These two pictures, side by side, show the buildings and ground of the Faith Baptist Church and school, Pucallpa, Peru. The low building at the left is the house that the Del Mayfields live in with attached garage. The next building (like a garage) is the boat and storage house. Back of this, under the large trees, are the well and utility house. Water is pumped from the well to a tank on top of the house so that there is running water in the house. Water is also pumped to a tank above the toilets in the school building so that the church and school have running water. All this property is in the name of Baptist Faith Missions.



The entire front of this building is the church auditorium, with the pulpit and baptistry in the left end of the flat roof part of the building. The auditorium actually seats over 300. The entrance to the auditorium is to the side of the rear. The two story building is the school building with classrooms for each of the five grades and also for Sunday school rooms. In back of this building is the playground, and for outdoor meetings, when the church auditorium will not hold the people. All the property is enclosed by a wall fence on three sides, and a steel fence on the fourth side. This is the work that the Lord has enabled Del Mayfield to do.

The Crains and Gibbs are coming home for six month furlough. We need a furnished house for each of them and also a car for each of them, for six months. The Lord will bless you if you can furnish these.

This was explained in an article in the May 1970 MISSION SHEETS. Here is the article reprinted so that all may know and understand.

Missionary Furloughs

We now have ten missionary families. We have worked out a schedule, by the Kissels, Crains, and Gibbs staying on the field for a shorter first trip out and coming home for one half year for the first furlough, so that only two families will be home on furlough at the same time. This means that two houses will take care of all ten families so they can have a house rent free while on furlough. We now have one house in Lexington, Kentucky and we need another one, not necessarily in Lexington. Does someone have a house you will give to Baptist Faith Missions?

John Hatcher Pickup Truck Fund

The need for a pickup truck for John Hatcher to use in his work in Manaus, Brazil is urgent. In the last issue we reported \$195.00 in this fund. This was an error, as it was the funds given in Dec. 1971 only. We have a total in this fund \$1,085.00 This does not include the offerings received in January 1972. We need a total of about \$4,000.00 to buy this pickup. Please pray and give. Maybe someone would like to give the total amount needed.

Dear Brethren,

We've been here in Iquitos the past few days awaiting the return of the Kissels. It was good to see them again and hear of the blessing they received while home. We're also enjoying the fellowship in their home. I'll leave the news to him: this month.

I've preached here several times and also got to help organize the 4th Baptist church. We had a great time. We're to go today to Astoria where we are to help ordain the pastor there.

This has been one of the saddest months in the history of Pucallpa. The 24th of December near Pucallpa a plane (Lansa Airlines) went down with 92 passengers aboard. Many of them were our friends. The sad part was that it took them 14 days to find the plane, and probably would have never found it had it not been for a miracle of God saving one 17 year old German girl who had to walk 8 days in the jungle. I'm sure that this was one holiday we'll never forget.

This year our school closed with the largest crowds we've ever had for our closing program. We'd like to thank everyone who had a part in the ministry of our school. We got to preach to many people through the school that we would have never gotten to, if it had not been for the school. Many of our children were saved during the school year. Several of them now members of the church. We're hoping for a larger enrollment for next year. We already have over 100 enrolled, and many others awaiting the 1st of March. Pray for us as we look forward to another new year.

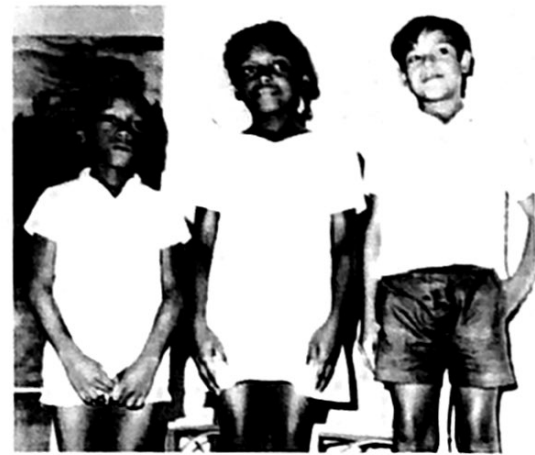

Report On Trip To Lima To Get Land Rover Station Wagons And Trip Home Over The Andes Mountains . . . Souls Saved And Baptized

Dear Brethren,
Since our last mission letter I have made another trip across the Andes Mountains. January 9th I left my home in Tingo Maria and arrived in Huanuco nine hours later. This is the rainy season and there are many landslides that make traveling by road practically impossible.

