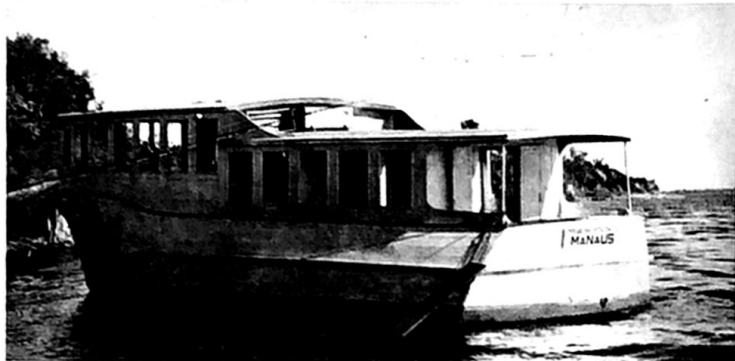

Dear Brethren,
By God's Grace and your support a dream has become a reality, and yet it seems like a nightmare. We left Lexington Thursday, August 21, at 8:10 a.m. and spent the night of the 20th in Tokyo, Japan. We arrived in Seoul, Korea noon the 21st. We were rushed through Customs and arrived in Pusan at 2:00 p.m.

We are presently with Bro. Mike Pepper and family. I was told of this Brother before I left the States and wrote him, so when I arrived in Pusan I had a Korean call and Bro. Pepper came and picked up this tired out crowd. Bro. Pepper and his family have been real nice to us, for which I am truly grateful.

Housing here in Korea is going to be a real problem and terribly expensive and since arriving and seeing what I am confronted with, I may go on to Seoul and take at least some of the language; there is no school here in Pusan. Pray with us about this matter. Brother Pepper is checking into a situation where one of their B.B.F. Missionaries is home and has a house in Seoul if we decide to go. If I do go to language school I hope to do some preaching even during that period of time perhaps by an interpreter. Pusan has a population of about two million people and Seoul with some 5.5 million. The opportunity looks tremendous here. We attended services

today with the Pepper's. Bro. Larry Cayle was starting a series of meetings in the church. How strange to hear the song services, etc. and still haven't heard a thing. Perhaps I shall have something to write about next month because right now I don't know whether I'm coming or going.

Thanks so much to the churches and individuals who have had a part in getting us here and who will have a part in our regular support. I, by God's Grace, shall do my best to be a missionary who you are pleased to help support.

Manaus, Amazonas
August 23, 1971
"Have pity upon me, have pity upon me,
O ye my friends; for the hand of God hath
touched me." Job 19:21.

On Thursday August 5th at 5:30 p.m. Stephen, Joel and I said good by to Mrs. Bratcher and Asa Mark and the Turners. "We'll be back sometime Tuesday, the 17th, the Lord willing," we told them as we left. The five of us (the pilot and another brother who did the cooking) arrived at Rio Urubu at our mission there on Friday afternoon August 6th at 5:30 p.m. The ten day revival there was blessed of God in every way.

On Tuesday morning, August 17th we began what we thought would be the last day of our trip back to Manaus but the Lord did not permit it thus. At around 10:00 a.m. somehow, somehow, unseen by anyone, Joel fell overboard. His body was not found until 10:00 a.m. Thursday August 19th. We

buried him in Manaus the same day. The Lord gave me the strength to bring the message at the funeral held at the church.

Many in Manaus have made us their debtors during this experience. Bro. Hatcher with 7 others arrived in the launch of another missionary on Wednesday night. Another missionary on Thursday morning just before the body was found arrived in his small amphibian airplane. He flew two of us back to Manaus with the body. We know that many of you have and will pray for us. We need them!

I translate from the church bulletin of yesterday:

"In Memory"

Joel Harold Bratcher was born on March 3, 1965. He died on August 17, 1971. He was the third and youngest son of Pastor Harold Bratcher and Mrs. Marie Moore Bratcher. He was born in Manaus and spent the most part of his short life here in Brazil. He was an enrolled pupil of the Sunday Bible School of the 14th of December Baptist Church.

We have joined the 14th of December Baptist Church. This church is the one pastored by Missionary Harold Bratcher. We hope to be a blessing to him and his church by God's help.

The attendance in this church is good. People come walking, riding motorbikes or by taxi. Only one member owns a car, besides Brother Bratcher having the mission's jeep. Yet having no transportation doesn't stop

these people from coming to the House of God. I wonder how many would make it to our churches in the States, on Sunday if they had no transportation.

Even though Manaus is a city of two hundred thousand people, the people raise chickens as if they lived in the country. About 6 o'clock every morning Brother Sidney Fisher's "Famous Rooster" wakes us up crowing as loudly as he can.

