Seven Day Revival In Manacapuru . . . Building Almost Finished . . . Highest Month In Tithe At 14th Of December Church . . . Coming Home For A Year Of Furlough

Dear Brethren,
Day before yesterday I arrived home after holding a seven day revival in Manacapuru. I learned that the work had gone well at the 14th of December Baptist Church during my absence. Bro. Richard Turner preached on Sunday morning and Pastor Elizario Candido da Silva preached Sunday night. The Sunday School attendance went over the 200 mark once again (202) on the fourth Sunday of May but dropped to 163 on Sunday, June 4th. Also, the month of May was the best month in the history of the church in the total amount of tithes given to the church. In dollars the total amount given in tithes (not including the regular and special offerings of the month) was \$451.70. During the month the emphasis was on Stewardship. On Sunday morning May 28, I baptized two and one was received by statement.

The Lord gave us a gracious revival in Manacapuru. The new building there is almost finished. It still lacks the doors and windows and some painting. The attendance was slightly above the 100 mark three or four nights. There were 4 professions of faith, 4 received by letter and 5 baptized during the meeting. On Monday night after the revival closed, some 18 of us went in a rented boat to Resaco de Pesqueira. This place is a little more than an hour's journey

by boat. There we held a service in a home. A man and his wife made a profession of faith.

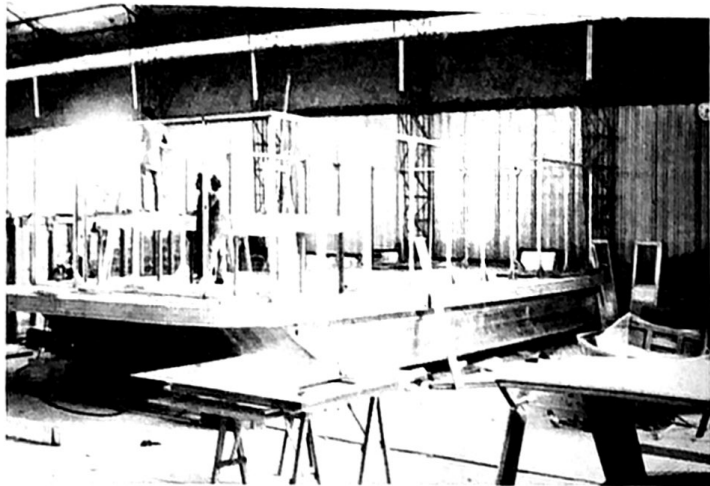

Trip To Lima On Mission Business And For New Carnets . . . In Conference In Huanuco . . . General Census In Peru On Sunday

Dear Brethren,

Monday the 22nd we went to Lima for new carnets, and to see about some papers for the mission here. Then on Thursday we went to Huanuco to be with the Gibbs and attend our annual Conference which was held there this year. I did most of the preaching, and enjoyed it as God gave the increase. There were 6 saved and 4 for baptism, so Brother Gibbs has 10 for baptism. We also had a good time with the Gibbs and his people. Hope he doesn't forget to tell about the "Pachamanca," the meat, potatoes, oh yes! meat was pig, goat, and lamb, all this cooked in the ground. They dig a large hole, line it with rocks and build a fire in it, until the rocks are red hot, then they clean the hole out and put the meat in on top of the rocks, along with all the other food, and then top it with leaves and then with dirt. After about three hours everything is done and ready to eat. Wish you all could have been there to enjoy it with us. Hope Brother Gibbs explains it better than I did.

The brethren did a good job taking care of the services while we were away at the conference. Our attendance has been very good. This census not only hurt our church, but all my teachers had to help, and there was no school for several days, as they had to prepare for the thing. We're glad to be back in the swing of things again.

Bro. Saureino reports that the church in San Francisco is doing real well. They had two professions of faith, and some who need to get married so they can be baptized.

Hope you have a good trip to Brazil, Brother Overbey, and that you'll give everyone our regards. Praying that they have a great conference, and I'm sure they will.

We do not have the money but if it be God's will for us to have the property then someone does have the amount and for this reason we are telling you about it. However the case is urgent. One judge here in Manaus (a Baptist) said to me, "Pastor you cannot afford to lose that property, it is worth \$30,000.00." May it please the Lord to impress someone to give that the property might be ours.

