Over The High Andes Mountains To Rent A House And Hall To Start Mission Work In Huanuco . . . Trip Over Mountains Never To Be Forgotten

Dear Brethren,
Greetings in Jesus' name. From March 15-27th we were blessed to have Paul and Ann Mullings with us in our home. These were busy days going to school and preparing messages in Spanish. Paul preached for the church here in Lima, Sun., March 21st in the morning service and myself in the evening service. I also preached for them Sun., April 4th.

Since I came to the decision that it would be pleasing to the Lord for us to begin a work in the city of Huanuco, pronounced "wan-oo-koe" on Wed. April 7th, Bro. Crain and I started up over the Andes in my old clunker (a '62 Olds compact). We busted a whole in the gas tank twice going over, but thanks to His Grace we arrived in Huanuco about 1:00 p.m. Thursday.

While there, the Lord blessed us with a house to rent and also a place to start meetings. The house is nice, and the meeting place is a large hall that already has a piano and chairs to seat about 300 people. Lord willing, by the time you read this letter we will have been moved and settled in our new house. Please note the new address.

Our trip back to Lima was a very trying experience, and except the Lord provided us helpers on the way we would never have

made it back. The roads are bad this time of year, as there has been much rain. At one point our car stalled and left us with water coming in the doors and through the floor. Later the fuel pump quit and left us stranded. Further up the road a wrong turn led us into a heathen Indian fiesta, which resembled Hell more than anything I had ever seen before. Some of them desired to keep us there and have some "fun", but again we were delivered by His Grace as a policeman happened to be on the scene. An hour further up the road in snow and rain, a rock pierced our transmission pan and left us stranded again. After obtaining oil in a nearby village we started off again, this time to be stopped by our own tiredness resulting from the altitude. After great difficulty we made it down the road to help at a roadside restaurant and from there to a hospital.

After breathing pure oxygen for over an hour our senses returned to normal. We then made our way down the mountain to Lima. We arrived home physically spent and armed with much more patience than previously.

By the Grace of the Lord we will cross the mighty Andes once more to begin a work for our Lord in the "jewel of the Andes", the beautiful city of Huanuco.

Pray that the Lord will Bless our ministry there.

Dear Brethren,
We have enjoyed an increase in our attendance in our mission here in Olho Dagua in all our services, for which we thank the Lord. In the past month, in all our services, the Lord has blessed us with 7 professions of faith, 7 additions for baptism, 3 baptized and one who was backslidden and out in sin, repented and came back to the Lord and the church.

We also had our services at Arassagir this past month, as well as in the home of a man and his wife who were saved here in the mission, then moved into the interior. We also have services every Thursday night here in Olho Dagua in the home of a woman who made a profession of faith under Bro. Bean's ministry, and has been bedfast for a number of years.

In all this past month we have had 26 preaching services, 2 baptismal services, and I taught 21 Bible classes in our Bible Institute. We were deeply shocked and saddened by the death of one of our new members of our mission here. He was a young man 18 years old. He had just recently been saved and baptized and was real faithful and was showing much interest and growth in the Lord. But the Lord for some reason saw fit to call him home to heaven. He was killed instantly by a drunken driver almost



directly in front of our house. We miss him very much, but we rejoice to know that he is with Christ, where we shall soon be also. Praise His Holy name!

Due to the fact that my car was in the garage, our song leader and I made a trip to Raposa on horseback (round trip about 25 miles). As we had marked a service there and had no way of letting them know that we could not be there. Neither time nor space will permit me to go into detail about the trip. I will say that I was riding "tall in the saddle" 'till the blisters "busted". Since then I have been walking and sitting mighty easy. This week Bro. Bean made a trip on a railroad hand-car, but that is another story, and I will let him tell that one. May God bless you all. Please continue to pray for us.

After reviewing the events of the days that have passed since the writing of the last M.S. letter I decided that an appropriate title of this letter would be "The Falls." After reading it, I'm sure you will agree. I hasten to add, however, that all is not sad news about "falls" or deaths even though I'm compelled to mention some sad events.

Our Sunday School attendance on March 14th fell from 177 to 90. It rained! However, that night we had a large crowd and I baptized 7, 1 was received by statement and there were 4 professions of faith.

On Sunday the 21st it rained again! We had 95 in Sunday School. Sunday the 28th was another rainy Sunday! On Sunday night, March 28th after the service at Costa de Sao Jose de Amatori in the interior, I was going down the steps of the bank to go to the launch. I was holding Joel (my youngest son) by the hand. I slipped and fell on one of the slick top steps and fell and rolled on down the steps falling over the side. I broke my glasses. No bones broken, only bruises. I was able to arise. The Lord gave us a good trip.

Rio Preto, 1 preaching service, 20 present, 4 professions.