Dear Brethren,

As I reported last month, we organized the Faith Baptist Church in Olho Dagua, with 36 members. Since then, the church having called me as their pastor, I have had the privilege of baptizing 7 more into the fellowship of our church. We have had good services during the month, though when we returned to Arassagir to begin our S.S. again, we were refused a house to have services in, and were told that they did not want services there anymore, though one little boy voted publicly that he wants services and others told us privately that they were still interested. I preached outside the house under a big tree, and then shook the dust off our feet as a witness against them, and later the Lord gave us another place nearby to have services. Pray for us and the work here.

I helped Bro. Bean bury one of his older

members who was killed by a hit-and run driver one night as he was returning to his home from a service. At the cemetery, as I stepped up near the open grave, someone said "watch those bones!" When I looked down, there at my feet laid a small pile of bones, a skull and a wad of long hair, the remains of what was once the body of a woman. They had dug them up, when they opened the grave to bury the remains of our brother. When they started filling the grave, someone said, "Don't forget the bones!" A couple of the men picked them up and pitched them in on top of the coffin of the one being buried, and buried them both together. And so it goes, here in the land where so many things seem so strange and unreal, and so hard to accept.

Dorothy is sick with amoeba-known by many as, "lettuce bug"-and some type of parasite, and certain other complications. She is taking medicine and is up and going, though she doesn't feel too well. Pray for her. God bless you all, dear ones in Christ. May the Clarksville Conference be the greatest ever. We are praying for you.

Dear Brethren,

This has been a different kind of month. God has worked in His mysterious ways which are beyond our ability to understand and so we bow before His Providence and worship for He never fails. The death of Joel Bratcher came as a shock to us. We became aware more vividly of God's presence and the happening has caused a closer searching of hearts. But it is better to lose a son in the field of battle than on the beds of ease.

This month there was one profession of faith and one baptism in the Tabernacle Baptist Church. One of our High School girls made a profession of faith in the Peniel Baptist Church where Brother Julie Dantas is pastor. Our new roof is on the Tabernacle church building and we have a new electric installation, all of which has been paid for by the church. We have voted to build an addition on one of our Mission

buildings. Much of the interior has been covered with water during the high water season. In one of the churches only one family was able to stay in their house. The families move to villages or towns where they seek some kind of work until the water recedes, then they move back. Some however stay in the new places and other families rent or buy their places. The reason that people continue to live in the lowlands is because of the great fertility of the land, and also the nearness of the water for transportation.

There is one new student in our seminary this semester. The classes are going well. Our house has seemed a little empty since Lynn and John Mark returned to the States. It was sure good to have them with us. They were both a help in the Lord's work while here. John Mark preached many times and in several of the churches. Our church here voted to send them a love offering to show their appreciation for their work and their lives. It was a blessing to us to see the church do this. May the Lord bless each of you who labour with us in this ministry.

Dempsey has done a good work at Olho Dagua and I believe he will do greater there with the new church. July 25, the New Hope Church began using the new building for the first time. We had dedication services on Sunday afternoon with Bro. Dempsey preaching with the house just about full, many visitors came from some of the other

It would seem they found out that they would have to study if they were going to learn anything. One of the reasons for this is that their schools or I should say the students of the primary and high schools do not have enough interest to study to pass and it is not unusual to see a student 20 to 25 years old still in high school and many others that just drop out. In the first three weeks we have had about twenty come from time to time, but have from six to eight each night.

I made a trip to Maita this month and found the work there going about as usual

with about 80 to 100 in services. Since I was there I have heard that there have been three professions of faith; these were children of the members of the church there.

I also made one trip to Mourapiranga this month. This church still is having problems, but we trust the Lord will work them out in his own time and way.

Last week I went to Colonia where we are members and we had very good services. There were about fifty in the Sunday night services. There was one profession of faith and then after we had dismissed, there was another man that came to me and said that for some time now he has been trusting the Lord and that when I returned he wanted to be baptized. There are about ten there awaiting baptism.

Mike and Beverly have bought a new house that is not quite finished so we have been trying to get it ready for them to move in as soon as their things get here from Manaus.

