Our first letter from Honduras. We left Lexington, Ky. on Jan. 31 and drove to New Orleans and stayed two days with Miss Marguerite Hallum. It was a big blessing to be in her home and talk about the work in Iquitos back from 1935. We arrived in Tegucigalpa, Honduras on Feb. 3. We are all doing well, even my wife. We are here where we for years wanted to be. We just thank God for it all and that we will not forget ever why we came here. So far all of us like it here so much but of course we miss the ones we left behind.

The need here is so great. There are over 275,000 people in and around close to Tegucigalpa. There are five American (Baptist) missionaries here and only 3 churches and 2 mission points. Pray with us that God will use us. You can readily see by the above that God was not wrong in leading us here to Tegucigalpa. The people are so nice to us here even in the public offices. I was amazed. We went to the Central Baptist this morning. They just stayed on and on talking to us. We have had many opportunities to witness for the Lord here even in the public offices, but we will not be happy until we have a place to start a mission work and then a church. Things are real high in price here so a building will cost at least \$150.00 if it is any kind at all.

We are living in a boarding house and hope to get a house by the end of the month and get some kind of a home life. We thank God for all of you that have prayed for us before coming here, we ask you to continue to pray that we will be used more for the Lord. We hope to get all our visa papers

done this week so we can concentrate only on the work. May the Lord really bless you all.

During the meeting we had good crowds, good interest, good singing and preaching, with four professions of faith.

Also Feb. 13th the Lord blessed with 6 professions of faith, making a total of 10 professions of faith for the month.

The real problem now is to get them baptized as about seventy five percent of the people here have never been legally married. I am sure that many of them will never be able to get married legally as they are so mixed up in their married life.

Because of more repair on the tent we were not able to have the tent meeting and Vacation Bible School as planned when Brother Gibbs was here, but, we plan to have another meeting and Vacation Bible

School the second week in March.

This is the rainy season here. Last Wednesday night it rained so hard that the people at church could not hear me preach with a loud speaker system. We have a tin roof on our building with out a ceiling, so, finally we sang until every one could not sing any more.

We also have suffered a set back with two of our most faithful men moving away to other cities to find work.

One of our most faithful women with 5 children carries her baby on her back and works as a cook for 15 soles per day, working 15 hours per day. This is about 35 cents per day to feed six people.

Last week I was so sick, I could hardly walk and finally had to go to bed for two days. Sunday I was up again and seem to be better.

Yesterday my wife came down with the same thing, a very sick stomach and headache that medicine will not touch. Last week she was waiting on me and now it is my turn to wait on her. I am sure that a couple days of rest with medication will help her also. Tomorrow we plan to have another baptizing at the river. Pray for us.

A Month Of Hard Faithful Mission Work Away From Home . . . New Mission Started At Boca Do Acre

Dear Brethren,
On Jan. 18 I left the family in Cruzeiro do Sul while I took the plane to Rio Branco, my destination being Boca do Acre. I knew when I left home that the plane service from Rio Branco to Boca do Acre would be impossible due to the

airport there not being in condition to use due to rain, so when I got to Rio Branco I found a boat that would be leaving in two days and I bought passage on it. I arrived in Boca do Acre Friday night late and Saturday morning early I was on my way, on foot, to Monte Verde where Bro. Elizario who had come from Manaus had been waiting for me for several days. We spent the week-end with the church there and then on Monday we returned to Boca do Acre where we spent the next six days renting a house, asking benches to open a new work there.

The next ten days we had services every night with 60 to 90 in services. After this we returned to Monte Verde to spend four

days with the church after which we returned to Boca do Acre for 4 more days of services. Although we visited much and good interest was shown each service I am sorry to report we did not have any professions of faith. Many expressed their desire for us to return soon.

While in Monte Verde Bro. Elizario resigned as pastor of the church and the church asked me to take charge of the work until they called another pastor.