Costa de Sao Jose de Amatori, wedding performed, 60 present.

Costa de Sao Jose de Amatori, 2 preaching services, 24 & 24 present, 1 profession.

Lago de Jaruari, 1 preaching service, 20 present, 8 professions & 1 rededication.

Nova Remanso, 1 preaching ser., 19 present.

Just as soon as I arrived home I learned and soon saw for myself that the largest tree in our yard had fallen soon after a storm two days before and completely wrecked the garage. The jeep wasn't in the garage at the time. If it had been, it would have been completely wrecked.

Yesterday our S.S. attendance was back to normal with 170 present.

Just as soon as I finish this letter I must go to a home to conduct the funeral of a married man-father of 5 children who died suddenly early this morning. He is the brother of one of the members of our church. His sister-the member lost a son by death in Rio de Janeiro only last month. Earlier this month I conducted the funeral of a three month old boy-son of one of the members.

I have some more red tape to get straight for the lot and building, and it seems that no one is interested in helping anyone except someone they know. I asked for permission to see the mayor and finally got one part of it resolved, but still have some more to do yet. The new church building for the New Hope Baptist Church has the bricks up to the height to set the roof truss on. The lumber is on the job to build the truss and I hope by this time next month that the roof will be on. The rains have hindered some on the building but not so much, as most of the hard rains come at night and makes it good for sleeping. I have been and now I

am being bothered with a kidney infection or kidney stone. They have not decided yet as to what it is.

The work of the church goes good. Our Sunday school is growing and we need more class space. Two classes need dividing now, but we will have to wait until we are in our new building. The Preachers School is going great, Bro. Dempsey is using the tape recorder to help the boys with their reading and with message preparation and delivery. They are growing in grace and Bro. Dempsey and I are really bearing down on the doctrines of grace in our teachings both at church and at The Preachers School. We have had five people from one family saved and two of them have asked for baptism. I believe this is growth when the church can and does win families to the Lord. We are busy in tract distribution and since last Oct. have passed out 30,000 tracts. This week the church received from the saints at Bluff Ave. Baptist Church, Indianapolis, Ind. Bro. Claude King pastor, 4,000 tracts.

Dear Brethren, Last month we had just begun a meeting in the First Church with the pastor from Lima. We had a good meeting with nine being saved and several getting right with the Lord. I baptized three into the First Church and several for the Second Church. I believe all the churches here were revived.

The pastor from Ojeal reports five saved this month in a village called Santa Clara where he has services once a week. The pastor of the Third Church reports two saved there and also three saved where he preaches on the River Itaya, also two baptized.

I visit a place called Santa Rita each Monday and Tuesday, we have had 35 professions of faith in this place in a little over a month. Last week five men were saved, but many cannot be baptized because they are not married according to law. This is very hard for many as they do not have the money to get married. We plan to try and

help some as we can. I baptized four in this place last week.

This is the time of the year when we have a lot of rain and the rivers are really high. We were told that last year was the highest for many years, but it is higher as of now and may get higher. Last week the paper said the river had risen 89 feet. This means that once again almost all of the crops are destroyed. There are many people without homes or food. It is very hard to buy any food now. About all they have in the market is rice and potatoes, but we are told that they plan to fly some things in.

My wife has been sick for a couple of days having been bitten by some insect while sleeping. This is the second time this has happened. We believe it may be a spider. It causes an infection in her hand and her entire body aches. She has chills and fever at the same time. We thank the Lord that we have had very little sickness thus far. We pray that the Lord will bless each one who prays and supports the work here. Also, each one needs to pray that the Lord will continue to supply the needs for the Mission as it continues to grow.

I have a fellow making the new pews, and he said he'd have them done next week. The building looks real nice. It's all painted, and

the light fixtures went in today. I'd also like to say we thank each one that has had a part in our building. We also appreciate the Liberty Baptist Church and their offering to finish the rest of the building. When we say the rest we mean to continue the concrete roof all the way out to the street, and make the entrance from the front instead of the side. This will make our building so much better, and we're so grateful for your help and prayers in our behalf. It was good to see the Mullings again. They are real blessings to us here, and to the work. It's good to have them back with us. Pray that the Lord will bless in the finishing of the houseboat. We hope that you all will want to have a part in that great ministry on the River Ucayali. We started our school after a week's delay. I'm not sure of the exact number we have, but we have several more than last year. I had to have a divided service for them this morning, as our addition is not finished, and our building without the addition will not hold everyone. So from 8 am to 9 am we had a service for the 2nd, 3rd, 4th & 5th grades, and then afterwards had one for the Kindergarten and 1st grade. It was a joy to preach to them again, and tell them there is a Saviour who can save to the uttermost all that will come to Him. Back In Pucallpa, Peru . . . Found House In Good Shape . . . Getting Prices On Building Boat

Dear Brethren,

It was good to get here and see the Mayfields and the brethren of the church again. It also was good to find our house clean and in good shape when we arrived. The couple (members of the church) we left in it did a fine job. Truly the Lord is good to us.