January 10th Brother Gibbs and I with my two sons, Paul and David took a bus from Huanuco to Lima. Twelve long, bumpy hours later we arrived in Lima.

After two days of going back and forth in Lima getting all the paperwork done on the two Land Rover Station Wagons, we finally left Lima Jan. 13th for Huanuco and Tingo Maria.

As we came over the highway there was a large landslide and cars, trucks and buses were lined up to wait for the highway equipment to come the next day and clear the road so they could go through. But with our Land Rovers we were able to put them in four wheel drive and continue on our journey.

About one hour out of Huanuco we came upon another landslide that had filled the road with about twelve feet of rocks and mud. Again we were able to climb over and drive on leaving many others behind who would have to wait until the next day for the highway workers to arrive and clear a way through.

We came to a small town called Ambo and found some missionaries from the USA who were soaking wet and needed a ride to Huanuco. After they got in our car they told us the landslide had covered their car and that their car was under the twelve feet of rock and mud we had come across.

We arrived in Tingo Maria Friday night January 14th and gave thanks for the watchful care of our great God.

Jan. 16th after our morning service we had a baptismal service where we preached to a large crowd that had gathered on the banks of the river plus the bridge that crosses the river above us was filled with people.

Jan. 17th we took our children to Pucallpa where they will study the rest of the year.

Next Sunday Jan. 23 we will have another baptism and the following day Jan. 24 Bro. Gibbs will come to preach in a revival.

During the month of December and continuing this month we are making repairs and improvements on the school grounds and buildings. Our school year starts the first of March and we hope to have things in good shape by then. Several changes in the education will be made this year and everything is being done to get all ready.

During our "vacation" days David and I have been remodeling the house where we live. The termites were getting ahead of us and we have made a real war on them and have changed much of the plywood walls which were damaged the most. Another little animal which exists in abundance in our country here is the bat. Our attic has been overloaded. Finally it seems that we have discovered a concoction that has killed and scared them off. After using a strong liquid poison with little effect I decided to mix with it a strong liquid solution of hot peppers. Seems like when the pepper got to burning they licked to ease the burning and got enough of the poison to die. Anyway the bats are on the run and after carrying out 20 gallons of bat dirt from walls and attics we are glad they are gone. The bathroom is being remodeled also and in a few days maybe all will be back in shape.

1972 is now before us and by the grace and Providence of God our expectations are that it will be a great year in the Lord's work here. Pray for us.

Dear Brethren,
It seems that my Mission Sheet letters have not been getting to Bro. Overbey, or at least not in time for the Mission Sheets. I will try once again somewhat earlier in hope that it will get there in time. My last letter was written from Manaus while we were there having some tests run on Betty as she had been ill for the past eight months.

The many tests on Betty did not reveal anything, but the doctor there found her trouble. After taking the medicine for twenty days she returned to the doctor and he prescribed more and told her she was well on the road to recovery and that she could return home. Although she is still somewhat weak she has not stopped since she got home so I know she is much better.

While in Manaus I watched Bro. Hatcher do some printing, some of which was posters and invitations for our conference that we are to have here in July. I also preached in several of the churches while in Manaus, the

last of which was the Tabernacle Baptist Church where Bro. Hatcher is pastor. I was with them in an eight day meeting and the attendance was good along with the attention and there were many lost in every service, but the Lord did not see fit to save any. I don't know when I have enjoyed preaching any more than I did those eight days.

