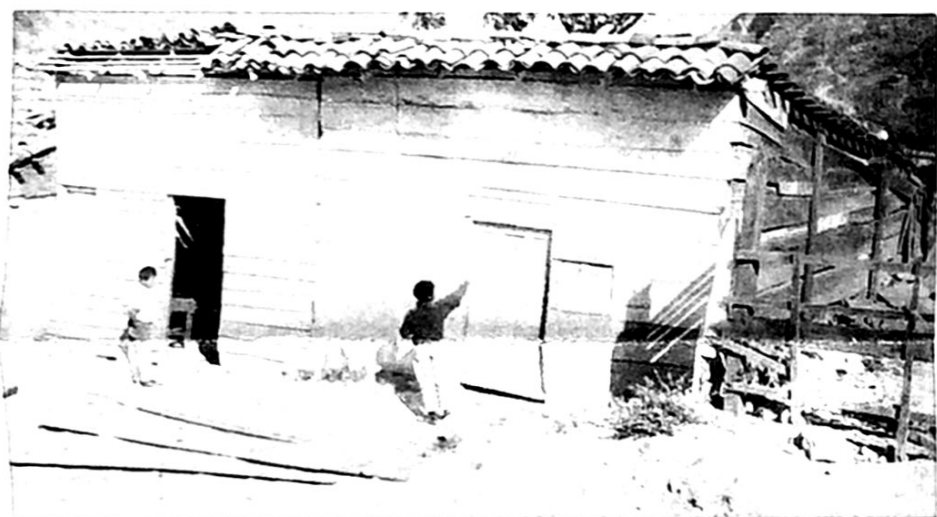

125 Miles Up Jurua River To . . . Nova Cinta . . . Campo De Santana . . . Parana Dos Mouras . . . Pucalpa And Rodrigues Alves

Dear Brethren,
This month I would like to take you by this letter on a trip up the Jurua River visiting some places that I have visited recently, some that I had visited the last time about two years ago and some that I had never visited.

Mike and I left Cruzeiro do Sul on a Wednesday and within a little over an hour in his speedboat we were at Nova Cinta where Mike has been maintaining a preaching point. I am not sure but I may have preached in this place about ten years ago. Through Mike's and others efforts there are several families of believers there, so we spent two days with them trying to strengthen them. The river had been pretty high but at this point it showed signs of wanting to go down so we decided to leave there to go to the farthest place up river that we would be going on this trip. We arrived in Campa de Santana within two hours and a half and this far up the river the water had already gone down a lot. We spent two days and a half with the church and had one soul saved. They are in their new building although it is not finished. On Sunday noon with the mud hip deep in the port we left going back down river to Parana dos Mouras where we spent

two and a half days with this church also. Sebastian who takes care of the work in this place had been gone for almost three months during which time there had not been any preaching for them, so they were glad to see us. On the day we left this place Mike baptized one lady into the fellowship of that church. We left Parana dos Mouras in a downpour of rain going to Pucalpa just a half hour down river. For almost twelve years I have gone by this beautiful place high on a green hill saying that we should have a preaching point there, it seems it was never in our trip plans to stop there. There must be about thirty houses in this place, we were well received by the owner who told us that his house was always open to us whether he was home or not. The attendance was only about twenty due to the rain but the attention was very good. The next and last night of our trip was spent in Rodrigues Alves where we have had a good preaching point for about five years now. About service time we had a heavy rain and for this reason we only had a little over thirty in attendance. It was a quick trip of only ten days but we enjoyed it in the Lord.

Dear Brethren,
I have not been with my home church much this month, but I have visited some of the other churches in the area and visited some of the mission points.

I visited the mission at Villa Rodrigues Alves twice with good attendance and growing interest on the part of the young Christians. The people have given sufficient quantities of lumber, money, and labor toward their church building. Consequently we should be able to start construction next week. We thank our Saviour for these blessings.

The mission at Nova Cinta is progressing slowly. As happened at the Villa, the priests have started visiting Nova Cinta. This is no great obstacle to the work, yet it isn't a help either. My first visit this month was poorly attended, but the last was much better.

Dad and I made a ten day trip up the Jurua River as far as Campo de Santana. Besides the Villa and Nova Cinta we visited the

churches at Campo de Santana and Parana dos Mouras. There was one young girl saved at Campo and one lady baptized at the Parana. We also stopped at a place called Pucalpa (not Peru) and were well received. The river went down while we were at Campo and the mud was over my waist where the boat was "docked", but all in all we had a very good trip and praise God for the good results. Dad's letter will probably give some more details. For those of you who are interested in distances, Campo is 3 hours and 40 minutes at 32 miles per hour in my boat with a 50 HP Johnson outboard motor.

