## 12 Saved at Chacara . . . Teaching Basic Doctrines and Building . . . 2 Saved at Boa Esperanca . . .

Dear Brethren,

This has been a good month. We had 12 saved at the Chacara dos Pinheiros work. Also we had 4 others request baptism and one rededication. All of our services are well attended. On Thursday nights we are teaching Basic Doctrines such as Salvation, Baptism, Tithing, Work of Holy Spirit, Church Doctrine, etc. It is going very well and I believe some are being grounded in the truth. On Friday nights we are at Tijucal. I am experimenting on how to best teach and involve the new converts. Ursula is teaching the ladies and I am teaching the men, and then we end with a time of prayer. I believe it is important to get people involved in order for them to grow spiritually.

We have begun our construction of 2 more Sunday school rooms behind the Chacara dos Pinheiros work. It will be a little slow since we do not have much funds and must pay as we go. Our goal is to organize this work by the end of the year. Pray for us that we will be able to do this.

I am needing to make a short trip this month to visit the work in Diamantino. We are anxiously waiting for Brother and Sister Creiglow to return to help out in this great



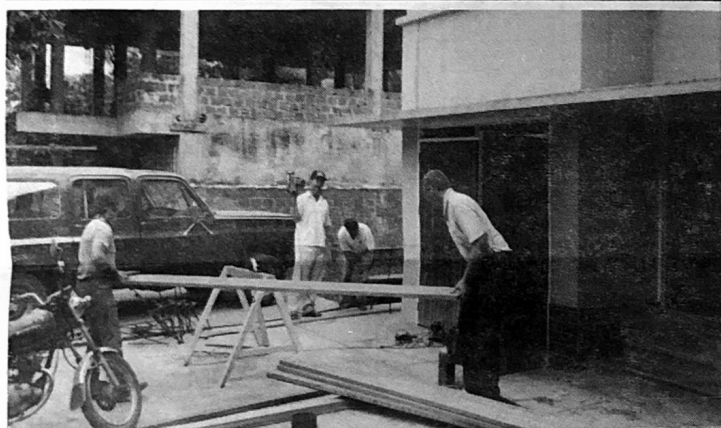

work. The Lord has blessed so much these past two years that it is almost scary. The church in Varzea Grande inaugurated their new mission building (Brother Creiglow's work) this past month. They have 4 families who live in the neighborhood who will carry on the work along with 2 preachers from their mother church. The Boa Esperanca church had 2 saved this month and is growing in attendance. They are having daily prayer meetings and are getting ready to evangelize the neighborhood which has over 2,000 houses and approximately 12,000 inhabitants. There is no other church close to them. I believe they will see some growth both spiritually and in number if they continue to pray and work.

I am getting ready to start the paper-work on the lot in Tijucal. We already have a small house 5 minutes from the lot which will later serve as the house for the worker. At today's prices we are a long way from having enough to build there. But we have a small auditorium built on to the side of the house which we are using for now. What we need mostly right now is another worker. Pray for this. We will need an American family if the Lord so pleases to help and also a Brazilian worker. If I am to build the other church building before furlough time we will need to start by the middle of next year. Please remember the Draper Work Fund as the Lord would so lead, along with the other needs of our missionary brethren.

## Conditions in Peru and the World Call for Special Prayer . . . Report on the Works . . . Receive 300 Bibles . . .

Dear Friends:

The world is naturally focused on the situation in Iraq at this time, and I'm sure all Christians, including Anita, the kids and myself, are praying for a peaceful solution if it be God's will. However, down in this part of the world (Peru, South America), the people aren't much interested in the rest of the world. Its understandable, with things as bad as they are here. Peru has one of the highest infant mortality rates in the world, and every day here is a struggle for the majority. Things were bad before, but after the new government took office and implemented severe measures to bring inflation under control, things have only gotten worse in Peru. The majority of small businesses have closed down and millions are without work. Daily, people come and beg at the door. Poverty, begging, crime, disease, and bureaucratic corruption rule the day here. The government continues to try and solve the problems, and there are some signs that things could get better, but the task is huge and only the grace of God is the real answer. On that note, I ask you, our friends, to pray. I mean really pray, for Peru! Pray for the leaders worldwide. This sinful world is on the brink of war, and again, only God's grace can make things better.

