This has been a very busy month and yet it seems I've done hardly anything for the Lord. The former interpreter is still roaring like a lion and trying to continue tearing up our work. He's gotten almost all our younger teenagers and some adults but I am sure in a short while these will see through his lies and deceit.

Despite the problems, the Lord has still been good to us. There have been between 5 and 10 professions of faith and five adults have submitted themselves for baptism, which I hope to administer in the near future. Our attendance is naturally down

some, but we are still running a little over 100 on Sunday A.M. services and near 100 in the Sunday P.M. services.

Since moving we are much further from the mission but closer to Pam's and my schools. This gives me about an extra hour each day, which I certainly can use.

As yet, I do not have a regular interpreter and here in Korea a good trustworthy interpreter is a must until one really gets the language and few really have the language that well. Please make this a special matter of prayer.

Bro. Young Ho Lee whom many of you know, arrived back in his native country last week, so last Saturday night he preached for me being his first message in Korean since coming back. I didn't understand the message, but the people at the Youth service were really moved and one was saved. He is scheduled to hold a meeting for us June 5-11. Please note the change of address.

We are back at home in Cruzeiro do Sul again and it is good to be back.

On Friday, April 21, our paperwork for our permanent visas was finished, at least as far as we could take it. The work went pretty well and we are satisfied with the results even though we didn't actually get the visas, but then this is normal, too.

On the following Sunday I preached at the Chapada Baptist Church. My family and I had a good time with the people there. I saw several brethren who I have known for many years.

Then on Monday morning early we left for Cruzeiro do Sul. The flight was a little rough this time.

Things are in good shape. I have taught several times at the church here in the past two weeks and preached some too. The attendance has been very good lately. There were 220 in Sunday School one morning and there are always 180 or more on hand. The addition to our building is coming right along also.

Our supplies arrived from Manaus last week and the unloading kept me busy for a while. The river has gone down almost as far as it can, so there was plenty of mud to go along with the job.

We are in the process of making some new pews in time for the conference here in July. Dad had already finished 15 when I arrived, so I only have 5 more to do.

All of us are doing jobs in preparation for this event. We are all looking forward to the conference and hoping that we will have many visitors. Pray for this conference

## Much Opposition To The New Building By Protestants And Catholics . . . But Gives Victory . . . Four Baptized . . . Trip To Pucallpa . . . Children Out Of School

Dear Brethren,  
This has been a real busy time for us. We have had some real trials since our last news letter. Last month we started building on the lot that we purchased and some of the churches here have done everything possible to stop us from building. They went before the authorities and asked them not to permit us to start the building. This did not work, so we kept on building. A few weeks ago the priest came and parked in front of our building Sunday morning taking down names of the people he knew and they have started putting pressure on the people. So, we have the Protestant crowd and the Catholics fighting every move we make.

Also, we gave a company an order for the lumber four weeks ago, gave a deposit (which was required for them to deliver the order) and I made seven trips that take three hours to get them to deliver the lumber. Finally, the Judge that comes to

our service went with me and he gave them an order to send the lumber or to return the deposit. The lumber arrived yesterday for which we are thankful.

That is enough of the dark side, even though there is much more. But I want to tell you about the blessings, for which we thank God.

Our Sunday school is still doing real good and we have had five professions of faith and I baptized four.

Last week we went to Pucallpa to pick up the children at school and to be with the Mayfields over the week end and preach for the church there. It was a real blessing to be with the Mayfields again.

The children are out of school for the year and it is a joy to have the added noise. Today we hope to start building the trusses and to put up the roof and then pour the cement floor.

When we pour the cement floor we will have to stop building because that is all the money we have. Please remember to pray about the need of the money to put up the walls, windows and doors. Remember we

Dear Brethren,  
Greetings in the precious name of Jesus. After writing my last Mission Sheet letter, in fact the day I mailed it, I lost my Portuguese teacher. Her baby was sick and so she decided the baby needed her too much for her to teach me.

About a week or two afterwards, I was able to enroll in a language school, which some other missionaries have here. I study in class 3 hours a day, 5 days a week. I'm hoping that this will be my last change of teachers, etc.