Due to the season and festivity of the devil this whole country has stopped everything to celebrate these few days. Even the airlines have stopped and for this reason we had to call on air taxi to bring us from Boca do Acre to Rio Branco where we are waiting for the airline to start again to take us home. During this month that I have been gone I have not had any word from the family; I trust that I will find them all well when I get there the day after tomorrow.

Tonight I am to preach the anniversary service of the Bosque Baptist Church here in Rio Branco.

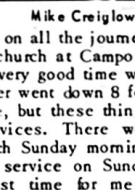
Dear Brethren,

We greet you with thankful hearts and hope that all of you have been blessed as much as we have.

My parents arrived from Manaus early last month. On the first weekend after their arrival Dad went to Colonia Rodrigues Alves with me. All the services were excellent and one soul was saved. The man who was saved is the husband to one of our Christian women. We thank God for another family united in Christ.

For the remainder of the month that has elapsed since my last letter Bev and Adam went on all the journeys with me. We visited the church at Campo do Santana again and had a very good time with the people there. The river went down 8 feet and it rained all the time, but these things did not impair the services. There were over 70 persons in church Sunday morning. There was a baptismal service on Sunday also. This was the first time for me to baptize anyone. The mud to the waist band on my pants, but the candidates were not discouraged. I baptized five.

The following week we went to visit the church at Parana dos Mouras in the village

of Barra do Jardim. They had asked me to come many times, but this was the first opportunity I could find. This church is on a small tributary of the Jurua River. The river was over the banks and the water is so calm that it is quite easy to become lost. Most of the curves are so sharp that we crossed our own wake as it rolled through the jungle. We stayed four days and had good services every day. There were 4 souls saved and I baptized six on Sunday morning. We had over eighty persons in services on the same Sunday, so we see that the Lord continues to bless that church even though the people feel they are "helpless".

We went back to Colonia the next week and even though it rained all the time we had a prosperous journey. On Sunday morning I baptized three of the saved from that mission point. These were the first to be baptized there. Many others want to be, but these are not legally married. Many people are united by priests here, who do not have legal authority to marry even though they could get such permission. The Brazilian laws do not recognize such unions. This is a great hindrance to many young Christians. The district judge has promised me that he will give me proper authority to perform weddings. I hope this will help.

The fifth Sunday of January the 14th of December Baptist Church once again observed "Membership Day." This we have done one Sunday in January each year for some 6 or 7 years now. On "Membership Day" the church roll is called at both services and a special offering received.

Also a report is given to the church as to the number of members, etc. I share with you the report: Number of members on December 31, 1970-315.

Additions during 1971
By baptism-34, By letter-20, By restoration-2, Total 56. Losses during 1971: By letter-6, By exclusion-7, By death-2, Total 15. Number of members on December 31, 1971-356. Number of non-resident members-130 (Most of these are active in one of the several missions of the church in the interior)

On the 4th Sunday of January, Bro. Richard

Turner preached at the Evening Service. This was his first sermon in Portuguese. He did real well.

On Monday afternoon, the 7th of February, my oldest son, Asa Mark and I began a trip that ended on Saturday afternoon of the same week. Monday night I preached at a home at Curari. Tuesday we traveled from Curari to Janauaca where we held services in a home. Wednesday and Thursday nights we visited the mission in the town of Manacapuri. For the first time I preached in the new building there that is still under construction but since the 25th of December all services have been held there. The building lacks the floor and the walls on both sides and the back. (It also lacks just a little of the roof). The front lacks the doors and windows. I'm hoping and praying that the building will soon be completed.

Friday we journeyed from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. to arrive at a home in Andiroba (no village-just houses scattered along the river banks). There we held services Friday night. Saturday afternoon we arrived in Manaus. May the Lord bless you all.