We hope to be able to work more on the rivers in the future, as there are so many places without the word of God. The expense for building churches on the rivers is very little, since most of the material is cut out of the jungle. Pray for us that the Lord will supply the things needed for this work. Eighteen Years A Missionary In Brazil . . . Trip To Southern Brazil . . . 21 States Remain In Which We Have No Missionary . . . God Help Us

Dear Brethren,
This has been a great month for me. After 18 years as missionary to Brazil I made a trip to the central and southern parts of this great country. Brasilia, the nations new Capital is marvelously beautiful; growing faster perhaps, faster than any other city in the world.

In ten years it has grown from a desert plain to a population of almost 700,000 people. In all of Brazil the people are among the friendliest in the world. Their culture varies from one section of the country to another but the warm and friendly spirit prevades everywhere. Never in the history of the world has there been any nation of 100,000,000 people with ears so ready to hear the gospel. Never has there been a door open so wide. This is nothing less than the great working of the Holy Spirit for the people are 95% Roman Catholic. But God is working a great work of grace and may He dominate our hearts and lives to take advantage of the great opportunity.

At the Educators Congress we assisted in Belo Horizonte, at least three-fourths of

the representatives were from Roman Catholic schools. The lives of the population have been in the hands of the papal system for centuries. At last this force is being broken, thank God. The people are coming to realize that idolatry holds no hope for the future but there is another danger and that is the danger of materialism and communism which follows in the wake of idolatry and other false religions.

Many times I have mentioned the great need in the other 21 states where we have no work. Today the cry is made again, may God help us to reach out and out. The work is barely begun, we have not scratched the surface. The great state of Rio Grande do Sul, much larger than the state of Kentucky has about 45 Baptist churches; Kentucky has over 2,400 Baptist churches. One city we visited is among the oldest of the nation with a population of 24,000 people and no Baptist witness whatever. Brazil cries out, "Come and help us, the door is open wide, come before it is too late". There are old cities, there are new cities, there are plains, there are slums, there are rich and there are great areas of poverty stricken but all are open to receive the preaching of the Gospel. May God help us to hear, send and go!

Dear Brethren,

Language school is back in full swing again (5 hrs. daily 5 days weekly) and my mind is almost going in circles. I can use but little; in fact, not even enough to be able to witness in it. I can go to the market and sing in Korean if I know the song, but Korean is one of the most difficult languages in the world being made up of about 75% Chinese.

The church is coming along fair with the faithful members showing some evidence of spiritual growth. We've had one profession in the church and baptized two this past month. Our attendance is running fairly steady for Korea.

One of the members wanted Mr. Chai (my interpreter) and me to go deep into the country with him to visit his aged mother and witness to her so after driving over 100 miles with about 30 miles over mud, gravel and snow and ice we finally got to her house

and had a short service, after which she assured us she had trusted Christ for salvation and plans to move to Seoul this spring and begin to attend the church here. We started home and I got deathly sick with a migraine headache and could not drive so Mr. Chai, with no licence, had to drive most the way back, but we had to pull over several times as our little two-cylinder car was getting hot and some wires were shorting out.

Mr. Chai is to get married to one of the young ladies in our church the first of March. Korean marriages are expensive on the ladies side it cost approximately \$1,000.00 and on the man's side approximately \$300.00 besides the honeymoon, etc., if they take one. Pray for him and Miss Kim as they take this big and expensive step.

Last month I forgot to tell you that several of our young people who attended the watch night service had to spend the night in the church because their unbelieving parents locked them out.

Thanks for the special offerings toward our lot and a building as well as your regular offerings and prayers.

Dear Brethren,

I have the title to the lot I bought and hope to have the building permit this week also, the Lord willing. I am sending some pictures of the lot. The building will be torn down and lumber used for forms, etc. The lot is level. You can see the mountains in the background. We hope to start building by March 1. Pray with us that the Lord will send in the rest of the money needed so as to not have to stop and wait to finish building. We thank God for those that have so generously given up to now and am confident we will be able to finish.

We had an average of 57 in S.S. and 2 professions of faith this month and night services also stayed up

around 40 or so. We hope that one family will get married March 2 so we can baptize those 2 and 3 others waiting for baptism. We also hope that another family will marry soon so as to get baptised. They just do not see the need to get legally married here. One day they will and the Lord will raise up more like them and the work here will grow and grow.

I still have not gotten over this cough yet. Two months now. Weather here is warming some the last week. I stated that the weather here was in the 60's but I meant 55. That is cold for dirt floors and no heat in their houses. A lot of religion here last month, a big healing campaign and the Catholics celebrating the day of their guardian saint "Suyapa". All who gave a Lepira got blessed for the year. Priest made 12 Lempiras on our block. Nice business.

May the Lord bless all of you and we thank God daily for you all.
