The Preacher's School is still going great as the hope for Independent Work is to train your own preachers. We find sometimes that is a big job. One boy that studies with us can barely read and this will be a big handicap in his ministry if he does not overcome this. We have some younger ones studying who are also finishing high school

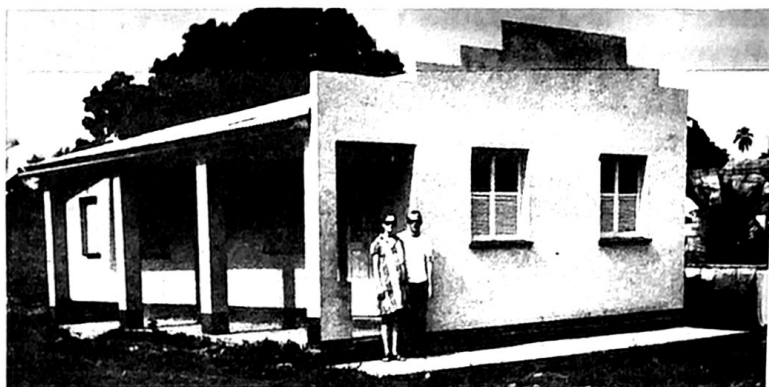

I was with the Church from Villa Maranhao for one service. They seem to be holding their own although I would like to see them more interested in starting other works. Mon. night I was with a brother from our church that has sold his house here in Sao Luis and has moved about 20 miles out in the country and has started a chicken farm. He also preaches and last night we had 36 in services with good attention shown. We may soon have a good strong mission here at this place.

Two have been baptized into the First Baptist Church, Iquitos. The attendance was 74 one Sunday. Several native preachers made a trip on a boat for several days to visit the new church that was organized in May last year at Maipuco, Peru on the Marañon River. There were about 38 professions of faith and seven baptized. The preachers returned fired up ready to go again. The head man of this town did not want the church there and had the pastor arrested and put in jail. The head man was fired from his job. Later he got saved and was baptized and is now a member of the church that he once despised and persecuted.

Korea Like A Different World . . . Started To Language School . . . Preaching Through An Interpreter

Dear Brethren,
We have now been in Korea almost a month, and it is as if we were living in an entirely different world.

I had not planned to go to Language School, but here it is almost a must. The only Language Schools are in Seoul, so we were able to locate a house in Seoul and I started to Language School Monday Sept. 13th. Pam and I spend over two hours daily on a crowded city bus and about an hour walking to and from school.

I am having some tracts translated and printed, besides some that I was able to get here that were seemingly good on Salvation. We have passed out hundreds of tracts. The children just love to pass them out.

I preached in a Korean Baptist Church last Wednesday night with one young man responding, I think, for salvation. One of the men of the church dealt with him. I am also scheduled to preach at the same church again next Sunday evening. The Korean Pastor does the interpreting for me. Most missionaries over here have to use an interpreter. Some have been here 10 to 15 years and still use an interpreter most of the time. One missionary has started back to language school this year after having been here over 10 years.

I have been looking, praying, and have talked to about three different men about interpreting for me. This is a must, so pray with me about it. With Seoul growing at a 37,000 increase monthly, the field is wide open, but building and property are extremely expensive. You know people increase in number but not property.

Our sympathy goes out to Bro. Bratcher and his family. May the Spirit of God be near them in this sad and dark hour.

Six Baptized . . . Mission Outgrown Building . . . Eight Years To Legalize Lots . . . Greatest Need Is Native Preachers

It is a joy to write you once more from Brazil and give you a little news about the work. This has been a real blessed month. There have been about six baptized into the fellowship of the Tabernacle Baptist Church, some from our services and some from the work of the mission at Compensa. That mission has outgrown their building and our church voted to enlarge but the area where the building is in legal dispute and no one is allowed to build now until the City Hall and the pretended owners of the land get things settled. Land disputes are very common here. Processes are slow.

For example two processes for legalizing two of our school lots were initiated in 1963 and after many, many trips to the land department the processes are about to be finished. It takes days and days and hours and hours for the follow through of processes and plans. But we are glad to be here and

thankful that life is ours that we can feel and sweat and know problems and by God's help solve them.

It was a joy to hear of the Carvers arriving in Korea. Let me remind you who do not know, the first months on any mission field are in many respects the most difficult of all. Do not forget to claim God's blessings for the new missionaries (and the old ones also). Our Greatest Need: Someone right off will say, money. While it is true, it is not our greatest need. If the fields were white unto harvest in Jesus' day with only a few labourers, how much truer this fact is today. How we do need God-called, spirit-filled native preachers who will leave all to serve Him. The only way to get them is God's way; "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest, that he will thrust labourers into the fields. Church after church and work after work suffers because there are no workers. Will you not obey the Master and pray for workers?"

Our needs for the schools this year continue, if God is to lay it upon your hearts to help us. May the Lord bless each of you and make you each a blessing.

Preaches At Two Hospitals Through Translator . . . Six Professions Of Faith . . . Studying Portuguese . . . Rented House

Dear Brethren,
Sunday, the 22nd of August, I went with some of the young people to a hospital about 15 miles out of Manaus. I drove the Mission's jeep which Brother Bratcher uses. I preached to a group of about 8 men in a ward and Asa Mark translated for me. Sunday, the 29th of August, I went to the leper colony that is also about 15 miles out of Manaus, with Brother Bratcher and some others from the church. I preached in the little Baptist church that is there. Brother Bratcher translated for me. There was one profession of faith at the first place I preached and five at the leper colony. I also preached to the young people of the 14th of December Baptist Church

Sept. 12 with Brother Bratcher translating. I'm thankful for these opportunities to speak but I'd much rather speak in these people's native language than through a translator. I'm working toward that end through the study of their language. I have two classes every day except Saturday and Sunday. It will be good to be able to preach to them in their own language.

We finally found a place to live and we moved in August 31st. There were plenty of houses for rent but most were way out of our price range. Rent in Manaus is very high.

Sunday night was the beginning of a series of meetings at our church. Brother Bratcher is doing the preaching. There were about four hundred present for the first service. Brother Bratcher will tell more about this in his letter.

Pray for us as we come to your minds and may the Lord bless each of you.