Dear Brethren,
As all months do, the month of January flew by. The month has been an exceedingly busy one whether much was accomplished or not. House repairs are mostly done and David and I are glad of that. The services at church have been good. Beautiful Garden Baptist Church baptized about seven candidates and in the same service the Bairro Vermelho Baptist Church baptized two. An interesting thing happened in one of our mission points. A crazy man who has a terrible dislike for believers entered in the mission building when one of the member's children was sweeping and took the key out of the door and chased the boy away. He then proceeded to arrange things as he liked. No one could convince him to come out. This happened on Sunday afternoon. His own son went to try to get him out and he chased him off with a machete. On Wednesday he was still in the house and had thrown the table clothes out, broke up the pulpit and put it under the church building and piled up the benches to his own liking. His party was over on Thursday, however, when the Mission pastor took policemen to arrest him. Our school classes begin once more on the first day of March. Day and night find us

trying to get everything ready. Building repaired, getting the faculty, planning schedules, buying supplies, besides seeing to boat repairs, preparing lessons, doing what printing can be done all makes for a busy schedule. Brother Julio Dantas has not been feeling well for the last month and if you remember, pray for him he does need your prayers. On the 28th and 29th of February our churches are having a two day missionary conference in the interest of the mission work of our churches here. They have two brethren which they support. Here as there the missionary spirit had to be stimulated as many have not yet learned that it is more blessed to give than to receive. Dear Brethren,
It hardly seems possible but we have been in Korea 6 months the 21st. Overall they have been good months but needless to say I cannot begin to communicate with the natives in their own language but Korean isn't picked up even in Language School as most others. Few Missionaries in Korea can preach in the native language. This has been a good month overall; especially the weather. We have had; snow, ice, rain and just plain sloppy weather; and on top of that the Lunar New Year is still celebrated by most Koreans. They have more holidays and customs than Carter had Liver Pills. We had a prayer meeting at a members house and their Buddhist neighbor began her Buddhist worship outside. You've never heard the likes - beating on the house, singing, hollering, etc. but before we were ended, just as I started to preach she came in and, probably for the first time, heard the Gospel. Pray that the Spirit will use it. Considering the weather, etc., our attendance at the mission has been good. For the past five weeks we've averaged 160 on Sunday A.M. and 145 on Sunday P.M. We've seen 12 saved at the Mission and one young man in our home. Our Tim was saved, only being five, but I counseled with him at his request as simply as I could and he assured me he was trusting Christ for Salvation, thank God. Including Timothy, I baptized five last Sunday. We have several more who have submitted for baptism but many were away Sunday and at least two were sick. Mary and the baby (Charity Dawn) are presently fine; the baby had Yellow-Gonders and Mary has had milk-fever twice already, but they are now doing alright. Some have written us and we deeply appreciate it but be patient and we'll try to answer soon.

Good Report From All The Churches . . . Building A Church Building At Santa Rita On Nanay River . . . Four Churches In Iquitos To Start 5th Mission Soon

February 18, 1972

This has been a busy month, trying to get things fixed up and trying to straighten out problems that have arisen. The Lord has blessed in spite of the problems. We baptized one into the first church. The Pastors report good months also, with two saved in Tamshiyacu, one saved in Ilojeal, two saved in Mopa Cocha and four baptized, five saved in Astoria, one baptized in the third church and five were baptized in a mission of the third church on the river Itaya. We are building a church building at Santa Rita, a mission of the first church, on the river Nanay. This means cutting everything out of the jungle, except the tin for the roof. The first church has bought that, as these people want a building and are willing to work for it. The Lord willing, we hope to have a church, in this place before too long. The city of Iquitos is full of strangers, since the discovery of oil in the jungle near here. With strangers, also comes much stealing, since there are many companies, drilling for oil. In one way it helps the people, as there are many jobs, but it is a disadvantage also, in that many members are living for 3 months at a time, away from their families and the church. We now have four churches in the city of Iquitos and the Lord willing, we plan to start the 5th mission soon. Our things are still in customs, since we have not yet received all the necessary papers to get them out. May the Lord richly bless each one who has part in the work.