I have been trying to obtain my driver's license. One of the national Brethren has been helping me but so far I have not been able to

obtain it. I thought I had all the necessary documents but the last trip to the license bureau, I was told that I would have to have an identification card issued by the police here. I went to the police and they told me they could not issue me a card because I did not have a permanent visa but they could issue me another paper but they did not know if the license bureau would accept it or not. So far I have not gotten the answer if they will.

I made one trip on Sunday afternoon with others of the church to the hospital to hold services. This hospital is for people who are not supposed to get well. However, some do and get to leave. It is located about 15 miles out of Manaus not far from the Leprosy hospital.

Continue to remember us in your prayers. Rejoiced to hear the good report on the Conference in Lexington.

I got back from Boca do Acre on May 18th and found the family in pretty good health. I had another good trip, gone 29 days and preached 28 times. The attendance in Boca do Acre was down some from what it was the other trip, but it was way up in Monte Verde. I spent two weeks in Boca do Acre with services every night. In Monte Verde when it was not raining we had 60 to 70 and around 30 when it rained. I preached and witnessed also in Rio Branco, but in all the month I did not have one profession of faith. I preached here in the church at Cruzeiro do Sul Sunday night and

(There has been so much work done to prepare for it, even a new building). Mike and I were wondering this morning who the church would get now to do the preaching.

There whatever we will have to do there will be plenty of eternity to do it and without our faults and weaknesses we won't even get behind with what there is to be done.

This month there have been two professions of faith and another three persons who have come to unite with our church by baptism, having professed their faith at a previous time. Our Sunday school attendance has been and is down. Some of our teachers are not as faithful as they could be and this has a bearing on our decrease. The carpenters have finished the repair of the launch and it is in better condition than when first built,

Our Seminary classes are going well. Our enrollment is 13, seven of these are ladies. There are many difficulties in the Lord's work everywhere but perhaps the greatest is so much to do and so few to do. The schools are going well and as many of you know, school work is a heavy and steady grind for nine months of the year. Pray that many of our pupils from Catholic homes will be saved. They hear the Word day after day but the force of evil is great, but God, who is rich in mercy, is our hope in this matter.

Dear Brethren,  
We've had another great month here with 14 professions of faith. It has not been advisable for us to baptize due to the river being high and very rapid.

April 14-15, I made a trip to La Union which is on the road going east out of Huanuco to the coast.

It was a 7 hour trip in which we passed town after town without any kind of work. The two largest towns each had a Protestant church, but no Baptist work anywhere. We passed out over 2000 tracts and witnessed to many along the way. The need is great as many have never heard a clear gospel message. One week later we had 5 professions of faith from people who live up the road where we had passed out the tracts.

May 1-7 I spent preaching in a meeting for Bro. Mayfield in Pucallpa. It was a good time of fellowship and the Lord was

pleased to bless with 4 professions of faith. One of the highlights of this week was preaching to all the students of Bro. Mayfield's school on Fri. morning. It was a real thrill and many of these raised their hands at the close saying they were trusting in Jesus for salvation. The school is a real open door for preaching the gospel and reaching people.

The Lord continues to give the increase here in Huanuco as we reached 75 in Sunday School last week. This is our weakest service but lately is showing strength since we put in a separate classroom for the children.

All the family is now starting to plan for our 6 month furlough which begins July 15th. Several pastors have written lately requesting that we visit their churches. Due to our short time home I would appreciate hearing from those who would like us to visit them in order to work out a schedule that would permit us to visit as many churches as possible. The hardest work I know is to start new work, especially in a completely new country and believing the doctrines we do. I had a little on others as I spoke Spanish from the beginning. That was a big blessing.

The people are very nice but very pagan. I guess that is why there are only 9 Baptist churches in all Honduras and less than 300 membership in all 9. So the need is great and the Lord is also, so we just keep on praying, preaching and much visiting and wait on the Lord for the results in HIS time. Many seem interested and we have from 25 to 40 in S.S. this month and from 15 to 30 in all

The judge performed five wedding ceremonies for 5 couples - 3 from Amatori and two from Rio Urubu. On the Sunday of the trip I baptized six at Costa de Sao Jose de Amatori. There were six professions of faith made during the trip.

From the 30th of April until the 7th of May a revival was held at the 14th of December Baptist Church. We had early morning services during the week 6:00-6:30 and services each night. We used different preachers during the 8 days. There were some five decisions made during the meeting. I trust there were other decisions made too in connection with