Our baggage arrived here by truck just three days after we arrived here. It suffered a little from the trip, but nothing was missing. Thank God. The first thing we had to do is haul some water for our house. The generator that the New Hope Baptist Church, Mr. Morris, Mich. (Lee S. Hammel, pastor) gave us came in real handy. We also brought an electric pump with us which cost \$100.00 in the U.S. and would cost \$300.00 here. These were a real help to pump 14 barrels of water to an overhead tank. Sure beats climbing a

ladder with a bucket as my son and I have done. God's love manifested.

Since we arrived in Pucallpa, I have been trying to get some prices out of a couple of boat builders for the building of our boat. Up till now, I have been able to get only one. I asked this company to give me a price on a steel boat like the plans I have drawn & he did! So then we talked of a cheaper & easier way to build it. He assured me it would be a lot easier and use less metal. He sent me the price today. The easier to build boat cost \$800.00 more!-???. Aluminum cost less.

The other company is in the process of moving further out of town and is pretty busy. I'll just have to wait on them until they can give me a price on the boat. This is the same company I used before, but prices have changed some since then.

So far, we have not been able to buy a gas refrigerator like we had hoped. We have the money, but the company doesn't have any more refrigerators that work. One day, the Lord willing.

A Never To Be Forgotten Trip Over The Andes Mountains Two And A Half Miles High . . . Preaches In Spanish With Six Professions Of Faith

Dear Brethren,
This has been a month that I shall never forget. Brother Gibbs asked me to go with him across the Andes to the city of Huanuco to rent a house. We left Lima Wednesday night about 9:00 p.m. In three hours we were high into the Andes and the car quit running so we thought we were out of gas but we had hit a rock and had a hole in the gas tank. Some men came along after a few hours and helped us repair it with a stick by driving the stick into the hole.

After this Brother Gibbs was driving and passed up the road that goes to Cerro De Pasco and at 5:00 a.m. we drove into the town of Tarma that has about 25,000 people, but does not have a Baptist Church. One and a half hours more we were back on the right road. The dust was so thick you could hardly see to drive. By this time Brother Gibbs was very sick from the high altitude and I was sick from the dust. About four hours later we had another hole in the gas

tank and we pinched the hole together with pliers and filled the hole with soap and we are on our way. We arrived in the city of Huanuco about noon. After renting a house for Brother Gibbs we began the long trip back home, leaving Huanuco at 6:00 p.m. Saturday.

About one hour out of Cerro De Pasco, the car stopped again and a doctor came by and offered me a ride back to the next town to get a mechanic. I waited two hours while he delivered a baby. We started back and had a flat tire with 7 men in a little Volvo car. We had no jack, so we all picked the car up by one corner and one of the men put the spare on.

Out of Cerro De Pasco we both were so sick from the high altitude we are delirious, talking and praying in Spanish and English. We were finally able to get help and get to a hospital for oxygen and medication. After about two hours we started again for Lima and Brother Gibbs slid into a bank, damaging the right fender and putting a knot on my head. Sunday evening we arrived back in Lima.

Sunday night April 18, I preached to a large crowd with 6 professions of faith. Pray for us.

April 16, 1971

Dear Brethren,
One Sunday night after I had preached here in Cruzeiro the Lord blessed with five professions. Bro. Jader and I went to Barra do Jardim and under my preaching on Saturday night there were two more professions. The next morning Bro. Jader preached and there was one more profession, and after the service by invitation of the church, he baptized five into the fellowship of that church. The Lord has blessed the work there this past year. There have been about thirty added to that church by baptism. There were about a hundred in each service while we were there.

With members of all eight of our churches present for the purpose of organizing a mission work among the churches, I was asked to bring a message. I started with the church that Jesus built showing how that church had a commission and then I followed that church through several count-

ries until it at last got to Barra do Jardim and then to the Acre, where it had stopped. I closed by asking them if God had cancelled the commission or if it was still in effect and showing them that it is still our responsibility here in the Acre to see that the Lord's work goes on and on until Jesus comes. We got our mission organized which is called, "The Directory of Missions of Cruzeiro." An offering was received from the fourteen brethren present, which amounted to a little over fifty dollars, and our first missionary selected, Jose Bandeira, to work up the Jurua. We have almost one hundred dollars a month promised from the churches and we trust there will be much more than this come in and that we will see these native brethren take hold and make the plan work through the Lord. This is their work and although it is small now there is no limit to what they can do in the Lord. The Lord started out with only twelve and look what He has done with them.

We are anxiously awaiting the arrival of Mike and Beverly.
