My last Mission Sheet letter was written from Rio Branco as I was enroute to Cruzeiro do Sul. Lacking just one day to complete a month from the time I left home I boarded one of the old DC 3 airplanes for home and due to bad weather the airports were closed in two of the cities between Rio Branco and Cruzeiro leaving just one stop to make before getting home. We took off, made one circle around the field and landed again having received a notice that the other city was also having bad weather. After leaving off the passengers for that city, we were soon on our way again for a direct flight home and little did we know at the time that it came close to being our last trip home. When we were about fifteen minutes from our destination one motor stopped and I, for one, thought I was on my way HOME. I have often wondered how a person felt when aboard a plane that was about to go down and now I know how a saved person feels, but I thank the Lord that I will never have to feel the terror that must be in the heart of a lost person. I now understand a little better I Thess. 4:13 (That ye sorrow not, even as others which

have no hope. We landed very well at the airport in Cruzeiro do Sul and I am sure some of the passengers did not even know at the time that we were in danger and I am sure some said we were very lucky, but as for me I thanked the Lord over and over for His providence.

Since I have been home the river has gone down that we could not get the boat in the water to make any trips, but it is coming up once again and it looks as though we will be able to travel this week.

Almost every trip I make I return with some intestinal disorder which takes some time to get over and it has been just this past week that I have felt about back to normal and if all goes as planned I will leave tomorrow to spend a few days in Japiim after which I will return to Cruzeiro do Sul to help make some new plans, in preparation for our conference in July. Although we did not have any souls saved while in the Boca do Acre I plan to return there the last part of March to spend two or three weeks and then I want to look more into the possibility of starting a work in Rio Branco. Dear Brethren,
February 21-28 we had our first Daily Vacation Bible School. Praise the Lord we managed to get in the classroom partitions on time and temporary tables with tops of pressed wood and cement blocks for legs. We had 74 students and a staff of 6 teachers. The enrollment could have been much larger if we had the funds for materials and the building facilities. Next time we will plan for at least 200.

March 1-4 Brother Mayfield came over to preach for us and to help organize the Mission here into a New Testament Church. Bro.

Crain arrived Saturday and also helped by moderating the organization. Bro. Mayfield preached the charge to the Church and pastor. We thank the Lord for all the help and blessings which made possible this great privilege of seeing the work here organized. Bro. Crain stayed and preached for us Sunday when a landslide blocked the highway and made it impossible for him to return to Tingo. We thank the Lord for all the good messages.

March 15 while I was in Lima obtaining the required dealer service on the Land Rover Bro. Saenz, our young preacher brought the message. According to reports he did very good.

We are now making plans to start a new mission point in the 13,000 ft. mountain town of Chinchao, which is about halfway between Huanuco and Tingo. We already have one member from there who is a member of the Huanuco Church. This family

has asked us to come and have the services in their home. Lord willing we will have the first services March 31.

Greetings from our wet world. The environment is quite damp, but not our spirits. We thank the Lord.

There has fallen many inches of rain in the past few days. One day last week six inches of rain fell within a two hour span. Even with all of this rain the river has gone down very much. This is not common for this time of year. Nevertheless this has impeded all traveling for the past four weeks. Everything was packed and ready last week, but the river dropped suddenly again. During these weeks we have worked steadily in our home church and also in some preparations for the coming conference.

Since I have remained in town I have directed services at Faith Baptist Church each week and preached several times also. Two weeks ago there were two souls saved

in our services, a young boy and an elderly man. I have also taught my Sunday School class, adult men, each week. The SS attendance has been close to two hundred lately so we are having some trouble to divide classes and be able to teach since three classes meet in the same room. The new addition should be finished in the near future, so this added space should solve the problem at least for a while. We hope that the growth will continue 'til the Lord returns.

We have held some open air services in several parts of the town. These have been encouraging and very well attended.

I have been doing some work with the young people on one or two days each week. They seem to be enjoying the "treatment" and are responding very well.

Of course there has been the ordinary multitude of material things to take care of, but these, like the poor, we have with us always.