While in Manaus last year I bought some of the things I needed to wire our house and while I was there this year I heard that our new light plant went into operation, so when we got back Mike and I spent two and one half days wiring the house and then Betty and I spent the same amount of time cleaning up the mess. Thus far we have lights only from six in the evening until midnight, but we are to have them twenty four hours a day starting in February.

While we were gone Mike had made several trips to Colonia Rodrigues Alves and had had several professions of faith. Last week we went there together and although the attendance was not so good we did have one more profession of faith. Our local Mission among the churches has bought a house there for services and that is a help.

Daughter In Korea . . . Seven Professions And Five Baptized . . . Persecution From Parents

Dear Brethren,

One of the highlights of the month was the arrival of our 8 pound 8 ounce daughter, 20 inches long, born this morning, Jan. 15, 1972 at 9:10 a.m. Mary and baby are in the hospital doing fine.

This has been a month of many and varied experiences here in the "Land of the Morning Calm," which sometimes isn't so calm. We've had a fair month at the mission, considering many situations which we often face. Our attendance for 3 morning services has varied from the low's in 100 to a high of about 280 and Sunday p.m. 2 services a low of 100 and high of near 200 with Wed. and Sat. varying and only for teenagers and adults. We've seen seven professions, and baptized five.

My interpreter's mother (an O.B. Dr.) we lead to the Lord in her home in Nov. being

a lost Protestant Church member, now has cancer and the doctors have given her 3 months to live. Due to poor health she has not been able to be baptized but has a desire to, please pray for her.

The Mission bldg. has been broken into twice this month, but nothing taken since we have someone sleep in it nights. About 3:30 one morning someone stole a little German Shepherd puppy off my porch even with a wall around the house.

Our youth are still being persecuted by Buddhist parents and unbelieving parents. One member about 18 wrote my interpreter that she could not attend night services but would try to slip away for morning ones. I received the following from a young man in his early 20's, "I'm sorry I have not the freedom of faith so I could go to assembly only at night secretly. I thank you for teaching me the Holy Bible deeply in our assembly." This young man made 100% on John 3 last Sat.

May God bless you and give each a wonderful and fruitful 1972.

Hazardous Trip Over Andes Mountains . . . Drove Over Car Covered In A Landslide . . . First Funeral In Peru

Dear Brethren,
Dec. 23 Bro. Crain and I flew home from Lima to spend the holidays with our respective families. We were disappointed that, due to a delay in customs, we could not drive back in our new cars. We finally were able to get delivery on the new cars Jan. 11th.

On Jan. 14 we made the trip across the Andes in our new cars. We drove through snow and rain, and over rock and mud slides, and even over a 1970 Chev. van, belonging to other missionaries, which became stuck and within a few minutes buried under at least 6 feet of rock and mud. A few feet from where the Chev. was buried we pulled out a taxi and a bus in order to save them from the same muddy grave. With any other type

of vehicle we would not have reached Huanuco that night.

We thank the Lord for those who have given to make possible our having such a vehicle.

We have had 2 professions of faith this month, and expect now to see our attendance improve as the rains should start easing off as we close out the month. I am now having special study classes for the young man who professed a call to preach.

As I was writing this letter a couple sent word that I should come with the Word of God. Their only child, a 9 mo. old boy, had died. Since there is no embalming here we passed immediately to the cemetery where I preached my first funeral here in Peru. This couple earlier had desired to dedicate their baby unto the Lord. Now they can find comfort that their baby will forever be with the Lord.

May great grace be upon us all in this short time of trials and sorrows.

I have been back to Colonia Rodrigues Alves several times this past month. The most pleasant thing I can tell you is the salvation of five more souls. Then the Christians there are buying a house to hold services in. During my visits with them we have spent some time making some benches and repairing the house. Generally I only do what is impossible for them because of a lack of experience or knowledge. When they do manual labor on something that belongs to them of course it has more value. No matter how you look at it the work is doing well. We all have plenty of work to do, and in actuality the Lord is performing the job through each one of us.

I was at home one weekend during the month and took care of all the services at Faith Baptist, since the pastor was away and I had promised to try to fill the gap. There were three women saved on that Sunday evening. We are truly grateful to