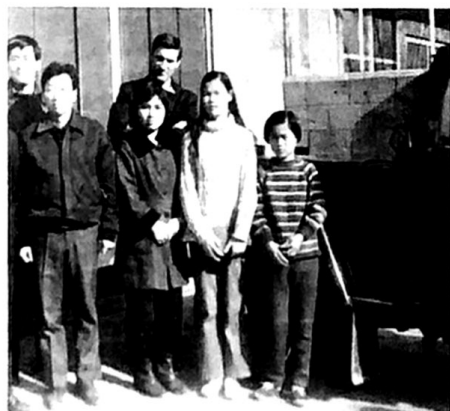

One of the oldest Baptist Pastor's in Korea came to visit me tonight. He has been preaching 56 years and is 78. He worked with the first Baptist Missionary to Korea (Missionary Penn Wick) from Canada in the 1890's. This old pastor thrilled my heart

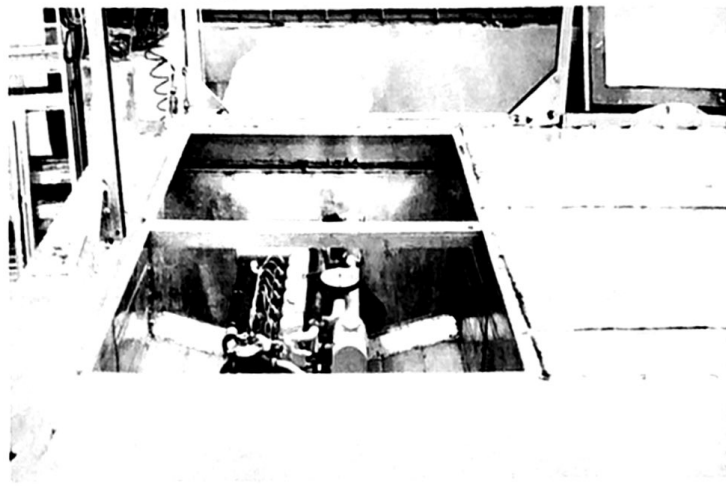

This month started off slow. Two that attended services from the first moved away and because I had to talk to parents of children that were molesting the services beyond reason, but ended up with 46, 47 and 58 in Sunday School the last three Sundays.

We also have had two present themselves for baptism and we pray they will be real faithful. We are planning a week of special services from July 9 to 14 and maybe the Lord will give us more. Our children that live in Lexington are to be here then and they will be able to play and sing, etc. for us in this time. We bought an accordion and our daughter Mary is trying to learn to play it and will in a little time. The owner of the mission house tells us she never would have believed we would have ever gotten 10 to come and thought that only our family would have been in attendance for at least a year, so the Lord is showing us and them many things. Dear Brethren,
This has been a very busy month but filled with blessings upon blessings.

We are still working on the construction of the new building and we believe we will be able to have our first service in it this coming Sunday, June 18th.

Last Friday we went to Huanuco to buy the steel doors as the man who had given me a good price on the doors here in Tingo Maria went up practically double on his price when I wanted them. I was able to get a good price in Huanuco and I believe better and stronger doors.

Today and tomorrow we hope to finish the roofing with galvanized metal roofing. Also, we plan to hook up the lights by working late in the night. We will need the lights Thursday as we will be pouring and finishing the cement floor. We plan to finish the floor in one day and that is without ready mix cement, yes, even without a mixer. All of this will be done by hand. Really this cement work is something else. We will

be working from Thursday morning early until Friday into the morning.

Friday we install the steel doors and windows with steel rods and Saturday we will move the benches from the other building and clean up the new building for Sunday services.

The Lord has really blessed here in the construction of the building. Several times we have run out of money but when the last sole has been used the Lord has provided that which we need. We have put all that we can possibly put into the building of our time and money. Last week we ran out of money and a man came and wanted to buy our refrigerator and stove, so, we sold them and started building again.

Also, the Lord has blessed with souls saved, for which we are thankful. We have had four professions of faith and we are to baptize three next Sunday afternoon.