Dear Brethren,

Another month has passed and it is time to write and report to you of our work here in Brazil. This past month has been quite busy for me. I went visiting with Bro. Bratcher to some sick members of the church one Sunday afternoon. We had little services in each home that we visited. We visited about 5 homes. One or two of the people were blind and one man had leprosy. I helped in the singing and praying. Also, I was able to go visiting everyday for a week with Brother Bratcher. We were in many homes, some were members and others were lost. I attended a service out in Compensa (a suburb of Manaus) at a member's house. This service was held outside in front of the house. There was no electricity and so an oil lamp was borrowed in order that Brother Bratcher might see to read the Bible. There were about 65 to 70 people present. This was my first service

to attend under the stars. I went to the leprosy colony the last Sunday in February with some others to visit a member of the church. I hate to report that I have not preached again in Portuguese, but hope to again soon.

My wife, Wanda, has been sick for some time and did not want to go to the doctor but I insisted that she go and so she found out that she is anemic. The doctor prescribed some vitamins to be taken by mouth and 9 vitamin shots to be taken in the vein. I hope this will help her as she has just been barely able to go on. Pray for her, please.

We did not have Portuguese classes for three weeks because our professor has been ill. We have had many problems getting someone to teach us. I started classes again with Bro. Dantes this week since he has recovered from his sickness. I have now a young man that comes to our house and helps us a little in exchange for some help with English. This is not the best way in the world to learn a language but it helps some.

Dear Brethren,

This has been another fast and busy month. There are so many things to be done here in God's Work and so little time in which to do it: Then too, not speaking the Language and attending Language School five days weekly, holds me back. The field here is white unto harvest and we've been praying that Our God will speak so loudly to some of your hearts that you will not be able to get away from the call until you say, "Here am I Lord, I'll go to Korea."

Our attendance at the mission has held its own this month, with the teenagers and adult worship services up a bit. We've seen several professions of faith and several other moves made in the services. I baptized five, three being adults, and four more have submitted for baptism. One of the highlights of the month is

that two 19 year old boys say God has called them to preach. I let them both speak one Saturday night at Youth Service, my interpreter says they did well and one really held the blood of Christ up. I may start teaching them one night a week, which will be difficult through an interpreter. Our mission building lease is up in April. We've considered trying to lease some land and put a G.I. tent on it or else try to buy some land without money and put a tent on it, but the Government has clamped down on the use of tents. We shall also have to find another house to live in in June, which is not easy; so pray that God will lead us to the right one at the right price.

The Spring Conference will have come and gone by the time you receive this M. S. but I pray this will be the best Conference yet. The Spring Conference I hold especially dear since for the past four I have helped with being pastor of Bentley Memorial.

Our teachers are all Baptists and each one active in his or her church. The great majority of students are Catholic and so we have good reason to preach and teach the Word of God each day. In our seminary classes this semester there are twelve enrolled so that is an increase over last semester. Not all are preachers. Some are preachers wives and some are Sunday School teachers. During the last part of February our churches had a missionary conference in the interest of the work here and the two days of conference gave a total attendance of about 900 people. 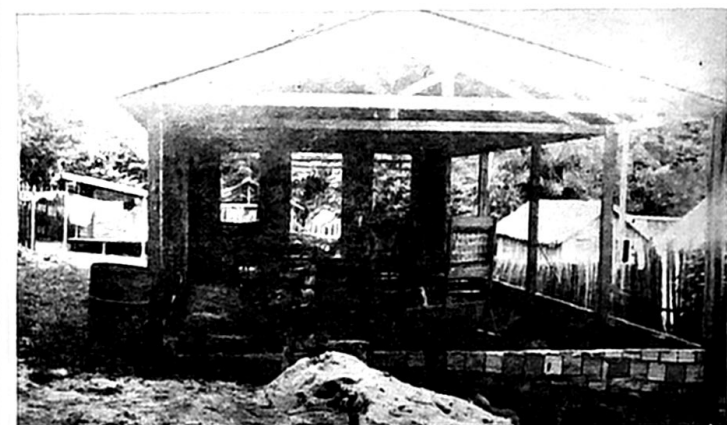

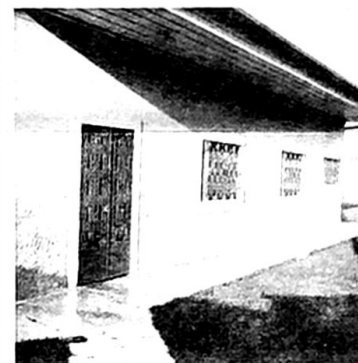

What we need now is to have a building, at least a building with a cement floor and roof over the top to have services on the new lot. Also, I would like to mention that the town of Aucayacu has promised me a large lot 325 feet by 650 feet on the highway. This town has over 5,000 people.