As a missionary, the Lord's Ambassador, here in Peru, I travel and preach, study and write, counsel and teach. Time never takes a vacation; it just keeps on passing. I must admit that sometimes I feel its passing

me by! The works in general are doing well, with the exception of the church in San Francisco on the river. I'm due to go there in two weeks and hopefully help them solve their internal problems by teaching them the difference between what is truly Biblical and their own superstitious customs and ideas. Pray!

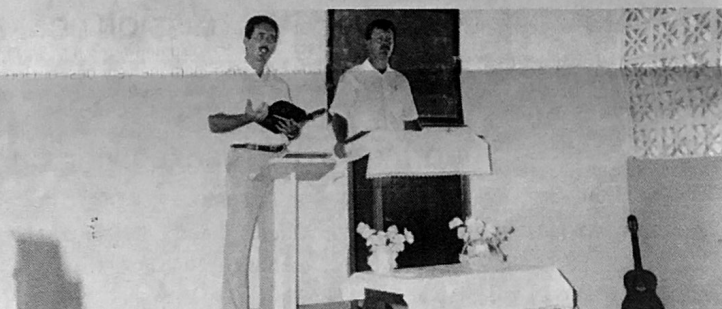

He's been a good friend and a big help to the mission work. Pray now for Jordan Baptist as the church seeks a new Pastor.

Well, I've written enough for now. You all take care and may the Lord continue to bless as you remain faithful to HIM.

Fourthly, it will involve less worry and stress with material facilities. This is what robs many missionaries of their motivation and energy. We aren't the first or only missionaries using this approach. Others who have applied it have usually found it to be effective.

Progress on the building of our house here is slow. Hopefully, the concrete floor for the second story will be finished this week.

Alta and I are building on to the small house we are buying. The addition will provide a large room for services with a capacity for 100 persons and a living area over the large room. When there are a group of believers here we will help them buy a lot and then they will have to build their building. The money we have in the building fund for New Works is destined for the building in Marilia and the building in Cornelio Procopio.

We have not started the building in Marilia yet due to the high prices of building materials. The new government with its

economic changes has caused the value of the dollar exchange to fall and the prices of materials are very high. Hopefully, prices will continue to stabilize and soon we can start building in Marilia.

In Cornelio Procopio we are looking for land to buy. In fact, I bought two lots and unfortunately, one of the lots had been sold by another real estate agency. So we are back looking again. We have to vacate the building we are now renting due to the raise in rent. Pray we might soon find suitable lots that we can afford to buy.

On the 7th of September we had a special day of Bible study for the young people of our churches. The meeting was held in Garca and there were about 90 young people present. Odali brought studies about **Courtship and Marriage and Attitudes**. I brought studies about **Principles of Life in the Book of Hebrews and Commitment to God**.

Beginning in a new field of work is somewhat slow and frustrating so remember to pray for us here in Urai and Cornelio Procopio. The Lord willing, we hope to be able to move here by the first of January.

Dear Brethren,

During this Mission Sheet Month I preached 18 times besides speaking at the four Wednesday night Prayer Meetings at the 14th of December Baptist Church - seven sermons at the Church, nine at five different churches, two in open air meetings and one in a Chapel Service at the "Faculdade."

Saturday, August 18th, I preached to 210 at the 17th of August Baptist Church. This Church is already meeting in their new building which is still in construction. For several months we have not received enough designated funds to help them. Brother Marivald Alves Natario, the national pastor would be happy to receive some more help from us. On the 24th of August at around 20:00, we arrived (Marie, Adelia and I) at the New Jerusalem Baptist Church after spending some 8 hours on the commercial boat. I preached three times. Saturday morning after prayer meeting Brother Evandro and I made a visit by land and by lake. The unsaved man we visited (with his family) is the man who bought the Mission launch. That night I preached to more than an hundred people. It was a special service. The engagement of Adelia and Gilberto was

publicly proclaimed.