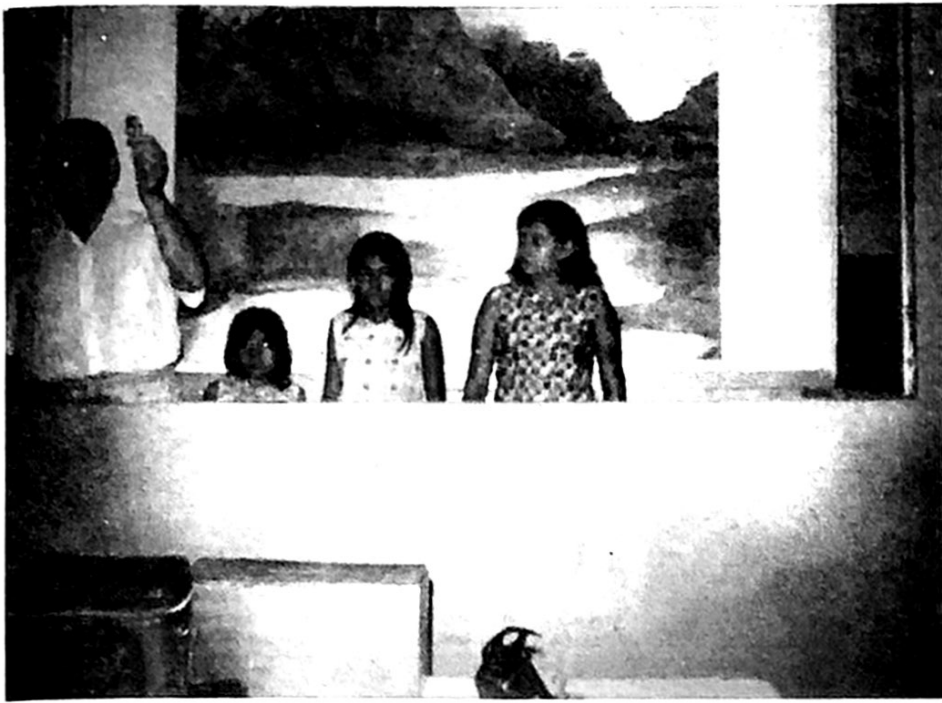
used Brother Lauerman to do a great work and Bro. Kissel has done real good in carrying it on.

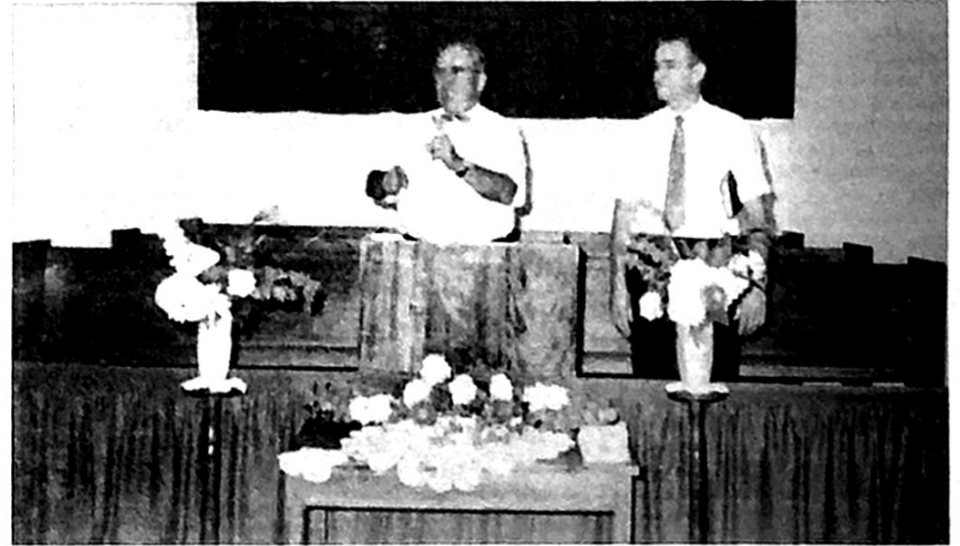

The meeting, to which I referred last month, has come to a close. There were over 100 persons attending each night in a church that averages only 30 at best on Sunday mornings. The interest was good indeed. My father and I have hopes that we will see this church continue to work with the other churches in this area.

After the meeting was over Dad and I went to Maita for five nights of classes. Dad taught lessons on sermon preparation and I taught five doctrines. The Church at Maita has great potential in that there are several men who are called to preach. The brethren there seemed to learn a great deal and really appreciate the short study.

The following week-end I conducted all

of the services at Faith Baptist Church here and just last Sunday. I was invited back to preach at First Baptist Church. I was also formally invited by the young people of Faith to teach music on Sunday evenings. The young people from the other churches were also invited to attend. The response has been very good. Our Bible classes also started on Monday night, August 2, with 13 students.

We have not received any of our personal things or equipment from Manaus (by boat). My father and I have been building my boat so that if and when the outboard engine arrives the boat will be almost ready. We want to have it ready for the rainy season at which time it will be possible for me to begin my travel on the rivers.
