongue. We took a doctor to see her the other day. He prescribed a medicine that he said would at least relieve the pain. The church bought the medicine for her and one of our members, a widow who lives neighbor to the couple, is giving it to her three times a day. At the close of the service they both indicated that they were receiving Christ as Saviour.

We pray the Lord's blessings to be upon you.

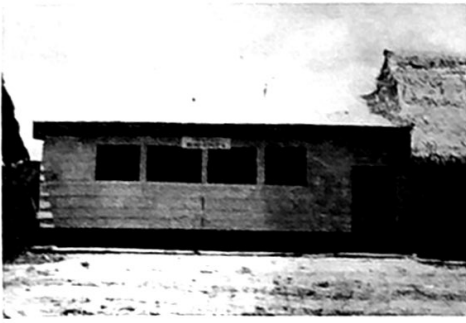
Aracagi

Enos Ibernnon Back To Manaus . . . He Did A Good Job In Cruzeiro do Sul . . . Mission Trips By Walking . . . Trip To Barra Do Jardim . . . Thanks For Refrigerator

Cruzeiro do Sul, Acre
November 13, 1969
Dear Brethren,
Bro. Enos, the pastor of the church here in Cruzeiro do Sul has become ill and has returned to Manaus to get treatment. He will stay there to finish his studies and to also teach in the primary school. During the time he was here the Lord raised up several young preachers in the church and they are at the present taking care of the services, with one of them being chosen of the church to be in charge of the work. Bro. Enos will remain their pastor at least until March during which time the church will continue to pay him.

One of the young men of the church here in Cruzeiro do Sul has felt led of the Lord to open a work in a place called Sao Francisco about two and one half hours from Cruzeiro do Sul. I have gone several times with him this month. There is a small stream that can be traveled, but when the path is dry it is much better to walk than it is to go by water. This brother with whom I have been going has only one arm, therefore I carry our pack. In planning one of these trips we decided to go on from there to Colonia Rodrigues Alves, which sits on the banks of the Juraua River, so we asked one of the other brethren to go there by canoe to bring us back. We left on Saturday, arriving at our first stop early and had services that night and the next morning, and then walking four more hours on to Colonia. When we got near Colonia we started visiting each house preaching and inviting to services that night. That night we had about one hundred lost people in our services and on the entire trip I guess we must have preached to more than two hundred lost. We had one saved the first night. The priests that seldom go to Sao Francisco upon hearing that we were going there also made a trip and so the next trip was made under threat of being beaten. The devil also works many times in ways that we know not. This time we had the best attendance ever, but instead of the devil sending violent men to break up the service he sent a drunk and just at the close of the service he caused so much confusion that it did break up the service.

I also made a trip to another preaching point of the church here, but the services were not very well attended although there have been several professions of faith in this place. This trip also was made by land, but this time we went by car.

Taking another brother with me this time going to Barra do Jardim, we left Cruzeiro do Sul 3:30 in the morning, going up the Juraua for what we thought would be a nine hour trip. We left early thinking we would get there before the afternoon sun, but after taking the hot sun for most of the day we got some relief by a cold rain and we got there at four-thirty in the afternoon. We spent several days with the brethren there having services every night. There have been four saved there

during the year we were in the States and I think I will baptize them on the next trip. The church there is in about as good a shape as we expected. The brother that I took with me enjoyed the trip very much and said that he would like to spend his life traveling the Juraua preaching the gospel, but the Army will get him in January, for at least a year and a half. He enjoyed the trip enough that he and the other brother with which I have been traveling and leaving next week going there and then on to Campo do Santana.

Some of the brethren from the church at Maita left Monday going up the Juraua also going to Campo do Santana. I am anxious to get their report of the trip.

Since my last Mission Sheet letter our refrigerator has come and it is a good one and we would like to take this opportunity to thank each one that has had a part in helping buy this for us.

The twins have been sick this past week, but are better now.

May the Lord bless each one of you for His Glory.