September 7th found us some 70 miles (we went and returned by car) in Castanho. There I preached the 9th anniversary service of the First Baptist Church where Raimundo Pereira is the pastor.

In my July letter I made a mistake. I wrote (in connection with the selling of the Mission launch) that we came out spending two or three dollars more than the sale of the boat brought. I should have written two or three HUNDRED dollars. However, in Brother Harold Draper's letter (same Mission Sheet) he made no mistake when he wrote about the tight financial times for us here in Brazil.

We appreciate and thank the Lord for each church and individual that gives to the work - regular and designated funds. Please continue to do so. We need your help. Dear Brethren,

Greetings from Mississippi one more time. I am writing you from our home while on furlough; not that I have been here that much. This is just a one day stop between trips. We are all well. I personally am a little tired and wish I was back home, but that is only normal.

The last word from the field was good. Our home church will be having a special weekend meeting this month. The guest speaker and singer will be Brother Sebastiao. He is blind, a good preacher and great singer. He lives and works in Rio de Janeiro.

Also our men are making a trip to a place called Boto where we have a mission point. This place is many miles back into the jungle and hard to reach. There have been many saved there though and a few of our preachers will be there to encourage them and teach them. At present these young believers do not have a preacher there. One of the local men gathers them for Bible reading and prayer on Sundays.

Thanks to all the churches who have

had me come and present our work. All have been quite gracious and have responded warmly to our visits.

Let me share a missionary's point of view, one thought about furloughs from my angle. I understand the urgent need for the missionary to visit as many churches as possible. There is no doubt that this personal contact is necessary to both the churches and the missionary. This is driven home every time someone says, "Brother Mike, are you still down there in, uh, Peru?" This lets me know that many don't know what country I work in and even tells me that some don't know if I am still a missionary! The personal contact is a need, no doubt about it. On my side of this question though I feel that sometimes I am "spinning my wheels". As a missionary there is always the urge and feeling that I want and need to be in my own field where I am sure that I am accomplishing what God has called me to do. Why am I telling you this? You need to be aware that your missionaries get tired and sometimes discouraged while on furlough! So if you see that "far-away" look in his eyes then you will know why. He enjoys being with you and sharing what the Lord is using him to do, BUT he would really rather be down ... where is that place, anyway?

## WEST INDIES MISSION REPORT

September 11, 1990

Dear Brother Overbey and Saints:

I greet you in the name of our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. I pray God's blessings upon you and yours.

Our country is still under a state of emergency and our services have to be kept in such a way so that we do not violate the curfew hours. Our church activities have been somewhat curtailed by this situation. For instance, a week of outdoor meetings had to be cancelled because it is illegal to assemble in large groups. Our Vacation Bible School had to be cancelled because parents were very hesitant to let their children out of their homes because they believed it was unsafe.

Except for our Bible Study, all our services had been going on as usual; we resumed our Bible Study Friday night. I started to teach "The Sovereignty of God". I believe this is doctrine that is either being ignored or neglected from the modern pulpit, hence the reason why so many are having trouble accepting it. Please pray for me that I would do justice to such a God-honouring doctrine.

On the 31st of August, a thanksgiving service was held at our mission outpost where we had as our guest speaker Brother Sugrim Ramesar, a graduate of Lexington Baptist College. We also took up an offering which is to be sent to two missionaries we help support in Guyana, South America. At the moment, we are making another concentrated effort in going into the homes of the Hindus around us and sharing the gospel with them. Pray that we would reach them for our Lord.

Except for the uncertain situation in our country, everything is all right. Our membership is faithful in their church attendance. The regular visitors are not as faithful as we expect of them. We are praying for them however. I appreciate your concern and love our ministry here in Trinidad. May God bless you and keep you all.