Elizabeth and the children are all busy packing and getting things ready to come home, so, you can see this is a busy, busy, place. The Lord willing, we will arrive in Detroit July 15th and we hope to see you all at the Clarksville conference.

Last Mission Sheet letter I reported that we had excluded one of our more faithful members. She had been sick with TB for four years and had been in the hospital. She had sinned a terrible sin against her Lord and the church and Sunday May 14 we went to her home to have a service as she was not able to go to church. She confessed that she had sinned and asked that she be restored into fellowship with the church. We did that Sunday night May 14. While I was writing the Mission Sheet letter May 16, her brother-in-law came and told me she had died. Her boy friend and I spent all afternoon getting her death certificate signed buying her casket, and paying the burying tax at the Mayor's office. After all this was done we arrived back at her home where some more members from the church had gathered at 5 p.m., I then preached her funeral and then we went to the cemetery where she was buried beside her newborn baby that had died two weeks before. I also had the sad duty of buying the casket and burying Irma Leotera, the blind lady from the Anajativa Church. New Church Benches Built For Conference . . . Large Cargo Plane Crashed, Nine Killed, Nine Survive

This letter will be the latest and last word before the Bible Conference in Cruzeiro do Sul. There is just shortly over a month until it begins.

Dad has arrived from Boca do Acre and since his return we have completed some new benches for the church here. The crowds at our church have been so big that the old benches were breaking and were also too small. Now we hope to be able to seat the people who will attend the conference next month.

A large private cargo plane fell just a few miles from town this week. The first report that came in was that everyone on board was killed, but the following day we found out that half of the persons survived. Two women of our church had husbands on the plane who had gone to Rio Branco to buy and bring goods to sell. The two men were brothers, also. One of the

men had one of his young daughters with him. As it turned out the one man and his daughter were taken in the crash while the other brother survived with only a few scrapes. We visited and waited upon the two wives and their families. It was extremely difficult on the day following the crash when one husband was found and the other lost. That any should survive this kind of crash is a miracle of the Lord. The plane lost two of its four engines over virgin jungle with a load of over eleven tons. The passengers managed to throw three or four tons overboard. When the plane came down it tore through the bush for over four hundred yards. We see God's providence in it and happily the two Christian women I have spoken about see it, also.

I have been working with the young people again lately. We are working on some music lessons together and hoping to arrange some special music for our church services. This group of young folks is happy and very co-operative.

May God bless you and do pray for the upcoming conference.

One Week Of Preaching At Monte Verde Baptist Church . . . Two Weeks Of Preaching At Boca Do Acre Missions . . . Nine Killed In Plane Crash . . . Funeral For Crash Victim

At the time to write my Mission Sheet letter for last month I was away on a trip to a place where the mail service is still in the Pony express stage and by the time I got home it was too late to get a letter to Bro. Overbey in time.

The above mentioned trip was to the Boca do

Acre once again. I was gone twenty nine days and during that time I preached twenty-eight times with not even one profession of faith. Just after getting there I went to spend the week-end with the church at Monte Verde and then on Monday

I returned to the Boca do Acre where I spent a week preaching every night. I then returned to Monte Verde to spend a week with the church. During the week at Monte Verde it rained several nights and on those nights we only had about thirty in services, but on the other nights we had up to seventy. After this I went back to Boca do Acre where I spent another week. While in Rio Branco I preached once or twice and witnessed to several during the time I was waiting for the day of my return home. I got home on May 18, the day of our twenty-sixth wedding anniversary.

Since I returned from the trip I have helped finish the new benches for the church and helped Mike build a small boat to use in low water time. I have also visited the church at Mourapianga. I preached here in the church the first Sunday night after I got back and there were four or five professions of faith.

Last week a large four motor plane bringing eleven tons of cargo and eighteen people from Rio Branco crashed near Cruzeiro do Sul. When they saw they were in trouble they began to throw out the cargo and managed to throw out about four tons before it crashed in the middle of the clearing where they are going to build a road. We have seen a miracle of God as nine of the passengers lived through it and one of them walked away without a scratch. There were two sons of the late Chico Lima aboard

and one of these had his daughter with him. Both father and daughter died, but the other who is a member of our church is back home and getting along very well. Most of our time last week was spent with these families and I preached the funeral of the man and his daughter on Thursday.
